IBM has chosen The UPS Store®, which in some cases uses participating Mail Boxes Etc.® centers to facilitate our no-charge product take back for our recycling program for Covered Electronic Devices. The UPS Store® and any such participating Mail Boxes Etc.® centers in Michigan will accept Covered Electronic Devices for shipment to IBM recyclers. When a Covered Electronic Device has been received by a UPS Store® or participating Mail Boxes Etc.® center, the store or center will package it and ship it to IBM's designated facility for recycling. At this time, this is TCG Recycling, located in Louisville, KY. Consumers do not have to pay a fee at the time of collection or afterward. IBM provides for the collection of Covered Electronic Devices that is reasonably convenient and available to consumers in Michigan, and designed to meet the collection needs of consumers in this state. Consumers may simply go online to the IBM website, print a UPS label or a Mail Boxes, Etc. label, then bring their Covered Electronic Device to the respective nearest UPS Store® or Mail Boxes, Etc.® center, where the Covered Electronic Device will be collected and shipped for the consumer.

13. The processes and methods used to recycle or reuse the covered electronic devices received from consumers:

IBM will not dispose of Covered Devices in landfills or transfer covered electronic devices to computer equipment recycling facilities that dispose of covered electronic devices in landfills other than necessary incidental disposal in de minimis amounts.

IBM provides for the recycling or reuse of used computer equipment from residents in Michigan through their recycling contract with Technology Conservation Group (TCG) located in Louisville, KY.

TCG takes extraordinary care to recycle, recover and reuse every part of what's sent to them. In fact, virtually 100% of TCG intake is indeed recycled, recovered or reused, with less than one percent - all biodegradable - sent to the landfill. With this level of commitment

Because TCG complies with this gold standard of Environmental Management Systems, TCG meets or exceeds all local, regional, national and international regulations at many TCG locations around the globe.

All downstream recyclers must meet strict IBM guidelines and are evaluated and approved prior to being used. TCG follows IBM's own very strict standards in this regard.

IBM's overall Environmental Management System has a global ISO 14001 certification, the first Corporation to achieve this designation and this dates back to 1997. Link to IBM's Global Certification:

To the best of our knowledge, all TCG locations are currently ISO 14001 registered & certified by a third party registrar, QMI/SAI.

Comment: IBM has not sold to the "household market" for any of the past five years:

The focus of IBM's recycling offerings is providing solutions for our commercial customers. In April, 2005, IBM completed the sale of its Personal Computing (PC) Division to Lenovo. IBM has not been involved in the design or marketing of desktop personal computers or notebook computers for household consumers since that date. Even before the sale of the Personal Computing Division, IBM's sales of PC systems were targeted to commercial users. In fact, IBM discontinued the sale of PC systems through retail outlets several years before the sale of the business to Lenovo. However, IBM does still manufacture certain video display products for use with professional workstations and business servers. Those products are typically recovered via our Global Asset Recovery Services Division which refurbishes them and resells them for further use.
