Dear Governor Granholm;

In accordance with section 6(3) of Act No. 279 of the Public Acts of 1995, the Horse Racing Law of 1995, as amended, the 2002 Annual Report of the Office of Racing Commissioner (ORC) is hereby submitted.

In 2002, seven Michigan tracks presented a combined 2,247 days of live and simulcast pari-mutuel racing. Racing attracted over 1.3 million fans, who wagered \$365.2 million. With increased competition for the gaming dollar from casinos in the state and neighboring racinos, total wagering at the horse tracks in the state sustained a 2.5% decline as compared to the previous year. Despite the overall decline, a foundation has been laid for a successful 2003 racing season in Michigan.

The ORC will continue to work with industry leaders to improve Michigan's race product, to enhance the economy of Michigan racing and the agricultural industries racing supports, and to preserve the farmland dedicated to the sport. As the regulatory agency with primary oversight responsibility for racing, the ORC will take appropriate actions to ensure that any initiatives acted upon favorably by the legislature are effectively implemented. We urge your continued support to ensure that horse racing remains a viable industry in Michigan.

What Horse Racing Means to Michigan

Michigan horse racing is a \$1.2 billion industry responsible for the creation of 26,200 jobs, \$142 million in personal income, and economic output of \$443 million each year. The industry also generates about \$23.5 million annually in state tax revenues, and supports capital facilities worth an estimated \$570 million, according to a December 2002 study released by Public Sector Consultants, Inc., of Lansing.

There are an estimated 77,000 racing breed equine in the state. Horse racing is a labor-intensive activity and creates jobs on and off the tracks for trainers, drivers, jockeys, blacksmiths, grooms, veterinarians, racing officials, pari-mutuel clerks, guards, admission clerks, concessions workers, and numerous other personnel. With the addition of full-card simulcasting, Michigan tracks now offer year-round entertainment opportunities for horse racing fans, meaning that seasonal work has turned into full-time employment for track employees.

Michigan's horse racing industry reaches far beyond the grandstands of Michigan's pari-mutuel tracks. Horse racing provides economic support to many fairs through purse revenues for those fairs that offer non-betting horse racing. Racing activities also provide direct financial support to Michigan's 4H programs and premiums (awards) at fairs throughout the state.

An important part of the state's economy, horse racing interests pay local property taxes on the tracks, and on breeding and training facilities. The tracks also contribute to the economy of the surrounding communities by purchasing goods and services.

Indirectly, racing interests provide employment for farmers, transportation workers, restaurant and hotel personnel employed near the tracks, the media representatives who report on racing, and the workers who build and repair the training or track facilities, among others. Their collective contribution to the Michigan economy is substantial.

In many of the rural areas of our state, supplying the needs of race horses represents much of the local economy and helps support and preserve the rural character of smaller communities. Farmers grow and sell the feed required by our state's race horse population. Grain elevator operations make sure that feed is available year-round. Barns and training facilities are available to horsemen on a year-round basis, supplying needed employment opportunities for Michigan citizens.

Pari-mutuel horse racing began in Michigan in September, 1933, with 31 days of Thoroughbred racing offered at the Michigan State Fairgrounds track in Detroit. The inaugural season attracted 101,227 fans who wagered over \$3.5 million and generated \$123,783 in state wagering tax.

Today, Michigan has seven licensed pari-mutuel race tracks, including five harness racetracks, one Thoroughbred track and one mixed breed track. The two largest tracks are located in the Detroit metropolitan area, with the other five distributed across the lower half of the state's lower peninsula. In 2002, the tracks presented a combined 2,247 days of live and simulcast pari-mutuel racing. This racing attracted over 1.3 million fans, who wagered \$365.2 million, generating \$11.6 million in state wagering tax revenue. Local communities received over \$1.6 million to defray the costs of police and fire protection required at all pari-mutuel tracks. Financial incentives were offered to the breeders of the best Michigan-bred horses. The incentives included purse supplements and special races for Michigan-bred horses.

As demonstrated above, horse racing's payoff to Michigan is far greater than the dollars seen on the toteboard. Horse racing means jobs; horse racing means revenue; horse racing means entertainment; horse racing means investments; and horse racing means stability and continuity for our state's farming communities.

The Commissioner's Responsibilities

The Commissioner's primary objective is to maintain the integrity of live horse racing and simulcasting in Michigan. As part of this mission, the Office of Racing Commissioner (ORC) is responsible for regulating the safety and fairness of the horse racing industry through the conduct of regular monitoring, investigations and prosecutions.

The Commissioner has jurisdiction over Michigan's license holders and the authority to regulate racing at the state's seven racetracks. Activities included in the regulation of racing activities are the oversight of pari-mutuel wagering, supervising pari-mutuel operations at all the tracks and granting permits for conducting Standardbred, Thoroughbred and Mixed Breed race meetings in the state. The Commissioner also has jurisdiction over the simulcasting of horse racing activities at these racetracks.

