III. INTRODUCTION OF STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION MEMBERS

Mrs. Marilyn Schneider, State Board Executive, introduced members of the State Board of Education and the 2015-2016 Michigan Teacher of the Year.

Mr. Whiston welcomed Mr. Craig Ruff, who is representing Governor Rick Snyder at the Board table.

Mr. Whiston invited audience members to introduce themselves.

Mrs. Weiser and Dr. Zeile arrived at 9:35 a.m.

V. PRESENTATION ON MICHIGAN TEACHER OF THE YEAR PROGRAM

Mr. Whiston said Mr. Rick Joseph has been a valuable resource at the Board table as a passionate advocate for teachers and students. Mr. Whiston thanked Mr. Joseph for his contributions to the teaching profession and for enriching the lives of the people he meets.

Mr. Joseph presented his final report as the 2015-2016 Michigan Teacher of the Year. He shared a slide presentation highlighting his activities during the past year while serving as the Michigan Teacher of the Year.

Mr. Austin presented Mr. Joseph with the resolution honoring him as the 2015-2016 Michigan Teacher of the Year.

VI. AWARDS AND RECOGNITIONS – 2016-2017 MICHIGAN TEACHER OF THE YEAR AND STATE FINALISTS

Mr. Whiston said on May 20, 2016, he made a surprise announcement at Zinser Elementary School in Kenowa Hills Public Schools in greater Grand Rapids, naming Ms. Tracy Horodyski as the 2016-2017 Michigan Teacher of the Year. He said Ms. Ramos-Montigny, a member of the selection committee, was present at the announcement.

Mr. Whiston said Ms. Horodyski is a reading interventionist and literacy coach and is described by her colleagues as passionate and excited about learning. He said she has 16 years of classroom experience and has taught all subjects in Kenowa Hills Public Schools.

Ms. Abbie Groff-Blaszak, Director, Office of Educator Talent, thanked Mr. Joseph stating that he has demonstrated the power of leveraging social media as an innovative professional learning tool for educators.

Ms. Groff-Blaszak showed a video of the surprise announcement of Ms. Tracy Horodyski as the 2016-2017 Michigan Teacher of the Year. Ms. Groff-Blaszak introduced Ms. Horodyski who was accompanied by Ross Willick, Principal, Zinser Elementary School, and her family and friends.

Ms. Horodyski said everyone in the room is pursuing excellence, and she is excited and humbled to be part of the synergy and energy generated by the pursuit of excellence. She said she is inspired by the leadership of those present in maximizing the efforts of others toward the achievement of a goal. She said she humbly accepts the identity of the Michigan Teacher of the Year as she becomes part of the statewide effort to develop Michigan into a Top 10 education state in 10 years.

Ms. Groff-Blaszak introduced the three Michigan Teacher of the Year state finalists. She said state finalist Ms. Delia Bush is a 5th grade teacher at Alpine Elementary School in Kenowa Hills Public Schools. Ms. Ramos-Montigny presented a certificate and lapel pin to Ms. Bush. Mr. Whiston presented Principal Jason Snyder with the commemorative plaque for Alpine Elementary School.

Dr. Pugh arrived at 9:55 a.m.

Ms. Groff-Blaszak said Ms. Annette Christiansen is a state finalist who teaches 10th-12th grade English Language Arts at Stevenson High School in Utica Community Schools. She said Ms. Christiansen is unable to attend the Board meeting, and Principal Steven Pfannes, is representing her. Mr. Pfannes accepted the lapel pin and certificate from Mrs. Straus and Mrs. Weiser and the school plaque from Mr. Whiston.

Ms. Groff-Blaszak introduced state finalist Ms. Cassandra Joss who teaches 3rd grade at Burr Elementary in Utica Community Schools. Ms. Fecteau and Dr. Zeile presented Ms. Joss with a certificate and lapel pin. Principal Michael Hardy received a plaque for the school presented by Mr. Whiston.

Ms. Groff-Blaszak introduced Ms. Pam Harlin, representing Meemic Foundation, which is part of Meemic Insurance Company. Ms. Groff-Blaszak thanked the Meemic Foundation for financing all Michigan Teacher of the Year travel costs up to \$10,000 per year, providing a \$1,000 check to Tracy's school, and presenting checks to the schools of the three finalists in the fall.

Ms. Horodyski received the 2016-2017 Michigan Teacher of the Year resolution from Mr. Austin. Dr. Ulbrich presented her with the Michigan Teacher of the Year statue, lapel pin, and a Michigan Teacher of the Year handbook. Principal Ross Willick received the commemorative plaque for Zinser Elementary School, which was presented by Mr. Whiston.

