

2014-2015 Section 32p Report

Early Childhood Outcomes

Public Act 196 of 2014 of the State School Aid Act allocated \$10,900,000 to intermediate school districts for the purpose of providing early childhood funding in block grants. This funding supports each intermediate school district (ISD) or a consortium of intermediate school districts to convene a local Great Start Collaborative and Great Start Parent Coalition (GSC/GSPC). The goal of each GSC/GSPC is to ensure the coordination and expansion of local early childhood infrastructure and programs that allow every child in the community to achieve the Governor's Early Childhood Outcomes.

- Outcome 1: Children born healthy.
- Outcome 2: Children healthy, thriving, and developmentally on track from birth to third grade.
- Outcome 3: Children developmentally ready to succeed in school at the time of school entry.
- Outcome 4: Children prepared to succeed in fourth grade and beyond by reading proficiently by the end of third grade.

Each local GSC/GSPC is also directed to convene a work group to serve as a school readiness advisory committee as provided for in section 32d, which lays out the expectations for the Great Start Readiness Program. In addition, the local Great Start system is to include supports for children birth through age 8. These supports, or system components, consist of:

1. Physical Health,
2. Social-emotional Health,
3. Family Supports and Basic Needs,
4. Parent Education and Child Advocacy, and
5. Early Education and Care.

Statute also allows the Michigan Department of Education to determine a formula for distribution of the State School Aid funds, as well as develop criteria for the use of funds. Funds distributed in Fiscal Year 2015 were budgeted to meet the statutory requirements. A total of \$6,655,984 was budgeted for the Great Start Collaboratives and Great Start Parent Coalitions (GSC/GSPC). Each GSC/GSPC completed work in accordance to what is outlined above. The work of the school readiness advisory committee fell under Outcome 3, thus each GSC/GSPC was required to work on that outcome, and were expected to address at least one other outcome in their application for funds. Some local GSC/GSPCs chose to cover multiple outcomes and/or complete multiple goals under those chosen outcomes.

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GSC/GSPC Goals

There were 28 GSC/GSPCs that wrote goals focused within Outcome 1, with activities of 23 of those GSC/GSPCs addressing system component 1, 10 addressing system component 2, 14 addressing system component 3, 13 addressing system component 4, and 8 addressing system component 5. Examples of the work directed toward Outcome 1 include access to proper preconception and prenatal care, improving safe sleep environments for newborns and infants, work towards reducing the number of babies born who were exposed to toxic substances, improving maternal and paternal lifestyles to improve home environments (smoking cessation, substance abuse supports, mental health services and access).

Outcome 2 was selected by 39 GSC/GSPCs with activities of 25 of those GSC/GSPCs addressing system component 1, 22 addressing system component 2, 21 addressing system component 3, 23 addressing system component 4, and 20 addressing system component 5. Examples of work for Outcome 2 included: comprehensive developmental screenings, oral health, physical activity and obesity prevention, home visiting access and hub development, supports and resources for teen parents, improvement to the IEP process for families, and referral and access to mental health services.

Outcome 3 was addressed by all 54 GSC/GSPCs with activities of 5 of those GSC/GSPCs designed to coordinate within system component 1, 8 within system component 2, 10 within system component 3, 17 within system component 4, and 47 addressing system component 5. Outcome 3 work included the creation of the school readiness advisory committees, child development trainings, joint recruitment and enrollment, increased access to quality learning and preschool settings, three-year-old scholarships, professional development and trainings for child care providers and teachers, and database creation to track children’s success.

A total of 27 GSC/GSPCs selected Outcome 4, with activities of 5 of those GSC/GSPCs addressing system component 1, 5 addressing system component 2, 5 addressing system component 3, 17 addressing system component 4, and 20 addressing system component 5. Some of the work addressed in Outcome 4 included early literacy activities related to book collection and distribution, early literacy and numeracy supports and education for families and children, connection and collaboration with physicians to distribute books at well-child checkups, Imagination Library™, and home-based literacy initiatives.

The following table summarizes the outcomes and system components that were addressed within the application for funds during fiscal year 2015.

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In addition to the funding supporting the GSC/GSPCs to attend to system-level changes, funds for early childhood programming were also utilized by each GSC/GSPC. Each of the 54 GSC/GSPCs provided at least one program with 43 percent, 23 GSC/GSPCs, offering more than one program. In addition, the 32p funds were blended with other locally-determined resources, often making it impossible to report discreetly on the number of families and children served. Early childhood programming funds supported programs that served children and families locally to achieve the outcomes and components outlined in Public Act 196 of 2014. Seventy-six percent of the GSC/GSPCs offered home visitation, with a majority utilizing Parents As Teachers™. Other offerings included fatherhood programs, literacy programs, social emotional screening, parent education and three-year-old preschool scholarships. The programs and services funded were both new or expanded programs and services, selected and implemented through collaborative efforts, to fill gaps and needs for children and families determined through community needs assessments and the strategic planning process. In fiscal year 2015, there was a total of \$4,244,016 budgeted for Early Childhood Programming with 5,635 families and 8,310 children served.

While MDE received and reviewed all 54 of the GSC/GSPCs accomplishments towards the outcomes, the Appendix of individual reports focuses on condensed achievements in early childhood programming, as section 32p(4) requires this report attend to the activities that related directly to the families and children served. Individual reports of the GSC/GSPCs focus on Outcomes and System Components are also displayed.

MDE also reported 2014-2015 data to the Department of Health and Human Services as a state investment for maintenance of effort for the federal funds for Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF). The report reflected those families and children who received more intensive services, including home visits, community referrals, and parent education classes under the block grant. Data are not available on the number of children in families who accessed parent education materials through district websites, news media, learning fairs, in physicians' offices, etc. The following data was provided in that report on children and families served:
