



Quick Reference: Courses That Can be Taught

Michigan Compiled Laws (MCL) 380.1531 and the *Administrative Rules Governing the Certification of Michigan Teachers* require ALL teachers hold the appropriate endorsement for the subject(s) they are assigned to teach. This is not an exhaustive list, but rather the common or typical course titles offered in Michigan middle and high schools (6-12 departmentalized). A companion document for [Appropriate Instructional Assignments for Elementary Certified Teachers](#) is also available. This alignment guidance is subject to change with new state endorsements, new course titles named by K-12 schools and districts, and Michigan curriculum expectations. Districts must consider the following elements when using this document to make the best decisions for the assignment of teachers:

- course title
- curriculum or content of the course
- certification/endorsement and corresponding preparation program of the teacher
- Michigan Merit Curriculum standards that will be addressed
- requirements related to funding source (e.g., special education, Title I, career and technical education)
- code used for reporting (REP, TSDL, etc.)
