<p><b><u>Chaldeans</u></b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. At least 40,000 live in metropolitan Detroit.</li><li>2. Many live in Dearborn.</li><li>3. They began arriving around 1910 and settled in an area around Belle Isle.</li><li>4. They come from the country of Iraq, but are Roman Catholics.</li></ol>	<p><b><u>Chinese</u></b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. They settled in Detroit region in the 1870s.</li><li>2. They settled an area called “Chinatown,” located near Third and Michigan streets.</li><li>3. Many had left the western United States because of anti-Chinese discrimination there.</li><li>4. Immigration of Chinese began to rise again in late 1990s.</li></ol>
<p><b><u>Japanese</u></b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. They came in large numbers after World War II.</li><li>2. The first Japanese community was located near Wayne State University.</li><li>3. Another wave of Japanese immigrants came in the 1980s.</li><li>4. Most of the recent Japanese immigrants settled in Oakland County.</li></ol>	<p><b><u>Irish</u></b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. Many came in 1840s because of a famine in Ireland.</li><li>2. Many settled in an area called “Corktown,” named after County Cork in Ireland.</li><li>3. In 1850, the Irish were the region’s largest ethnic group.</li><li>4. Irish immigration decreased over the years.</li></ol>
<p><b><u>Germans</u></b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. Over one million people in Metropolitan Detroit are of German ancestry.</li><li>2. They began arriving in 1830s.</li><li>3. They settled on the east side of Detroit.</li><li>4. In late 1800s, Germans were the dominant ethnic group in Metropolitan Detroit.</li></ol>	<p><b><u>Greeks</u></b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. There are around 30,000 living in the Detroit Metropolitan region.</li><li>2. The largest Greek immigration was from the late 1880s to the early 1900s.</li><li>3. They settled in an area near downtown that became known as “Greektown.”</li></ol>

<p><b><u>Hungarians</u></b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. There are about 70,000 living in Detroit region.</li><li>2. The first Hungarians arrived just after 1900.</li><li>3. They settled in a region of southwestern Detroit called “Delray.”</li><li>4. Many came to work in the mills along the river.</li></ol>	<p><b><u>Italians</u></b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. Nearly 300,000 live in the Metropolitan Detroit region.</li><li>2. A few Italian families came before the Civil War.</li><li>3. Most came between 1880 and 1920.</li><li>4. They settled along Gratiot Street near Eastern Market.</li><li>5. Over the years, many moved eastward to St. Clair Shores, Warren, and other parts of Macomb County.</li></ol>
<p><b><u>Canadians</u></b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. They started settling in Metropolitan Detroit region in the 1840s.</li><li>2. Many moved just across the river.</li><li>3. Once here, many Canadians identified themselves as Irish, Scottish, English, or Welsh.</li></ol>	<p><b><u>Mexicans</u></b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. They began immigrating to the region around the time of World War I.</li><li>2. Many settled in an area of southwest Detroit that became known as “Mexicantown.”</li><li>3. Today many Mexicans live in Dearborn, Pontiac, and in downriver suburbs such as Melvindale and Allen Park.</li></ol>
<p><b><u>Russians</u></b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. Russian Jews immigrated to the Detroit Metropolitan region to escape discrimination in their homeland.</li><li>2. A few came in the early 1900s but most in the late 1900s.</li><li>3. In the 1970s and 1980s, about 7000 Russian Jews lived in Oakland County.</li></ol>	<p><b><u>Ukrainians</u></b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. There are about 33,000 in the region.</li><li>2. Many came from Pittsburgh, where they had been miners.</li><li>3. Many came here to work in the automobile factories.</li><li>4. They settled on the west side of Detroit, and later in Hamtramck.</li><li>5. Today many live in southern Macomb County.</li></ol>

<p><b><u>Lebanese</u></b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"><li><b>1. Up to 100,000 live in the Metropolitan Detroit region.</b></li><li><b>2. Christians from Lebanon first came around 1890 and settled just east of downtown.</b></li><li><b>3. Lebanese Muslims began to arrive around 1910 and settled in Highland Park.</b></li><li><b>4. Another wave of Lebanese came in the 1970s.</b></li></ol>	<p><b><u>Nigerians</u></b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"><li><b>1. Not including African-Americans, around 1500 out of the 7000 Africans that live in Metropolitan Detroit are from Nigeria.</b></li><li><b>2. Many came in late 1900s when the military was in power in Nigeria.</b></li><li><b>3. They come from many different Nigerian ethnic groups.</b></li></ol>
<p><b><u>Koreans</u></b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"><li><b>1. A small number came after the end of the Korean War in the 1950s.</b></li><li><b>2. Many more came in the late 1970s.</b></li><li><b>3. Most settled in Oakland County.</b></li></ol>	<p><b><u>Poles</u></b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"><li><b>1. Began to come to Metropolitan Detroit just after the Civil War.</b></li><li><b>2. They immigrated in very large numbers between 1890 and 1920.</b></li><li><b>3. Many settled in the lower east side and the west side of Detroit.</b></li><li><b>4. By 1920, they had become the largest immigrant group with nearly 20% of the population.</b></li><li><b>5. Over time, they moved north and east into Macomb County suburbs.</b></li></ol>
