

HAN: Ongoing Hepatitis A Outbreak in SE MI

Dear Southeast Michigan Healthcare Community Members,

We are facing a large, ongoing hepatitis A outbreak in Southeast Michigan and need your help.

Since August 2016, there have been over 200 cases of hepatitis A, 10 associated deaths, and several more cases of fulminant liver failure requiring transplantation.

To end this outbreak, we must work together to increase hepatitis A vaccination of the most vulnerable individuals, including:

- History of injection and non-injection drug use
- Homelessness or in transient housing
- History of trading sexual practices for drugs or money
- Chronic liver disease (hepatitis B, C)
- MSM
- Anyone who requests vaccination regardless of risk factors endorsed

Please also ensure that staff members who provide direct patient care are vaccinated.
