2. Identify promising silvicultural treatments that favor oak
3. Highlight sources of information that supports oak ecosystem restoration, and
4. Discuss the significance of oak regeneration monitoring and approaches to accomplish monitoring.

West Michigan's 2016 peregrine chick banding season has finally wrapped up for this year. The four banding sites included: 5/3 Bank in Kalamazoo, Kent County Courthouse in Grand Rapids, Consumers Energy, J.H. Campbell Plant in Port Sheldon, and Board of Light and Power Sims Plant in Grand Haven. "In total, 15 peregrine chicks, 8 females and 7 males were banded," said Nik Kalejs, Wildlife Biologist, "It was a very good banding season."
