

The Child & Adolescent Health Center Program within the Michigan Department of Community Health has had a longstanding relationship with **Federally Qualified Health Centers** since the program was created in 1988. Going into our 23<sup>rd</sup> year of programming, roughly one third of the current 71 centers are run by Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs); the remaining two thirds are run by Health Systems and Local Health Departments. Child & Adolescent Health Centers (CAHCs) compliment the core mission of FQHCs and serve as a critical safety net to children and adolescents who lack access to primary care services.

The three models through which these centers operate are clinical, alternative clinical, and school wellness programs. The **clinical adolescent health center model** provides on-site primary health care, psychosocial and health promotion/disease prevention education, and referral services through either school-based or school-linked health centers. **Alternative clinical centers** provide similar services to clinical centers, but differ in the number of hours that they are required to be open and the number of youth they are required to reach. Services offered by the **school wellness program** include limited clinical services, individual and group evidence-based health education, school staff training, and mental health services.

Below, is a list of the Federally Qualified Health Centers that have demonstrated a strong commitment to Child & Adolescent Health Center Services by overseeing one or more clinics in their communities.

*Baldwin Family Health Care, Inc.*

- Baldwin Family Health Care's (BFHC) network is made up of health centers in Baldwin, Cadillac, Grant, McBain, and White Cloud.
- BFHC, in collaboration with Baldwin Community Schools, has sponsored and administered the Baldwin Teen Health Center since 1987.
- BFHC also collaborated with White Cloud Public schools to open a school based health center in August 2009.
- Recently, BFHC received funding to open a third health center at Grant Middle School.



### Center for Family Health

- The Center for Family Health provides medical, dental, and behavioral health services through a number of clinics located in the Jackson area.
- The CFH has a strong relationship with Jackson Public Schools and operates two CAHCs within the district.
  - The health center at Northeast Elementary School opened in 2005. Last year, the Northeast Health Center provided services to almost 1,600 unduplicated users. Among these services provided were 1,563 EPSDT/well checks and 502 immunizations.
  - The Teen Health Center at Parkside Middle School (TCAP) opened in 2006. In 2010, the TCAP served almost 1,200 unduplicated users, provided 614 EPSDT/well checks and 330 immunizations.

### Cherry Street Health Services

- Cherry Street Health Services is a non-profit organization with 11 health centers in the Grand Rapids area. Cherry Street Health Services operates three clinical centers in the Grand Rapids Public Schools system. These health centers have a number of special programs on prevention, self esteem, and relationships.
  - The Creston High School Health Center, which opened in 2005, saw 519 users in 2,018 visits in 2010. During these visits, center staff provided a number of services including 306 EPSDT/well checks and 352 immunizations.
  - The Ottawa Hills High School Health Center has provided health services to students since 2005. In 2010, the health center staff saw 566 unduplicated users in 2,625 visits. The staff also provided 212 EPSDT/well checks and 462 immunizations.
  - The Union High School Health Center opened in the summer of 2000. In 2010, center staff saw 929 unduplicated users, provided 182 EPSDT/well checks, and administered 373 immunizations.



### Detroit Community Health Connection Inc

- Detroit Community Health Connection is a non-profit based primary care organization that provides medical and dental services in the Detroit area.
- DCHC has administered the Healthy Teens Community Care Center (HTC3) since 2006. The school linked center, which is located in the City of Detroit, opened in 2007. The HTC3 provided services to 630 unduplicated users in 2010 in over 1,930 visits.

### Downriver Community Services

- Downriver Community Services (DCS) provides community based health and human services in Algonac, New Haven, and Port Huron, Michigan.
- DCS oversees the New Haven Adolescent Health Program, which opened in 1988 and is located in Macomb County. Last year, the New Haven Adolescent Health Program saw over 600 unduplicated users. During these visits, health center staff provided 130 EPSDT/well checks and 157 immunizations.



### Family Health Center

- Family Health Center provides medical, dental, and behavioral health care services to the Kalamazoo County community.
- Family Health Center administers the alternative clinical child health center at Edison Elementary in Kalamazoo. This elementary school is comprised of a large population of children in high need. The health center opened in 2005 and served 159 unduplicated users in 2010.

### Hackley Community Care Center of Muskegon

- Hackley Community Care Center (HCCC) is a non-profit organization that provides Muskegon County with medical, dental, pharmaceutical, and behavioral health services.
- The HCCC coordinates the School Wellness Program at Steele and Bunker Middle Schools in the Muskegon Public Schools District.
- HCCC also coordinates Family Resource Centers in each school that provide contracted services to at-risk students and their family members.

### Health Delivery Inc

- Health Delivery Inc. provides medical, dental, and behavioral health care services to individuals and community groups in Saginaw, Bay, and other nearby counties.

Health Delivery Inc. coordinates two clinical centers in the Saginaw area.

- The Arthur Hill High School Health Center opened in the spring of 2009. That year, the Arthur Hill health Center received an earmark for funding from State Senator Roger Khan. In 2010, the center provided services to 85 unduplicated users.
- The school-based health center located in Saginaw High School opened in 2006. In 2010, the center saw 363 users, provided 180 EPSDT/well checks and administered 146 immunizations.



### Oakland Primary Health Services

- Oakland Primary Health Services is a federally qualified health center that has provided services to low income residents of Pontiac and the surrounding communities for over 8 years.
- OPHS administers three clinical adolescent health centers.
  - The Pontiac High School Teen Health Center (formally known as Central High) opened in 1995. In 2010 the health center served 556 unduplicated users in 1,629 visits. In these visits the health center staff provided students with 192 EPSDT/well checks and 83 immunizations.
  - The Pontiac Middle School Teen Health Center opened in 2010 after the health center at Northern High School (opened in 1989) closed with the building. In 2010, the new center served 490 users, provided 215 EPSDT/well checks, and 67 immunizations.
  - The Teen Health center at Waterford Alternative High School opened in 2005. The Alternative High School is an educational program for students who prefer a small high school setting or who have not been successful in the regular classroom environment. In 2010, the center provided services to 442 users, including 192 EPSDT/well checks and 284 immunizations.



### Thunder Bay Community Health Service, Inc.

- Thunder Bay Community Health Service, Inc. provides primary, preventative, and supplemental health services to residents of Northeastern Lower Michigan's Montmorency, Western Alpena, and Presque Isle Counties.
- Thunder Bay coordinates the Thunder Bay Onaway School Based Health Center which provides primary health care services to the students of the Onaway Area School District. The school based health center opened in the spring of 2009 at Onaway Senior High School. In 2010, the health center served almost 500 unduplicated users and administered 604 immunizations.
