

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS
For the Year Ended March 31, 2007

As management of the Augusta Charter Township (Township), we offer readers of the Township's financial statements this narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities of the Township for the year ended March 31, 2007. We encourage readers to consider the information presented here.

Financial Highlights

- The Township has continued to experience growth. The taxable value of property in the Township increased 11 percent over last year.
- Property tax revenue for the Township increased \$71,000 (9%) all of which is attributable to the increased taxable value of Township property.
- The Augusta Charter Township Board authorized a Water & Sewer Rate study of the Utility Fund as a result of the operating loss.
- The assets of the Township exceeded its liabilities at the close of the year ended March 31, 2007 \$16,943,763 (*net assets*). Of this amount, \$3,072,585 (*unrestricted net assets*) may be used to meet the government's ongoing obligations to citizens and creditors.
- The government's total net assets decreased \$643,648. This decrease is primarily attributable to utility fund expenses exceeding revenues.

Overview of the Financial Statements

This discussion and analysis is intended to serve as an introduction to the Township's basic financial statements. The Township's basic financial statements comprise three components: 1) government-wide financial statements, 2) fund financial statements, and 3) notes to the financial statements. This report also contains other supplementary information in addition to the basic financial statements themselves.

Government-wide financial statements. The *government-wide financial statements* are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of the Township's finances, in a manner similar to a private-sector business.

The *statement of net assets* presents information on all of the Augusta Charter Township's assets and liabilities, with the difference between the two reported as *net assets*. Over time, increases or decreases in net assets may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position of the Augusta Charter Township is improving or deteriorating.

The *statement of activities* presents information showing how the government's net assets changed during the year ended March 31, 2007. All changes in net assets are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, *regardless of the timing of related cash flows*. Thus, revenues and expenses are reported in this statement for some items that will only result in cash flows in future fiscal periods (e.g., uncollected taxes and earned but unused vacation leave).

Both of the government-wide financial statements distinguish functions of the Augusta Charter Township that are principally supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues (*governmental activities*) from other functions that are intended to recover all or a significant portion of their costs through user fees and charges

(*business-type activities*). The governmental activities of the Augusta Charter Township include general government, public safety, highways and streets, sanitation, public works, and culture and recreation. The business-type activities of the Augusta Charter Township include utility systems.

The government-wide financial statements can be found on pages 3 – 5 of this report.

Fund financial statements. A *fund* is a grouping of related accounts that is used to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities or objectives. The Township, like other state and local governments, uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements. All of the funds of the Township can be divided into three categories: governmental funds, proprietary funds, and fiduciary funds.

Governmental funds. *Governmental funds* are used to account for essentially the same functions reported as *governmental activities* in the government-wide financial statements. However, unlike the government-wide financial statements, governmental fund financial statements focus on *near-term inflows and outflows of spendable resources*, as well as on *balances of spendable resources* available at the year ended March 31, 2007. Such information may be useful in evaluating a government's near-term financing requirements.

Because the focus of governmental funds is narrower than that of the government-wide financial statements, it is useful to compare the information presented for *governmental funds* with similar information presented for *governmental activities* in the government-wide financial statements. By doing so, readers may better understand the long-term impact of the government's near-term financing decisions. Both the governmental fund balance sheet and the governmental fund statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balances provide a reconciliation to facilitate this comparison between *governmental funds* and *governmental activities*.

The Township maintains four individual governmental funds. Information is presented separately in the governmental fund balance sheet and in the governmental fund statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balances for the general fund, fire fund, police fund and environmental fund which are considered to be major funds.

The Township adopts an annual appropriated budget for all funds. A budgetary comparison statement has been provided for all major governmental funds to demonstrate compliance with budget.

The basic governmental fund financial statements can be found on pages 6 – 8 of this report.

Proprietary funds. The Township maintains an *Enterprise fund*, a type of proprietary fund, used to report functions presented as *business-type activities* in the government-wide financial statements. The Township uses an enterprise fund to account for its Utility Fund.

