Real-time documentation ensures program fidelity, saves personnel hours and allows staff to fully concentrate on providing safe and secure supervision for the residents in Secure Detention, Residential Treatment, and Family Services programs. Programs use evidence based cognitive behavioral treatment protocol called Rational Behavior Training. This protocol seeks to impact the youths' criminal behaviors by focusing on changing their criminal oriented thinking. To help effect these changes, the protocol uses a detailed behavior modification program, based in classical operant condition theory that rewards positive, pro-social behavior and consequences negative, anti-social behaviors. The key to this programs' effectiveness is immediately tying the observed behavior with the associated reward or consequence. This requires detailed staff observation and recording of each youth's behaviors continuously throughout the day. This in turn, requires staff to continuously complete numerous records detailing the youths' program points, relating the observed behaviors and outcomes to the individual's treatment plan and a host of other records including shift reports and safety and security audits.</p>

Many of these youth are involved in gangs, drugs or are subject to other environmental factors that lead to poor decision-making and lack of awareness of potential consequences. In an effort to alleviate this trend youth who are admitted to the CCJH are screened for the use of illicit/illegal drugs and are immediately placed in our detention program. The detention program challenges youth to identify and acknowledge inappropriate choices in many aspects of their life such as peer groups, decision-making, and thought process using a Rational Behavior Therapy model. In order to ensure that youth are held accountable for their behavior, increasing and enhancing hand held communication devices is of utmost importance. To support the efforts of the CCJH, the Calhoun County Juvenile Crime Enforcement Coalition intends to focus its efforts on making the facility as safe and secure as possible for our residents, staff, and visitors. The Coalition has concluded that the most important and effective way to accomplish this the present time is to increase and enhance current hand held radios capabilities within the CCJH. This will increase the staff response time to volatile situations, allowing for staff to begin verbal de-escalation and anger management techniques with residents.</p>

The SAFETY Program is a diversion program for City of Detroit youth and their families, focusing on intervention services and treatment services. The Bureau of Juvenile Justice, JABG dollars are funding services to youth referred by Wayne County Third Circuit Court Family Division, Juvenile Section; Wayne County Juvenile Drug Court; and youth referred from the Wayne County Prosecutors Office. JABG dollars are being used to provide staffing for the Detroit Juvenile Assessment Center (JAC), Successful Alliance for Evaluating Talented Youth (SAFETY) Program. The JAC provides immediate community based intake, and rapid, comprehensive, multi-disciplinary assessment for Detroit juveniles taken into custody by police. The SAFETY program is a diversion program providing services to Detroit youth ranging from assessment and referral, to intervention and treatment services. The SAFETY Program will provide some funding toward the Wayne County Drug Court Program. The Drug Court funding is for a portion of a Juvenile Drug Court Probation Officers salary and mileage. The SAFETY Program will also provide wages for youth participating in a summer work program. Youth will work four hours a day, three times a week, for four weeks, on community service programs as part of the diversion agreement. If youth do not report for their Summer Work assignments, the Probation Officer or referring Jurist will be notified and sanctions will be enforced. Detroit's Juvenile Assessment Center provides case management through on-site staff capability linked to a locally organized system of services that include community-based services, crisis shelters, individual and family counseling, intervention services, leisure time activities and substance abuse treatment programs.</p> <p>Substance Abuse Testing Policy Summary: Strictly voluntary for walk-ins and pre-adjudicated youth, mandatory substance abuse testing for youth currently being supervised by Wayne County Third Circuit Court, Juvenile Division. SAFETY provides drug screening to identify youth who are using marijuana, opiate and/or cocaine. These individuals will be referred to a substance abuse treatment program to provide treatment in an effort to help them eliminate the use of drugs in their lives. An assessment/evaluation is conducted for all youth who test positive for the use of marijuana and other drugs (AOD). These youth will be referred to a substance abuse treatment program. The program will be based on the specific problems and needs of the individual. The recommended treatment could include: drug education; individual and/or family counseling; group counseling; self-help and 12-step programs; relapse prevention program; residential placement; psychiatric treatment; or intensive outpatient care. SAFETY's drug screening/assessment will be provided by staff certified by the State of Michigan's Board for Addiction Professionals.</p>

The Court's focus is on juveniles with petitioned offenses involving drugs or guns. One senior-level intensive probation officer has a reduced caseload of up to twenty juveniles identified with substance abuse histories or gun</p>