In addition to these responsibilities, the ORC allots annual race dates to race meeting license holders. The ORC licenses, fingerprints, photographs, and screens personnel working for or connected with track operations, including management, horsemen, owners and prospective stockholders, to ensure that everyone connected with racing is of suitable character and integrity. The ORC oversees the actual conduct of races, supervises the extraction of fluid and blood specimens from horses for chemical analysis and conducts initial hearings on appeals resulting from disciplinary actions that may lead to judicial proceedings at the appellate level.

Investigations

Horse racing in Michigan is a dynamic sport constantly challenged by competitive forces. The ORC employs an in-house investigative unit which works to preserve the integrity of the sport. The unit conducts inquiries on potential licensees, administers license checks at racetracks, investigates racehorse abuse complaints, inspects licensed off-track farms where racehorses are stabled, provides testimony in litigated matters, and assists other law enforcement authorities and the track security organizations in conducting their duties.

In 2002, ORC investigators administered 2,279 alcohol breath tests and 206 drug screens as part of the monitoring program to ensure that no illegal or banned substances are being used. Of the tests administered, two positive alcohol tests and 21 positive drug screens were recorded.

In addition to human testing, ORC investigators processed 100 application investigations and conducted 35 special operations that included searches and surveillances of restricted race-track areas.

Licensing

The ORC continued its annual licensing program for Standardbred, Thoroughbred, and Mixed Breed (Quarter Horse, Arabian, Appaloosa and American Paint). Each type of racing requires a separate license. All applicants must be participants in pari-mutuel horse racing in Michigan and must meet the standards and criteria set forth in the laws and regulations. In 2002, the ORC issued 8,594 occupational licenses (see page 4).

Also in 2002, in an effort to streamline the licensing process for owners, the ORC began participation in the National Racing Compact licensing program. This enables a potential licensee who desires to be licensed in several states to complete the license process one time only.

Horse Racing Hotline

The Commissioner remains committed to developing programs directly related to providing a safe and equitable environment for racehorses and industry participants. Individuals who believe that a racehorse is being mistreated have the opportunity to call a 24-hour Hotline (1-800-973-5000) to report each incident. The matter is then investigated by the ORC. The hotline also allows individuals to anonymously inform the ORC of any illegal practices that may be occurring.

Sampling and Testing for Equines and Humans

The Office of Racing Commissioner's (ORC) equine and human blood/urine testing programs are important parts of the Commissioner's regulatory functions. The programs are conducted by the ORC and the Michigan Department of Agriculture (MDA) Equine Drug Testing Laboratory. The program involves the post-race collection of urine and/or blood samples from every pari-mutuel horse race conducted in Michigan and human testing for drugs and alcohol.

Equine samples are collected by ORC field staff from the winner of every race, and any other horse designated for testing by officials. The samples are then tested by the MDA Equine Drug Testing Laboratory to detect any prohibited drugs or foreign substances present.

Any drug or other substance not naturally present in the horse's system may either enhance or hinder its performance. It is the duty of the Commissioner to ensure the wagering public that drugs or other foreign substances are not administered to or are not present in any race horse, except as authorized by law. The post-race analysis is an important part of this process.

Dr. Brad Skiba, supervisor of the MDA Equine Drug Testing Laboratory, oversees a team of trained and experienced scientists and technicians who analyze each blood, urine or other sample. Utilizing sophisticated testing methods and equipment, this drug detection group represents a valuable link in the Racing Commissioner's regulatory chain.

A total of 19,329 post-race samples were tested during 2002 (12,796 TCO₂; 5,382 urine; 1,131 blood and 20 miscellaneous samples). The total number of positives or instances of permitted medication over the approved level was 44.

As part of its regulatory efforts, the ORC employs a team of stewards, detention crew workers, veterinarians, licensed veterinarians, veterinarian technicians and investigators to ensure the integrity of the horse racing industry. Sample collection workers (usually three per track) collect the blood and urine samples from the horses for testing.

The ORC's veterinarians make sure the horses are sound and capable of racing, and supervise the horse sample collections. ORC veterinarians do not have equine practices of their own. Additional veterinarians, licensed by the ORC for practice in restricted areas at the race tracks, prescribe and administer medications to horses who may be at the tracks but are not scheduled to race. These licensed veterinarians have private equine practices.

Samples collected by the collection technicians are delivered from the race tracks to the MDA Geagley Laboratory in East Lansing by couriers employed by the ORC. Samples are identified only by tag number to ensure confidential testing, while maintaining a chain of evidence. The ORC keeps a copy of each sample tag number and the corresponding horse information (trainer, horse name, race day, track, etc.). If any samples test positive, the Laboratory contacts the ORC for confirmation and possible disciplinary action. The cooperative efforts of the ORC and MDA Geagley Laboratory staff help ensure fairness, honesty and integrity in the horse racing industry for the betting public.

2002: The Year in Review

January

A two year undercover investigation conducted by the Michigan Office of Racing Commissioner (ORC), the United States Attorney's Office, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA), and the Standard-bred Investigative Services (SIS) resulted in the conviction of a former horse trainer for selling a human prescription drug under the pretense of illegally affecting the performance of horses.