Proprietary funds provide the same type of information as the government-wide financial statements, only in more detail. The proprietary fund financial statements provide separate information for the Utility Fund, which is considered to be a major fund of the Township.

The proprietary fund financial statements can be found on pages 10 – 13 of this report.

Fiduciary funds. Fiduciary funds are used to account for resources held for the benefit of parties outside the government. Fiduciary funds are *not* reflected in the government-wide financial statement because the resources of those funds are *not* available to support the Township's own programs. The accounting used for fiduciary funds is much like that used for proprietary funds.

The basic fiduciary fund financial statement can be found on page 14 of this report.

Notes to the financial statements. The notes provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the government-wide and fund financial statements. The notes to the financial statements can be found on pages 19 – 35 of this report.

The tax collection fund schedule can be found on page 46 of this report.

Government-wide Financial Analysis

As noted earlier, net assets may serve over time as a useful indicator of a government’s financial position. In the case of the Township, assets exceeded liabilities by \$16,973,763 at the close of the year ended March 31, 2007.

By far the largest portion of the Township’s net assets (78 percent) reflects its investment in capital assets (e.g., land, buildings, equipment, infrastructure), less any related debt used to acquire those assets that is still outstanding. The Township uses these capital assets to provide services to citizens; consequently, these assets are *not* available for future spending. Although the Township’s investment in its capital assets is reported net of related debt, it should be noted that the resources needed to repay this debt must be provided from other sources, since the capital assets themselves cannot be used to liquidate these liabilities.

Property taxes and state shared revenues finance most of the Township’s basic services, such as police, fire, public works, community development and general administration.

The Township’s business-type activity, the Utility Fund, which supplies water distribution and provides sewage treatment, is provided to the residents by the Ypsilanti Community Utilities Authority (YCUA). The Township passes water & sewer rate increases received from YCUA to its residents. Total expenses increased \$92,400 from the prior year and the cost of purchasing water and wastewater treatment increased \$267,262.

The Township is looking into the purchase of property with an existing building for the purpose of storage of utility equipment. A portion of the building is expected to be rented to the fire department for storage of fire equipment.

An additional portion of the Township's net assets (3 percent) represents resources that are subject to external restrictions on how they may be used. The remaining balance of *unrestricted net assets* \$3,072,585 may be used to meet the government's ongoing obligations to citizens and creditors.

At the end of the current fiscal year, the Township is able to report positive balances in all three categories of net assets, both for the government as a whole, as well as for its separate governmental and business-type activities. The same situation held true for the prior fiscal year.

Financial Analysis of the Government's Funds

As noted earlier, the Township uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements.

As of the year ended March 31, 2007, the Township's governmental funds reported combined ending fund balances of \$1,042,136, an increase of \$139,548 in comparison with the balance at March 31, 2006. Reserved fund balance (\$5,599) is not available for new spending since it already is committed and Special Revenue Funds have \$843,894 available for their special uses.

The General Fund is the chief operating fund of the Township. At the end of the current fiscal year, unreserved fund balance of the General Fund was \$192,643. General Fund overhead expenses collected from other funds is reported as revenue rather than netted against operating expenses.

The fund balance of the Township's General Fund increased by \$22,817 during the year ended March 31, 2007

Proprietary fund - The Township's proprietary fund provides the same type of information found in the government-wide financial statements, but in more detail.

Unrestricted net assets of the utility fund at the end of the year amounted to \$2,621,297. The total decrease in net assets for the fund was \$727,759.

General Fund Budgetary Highlights

State sources revenue was over budget by \$13,633 although state revenues continue to decline.

General Fund expenditures line items over budget totaled \$119,800 of which the major over budget items are:

- Elections over budget amount of \$10,233 net of \$2,700 recorded in local sources of revenue reimbursed for the May 2006 school election leaving a remaining over budget amount of \$7,500 for equipment and salaries.
- Economic development over budget of \$84,954 represents amounts billed to developers for expenditures incurred on the new development reviews. The community development revenues and expenditures have been considered on a net basis and in the future will be budgeted. In addition, \$113,200 of developer billings are reported as deferred revenue versus revenue because the receivables were not collected within 60 days of year end.

