Please find following the completed Fire Protection Reporting Requirement questionnaire. The completion of this reporting requirement was taken very seriously and with great concern. It was a joint effort with local Municipalities, Grayling Fire Department and a liaison from the Military.

As discussed with you I have included a separate list of what the Military calls MEVAs "Mission Essential Venerable Asset sites". Part VI contained no category for the MEVAs. I found no category for the Grayling Airport. Our Airport services the public. In addition it plays an essential role in the Military Training conducted at Camp Grayling. The airport also serves as a base for Homeland Security in Northern Michigan. I'm sure it could be considered a potential target risk.

It is a huge concern to have the responsibility for fire protection for the largest Township in the Lower Peninsula. At the same time burdened financially due to the large percentage of state land with little to no tax base to help fund our fire department. At the same time we have what we think is a large number of target risks. Without adequate funding we feel our area is potentially vulnerable.
