



The Child & Adolescent Health Center Program within the Michigan Department of Community Health has had a longstanding relationship with **Health Systems** since the program was created in 1988. Going into our 23<sup>rd</sup> year of programming, roughly one third of the current 71 centers are run by Health Systems; the remaining two thirds are run by Federally Qualified Health Centers and Local Health Departments. Child & Adolescent Health Centers (CAHCs) compliment the core mission of community Health Systems and serve as a critical safety net to children and adolescents who lack access to primary care services.

The three models through which these centers operate are clinical, alternative clinical, and school wellness programs. The **clinical adolescent health center model** provides on-site primary health care, psychosocial and health promotion/disease prevention education, and referral services through either school-based or school-linked health centers. **Alternative clinical centers** provide similar services to clinical centers, but differ in the number of hours that they are required to be open and the number of youth they are required to reach. Services offered by the **school wellness program** include limited clinical services, individual and group evidence-based health education, school staff training, and mental health services.

Below, is a list of the Health Systems that have demonstrated a strong commitment to Child & Adolescent Health Center services by overseeing one or more clinics in their communities.

#### *Arab Community Center for Economic and Social Services*

- ACCESS is a non-profit health and human service organization that has directed a school-linked health center through the Child and Adolescent Health Center Program for over 20 years.
- The health center at ACCESS opened in 1990 and primarily serves Arab American children and adolescents in the Dearborn area.
- In 2010, the ACCESS CAHC provided services to over 1,900 unduplicated users. The center provided almost 660 EPSDT/well checks and close to 400 immunizations.

#### *Botsford Hospital*

- Botsford Hospital is a health care facility serving the residents of Oakland and western Wayne Counties. Botsford Hospital collaborated with the South Redford School District to establish a school based health center at Pierce Middle School.
- The Botsford/South Redford Child and Adolescent Health Center opened in Pierce Middle School during the spring of 2010. In its first year, the center provided services to over 260 unduplicated users, including 125 EPSDT/well checks and 65 immunizations.

### Henry Ford Health System

- Henry Ford Health System School Based and Community Health Program has been providing care through school based/linked clinics since 1991. The HFHS provides care through 11 clinics, including 5 state-funded Child and Adolescent Health Centers.
- The Henry Ford Health System provides funding to its health centers through state and organizational funds, as well as a number of grants in order to sustain services.

- The Fitzgerald Health Center, located in Fitzgerald High School in southwest Warren, opened in 1989. In 2010, the center saw over 500 unduplicated users, provided almost 200 EPSDT/well checks, and administered 174 immunizations.



- The Ford Health Center, located in Ford High School in Detroit, opened in 1997. In 2010, the health center saw over 360 unduplicated users, provided 182 EPSDT/well checks, and administered 166 immunizations.
- The Mumford Health Center, located in Mumford High School in Detroit, opened in 2010. In its first year, the health center staff saw 430 unduplicated users and provided 180 EPSDT/well checks.



- The Southwestern Health Center, located in Southwestern High School in Detroit, opened in 1991. In 2010, the center provided services to over 400 unduplicated users in almost 1,100 visits. During these visits, the center staff provided 180 EPSDT/well checks and 100 immunizations.
- The Youthville school linked Clinical Health Center, located in Detroit, opened in 2005. In 2010, the health center served 334 unduplicated users and provided over 100 EPSDT/well checks.

- The alternative Clinical Center at the Detroit Edison Public School Academy opened in 2010. In its first year, the Webber Pioneer Health Center provided services to 60 users.

### MidMichigan Health System

- MidMichigan Health is a non-profit health system covering a 12-county region, with medical centers in Midland, Alma, Clare, and Gladwin. MidMichigan Health System administers one clinical center and one alternative clinical health center.
  - The Clinical Health Center at Houghton Lake High School opened in the spring of 2009. In 2010, the site provided services to 523 unduplicated users in over 1,100 visits.
  - The Alternative Clinical Center at Roscommon Middle School also opened in the spring of 2009 and saw 645 unduplicated users last year in 1,144 visits.