Capital Asset and Debt Administration

Capital assets. The Township's investment in capital assets for its governmental and business-type activities as of March 31, 2007, amounts to \$16,152,302 (net of accumulated depreciation). This investment in capital assets includes land, buildings and utility systems, machinery and equipment and park facilities.

Capital assets purchased during the year ended March 31, 2007 were:

- A network server, \$5,787, reported in the governmental activities.
- Water meters, \$19,100, reported in the business-type activities.

Long-term debt. At the year ended March 31, 2007, the Township had total bonded and contract debt outstanding of \$2,904,576. Of this amount, \$986,576 comprises debt backed by the full faith and credit of the government. The remainder of the Township's debt represents bonds secured solely by specified revenue sources (i.e., revenue bonds).

Economic Factors and Next Year's Budgets and Rates

The Township budget for next year anticipates relatively reduced revenue due to the decline in Michigan's overall economy. The Township experienced an increase of 11 percent in its tax base for the year, down from the previous year's 15 percent with an estimated increase of 8 percent in 2008.

The Township anticipates next year's revenue will continue to decline by an estimated 1 percent.

The Police Fund millage ballot proposal of 2006 failed to renew 0.50 mills and failed to approve the requested increase of an additional 0.50 mills for December 1, 2007 through 2010 that would have generated an estimated levy of \$209,300 in the first year. The remaining police millage will expire after the December 1, 2007 tax levy. The Township estimates funds available to maintain the existing police service contract with Washtenaw County Sheriff through 2008 assuming no additional service costs are incurred under the contract conditions effective January 1, 2008.

The Washtenaw County Road Commission property on Bolla Road reverted to the county in October 2007.

The Township is pursuing the sale of Township property for the purpose of funding a new fire building.

The Township authorized the purchase of a fire truck for \$341,500 for year ending 2008 purchased through lease financing.

The Township is in litigation with Washtenaw County over the costs of police services. The resolution to the litigation could necessitate a budget amendment to the Police fund in an amount not greater than \$20,000. Other general fund litigation includes zoning compliance not anticipated to be greater than \$2,000.

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, the business-type activities and each major fund of Augusta Charter Township, Washtenaw County, Michigan, as of and for the year ended March 31, 2007, which collectively comprise the Township's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of Augusta Charter Township, Washtenaw County, Michigan's management. Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinions.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, the business-type activities and each major fund of Augusta Charter Township, Washtenaw County, Michigan, as of March 31, 2007, and the respective changes in financial position and cash flows, where applicable, thereof for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated November 8, 2007 on our consideration of Augusta Charter Township, Washtenaw County, Michigan's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. NOTE 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements of Augusta Charter Township, Washtenaw County, Michigan (Township) have been prepared in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP) as applied to government units.

A. Reporting Entity

Augusta Charter Township is a charter township, governed by a Board of Trustees. As required by generally accepted accounting principles, these financial statements present Augusta Charter Township as a primary government. There are no component units to the Township.

B. Government-wide and Fund Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements (i.e., the statement of net assets and the statement of changes in net assets) report information on all of the nonfiduciary activities of the primary government. For the most part, the effect of interfund activity has been removed from these statements. *Governmental activities*, which normally are supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues, are reported separately from *business-type activities*, which rely to a significant extent on fees and charges for support.

The statement of activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct expenses of a given function or segment are offset by program revenues. *Direct expenses* are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific function or segment. *Program revenues* include 1) charges to customers or applicants who purchase, use or directly benefit from goods, services, or privileges provided by a given function or segment and 2) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function or segment. Taxes and other items not properly included among program revenues are reported instead as *general revenues*.

Separate financial statements are provided for governmental funds, proprietary funds, and a fiduciary fund, even though the latter are excluded from the government-wide financial statements. Major governmental funds and major individual enterprise funds are reported as separate columns in the fund financial statements.

C. Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting and Financial Statement Presentation

The government-wide financial statements are reported using the *economic resources measurement focus* and the *accrual basis of accounting*, as are the proprietary fund financial statements. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Property taxes are recognized as revenues in the year for which they are levied. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been met.