March

The third Annual Michigan Horse of the Year Ball was held at the Kellogg Center in East Lansing, Michigan on March 23, 2002. Michigan-bred Horse of the Year awards were presented by Commissioner Bacola to 2001's top Michigan horses in the categories of Quarter Horse, Thoroughbred, Standardbred Trotter and Standardbred Pacer. Additionally, Laura Kendrick of Marysville became Michigan's third Equestrian Princess.

May

Pari-mutuel racetracks in Michigan saw a 13% increase in simulcast wagering for the three days of Triple Crown racing as compared to 2001.

August

ORC hosted an industry-wide symposium entitled "Industry Views," held in Livonia on August 8, 2002. The symposium focused on the industry's need to promote the horse racing product in the increasingly competitive gaming, sports and entertainment markets. Guest speakers included Lonny Powell of the Racing Commissioners International, Michael Tew of Bear Stearns, and Mike Veeck, owner and promoter of minor league baseball.

The 2002 Michigan State Fair set the stage for the second running of the Michigan Horse Racing Exhibit in the Agriculture Building from August 20 through September 2, 2002. The exhibit, complete with horse racing games and videos, presented the sport to approximately 500,000 people. In addition, nearly 10,000 patrons rode the virtual reality jockey ride which was the highlight of the multifaceted exhibit.

On August 29, the ORC received an application to construct and operate a racetrack from the EQTAH Group Ltd. The application proposed a mixed-breed race meeting to commence the spring of 2003 in the Greater Lansing area.

On August 30, the ORC received an application to construct and operate a racetrack from Michigan Racing, a subsidiary of Magna Entertainment Corporation. The application proposed a dual-breed race meeting to commence in 2004 in Romulus, Michigan.

September

The highlight of harness racing was the Michigan Sire Stakes Million Dollar Night held at Hazel Park Harness Raceway on Saturday, September 28, 2002. The combined value of the purses for these and other races on the program was over \$1 million.

October

The highlight of Thoroughbred racing occurred when six Thoroughbred Sire Stakes races were run on October 5 at Great Lakes Downs.

The Toronto-based EQTAH Group withdrew their application for 2003 pari-mutuel horse racing dates from the ORC.

On October 31, Commissioner Bacola signed orders authorizing the 2003 live horse racing dates.

December

On December 16, the ORC received an application to construct and operate a racetrack from Triple Creek Associates LLC. The application proposed a multi-breed race meeting to commence in 2004 in Van Buren Township.

On December 20, Annette M. Bacola resigned. Bacola, of Grosse Point Farms, served as the Michigan Racing Commissioner since she was first appointed in August 1999.

On December 21, R. Robert Geake began his term as Michigan Racing Commissioner for a term that extends through December 31, 2004.

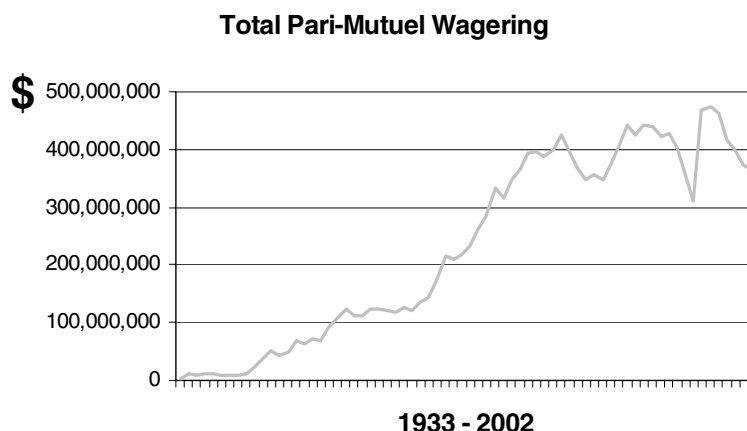

* Full-card simulcasting was authorized with the enactment of the Horse Racing Law of 1995 which allowed Michigan pari-mutuel tracks to conduct live and simulcast wagering year-round. Prior to 1996, "Days Raced" meant days of live racing only. From 1996 on, "Days Raced" indicates tracks operation for live and simulcast racing.

* "Outs" are generated in 2002 and distributed in 2003.

+Public Act 505 of 1998 amended the law covering the distribution of funds from outstanding uncashed winning tickets (Outs). Previous to this amendment, all Outs funds were sent to the Michigan Department of Treasury, Abandoned and Unclaimed Property Division, for future claims and eventually reverted to the State General Fund pursuant to law. The amendment changed the distribution of Outs monies. Outstanding uncashed tickets could be cashed for only 60 days after the end of a race meeting, as opposed to an unlimited period of time under the previous law. After 60 days the race meeting licensee now retains 50% of the remaining Outs funds and deposits the other 50% to the Michigan Agriculture Equine Fund established under the Horse Racing Law of 1995, as amended. This makes the Outs funds available for track expenditures, purse monies, and the various programs under the Michigan Agriculture Equine Fund.
