Pursuant to P.A. 107 of 2017
Article V, Section 925
Administrative Segregation Report

Section 925: By March 1, the department shall report to the senate and house appropriations subcommittees on corrections, the senate and house fiscal agencies, the legislative corrections ombudsman, and the state budget office on the annual number of prisoners in administrative segregation between October 1, 2016 and September 30, 2017, and the annual number of prisoners in administrative segregation between October 1, 2016 and September 30, 2017 who at any time during the current or prior prison term were diagnosed with serious mental illness or have a developmental disorder and the number of days each of the prisoners with serious mental illness or a developmental disorder have been confined to administrative segregation (Ad Seg). As used in this section:

(a) "Administrative segregation" means confinement for maintenance of order or discipline to a cell or room apart from accommodations provided for inmates who are participating in programs of the facility.

(ff) "Serious mental illness" means that term as defined in section 100d(3) of the mental health code, 1974 PA 328, MCL 333.1100d.

This report summarizes data compiled by Corrections Mental Health Program Support Services (CMHPSS) which includes cumulative and individual case data for serious mental illness (SMI) or development disorder (DD) as identified on the mental health caseload. This data is shaded in grey.

This report also summarizes data compiled using MDOC's Health Management Information System (HMIS) and Correctional Information Management System (CMIS) between October 1, 2007 and September 30, 2013. In August 2014 MDOC replaced this system with the Offender Management System (OMS). For Fiscal Year 2013-14 the report uses estimates from the CMIS data (not shaded). Since Fiscal Year 2014-15 the report uses data from OMNI and OMS.

It should be noted that the decrease in the Daily Average Number of Prisoners w/SMI in Ad Seg from 2015-2016 to 2016-2017 correlates with a decrease in the total MDOC SMI population at large. The 2016-2017 year saw an overall decrease in this population from 3,914 to 2,674 (-1,240 or -32%) and the average number of SMI in Ad Seg declined from 88 to 59 (-29 or -33%).

The MDOC's Bureau of Healthcare and Correctional Facilities Administration have collaborated to address the needs of seriously mentally ill individuals in prison, and to avoid lengthy stays in Ad Seg. These efforts include increased availability of movement, recreation and treatment for the SMI in restricted housing situations (Interim Care Program, Secure Status Outpatient Program, Incentives in Segregation), early identification and referral of prisoners exhibiting signs of mental illness, increased use of involuntary commitment with mentally ill prisoners who are resistant to treatment, ongoing professional development aimed at improving assessment and treatment of SMI, and improved tracking and communication between custody and healthcare which reduces medically unnecessary transfers of prisoners.

Additionally, in April 2017 CFA and BHC, under instruction from the Director, began to make plans and a goal to divert all seriously mentally ill individuals away from Ad Seg. This will be accomplished by the use of a therapeutic housing unit and program called START, which will teach prisoners life and personal skills to help them avoid behaviors that require escalating security precautions, as well as address their overall mental health needs. In 2018, the Department will pilot the START units at two prisons, and accomplish its initial goal to remove and divert all SMI prisoners from Ad Seg, as well as reduce the overall use of Ad Seg.