Governmental fund financial statements are reported using the *current financial resources measurement focus* and the *modified accrual basis of accounting*. Revenues are recognized as soon as they are both measurable and available. Revenues are considered to be *available* when they are collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay liabilities of the current period. For this purpose, the government considers revenues to be available if they are collected within 60 days of the end of the current fiscal period. Expenditures generally are recorded when a liability is incurred, as under accrual accounting. However, debt service expenditures are recorded only when payment is due.

Amounts due from other governments and services provided associated with the current fiscal period are all considered to be susceptible to accrual and so have been recognized as revenues of the current fiscal period. All other revenue items are considered to be measurable and available only when cash is received by the government.

The government reports the following major governmental funds:

The *General Fund* is the general operating fund of the Township. It is used to account for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

The *Fire Fund* accounts for financial resources of the Township's Fire Department.

The *Police Fund* accounts for the financial resources of the Township's Police Department..

The *Environmental Fund* accounts for financial resources raised for the legal defense and related research costs pertaining to significant environmental threats in Augusta Township.

The government reports the following major proprietary fund:

The *Utility Fund* accounts for the acquisition, operation, and maintenance of the Township's water and sewer system.

Additionally, the government reports the following fund types:

The *Fiduciary Fund (Tax Collection Fund and Agency Fund)* accounts for assets held by the Township as an agent for individuals, private organizations, other governments, and/or other funds.

Private-sector standards of accounting and financial reporting issued prior to December 1, 1989, generally are followed in both the government-wide and proprietary fund financial statements to the extent that those standards do not conflict with or contradict guidance of the Governmental Accounting Standards Board. Governments also have the *option* of following subsequent private-sector guidance for their business-type activities (water and sewer funds), subject to this same limitation. The Township has elected not to follow subsequent private-sector guidance.

As a general rule the effect of interfund activity has been eliminated from the government-wide financial statements. Exceptions to this general rule are payments of utility charges between the Township's water and sewer function and various other functions of the government. Elimination of these charges would distort the direct costs and program revenues reported for the various function concerned.

Amounts reported as *program revenues* included 1) charges to customers or applicants for goods, services, or privileges provided, 2) operating grants and contributions, and 3) capital grants and contributions, including special assessments. Internally dedicated resources are reported as *general revenues* rather than as program revenues. Likewise, general revenues include all taxes.

The Proprietary Fund distinguishes *operating* revenues and expenses from *nonoperating* items. Operating revenues and expenses generally result from providing services and producing and delivering goods in connection with a proprietary fund's principal ongoing operations. The principal operating revenues of the

Utility Fund relates to charges to customers for sales and services. Operating expenses for this fund include the cost of sales and services, administrative expenses, and depreciation on capital assets. All revenues and expenses not meeting this definition are reported as nonoperating revenues and expenses.

When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, it is the Township's policy to use restricted resources first, then unrestricted resources as they are needed.

D. Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

E. Assets, liabilities, and net assets or equity

1. Cash and investments

Cash includes amounts in cash on hand, demand deposits, except those deposits noted as investments (see below), as well as short-term investments with a maturity date within three months of the date acquired by the Township.

Investments include money market and certificates of deposit where the intent is to hold funds long-term, as well as investments with maturity dates over three months of the date acquired by the Township.

State statutes authorize the government to invest in Obligations of the U.S. Treasury, Federal Agencies, commercial paper, corporate bonds, repurchase agreements, and State approved Investment Pools.

Investments are stated at cost or amortized cost. The Township will use amortized cost only when it reflects fair value of the investment. Currently, no investments are stated at amortized cost.

2. Receivables and payables

Activity between funds that are representative of lending/borrowing arrangements outstanding at the end of the fiscal year are referred to as either "due to/from other funds" (i.e., the current portion of interfund loans) or "advances to/from other funds" (i.e., the noncurrent portion of interfund loans). Any residual balances outstanding between the governmental activities and business-type activities are reported in the government-wide financial statements as "internal balances."

