

Tuliptree, *Liriodendron tulipifera*

Origin: Michigan/North America
Other Names: Tulip Poplar, Yellow Poplar, Tulip Magnolia, Whitewood
Mature Height: 70-90 feet
Crown Width: 25-50 feet
USDA Hardiness Zone: 4-9
Growth Rate: Fast
Light Requirements: Full Sun
Fall Color: Yellow

Culture and Planting Information:

Tuliptree prefers well-drained, moist and slightly acidic soil, but can tolerate clay, loam, and planting locations that are occasionally wet. A member of the Magnolia family, it produces a yellow/orange flower in June. Due to its mature height and size, Tuliptree should not be planted where overhead utility wires are present or where there is not ample room for it to grow.
