Nutrition Program Funding

- ❖ U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA)
 - School entitlement programs
 - Competitive grant programs
 - Allocation of USDA Commodity Foods
- ❖ Michigan State Aid Fund

National School Lunch Program (NSLP)

- ❖ Over 900 public, private, and residential child care institution School Food Authorities (SFA)
- ❖ Free lunches available to many students, including foster, runaway, migrant, homeless, and those in low-income households

National School Lunch Program (NSLP)

❖ School Meals Facts

- Total lunches served all year
 - ❖ FY 10 – 144,351,545
 - ❖ FY 11 – 141,424,866
- October's Average Daily Participation (ADP)
 - ❖ FY 10 – 860,360
 - ❖ FY 11 – 864,739

❖ School Meals Facts

- FY 10 Reimbursement
 - ❖ Federal – \$258,710,257
 - ❖ State Aid Section 31d – \$21,664,383
- FY 11 Reimbursement
 - ❖ Federal – \$263,214,677
 - ❖ State Aid Section 31d – \$20,827,131

School Breakfast Program

- ❖ Available to over 900 public, private, and residential child care institutions
- ❖ Offers students a balanced breakfast that includes protein, milk, grains, and fruit or vegetable
- ❖ Served in a variety of ways, including inside the classroom
- ❖ Available for free to the same students as the NSLP

School Breakfast Program

- ❖ Free and Reduced Breakfast and Lunches Served
 - Served in FY 10
 - ❖ Breakfasts – 44,388,256
 - ❖ Lunches – 92,875,844
 - Served in FY 11
 - ❖ Breakfasts – 46,648,476
 - ❖ Lunches – 92,856,313

Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP)

- ❖ Nutritious food for day care centers, Head Start programs, outside school hour programs, and family and group day care homes
- ❖ Vital role in improving the quality of day care for children by making care more affordable for many low-income families
- ❖ Meals for children in over 1,000 preschool programs and child care centers in Michigan

Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP)

- ❖ Free federally-funded meals and snacks in community-based programs offering enrichment activities for at-risk children and youth, 18 and under, after the regular school day ends
- ❖ Annually reimburses 200 programs serving over 3 million snacks and suppers

Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP)

- ❖ Federal reimbursement for meals and snacks served to small groups of children receiving nonresidential day care in **private homes** that are licensed, registered, or approved to provide family child care
- ❖ Health and safety standards, training, and monitoring make CACFP an important component of quality child care, especially in family day care homes
- ❖ Over 6,800 family day care homes are sponsored by one of six family day care home sponsors

- ❖ Lunches – 12,952,176
- ❖ Suppers – 5,469,874

- ❖ Average Daily Attendance – 83,678

Summer Food Service Program (SFSP)

- ❖ **FOOD THAT'S IN WHEN SCHOOL IS OUT!!**
- ❖ Ensures healthy meals for children year-round
- ❖ More than 200 schools, agencies, and summer camps participate
- ❖ Nutritional meals provided to all children at approved sites, in areas with significant concentrations of low-income children

Summer Food Service Program (SFSP)

❖ Summer Food Service Program Facts

- Total lunches served
 - ❖ FY 10 – 1,697,527
 - ❖ FY 11 – 1,717,950
- Reimbursement
 - ❖ FY 10 – \$7,108,430
 - ❖ FY 11 – \$7,276,224

Community Eligibility Option (CEO)

- ❖ Michigan - one of three states in the CEO pilot program
- ❖ An alternate method of qualifying students for free breakfast and lunch in areas of high poverty
- ❖ Individual schools or entire districts with a direct certification rate of 40% or higher eligible to participate


Community Eligibility Option (CEO)

- ❖ Michigan has 85 school districts, including 441 schools representing nearly 200,000 students, eligible to receive a free lunch and free breakfast on a daily basis
- ❖ Key advantage is the elimination of stigma that has long accompanied the receipt of Free or Reduced meals
- ❖ Early claim data shows an overall increase in participation in CEO schools
 - 6.4% increase in Breakfast participation
 - 9.3% increase in Lunch participation

Summer Electronic Benefit Transfer For Children (SEBTC)



- ❖ Michigan: One of five states selected for the pilot in 2011
- ❖ Partners: Grand Rapids Public Schools and Department of Community Health
- ❖ Grant value: \$707,735 to implement; \$450,000 food benefit
- ❖ Participants: 2,500 student food benefits ; \$60 per eligible child per benefit month
- ❖ Full Implementation Grant: \$309,354 to provide 5,000 students food benefits
- ❖ Expansion Grant: \$460,136 to provide 5,000 students food benefits
- ❖ Includes contiguous counties (Bay, Clare, Gladwin, Midland, Tuscola, Arenac)



Michigan Farm To School

- ❖ House Bill provides for the collaboration of Michigan Department of Agriculture (MDA) and Michigan Department of Education (MDE) for farm-related issues and schools
- ❖ Farm to School committee finds ways to link local farmers with schools
- ❖ 41% of schools report having purchased local fresh fruits and vegetables for their students

Team Nutrition (TN) Training Grants

- ❖ Support implementation of USDA's nutrition requirements and the Dietary Guidelines for Americans in meals served in schools
- ❖ Michigan received award annually **since 1996**
- ❖ Provide training to foodservice professionals and school staff to create healthier school environments

Team Nutrition (TN) Training Grants

- ❖ TN 2009 – \$379,910 for School Gardens, Junior Chef Competition, and training foodservice staff
- ❖ TN 2010 – \$376,047 for creation of Nutrition Standards Toolkit, and regional nutrition standards trainings
- ❖ TN 2011 – \$379,949 for the collection and promotion of Healthier US School Challenge applications, Junior Chef Competition, promoting adoption of nutrition standards

Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program (FFVP)

- ❖ 25 buildings participated as a pilot project in 2002
- ❖ 190 buildings with at least 50% eligibility for free or reduced meals currently participate
- ❖ Over \$3.3 million provided to schools for the purchase of fresh fruits and vegetables – about \$50-\$75 per student per year
- ❖ Fruits and vegetables available to students at times when the school meal programs are not in operation

The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP)

- ❖ Provides nutritious USDA Foods to income eligible households
- ❖ Foods are distributed through food bank pantries and community action agencies
- ❖ FY11 - Michigan provided over 28 million pounds of USDA Foods with a market value over \$18 million dollars

Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP)

- ❖ Provides nutritious USDA Foods to income eligible elderly and mothers, infants, and children not participating in WIC
- ❖ Eighteen local agencies throughout the state serve 80 Michigan counties and 80,000 individuals each month
- ❖ A typical food package includes canned fruits, vegetables, juices, meats, pasta, cereal, milk and cheese
- ❖ FY11 - Michigan provided nearly 24 million pounds of USDA Foods with a market value over \$18 million dollars

Food Distribution Programs (Schools)

- ❖ Schools receive USDA Food entitlement at \$.2225 per lunch served
- ❖ Over 180 products available: fruits, vegetables, meats, rice, cheese, beans, pasta, flour, and other grain products
- ❖ USDA Foods make up about 20% of food served in school meals
- ❖ FY11 – over 45 million pounds of USDA Foods with a market value over \$32 million dollars

No Kids Hungry (NKH)

- ❖ No Kids Hungry (NKH) Campaign – five year campaign
- ❖ Partnering with Share our Strength and United Way of Southeast Michigan
- ❖ Focus on increasing the effectiveness of existing nutrition programs for children