Advances between funds, as reported in the fund financial statements, are offset by a fund balance reserve account in applicable governmental funds to indicate that they are not available for appropriation and are not expendable available financial resources. The Township had no advances between funds at March 31, 2007.

Personal property taxes receivable is shown net of an allowance for uncollectibles.

Properties are assessed as of December 31 and the tax levies are July 1 and December 1 of the following year. The tax levies of July 1 and December 1, 2006 are revenues in the Township's fiscal year ended March 31, 2007.

The Township had a general tax millage of .8201 for 2006. The Township's maximum allowable millage is 1.0 mills. The Township had a police department millage of 1.375 and a fire department millage of 1.6277 for 2006.

A lien on the property occurs when the taxes are levied. The taxes levied July 1 are payable by September 14 without penalty. The taxes levied December 1 are payable by February 14 without penalty.

Since the County through revolving funds obtains the delinquent real property taxes for the Township, the sixty (60) day rule does not apply to such delinquent taxes receivable.

3. Inventories and prepaid items

Inventory is valued at cost on a first-in, first-out basis. Certain payments to vendors reflect costs applicable to future accounting periods and are recorded as prepaid items in both government-wide and fund financial statements.

4. Restricted assets

Certain proceeds from developers are classified as restricted assets on the balance sheet because their use is limited to making payments toward the cost of an additional sewer capacity lease.

5. Capital Assets

Capital assets, which include property, plant and equipment are reported in the applicable governmental or business-type activities columns in the government-wide financial statements. Capital assets are defined by the government as assets with an initial, individual cost of more than \$5,000 (amount not rounded) and an estimated useful life in excess of two years. Such assets are recorded at historical cost or estimated historical cost if purchased or constructed. Donated capital assets are recorded at estimated fair market value at the date of donation.

6. Long-term obligations

In the governmental-wide financial statements and the proprietary fund type in the fund financial statements, long-term debt and other long-term obligations are reported as liabilities in the applicable governmental activities, business-type activities, or proprietary fund type statement of net assets.

7. Fund Equity

In the fund financial statements, governmental funds report reservations of fund balance for amounts that are not available for appropriation or are legally restricted by outside parties for use for a specific purpose. The reserve for taxes receivable represents the portion of the fund balance that is not available for appropriation. The designation for fire building represents the tentative plan, that is subject to change, of the current board of trustees to construct a fire hall.

The government-wide statement of net assets reports \$591,816 of restricted net assets of which \$591,816 is restricted by enabling legislation.

NOTE 2. STEWARDSHIP, COMPLIANCE, AND ACCOUNTABILITY

A. Budgetary information

The accounting basis used by the Township for budgeting is in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP).

The Township follows the budgetary procedures outlined by the State of Michigan including public hearings and proper adoption. All funds of the Township have a budget. All annual appropriations lapse at fiscal year end. The budgets are amended during the year as needed.

B. Excess of expenditures over appropriations in budgetary funds

P.A. 621 of 1978, Section 18(1), as amended, of the State of Michigan provides that a local governmental unit shall not incur expenditures in excess of the amount appropriated. Augusta Charter Township did not incur expenditures in excess of the amount appropriated in any of its funds.

NOTE 3. DEPOSITS AND INVESTMENTS

Deposits

Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a bank failure, the Township's deposits may not be returned to it. The Township does not have a deposit policy for custodial credit risk. As of March 31, 2007, \$1,643,920 of the Township's bank balance of \$3,040,104 was exposed to custodial credit risk as follows:

Investments

The Township's investments include certificates of deposit, obligations of federal agencies and money market funds.

The Township's investments include \$48,800 invested in Michigan Governmental Money Market Funds held by JPMorgan Chase. The money market funds are rated Aaa by Moody's rating service and AA by Standard & Poor's rating service. Eligible investments of the Michigan Governmental Money Market Fund include bonds, securities and other obligations issued by the U.S. Government or its agencies, certificates of deposit and time deposits of eligible financial institutions, share certificates of a state or federal credit union organized and authorized to operate in Michigan, commercial paper rated in the two highest rating agency classifications and mutual funds. The weighted average maturity of this money market fund is 18 days as of September 30, 2006.

