**SUBJECT:** Mandated Reporter Requirements and Code of Ethics Resources

In accordance with Section 3 of MCL 722.623, known as the <u>Child Protection Law</u>, teachers, school counselors, and school administrators are required to make an immediate report of all suspected child abuse and/or neglect as a "mandated reporter." Michigan Department of Education (MDE) suggests that all local educational agencies incorporate mandated reporter and code of ethics training into annual professional development plans. This memorandum contains links to mandated reporter and code of ethics training resources.

The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) website states:

Mandated reporters shall make an immediate report to CI (Centralized Intake) by telephone or through the online reporting system of suspected child abuse or child neglect. Within 72 hours after making an oral report by telephone, the reporting person shall file a written report (DHS-3200). If the immediate report has been made using the online reporting system, no additional written report is required.

In accordance with the Child Protection Law, notifying parents/guardians, school administrators, or other individuals of authority is not adequate fulfillment of mandatory reporting requirements.