Numerous organizations and affiliations work in conjunction with the probation officer to ensure successful outcomes. Several supervision and service options are made available, including electronic tethering, life skills training, psychological evaluations, mental health assessments, and individual and family counseling to name a few. Case supervision duties include intensive monitoring, random drug screening, breathalyzer testing, and assistance in transporting clients and parents to and from treatment sessions. There are graduated sanctions and rewards built into the probation contract. Drug Court is an intervention which provides support to coincide with the JABG program.</p> <p>In addition, many juveniles served through the 7th Judicial Circuit Court, Family Division, have been identified as having emotional impairments, learning disabilities, or in need of non-traditional educational settings. Many times the youth in need of additional services and their families are unaware of the procedures to follow to ensure a successful educational outcome. School systems may be unaware of the family and social dynamics which impair a youth's learning. An Education Specialist, with a full understanding of the federal and state requirements, will be used to provide youth access to the appropriate resources needed in the home, school and/or community. Specialists will also participate in behavior planning or other outcome based meetings to communicate the specific needs of each child and ensure those needs are adequately met. Behavior programs will be tailored for each child. Advocate will act as the liaison between the schools, family, and Court. Specialist will recommend additional testing or evaluation on an as needed basis. Lastly, baseline information will be collected and progress, or lack thereof, will be monitored and communicated to all. Providing these services will enhance learning and school attendance, reduce school suspensions and drop outs, and ultimately improve graduation and reduce re-offending.</p>

The program will continue to be administered by the Dispute Resolution Center of Central Michigan, with oversight from a Juvenile Crime Enforcement Coalition comprised of police, prosecutors, social services, schools, juvenile courts, community agencies, and others with experience in the local juvenile justice system.</p> <p>The program will operate with a part-time Restorative Justice Coordinator and a part-time Restorative Justice Practitioner. These individuals will coordinate restorative justice interventions within the school, conduct interviews with program participants and their parents, follow-up with parties to ensure compliance, collect data using such instruments as a follow-up survey and a screen for recidivism, and other program related activities.</p> <p>The program will be devoted year-round to restorative justice interventions.</p>

Kalamazoo County will use JABG funding for substance abuse assessments, educations sessions, and supervision for community services activities. First time juvenile offenders with an alcohol or illegal substance use offense or related offense will attend an inquiry with an intake screener. At the inquiry, if appropriate for diversion and the juvenile admits responsibility, a MAYSI-2 and substance abuse screening would be administered. If the assessments showed a need for a substance abuse assessment, one would be scheduled within 60 days. If the juvenile fails to appear for and/or cooperate with the assessment, they will appear before a referee for sanctions up to and including abstraction to the Secretary of State. If the assessment does not show a need for a substance abuse assessment, the juvenile will be referred to an educational component to be completed within 60 days. If the juvenile fails to appear for and/or cooperate with the educational component, they will appear before a referee for sanctions up to and including abstraction to the Secretary of State. In addition, a policy has been developed for controlled substance testing, assessment, and sanctions for early detection of drug use for juveniles that are at high risk for drug use and abuse.</p> <p>The Kent County CEP focuses on the continued practice and enhancement of a policing and probation approach to working with offenders, along with all the resultant accountability sanctions that are part of such a concept. Community probation will continue to operate in the South Sector of the City of Grand Rapids. This area is the highest police referral source for the Court. The use of JABG funding has allowed the Court to use this sector as a pilot for the Court to expand community probation into other areas of the City and the County. Four probation officers are assigned to this area and the wages and fringe benefits for one officer will be partially funded by the JABG grant.</p> <p>The broad goal of the Community program is to reduce juvenile delinquency in a targeted population by providing court and probation services. The objectives of the program involve developing cooperative working relationships with the police and probation officers; developing services and plans with the entire family unit in mind; providing services or assist in</p>

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			accessing services that are collaborative and coordinated; assigning probation officers to certain sectors of the city that support the philosophy of community policing/probation; and enhancing the philosophy of justice by way of community service and restitution. Probation officers will be housed in the community with the community policing team.

The mission of Juvenile Drug Court is to empower substance abusing juvenile offenders and their families to restore abstinence, maintain sobriety, and reduce recidivism through judicial supervision and treatment that integrates community resources. Youth in the program receive intensive outpatient group counseling for the first ten weeks and then graduate to weekly group counseling. They participate in individual therapy bi-weekly and monthly family therapy. The program is designed to be six months in length. The Juvenile Drug Court program targets youth that are at risk for residential placement as a result of their substance abusing behaviors. This program allows the youth to remain with their family, in the community and saves money by not sending them to a costly residential placement.

The 38 <sup>th</sup> District Court is using JABG funding to install a Live Scan fingerprinting system and train court staff. Currently, all juvenile offenders requiring fingerprinting by law must be escorted by a Juvenile Probation officer or transported by a Monroe County Youth Center staff to the Monroe County Jail for fingerprinting and creation of associated records. Current process also requires juveniles to remain sight and sound separated from adult prisoners during the procedure. The transport and separation requirements of the current system are time consuming and an inefficient use of scarce resources. Installation of a Live Scan fingerprinting system will allow court staff to immediately take fingerprints following an appearance in court, and the prints and associated records will be immediately transferred electronically to the Michigan State Police and placed on file in the Court's information technology system.

