# CBRNE Fact Sheet

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## CBRNE (Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear, Explosive)

- C** A chemical attack is the deliberate release of a toxic gas, liquid or solid that can poison people and the environment.
- B** A biological attack is the deliberate release of germs or other biological substances that can make you sick. Unlike an explosion, a biological attack may or may not be immediately obvious.
- R** A radiation threat or “Dirty Bomb” is the use of common explosives to spread radioactive materials over a targeted area. It is not a nuclear blast. The force of the explosion and radioactive contamination will be more localized.
- N** A nuclear blast is an explosion with intense light and heat, a damaging pressure wave and widespread radioactive material that can contaminate the air, water and ground surfaces for miles around.
- E** An explosive is a substance, or prepared chemical that explodes or causes an explosion. Approximately 70% of all terrorist attacks worldwide involve explosives.

**Terrorists are working to obtain biological, chemical, nuclear and radiological weapons and the threat of attack are very real.**

# HOMELAND SECURITY ADVISORY SYSTEM

## “PROTECTIVE MEASURE” GUIDELINES FOR THE PUBLIC

### GREEN

Continue to enjoy individual freedom. Participate freely in travel, work, and recreational activities.

Be prepared for disasters and family emergencies.

Develop a family emergency plan.

Know how to turn off your power, gas and water service to your house.

Know what hazardous materials are stored in your home and how to properly dispose of unneeded chemicals.

Support the efforts of your local emergency responders.

Know what natural hazards are prevalent in your area and what measures you can take to protect your family.

### BLUE

Continue normal activities while being watchful for suspicious activities. Report criminal activity to local law enforcement.

Review family emergency plans.

Increase family emergency preparedness by purchasing supplies, food and storing water.

Be familiar with local natural and technological hazards in your community.

Increase individual or family emergency preparedness through training, maintaining good physical fitness and health, and storing food, water and emergency supplies.

Monitor local and national news for terrorist alerts.

Update immunizations.

Volunteer to assist and support the community emergency response agencies.

### YELLOW

Continue normal activities, but report suspicious activities to the local law enforcement.

Take a first aid or CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) class.

Become active in your local Neighborhood Crime Watch program.

Network with your family, neighbors, and community for mutual support during a disaster or terrorist attack.

Learn what critical facilities are located in your community and report suspicious activities at or near these sites.

Attend your local emergency planning committee meeting to learn more about local hazards.

Increase individual or family emergency preparedness through training, maintaining good physical fitness and health, and storing food, water and emergency supplies.

### ORANGE

Resume normal activities but expect some delays, baggage searches and restrictions as a result of heightened security at public buildings and facilities.

Monitor local events and government threat advisories.

Report suspicious activities at or near critical facilities to local law enforcement by calling 911.

Avoid leaving unattended packages or brief cases in public areas.

Inventory and organize emergency supply kits and discuss emergency plans with family members. Reevaluate meeting location based on threat.

Consider taking reasonable personal security precautions. Be alert to your surroundings, avoid placing yourself in a vulnerable situation and monitor the activities of your children.

Maintain close contact with your family and neighbors to ensure their safety and emotional welfare.

### RED

Report suspicious activities and call 911 for immediate response.

Expect delays, searches of purses and bags and restricted access to public buildings.

Expect traffic delays and restrictions.

Take personal security precautions to avoid becoming a victim of crime or terrorist attack.

Avoid crowded public areas and gatherings.

Do not travel into areas affected by the attack or in an expected terrorist attack.

Keep emergency supplies accessible and car gas tank full.

Be prepared to evacuate your home or to shelter in place on order of local authorities.

Be suspicious of persons taking photographs of critical facilities, asking questions about physical security or dressed inappropriately for weather conditions. Report these incidents immediately to law enforcement.

Closely monitor news reports and local radio/TV stations.

Assist neighbors who may need help.

Avoid passing on unsubstantiated information and rumors.

# THE SEVEN SIGNS OF TERRORISM



## 1. Surveillance:

Someone recording or monitoring activities. This may include the use of cameras (either still or video), note taking, drawing diagrams, annotating on maps, or using binoculars or other vision-enhancing devices.

## 2. Elicitation:

People or organizations attempting to gain information about military operations, capabilities, or people. Elicitation attempts may be made by mail, fax, telephone, or in person.

## 3. Tests of security:

Any attempts to measure reaction times to security breaches or to penetrate physical security barriers or procedures in order to assess strengths and weaknesses.

## 4. Acquiring supplies:

Purchasing or stealing explosives, weapons, ammunition, etc. Also includes acquiring military uniforms, decals, flight manuals, passes or badges (or the equipment to manufacture such items) or any other controlled items.

## 5. Suspicious persons out of place:

People who don't seem to belong in the workplace, neighborhood, business establishment, or anywhere else. Includes suspicious border crossings and stowaways aboard ship or people jumping ship in port.