### Mott Children's Health Center

- The Mott Children's Health Center (MCHC) provides services to the children and adolescents of the Genesee County community. MCHC operates two state funded school based health centers.
  - The Beecher Teen Health Center located at Beecher Middle/High School opened in 1990. In 2010, the center saw 560 unduplicated users in 1,417 visits. In these visits, center staff provided a number of services including 262 EPSDT/well checks and 497 immunizations.
  - The School-based Health Center at Northwestern High School in Flint opened in 1994. In 2010, the Northwestern Wellness Center provided services to 570 unduplicated users, including 229 EPSDT/well checks and 160 immunizations.
- MCHC was selected to administer the region's first school model of the Carrera Project, an adolescent pregnancy prevention program for 5<sup>th</sup> graders, in Beecher Schools.
- The Northwestern Wellness Center has been essential in providing assistance to the adolescents of the Flint community who continue to suffer from the effects of the auto industry crisis.



### St. John Community Health Investment Corporation

- St. John Providence Health System is comprised of seven hospitals and more than 125 medical facilities in southeast Michigan. St. John manages and supports 5 state-funded school-based health centers.
  - The Napoleon B. Jordan Center for Health Care at Marcus Garvey Academy has provided services to southeastern Detroit since 1996. In 2010, the clinical center saw 634 unduplicated users, administered 305 immunizations, and provided 245 EPSDT/well checks.
  - The School-based health Center at Central High School in Detroit recently moved to this location from Cooley High School. In 2010, the center provided services to almost 200 users.

- The Clintondale Health Center, in Clinton Township, has served the students of Clintondale Middle School and High School since 2009 as an alternative clinical site. In 2010, the center saw 165 unduplicated users and provided 116 EPSDT/well checks.



- The Jardon-Webb Health Center in the Hazel Park School District has provided services to the Jardon Vocational High School and Webb Elementary School since 2005. In 2010, the clinical health center provided services to 380 unduplicated users, including 140 EPSDT/well checks and 170 immunizations.
- The Nolan Health Center, located in Nolan Elementary/Middle School in Detroit, opened as an alternative clinical site in 1996. In 2010, the health center provided services to 253 unduplicated users.

*Oakwood Healthcare Inc.*

- Oakwood Healthcare Inc. provides administration for four school based/school-linked health centers in the Metro Detroit area.
  - The Taylor Teen Health Center has provided services in Taylor, Southgate, and Allen Park since 1988. In 2010, the school-linked center provided services to 643 users, including 181 EPSDT/well checks and 197 immunizations.
  - Oakwood also administers the Taylor Teen Health Center School Wellness Program at Harry S Truman High School as a satellite program of the Taylor Teen Health Center.
  - The Oakwood Inkster Teen Health Center is located in Inkster High School and opened in 1989. In 2010, the Inkster Health Center saw 381 users and provided 186 EPSDT/well checks.
  - The Adams Child and Adolescent Health Center is a school based health center located in Westland, which recently moved to its new location at Adams Upper Elementary School. Previously known as the Lincoln/Jefferson-Barns School Health Center, the ACAHC opened in 1998.
- Oakwood Healthcare Inc. was one of the first organizations in Michigan to be awarded a planning and implementation grant by MDCH to create a teen health center.



University of Michigan Health System

- The University of Michigan Health System operates 5 school-based health centers in the Ann Arbor, Ypsilanti, and Willow Run public schools systems through their community partnership known as the Regional Alliance for Healthy Schools (RAHS).

- The alternative clinical RAHS Health Center at Stone High School in Ann Arbor opened in 2003. In 2010, the health center served over 160 unduplicated users.
- The RAHS Health Center located within Scarlett Middle School



- opened in 1996 in the city of Ann Arbor. The clinical health center saw 395 unduplicated users in 2010 and provided a number of services including 124 immunizations.
- The RAHS Health Center at Willow Run Middle/High School opened in 2009. In 2010, the center served 392 users, provided 147 EPSDT/well checks, and administered 76 immunizations.
- The alternative clinical RAHS Health Center at Ypsilanti Middle School also opened in 2009. In 2010, the center saw 276 users in over 1,300 visits.
- The RAHS Health Center at Ypsilanti High School opened in 2010, and recently received state funding to operate as a CAHC beginning in October 2011.
