State and National Resources for Cancer Survivors



A Guide for Nurse Navigators, Social Workers, Patient Navigators, and Community Health Workers



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IINTRODUCTION

Nurse navigators, patient navigators, and community health workers (CHW) are uniquely positioned to provide resources to cancer survivors. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) considers a cancer survivor to be any person from the point of diagnosis throughout the remainder of their life. A cancer diagnosis can be overwhelming to the patient and their family. Many need assistance or specialized support.

This guide organizes state and national resources for cancer survivors. Its companion document, *Community Scan: Finding Local Resources*, is a guide for searching and recording local resources. Finding community resources to support people with cancer is an important service that navigators and CHWs can provide to support health and wellness. Both documents examine:

This document will be reviewed quarterly to update links and resources.

Reducing Barriers

Transportation

- Medicaid Michigan Medicaid may help with transportation. Encourage individuals with Medicaid to work with their Medicaid provider for transportation assistance.
- American Cancer Society Road to Recovery (currently suspended due to COVID-19).
- <u>CancerCare</u> Limited financial assistance for treatment related transportation.
 Individuals who are in active cancer treatment and under 250% of the Federal Poverty Limit are eligible.
- <u>Mercy Medical Angels</u> Their mission is to remove the barrier to medical care with transportation assistance for commercial airline travel and ground transportation.
- Faith-Based Organizations Churches, temples, or synagogues may provide help with transportation to cancer treatment.

Lodging

- <u>Airbnb and the Cancer Support Community</u> This partnership provides free housing for cancer patients and caregivers who meet certain geographic (travel for at least 50 miles) and income (based on household size) criteria. Contact 877-793-0498 for an application.

One-on-One Assistance



In Michigan, the six most common cancer types are breast, lung, prostate, colorectal, melanoma, and urinary bladder. Together these cancers make up over half (58.7%) of the cancer diagnoses in Michigan. There are an additional 20 cancer sites that are grouped in the "other sites" category. ¹

Grants (typically \$500 to \$1,000) are awarded to young adults in treatment between the ages of 16 and 36. This includes breast cancer as it is considered rare in young adults. The next application period is expected June 2021, due to COVID-19.
- <u>Cancer for College</u> Offers scholarships to college students who have had a personal diagnosis of cancer.
- <u>Lacuna Loft</u> Provides online support programs to young adult cancer patients, survivors, and caregivers.