## 6. Dry run/Trial Run:

Putting people into position and moving them around according to their plan without actually committing the terrorist act. This is especially true when planning a kidnapping, but it can also pertain to bombings. An element of this activity could also include mapping out routes and determining the timing of traffic lights and flow.

## 7. Deploying assets:

People and supplies getting into position to commit the act. This is a person's last chance to alert authorities before the terrorist act occurs.

## Overview

Emergency management and homeland security is about protecting lives, property, the environment, securing our state and nation, and about making our communities safer. In Michigan, the Michigan State Police Emergency Management and Homeland Security Division (EMHSD) takes the lead in coordinating state, federal, local, and nongovernmental resources in protecting our state and homeland from all hazards.

Under the command of the Deputy State Director of Emergency Management and Homeland Security, EMHSD strives to foster, promote and implement a system that protects Michigan's communities, citizens, and visitors from the effects of disasters, emergencies, and threats to the homeland through appropriate prevention, mitigation, preparedness, response, and recovery actions and activities. The division is responsible for developing and continuously updating the Michigan Emergency Management Plan, which details emergency and disaster policies for all state agencies during all types of disasters. The Michigan Emergency Management Act (1976 PA 390, as amended), provides EMHSD with the authority to coordinate these activities.

EMHSD receives substantial programmatic and financial support through a number of grant programs from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS). During response and recovery operations associated with federal disaster declarations, EMHSD serves as the state's liaison with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) of DHS.

The cost and tremendous impacts of recent disasters has forever changed views of emergency management and homeland security. Major disasters have cost federal, state, and local governments, business and industry, private citizens, and insurers billions of dollars and resulted in thousands of deaths. Emergency management and homeland security policy has evolved from emphasizing preparedness and response to focusing on prevention, protection, and mitigation activities - actions that can reduce or eliminate the costs and negative impacts of future disasters.

EMHSD promotes an all hazard approach to emergency management and homeland security and fosters a system that provides for improved training and education, public awareness and preparedness, hazard mitigation and incident prevention, emergency planning, and response and recovery programs. EMHSD provides services that strive to meet the needs of the citizens of Michigan, governmental agencies at all levels, private nonprofit and other nongovernmental organizations, and business and industry, through a network of district, county and local emergency management programs and coordinators.

## Key Program Areas

**Michigan Emergency Management Plan (MEMP).** EMHSD is responsible for developing and continually reviewing and updating the MEMP. This document details emergency or disaster response policy and operating procedures for state government for all types of disasters.

**State Emergency Operations Center (SEOC).** The SEOC, located in Lansing, is where coordination of state disaster response is accomplished. Involved state agencies direct resources from this center.



**Michigan Homeland Security.** EMHSD serves as the primary focal point for all issues related to homeland security within the state of Michigan. EMHSD will ensure the coordination of all homeland security-related actions across a broad spectrum of federal, state, local, nongovernmental organizations, and the private sector and advance the effective development and implementation of a state homeland security strategy.

**Emergency Management and Homeland Security Funds.** EMHSD administers funding to emergency management and homeland security programming for local government programs, including staffing, equipment and services. EMHSD also coordinates disaster relief grants to state agencies, local governments, and eligible non-profit organizations.

**Emergency Planning.** EMHSD provides planning assistance to local jurisdictions and state agencies to address all types of hazards as well as specialized functions such as donations management, debris management, and continuity of government. Local plans and procedures are continuously reviewed by EMHSD to assure that they meet current program standards.

**Hazardous Materials (HazMat) Planning.** EMHSD coordinates the local hazardous material emergency planning program by providing guidance to Local Emergency Planning Committees (LEPCs).

**Training.** EMHSD provides training for public and private sector organizations in a variety of topic areas within the field of emergency management and homeland security. The Emergency Management and Homeland Security Training Center (EMHSTC) provides a comprehensive program of cost effective training courses for individuals and private sector companies related to emergency management, homeland security and hazardous materials.

**Public Information.** EMHSD coordinates the release of both emergency and non-emergency information to the public in conjunction with local, state, federal and private sector organizations and acts as liaison to the media and legislative bodies. EMHSD is also responsible for the coordination of the state's Joint Information Center and Team during emergencies.

**Radiological Emergency Preparedness.** EMHSD coordinates state and local activities necessary to meet federal requirements as they relate to the commercial nuclear power plants in the state. These activities include training, exercising and planning assistance.

**Exercising.** EMHSD assists local jurisdictions and state agencies in exercise plan, development, operation and after-action evaluation of emergency plans and operational capability.

**Hazard Mitigation.** EMHSD provides assistance to state agencies and local jurisdictions on mitigation activities to eliminate or reduce the long-term risk to human life, public and private property, and the environment for specific types of hazards.

**Field Liaison.** Eight district coordinators serve as field staff for the division. They are responsible for the administration of EMHSD policy and programs and for serving as the division's "ambassadors" with local communities.




