

This Monthly Financial Report to the Legislature presents the Michigan State government's economic situation and cash collections for October 2021, representing some September and some October economic activity in Michigan.


Total General Fund-General Purpose revenues were \$106.9 million (11.1 percent) higher in October 2021 than in October 2020. The October 2021 School Aid Fund revenues were \$83.8 million (4.1 percent) higher than in October 2020. October 2021 Transportation revenues were \$10.6 million (3.8 percent) lower than in October 2020 (see revenue table). October is the first month of the State's fiscal year (FY). Tax revenue received in October relating to economic activity prior to October will be accrued back to FY 2020-21. Likewise, any refunds paid out in October relating to FY 2020-21 liabilities will also be accrued back. Final FY 2020-21 revenue totals should be available in late December or early January.

The FY 2021-22 revenue projections presented in the revenue summary table on page 11 are from the Consensus Revenue Estimating Conference held on May 21, 2021. The revenue estimate for net General Fund – General Purpose revenue for FY 2021-22 is \$11,673.1 million and the net School Aid revenue forecast is \$15,131.0 million. The Transportation Funds revenue forecast is \$3,793.5 million. By law, the Consensus Revenue Estimating Conferences are held the second week of January and the third week of May.



# Economic Highlights (All data seasonally adjusted unless otherwise noted.) U.S. Economy

U.S. real *Gross Domestic Product* increased at a 2.0 percent annual rate in the third quarter of 2021, according to the advance estimate, down from the 6.7 percent annual rate in the second quarter of 2021. The past three quarterly contributions to the percent change in GDP are shown in the graph below.




Private inventories and personal consumption expenditures contributed significantly to the increase in GDP in the third quarter of 2021. Government spending made minor contributions to the increase in GDP. Net exports and fixed investments were drags on the economy. Real final sales declined 0.1 percent in the third quarter according to the advance estimate while on the inflation front, the implicit price deflator increased by 5.7 percent.

**U.S. wage and salary employment** increased by 531,000 jobs in October, after gaining 312,000 jobs in September, according to revised estimates. Employment levels were still 4.2 million payroll jobs, or 2.8 percent, below the February 2020 level, prior to the pandemic. In October, sectors with the largest increases in employment include the leisure and hospitality sector with 164,000 jobs, trade, transportation, and utilities sector with 104,000 jobs, professional and business services with 100,000 jobs, education and health services with 64,000 jobs, and manufacturing with 60,000 jobs.

In October, the U.S. unemployment rate declined to 4.6 percent, down from September's 4.8 percent. Civilian employment increased slightly to 154.0 million in October, while the number unemployed decreased to 7.4 million. Of the unemployed, 1.1 million were reported as being on a temporary layoff in October, similar to the number in September.

Short-term *interest rates* increased slightly in October, as the 3-month Treasury bill (T-bill) rate rose to 0.05 percent, up 0.01 percentage points from September. Compared to one year ago, the T-bill rate decreased 0.05 percentage points. The Aaa corporate bond rate increased 0.15 percentage points to an


interest yield of 2.68 percent in October and was up 0.33 percentage points from its year-ago level. The interest rate on high-grade municipal bonds increased 0.13 percentage points to 2.43 percent in October and was up 0.28 percentage points from a year ago.



**U.S. retail prices**, as measured by the Consumer Price Index (CPI-U), are up 6.2 percent from October 2020 to October 2021, well above in the 5.4 percent year-over-year increase in September. The CPI-U year-over-year change was last this high at the end of 1990. The Consumer Price Index – Core (CPI-Core) measures the change in all consumer items aside from food and energy prices. The CPI-Core was up 4.6 percent from October 2020 to October 2021. Prior to the current year, the CPI-Core has not been above 4.5 percent since 1991.




Gasoline experienced the largest year-over-year price increase (49.6 percent) due in part to the dramatic decline in gasoline prices for much of 2020 due to the pandemic. Transportation was next in largest price increase (18.7 percent). Far lower year-over-year percent changes can be seen in food and beverage (5.1 percent), housing (4.5 percent), apparel (4.3 percent) and other goods and services (4.2 percent).




### **Michigan Economy**

The *Michigan jobless rate* "inched down over the month by 0.2 of a percentage point to 6.1 percent, according to data released" mid-November "by the Michigan Department of Technology, Management & Budget." This is above the national unemployment rate which declined to 4.6 percent in October. Recently, "the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) identified a distortion in their statistical estimates and has revised the Michigan's September unemployment rate upward by 1.7 percentage points to 6.3 percent. Additional revisions to the unemployment rate for January through August of 2021 will need to be made and will occur during the normal review process at the end of the year." The months still to be revised are presented as the dashed line in the graph below. The civilian labor force remained constant in October, with no change from September. The number unemployed decreased by 7,000 in October, a -2.3 percent change, while the number employed increased by 6,000, a 0.1 percent change from September to October. The number unemployed is 26.0 percent lower than in October 2020 during the first year of the pandemic.



**Michigan wage and salary employment** increased in October by 38,000 jobs from September's revised estimate, and was up 130,000 jobs, or 3.2 percent, from October 2020. In October, the sectors with the largest increases in employment include manufacturing with 10,000 jobs gained, professional and business services with 10,000 jobs gained, leisure and hospitality services with 7,000 jobs gained, and trade, transportation, and utilities with 6,000 jobs gained.


*Michigan gasoline prices* increased in October 2021 to \$3.28 per gallon, up 8.7 cents a gallon from last month's average. Year-over-year gasoline prices are up significantly from the \$2.09 per gallon in October 2020, when they were still low due to the pandemic. October 2021 gas prices are 68.8 cents a gallon higher than they were two years ago in October 2019 and are similar to prices last seen in 2014.





### **Motor Vehicle Sector**

**U.S. light vehicle sales** (cars and light trucks) increased 6.3 percent in October from September, selling at a 13.0 million unit seasonally adjusted annual rate. Domestic car sales increased 2.1 percent and light truck sales increased 13.1 percent from September. Import car sales and light truck sales declined 15.8 percent and 4.1 percent, respectively, from September. Compared to October 2020, light vehicle sales were down 32.0 percent. Domestic car sales decreased 35.0 percent while light truck sales decreased 16.6 percent from the year ago levels. Import car sales were down 22.5 percent while import light truck sales were down 20.5 percent from last year. Domestic light vehicles recorded a 78.1 percent share of October 2021 sales, up 3.2 percentage points from September.



**Michigan motor vehicle production** was up in October, with 178,614 total units, similar in level compared to March 2021. Michigan's October production was 25.9 percent above September's production and 15.9 percent above the level in October of 2020. In October, some factories have remained temporarily suspended due to the semiconductor shortage, while others have returned to production. Nationally, motor vehicle production totaled 794,730 units, which was down 14.4 percent from a year ago. In October, Michigan's car production was 10,149 units while the state's truck production was 168,465 units. Michigan motor vehicle production data are not seasonally adjusted.
