LOST WORKTIME INJURIES AND ILLNESSES: CHARACTERISTICS AND RESULTING TIME AWAY FROM WORK MICHIGAN 2010


This publication contains Case and Demographic data reported on the Survey of Occupational Injuries and Illnesses. This survey is conducted by the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS), U.S. Department of Labor, in cooperation with the Department of Licensing & Regulatory Affairs, Michigan Occupational Safety and Health Administration (MIOSHA), Management and Technical Services Division, Management Information Systems Section.

During 2010, a total of 26,830 injuries and illnesses that required days away from work* beyond the day of the incident were reported in private industry workplaces in Michigan. Nationally, there were a total of 933,200 reported.

The following charts give specific details regarding data collected by age, length of service, nature, part of body, source, and event. There is also a chart showing the occupations with the most injuries and illnesses.

WORKER CHARACTERISTICS HIGHLIGHTS


AGE



Workers between the ages of 35-54 accounted for almost half of the total injury and illness cases.


Forty-four percent of the injury and illness cases involved workers who had been on the job for more than five years.


NATURE



Sprains, strains made up over 39% of all nonfatal occupational injuries and illnesses in 2010.


PART OF BODY

The trunk (shoulder and back) was injured in 34% of the injury and illness cases reported in 2010.




Floors, ground surfaces contributed to 23 percent of the occupational injuries and illnesses in 2010.

The event of Overexertion was the leading category involved in one-fourth of the nonfatal occupational injuries and illness during 2010.