Interest rate risk is the risk that the market value of securities invested will fall due to changes in market interest rates. The Township does not have an interest rate risk policy. The weighted average maturity of the governmental funds certificates of deposits is 202 days. The weighted average maturity of the proprietary funds certificate of deposits is 439.22 days. The weighted average maturity of the proprietary funds obligations of federal agencies is 243.06 days. The weighted average maturity of the fiduciary funds certificates of deposits is 136 days.

Custodial credit risk for investments is the risk that, in the event of the failure of the counterparty to a transaction, the Township will not be able to recover the value of investment of collateral securities that are in possession of an outside party. As of March 31, 2007, \$940,058 of the Township's investments of \$2,543,693 is uninsured and uncollateralized.

Concentration of credit risk is the risk of loss attributed to the magnitude of a government's investment in a single issuer. As of March 31, 2007, concentrations of 5% or higher include 12.32% of investments at Federal National Mortgage Association, 11.80% at Federal Home Loan Bank, 10.20% at Key Bank, and 8.04% at Bank of Ann Arbor.

The Township has entered into a lease agreement with YCUA to obtain a temporary leasehold right of .8 MGD in treatment capacity in the existing WWTP. The lease term is 15 years, ending in December 2020, with payments of \$143,500 per year at 6% interest. **NOTE 11. VIOLATION OF FINANCE-RELATED LEGAL OR CONTRACTUAL PROVISIONS-

NOTE 13. DEFINED CONTRIBUTION PLANS

The Augusta Township Pension Plan is a defined contribution plan administered by Principal Financial Group under authority of Internal Revenue Service Code Section 401(a). The Township makes monthly contributions of 15% of full time employees' compensation. Employees must be 18 years of age to participate and are allowed to contribute, however employees did not contribute to this plan. The Township made contributions of \$25,886 for the year ended June 30, 2007.

Augusta Charter Township 457 Prototype Plan is a governmental 457 deferred compensation plan administered by Symetra Financial. Employees, with the exception of part-time employees working 15 hours or less and volunteer firemen, are allowed to participate with no employer match. One employee contributed \$3,000 during the fiscal year.

NOTE 14. CONTINGENCIES

Subsequent to March 31, 2007, and before the issuance of this report, the Township was notified that it will have to pay \$2,000 regarding a zoning compliance lawsuit. It is reasonably possible that the Township will have to pay an amount not greater than \$21,000 in regard to separate litigation involving the clerk.

NOTE 15. SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Subsequent to March 31, 2007, and before the issuance of this report, the property on Bolla Road was returned to the Washtenaw County Road Commission.

We have audited the financial statements of the governmental activities, the major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of Augusta Charter Township, as of and for the year ended March 31, 2007, which collectively comprise Augusta Charter Township's basic financial statements and have issued our report thereon dated November 8, 2007. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

INTERNAL CONTROL OVER FINANCIAL REPORTING

In planning and performing our audit, we considered Augusta Charter Township's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statement, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Township's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Township's internal control over financial reporting.

Our consideration of internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the preceding paragraph and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that might be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses. However, as discussed below, we identified a certain deficiency in internal control over financial reporting that we consider to be a significant deficiency.

A control deficiency exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect misstatements on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a control deficiency, or combination of control deficiencies, that adversely affects the Township's ability to initiate, authorize, record, process, or report financial data reliably in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, such that there is more than a remote likelihood that a misstatement of the Township's

financial statements that is more than inconsequential will not be prevented or detected by the Township's internal control over financial reporting. We considered the deficiencies described as 2007-1 through 2007-3 in the accompanying schedule of findings and responses to be significant deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting.

A material weakness is a significant deficiency, or combination of significant deficiencies, that results in more than a remote likelihood that a material misstatement of the financial statements will not be prevented or detected by the Township's internal control.

Our consideration of the internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in the internal control that might be significant deficiencies and, accordingly, would not necessarily disclose all significant deficiencies that are also considered to be material weaknesses. However, we believe the significant deficiencies described above as 2007-1 through 2007-3, are not material weaknesses.