Mr. Whiston thanked Ms. Harlin and the Meemic Foundation for their support. He congratulated the Michigan Teacher of the Year, finalists, nominees, and their families and communities.

Ms. Janice Weckstein, Assistant Director, Office of Special Education; Ms. Becky Myers, Coordinator of Student Services, Hamilton Community Schools; Sydney Wassink, Student, Hamilton Community Schools; and Rachael VanHuis, Student, Hamilton Community Schools; presented on the Statewide Autism Resources and Training (START) Intensive Training Program and Implementation of Peer to Peer Program.

Mr. Whiston said The Statewide Autism Resources and Training Project, known as START, is one of the Office of Special Education grant-funded initiatives. He said START works with schools, community partners and families to support students with Autism Spectrum Disorder.

X. PRESENTATION ON MICHIGAN DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION ANNUAL REPORT

Mr. Brian Whiston, State Superintendent; and Ms. Alisande Henry, Special Projects, presented the Michigan Department of Education Annual Report.

Mr. Whiston said the 2015-2016 Annual Report for the Michigan Department of Education is designed to highlight the great strides made in the Michigan Department of Education in supporting schools, districts, educators, students, and parents through a lens of providing premier customer service.

The report, "Michigan Department of Education Annual Review 2015-2016," was distributed.

Mr. Whiston reviewed the annual report and provided information via a [PowerPoint presentation](#).

Board member comments included appreciation from the field regarding Michigan Department of Education support and customer service, legislative relations and using the document for orientation of new legislators, issuing future annual reports in October or November providing up-to-date information for incoming legislators, inclusion of data and mapping progress in future reports, and integration of the Governor's 21st Century Education Commission with building Michigan into a Top 10 education state over the next 10 years.

XII. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

There was Board consensus to reorder the agenda.

Mr. Austin said as follow up to the Board's Retreat, he has provided budget priorities that are embedded in the Top 10 including postsecondary attainment, guidance counseling and early postsecondary credit. He encouraged Board members to submit additional budget priorities.

Mr. Austin said legislation regarding Detroit Public Schools has been passed by the Legislature, but he does not believe the total job has been done. He said he believes there needs to be a managing body for all public schools in order to have a long-term solution for Detroit Public Schools. He said it is necessary to work together to do the best we can with what we have.

Mr. Austin said the budget included modest enhancements to early literacy, career and technical education, and other areas. He said it didn't go far enough to reinvest in higher education, and access to higher education.

Mr. Austin said the Governor's 21st Century Education Commission will be meeting. He said he is hopeful that discussion will continue to advance strategies contained in the vision for developing Michigan into a Top 10 education state and take a broader look at the education system of the future. He hopes it will be a place to take up the challenges of tracking successful models of high performing states, school finance, charter/choice/new school creation, and differential funding.

Mr. Austin said the recent horrific events in Orlando are a reminder that lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people are too often the target of hate and not the agents of it, and that should be reflected upon.

XV. STATE AND FEDERAL LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Dr. Casandra Ulbrich, Chair, State Board of Education Legislative Committee, said there is nothing to discuss as a result of the June 7th Legislative Committee meeting.

Mr. Martin Ackley, Director, Public and Governmental Affairs, said Detroit Public Schools legislation has passed, and that will be presented later in the meeting.

Mrs. Eileen Weiser, gubernatorial appointee to the Education Commission of the States (ECS), said ECS has been in Michigan discussing school finance. She said the Executive Director would like to present to the State Board of Education at a future meeting.

Mrs. Straus, NASBE Governmental Affairs Committee, provided an update on federal funding for education. She said NASBE has requested comments regarding the rules and regulations for the Every Student Succeeds Act, and she is requesting that comments be provided to her so that she can submit them to NASBE by the July 1, 2016, deadline.

Ms. Fecteau said states are being given more flexibility with accountability measures related to ESSA, and she asked if there are parameters. Mr. Whiston said the rules are not yet available, and staff will provide Board members with links to the proposed regulations.

XVI. PERSONAL PRIVILEGE – MS. MICHELLE FECTEAU

Ms. Fecteau said her son, Cassidy, has written a poem that is included in the book, *Rare Air*. She said *Rare Air* is a collection of poems written by students attending Roberto Clemente Learning Academy in Detroit. She said she is very proud of the teacher and students.

Ms. Ramos-Montigny thanked Mr. Benjamin Williams, Legislative Liaison, for his service to the Board and Department. She gave him a thank you gift, as he is leaving the Department for another job opportunity.

Mr. Whiston said Mr. Williams has accepted a position as the Midwest Legislative Director with The College Board. He thanked Ben for his service to the Michigan Department of Education, stating that he has done an outstanding job opening doors and developing relationships in the Legislature.
