Morning Keynote Speaker
Hate Crimes

Richard Eaton will be speaking about hate and terrorism groups. Mr. Eaton has been a researcher for the Simon Wiesenthal Center/Museum of Tolerance for 25 years. He conducts research on terrorism and domestic extremism; conducts monitoring of extremist groups worldwide; supervises the Center's continuing investigation into the use of the Internet by extremist groups; and acts as liaison to a wide variety of civic, religious and law-enforcement groups.

Afternoon Keynote Speaker
ICE-Secure Communities

Trent Horkey from the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) Detroit Field Office will be discussing Secure Communities. Secure Communities is a comprehensive plan that improves public safety by implementing an integrated approach to identify and remove criminal aliens from the United States. Currently operational in Wayne, Oakland and Macomb Counties with Kent County expected to be operational in September. The goal is for state-wide deployment by the end of 2013.

Animal Cruelty/Dog Fighting

This session will focus on animal cruelty crimes particularly dog fighting and will feature speakers from the Detroit Humane Society. Their Cruelty and Rescue Team was featured on Animal Planet Channel's television program: Animal Cops; Detroit.

NAMUS – National Missing and Unidentified Persons System

This session will focus on the new clearinghouse for missing persons and unidentified decedent records. It will be presented by Sgt. Greg Jones, Michigan State Coordinator for the National Center of Missing and Exploited Children, runaway children, and human trafficking investigations.

State Forensic Lab

The focus of this session will be to explain what functions are carried out within our state crime labs and what changes may be expected in the future. This session will be presented by the new director of the MSP Forensic lab, Mr. John Collins.

Mi-DEX/N-Dex

This session will focus on participating in Michigan's data sharing program. Ms. Wendy Easterbrook, Crime Reporting Section, will explain how the state will feed the FBI's National Data Exchange system allowing law enforcement agencies in different states to share their records management incidents nationwide.

MIOC – Michigan Intelligence Operations Center

The Michigan Intelligence Operation Center was created in 2006. This session will provide information on why this operation was developed, what information is housed, and how the center can help coordinate state wide criminal investigations.

MICR for the Administrator

This session will focus on what administrators need to know about MICR. It will provide information on what to expect when a new records management system is purchased and what the agency must do to become certified. It will also focus on the MICR error reports and MICR reports that are available through the MICJIN portal.

MICR Updates

There are several upcoming changes to the MICR System. Find out what these changes are and what you will need to do to get your system compliant with the FBI's national reporting standards and the legislation behind these changes.

Common MICR Errors

This session will focus on the MICR error process. Participants will learn how to decipher the error reports using the error handbook. Section 4 of the MICR handbook will be covered along with how to retrieve reports from the DEG.

MICR Crime Reports

Agencies now have real-time access to MICR reports through the MICJIN portal. This session will go over each available MICR report providing participants with an understanding of how statistics can vary depending upon the report chosen.
