
What is Computer Science?

Computer science teaches important skills, such as creativity, problem-solving, critical and flexible thinking, and coordinating with others. Computer science also provides a critical understanding of citizenship, ethics, and social good.

In our technology-enabled world, computer science learning opens doors to high-demand jobs and provides students with skills that are broadly applicable. Here are a few examples of jobs/careers that are available: fashion tech designer, mobile developer, medicine analyst, data scientist, music program engineer, and various manufacturing jobs.

According to code.org, as Michigan's manufacturing industry transitions to meet the current market demands, there are more than 15,367 open computing jobs. That's 3.8 times higher than the average demand for qualified candidates. In Michigan, the average salary for computing occupations is \$82,386 (versus an average of other salaries \$49,510).

In adopting the <u>Computer Science Standards</u>, the Michigan Department of Education is committing to Michigan learners that they will be provided equitable access to computer science opportunities regardless of where they live, or the school's demographics.

To get started in computer science, students only need a desire to solve problems and a willingness to explore new ideas.