COMPLIANCE AND OTHER MATTERS

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether Augusta Charter Township's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

We noted certain matters that we reported to management of Augusta Charter Township in a separate letter dated November 8, 2007.

August Charter Township's response to the findings identified in our audit are described in the accompanying schedule of findings and response. We did not audit Augusta Charter Township's response, and accordingly, we express no opinion on it.

Finding 2007-1

Finding considered a significant deficiency

Criteria:

Effective for the year ended June 30, 2007, Statement on Auditing Standards #112 titled *Communicating Internal Control Related Matters Identified in an Audit* (issued May 2006), requires us to communicate in writing when a client requires assistance to prepare the footnotes required in the annual audit report in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Condition

Currently, the Township's staff prepares the interim financial reports and assists the external auditor in the preparation of the annual audit report.

Cause

The staff of the Township does understand all information included in the annual financial statements; however, assistance of the external auditor was utilized in preparing the footnotes to the financial statements.

Effect

Utilization of the external auditor in preparing the footnotes to the financial statements assists management with the external financial reporting responsibility, to ensure their financial statements are accurate.

Recommendation

At this time, we recommend no changes to this situation and communicate this as required by professional standards. The current process meets the definition of a significant deficiency as defined in Statement on Auditing Standards #112.

Client Response

We are aware of this deficiency and believe it is not cost beneficial in our situation to develop this expertise. We will continue to use our external auditors for this technical assistance. We would expect this situation to be ongoing in future years.

Recommendation

The Township should consider adding additional personnel in order to segregate duties.

Client Response

We are aware of this deficiency and the Township will explore possibilities to achieve greater segregation of duties.

Finding considered a significant deficiency

Criteria:

Effective for the year ended March 31, 2007, Statement on Auditing Standards #112 titled *Communicating Internal Control Related Matters Identified in an Audit* (issued May 2006), requires us to communicate in writing to management and those charged with governance, significant deficiencies and material weaknesses identified in an audit.

Condition

The Township is required to adopt a budget for the General Fund. The budget should be adopted at a minimum level of appropriation. This is usually at the major revenue category and expenditure functional level. Each of the expenditure function levels should not be overspent.

Cause

The administration of the Township understands the requirement, and annually prepares the budget which is approved by the Township. In March of the fiscal year, administration prepares amended budgets to be approved by the Township. The amended budget discloses estimated expenditures at the functional level.

Effect

The budget must be amended before year end, the timing of which resulted in one functional expenditure being over expended at year end. On the Required Supplementary Information Budgetary Comparison Schedule, one expenditure function was overspent. However, total expenditures for the General Fund were underspent.

Recommendation

That the administration determine prior to the amendment of the appropriations, that the information is complete including adjusting entries to record the year end accruals.

Client Response

At the time of amendments, the appropriations and expenditures are adjusted as accurately as possible. The Township knows of no way to assure that the expenditures are exact when the final revenues and expenses are not known until later. The Township does, however, assure that every attempt to be as accurate as possible will be taken.

Our comments and recommendations are intended to improve the internal control or result in other operating efficiencies. We will be pleased to discuss these comments in further detail at your convenience, perform any additional study of these matters, or assist you in implementing the recommendations. Our comments are summarized as follows:

CURRENT YEAR COMMENTS

Bank Reconciliations

We recommend reconciling each bank account with the general ledger monthly. Performing reconciliations gives accurate, up to date information to the Board in order to make decisions in the best interest of the Township.

Credit Card Policy

For the fiscal year ended March 31, 2007, the Board had not adopted a credit card policy. We believe it is in the Township's best interest to develop policies and procedures for credit card use. With proper controls in place, the Board will be able to minimize the risk of potential misuse.

Investment Policy

We recommend updating the Township's deposit and investment policy so that it addresses the risks defined in GASB Statement No. 40. Doing so will clarify the Township's objectives for depositing and investing the Township's assets.

Recently, 10 new auditing standards have been released and are effective, or will become effective for your March 31, 2008 year end.
