AUTO MECHANICS

Students learn how to troubleshoot and repair various kinds of problems found in today's vehicles. Areas include front end alignment, brake repair, automotive electrical, and engine tune-up.

CABINETMAKING

This program prepares cabinetmakers, millworkers, and wood product technicians. Students can train in the areas of cabinet and furniture assembly, machine and millwork operations, molding operations, and plastic laminate assembly.

COMPUTER PROGRAMMING

Computer programming is the part of business responsible for providing accurate information to management. Students learn current programming languages, including COBOL and RPG.

CULINARY ARTS

Students are provided with the skills, attitudes, and knowledge needed for careers in the food service industry. Training levels include cook's helper, line cook, and cook.

CUSTODIAL

This program provides training in all aspects of cleaning and custodial duties necessary for employment in hospitals, schools, apartment buildings, hotels, and other public or private facilities.

DRAFTING

Students learn to prepare clean, complete, and accurate drawings, both manually and by computer aided design. A student can train to be a drafter or a drafter/detailer.

ELECTRONICS

Students train to become technicians in the areas of consumer products, FCC telecommunications, computer monitors, industrial controls, alarm systems, and assembly of circuit boards.

MACHINE TECHNOLOGY

This program teaches students how to set up and operate machine tools to make or repair metal parts, tools, or machines. Students may also train in numerical control.

P.C. SPECIALIST

Students specialize in different computer related areas such as general office clerk, accounting clerk, administrative assistant, and computer support.

OFFICE AUTOMATION

Students are provided with the electro-mechanical skills necessary to maintain and repair today's office equipment, including computers and peripherals, copiers, and networking essentials.

PRINTING

Students learn offset press operation, flexo press operation, bindery, and desktop publishing.

UPHOLSTERY

Students are prepared for all phases of the upholstery business, such as fabric selection, repairs, and cutting, sewing, and fitting fabric.

WOOD FINISHING

Students learn to prepare and finish various kinds of wood products, such as cabinets, office furniture, and high quality residential furniture.

DIRECTIONS TO MCTI

From **BATTLE CREEK**: Take M-89 west through Richland to Doster Road, turn north, about seven miles to **MCTI**.

From **GRAND RAPIDS**: Take US-131 south to the Plainwell exit, turn east on M-89 through Plainwell to Doster Road, turn north, about seven miles to **MCTI**.

From **KALAMAZOO**: Take US-131 north to the Plainwell exit, turn east on M-89 through Plainwell to Doster Road, turn north, about seven miles to **MCTI**.

From **LANSING**: Take Saginaw Highway (M-43) west, follow M-43 through Hastings to Delton, turn west on Delton Road. At Prairieville, turn north for one half mile, turn west on Pine Lake Road, about four miles to **MCTI**.

The campus — located on the shores of Pine Lake in southwestern Barry County — is fully accessible. For eligible adults who have a physical or mental disability, tuition and room and board are free.

A career assessment service is available to help students explore their career options. Depending on aptitude and interest, students may choose to enroll in one of 13 vocational programs.

Classroom preparation — principally hands on — is complemented by a supportive environment designed to meet the needs of students with physical, mental, or emotional disabilities. A full spectrum of health, psychological, and social work services is provided.

In addition, all classrooms as well as the dormitory rooms, cafeteria, library, and leisure services are located in one building — an especially welcoming feature during Michigan winters.