The program will utilize diversion through the court system based on BARJ principles. Through early intervention and self accountability minors are provided with community support for successful outcomes. The Keys to Success diversion program addresses students in the court system to develop juvenile accountability, anger management and successful ways to address life situations. The Life Skills program will teach parents the proper tools necessary to work with the daily challenges of family life. The program also establishes positive life skills which will help them become successful in life settings. An order is designed by the Judge with all parties involved having an understanding that the minors and parents agree to participate in the process. Relationships between school officials, community members, families and the courts are developed. It is the goal of the program to divert these cases from the formal court docket through referrals to community based programs such as, Keys to Success and the Life Skills program. The overall goal is for the child to remain out of the court system and to go through their lives without any official court involvement. Compared to court adjudication, case management and diversion programs allow for the process to be confidential, inexpensive, and expedient. Counseling will be provided to assist the student and parents towards a successful court experience. Other outside agencies collaborate to meet the needs of the families referred. Based on risk assessments with children and families recommendations are made by the court intake department.</p>

The program provides individualized treatment and supervision to keep youth at home, assistance and support to parents to develop parenting skills, connections for parents and siblings to drug treatment, teaches youth how to interact appropriately and productively within their homes, schools, and neighborhoods, and connects youth and families to resources within their community.</p> <p>The JDC contains three levels of treatment available for youth:</p> <p>1) a 3-4 month residential component (provided by Children’s Services and Dawn Farm) for drug-dependent youth;</p>

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			<p>2) a 9 month outpatient component of moderate intensity for drug-dependent youth (including treatment sessions three times per week and intensive community-based supervision); and</p> <p>3) a 4-6 month, lower intensity outpatient program for drug-abusing youth.</p> <p>With the exception of the residential component, youth are now maintained in their community schools.</p>

Youth on probation, who are under the jurisdiction of the 13 <sup>th</sup> Circuit Court, including Antrim, Leelanau, and Grand Traverse Counties, will be tested for unlawful use of controlled substances and alcohol. Those youth who continue to violate the law will receive graduated sanctions including detention. This multi-systemic approach will reduce youth crime as evidenced by the continued reductions in Grand Traverse County's petitions. Our Courts recognize that due to decreased funding this grant provides important funding for needed consistency in programming.

The 19th Judicial Circuit-Family Division will use a program of graduated sanctions, the drug court program, drug testing, intensive out-patient drug/alcohol treatment and intervention strategies to deter youth in Benzie and Manistee from using Drugs and Alcohol. Upon receiving a petition for a drug or alcohol offense the minor will be referred to Catholic Human Services to participate in a drug education program for teens. If the minor violates a condition of probation or if they test positive for alcohol/drugs they may be referred to Catholic Human Services for an in depth drug/alcohol

Once the assessment is done, the treatment provider and caseworker will then make a recommendation to the court on treatment related issues necessary to assist the minor in changing inappropriate behaviors. The recommendation could be for the youth to attend intensive out-patient treatment, inpatient treatment, or refer the youth and family to drug court. The caseworker will refer to the proper program and provide all the necessary casework services to assist the youth toward the goal of zero tolerance. All the caseworkers are very knowledgeable about the programs available for youth in their respective communities and will work together with the schools, Department of Human Services, Mental Health, and local law enforcement to provide services to families and youth in Benzie and Manistee Counties. The substance abuse testing policy is very simple. A youth can be tested twenty-four hours per day, seven days per week, three hundred sixty-five days per year. We then send the urine samples to Redwood Toxicology for analysis.</p>

JABG-NM funds will provide experiential substance abuse programming through Youth Camp Programming and Random drug testing.</p> <p>Newaygo County Juvenile Division provides a comprehensive approach to youth substance abuse issues. Programs include diversion, probation, random drug testing, in-home detention, and placement. These programs could include psychological testing, substance abuse counseling and treatment, and educational/support groups depending on the needs of the youth.</p> <p>JABG-NM funds allow the court to contract services to provide Diversion Programming to first time juvenile offenders. Diversion programs give youth the opportunity to avoid prosecution resulting</p>

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			<p>in a criminal record. Diversion gives the youth a chance to recognize his/her poor choices, analyze decisions and modify behavior. Diversion programming provides the youth and their families' awareness training and education. The Drug and Alcohol Diversion program provides a challenge education experience at Camp Henry, group counseling, and random drug testing. The Shoplifting Diversion Program requires group meetings and a home study program with a verification quiz.
