REPLACING THE PIPES

Mayor's Fast Start Program has initial pilot project completed with 33 homes done and Rowe Engineering is finalizing report on identifying more lead lines.

\$2 million in state funding remains for 500 more homes to get started immediately and we would encourage the city to do so in an effective manner that maximizes efficiency and minimizes disruption for residents.

COVERING THE COST OF WATER

\$30 million credit from state helps city begin processing water bills with credits for residents. People shouldn't be paying for water they could not or cannot use.

We are looking at resources to continue helping to provide relief to people while the water is still not meeting adequate standards.

State paid \$6 million to help with reconnecting the city of Flint to Great Lakes Water Authority and is continuing to pay approximately \$1.2 million monthly to stay connected.

TAKING CARE OF FLINT KIDS

Nine nurses have been hired for Flint Community Schools to help with, monitor and assist students who may show signs of being affected.

Seven additional early childhood classrooms are now available thanks to state support through the Great Start program. Each classroom serves 16 full-day students. (112 full day students total) Programs will go all summer long.

PUBLIC FACILITIES FOR VULNERABLE POPULATIONS

- School Fixtures: 927 installed (99%). We have been in 33 facilities (94%)
- Child Care Facility Fixtures: 222 installed (99%). We have been in 36 facilities (100%)
- Adult Foster Care Facility Fixtures: 137 installed (100%)
- Health Care Facility Fixtures: We have completed all of the installs for health care facilities
- Total project: 1,348 fixtures installed (99%)

GOOD NUTRITION

Mobile Food Banks: Delivered 321,000 pounds of food so far. 4,786 families served through the end of March.

HIRING FLINT RESIDENTS

Through cooperative efforts of the U.S. Department of Labor and the Michigan Talent Investment Agency, 81 residents have been hired to date.

- UPCOMING PLANS -

EXPANDED HEALTH CARE

Medicaid Waiver rollout with signups starting Monday, May 9. This will help thousands of children and adults up to age 21 and pregnant women.

MOVE WATER TO MOVE FLINT FORWARD

We need to move water through Flint to move Flint forward. That's why the state is providing money to cover the costs for residents when flushing the pipes. People will not have to pay for the water involved with moving the water through Flint's pipes.

REPLACING THE PIPES

We are working with the Legislature on finding more resources to replace more pipes in Flint in addition to the 500 that could be replaced now with the \$2 million already provided by the state.

WATER BILL RELIEF

Additional resources are being worked on to continue water bill relief while water still isn't up to federal quality standards. Again, people shouldn't be expected to pay for water they can't use for drinking and cooking.

EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES

Increasing resources for Flint Community Schools and Genesee Intermediate School District will expand early education services to children up to age 3. More support will also provide for special education and literacy support.

JOBS AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Plans call for 500 Flint residents to find employment through jobs and skilled training programs by the end of 2017.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

The state is working to complete the Flint Riverfront Development Project, including removing the Hamilton Dam, by the end of 2019. Michigan State Housing Development Authority is also working to get three new affordable housing developments underway and completed with Flint developers by the end of 2018.

IMPROVING THE FEDERAL LEAD AND COPPER RULE

State initiatives are being reviewed now and we are working with the Legislature to get these done. Michigan needs to set the standard and become a national model for other states to follow. That's why the LCR proposal we put forward far exceeds what any other state is doing.

WORKING TO PROVIDE MORE THAN \$232 MILLION IN STATE SUPPORT

- \$37 million to ensure safe drinking water.
- \$15 million to improve food and nutrition.
- \$63 million for securing physical, social, and educational well-being.
- \$30 million for water bill relief.
- \$50 million in reserved funding for future needs in Flint.
- \$37 million in previous supplementals to address the immediate needs in Flint.

ADDITIONAL FEDERAL SUPPORT

The city needs additional resources for the people of Flint from the federal government to complement the state's efforts.
