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Policy Subject: Prohibition of Automatic Refills of Prescriptions

Affected Programs: Medicaid, Healthy Michigan Plan, Children's Special Health Care Services (CSHCS)

Distribution: Pharmacies, Federally Qualified Health Centers

Policy Summary: Pharmacies are prohibited from automatically filling prescriptions for Medicaid and Healthy Michigan Plan beneficiaries in Fee-for-Service. Each prescription refill must be specifically requested by the beneficiary.

Purpose: The purpose of this policy is to reduce waste in prescriptions that are not picked up by the beneficiary.

Subject: Prohibition of Automatic Refills of Prescriptions

Effective: July 1, 2016 (Proposed)

Programs Affected: Medicaid, Healthy Michigan Plan, Children's Special Health Care Services (CSHCS)

The purpose of this policy is to announce that effective for dates of service on and after July 1, 2016, automatic refills of prescriptions are prohibited. Automatically issuing refills of prescriptions to beneficiaries can result in unnecessary expenditures and/or unused products.

The use of automatic refills by a pharmacy is not allowed. All prescription refills must be initiated by a request from the physician, recipient, or other person acting as an agent of the recipient (e.g., a family member). The possession of a prescription with remaining refills authorized does not in itself constitute a request to refill the prescription. The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) will not reimburse a pharmacy for any prescription claim that has been automatically refilled. Any claim for a prescription filled without a request from the physician, recipient or agent of the recipient, including but not limited to claims for any prescription service provided after the client's date of death will be subject to recovery. Claims for prescriptions that have been filled using automatic refill and inadvertently billed to MDHHS must be reversed by the pharmacy. The automatic refill prohibition does not apply to medications that are dispensed to residents of long-term care facilities.
