2007 GLBHI Conference Draws Largest Audience Yet

LANSING, MI, June 16, 2007 -- The fourth annual Great Lakes Border Health Initiative (GLBHI) Conference was held on June 13-15, 2007 in Niagara Falls, New York and received rave reviews from its more than 200 attendees. This marked the first time since its inception that the conference was held outside of Michigan.

GLBHI is comprised of six US states and one Canadian province (Michigan, Minnesota, New York, Ohio, Ontario, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin) in the Great Lakes region that share a common goal: enhancing early warning infectious disease surveillance at our international borders. GLBHI is funded through the Early Warning Infectious Disease Surveillance (EWIDS) cooperative agreement provided by the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Each year, GLBHI organizes a conference inviting local, state and federal representatives from both Canada and the United States to participate as a means of introducing and further cementing relationships established across the borders. This year's conference, *Partnerships to Improve Identification of International Infectious Disease Issues*, was held with a focus on international food safety and defense. It featured many high profile speakers from the governmental and private sectors in topics ranging from the keynote addresses on food safety and regulation, the World Health Organization's International Health Regulations and the European Union's Early Warning Response System to breakout sessions on topics such as norovirus and botulism, cross-border communications, the role of the laboratory, plus an in-depth facilitated discussion about applying isolation and quarantine scenarios involving local tribes and First Nations.

A tabletop exercise, facilitated by Donald Tillery and the University of Michigan Center for Public Health Preparedness, was also held, featuring deliberate E. coli contamination by self-proclaimed terrorists at a produce distribution center servicing Canadian and American food retailers.

Overall, the 2007 Great Lakes Border Health Initiative Conference was a great success thanks to presenters and participants that contributed a wealth of 'in the field' expertise and represented over twenty jurisdictions in both the United States and Canada.
