Automotive Technology

Students learn how to troubleshoot and repair automobiles. Areas include front-end alignment, brake repair, automotive electrical, and engine tune-up.

Building Services (Building Trades/Weatherization)

Students learn entry level construction laborer skills to construct floors, wall and roof systems and also gain installing skills in air sealing and insulating homes. Students train for safety and national certifications.

Cabinetmaking/Millwork

Students are training in the operation of state-of-the-art woodworking machinery, software and techniques. The program is home to the Midwest Advanced Woodworking Technology Center.

Culinary Arts

Students are provided with the skills, certifications and knowledge needed for entry level careers in the food service industry. Training is conducted in the student restaurant and cafeteria.

Custodial

This program provides training in all aspects of cleaning and custodial duties necessary for employment in hospitals, schools, apartment buildings, hotels and other public or private facilities.

Electronics

Students train to become technicians in the areas of cable and wire assembler/installer, alarm systems, manufacturing and industrial. Training is hands-on learning via lab simulations, projects and bookwork. Safety training is also included.

Graphics Communication

Students learn screen printing, pre-press, bindery, offset press and flexo press operation to produce brochures, business cards, forms and other printing projects.

Grounds Maintenance/Landscaping

Students learn how to operate various tools and machines related to landscaping, planting skills and other seasonal tasks related to grounds upkeep.

Health Careers

Students receive hands-on instruction in patient care, communication, medical terminology, documentation and medical equipment. They prepare for and do testing certification while in the program.

Machine Technology

This program teaches students how to set up and operate various computer numerical control (CNC) and welding equipment to make or repair metal parts, tools or machines.

Office Automation

Students are trained in a well-equipped automation lab with skills to maintain and repair office equipment, including computers, portable devices and copiers. They also learn networking essentials.

Pharmacy Technician

Students train in a simulated lab, learning calculations, cashiering, inventory and medical and pharmaceutical terminology, plus customer service skills.

Retail Marketing

Students learn customer service/selling skills, cash handling, inventory skills, promotion/advertising and loss prevention. This training is conducted in the classroom and the student store.

The Michigan Career & Technical Institute (MCTI) offers adults with disabilities a unique blend of caring human support services and state-of-the-art training for jobs needed in business and industry today.

The campus – located on the shores of Pine Lake in southwestern Barry County – is fully accessible. For eligible adults who have a physical, mental or emotional disability, tuition and room and board in the dormitory are free.

A career assessment service is available to help students explore their career options. Depending on aptitude and interest, students may be eligible to enroll in vocational programming.

Classroom preparation – principally hands on – is complemented by a supportive environment designed to meet the needs of students with physical, mental or emotional disabilities. MCTI offers a number of health and counseling services on campus.

In addition, all classrooms as well as the dormitory rooms, cafeteria, library, and indoor leisure services are located in one building for easy accessibility out of the weather.

Individuals must be at least 18 years old to be accepted into Career Assessment, Career Readiness Services or an MCTI Training program. If a prospective student meets the entrance criteria of the training program, he or she has selected, the Admissions staff will place his/her name in the next available opening for that program.

DIRECTIONS TO MCTI

From **BATTLE CREEK**: Take M-89 west through Richland to Doster Road and then turn north; about seven miles to MCTI.

From **GRAND RAPIDS**: Take US-131 south to the Plainwell exit, turn east on M-89 through Plainwell to Doster Road, and then turn north; about seven miles to MCTI.

From **KALAMAZOO**: Take US-131 north to the Plainwell exit, turn east on M-89 through Plainwell to Doster Road, and then turn north; about seven miles to MCTI.

From **LANSING**: Take Saginaw Highway (M-43) west, follow M-43 through Hastings to Delton, and then turn west on Delton Road At Prairieville, turn north, go one-half mile and then turn west on Pine Lake Road; about four miles to MCTI.

MCTI is accredited by the Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities and by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools. The school also works with the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs.

Michigan Rehabilitation Services (MRS) is funded 78.7% with USDOE-RSA Title I federal funds and 21.3% with state and local funds.
