



Corrections Connection End of Year Edition



The MDOC has developed a officer recertification program allowing previously PA-415 certified MDOC staff to volunteer as corrections officers.

The past 18 months have without a doubt been demanding for Michigan Department of Corrections employees across the state. Those working in correctional facilities have worked tirelessly to maintain the safety and security of our facilities during a global pandemic.

Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, FOA, ARU and Central Office and regional office staff picked up shifts inside of prisons to relieve facility staff. In a time of need, MDOC employees have come together, demonstrating their commitment

to the department and the State of Michigan. The Department is grateful for the hard work our employees have demonstrated. Director Washington recognizes the sacrifices staff have made and she along with a team of dedicated employees developed a plan to reduce mandatory overtime shifts for correctional facility staff across the state, allowing them more time for rest and time with their families.

"Our corrections officers continuously go above and beyond the call of duty, sacrificing time with their loved ones to maintain the safety and security of our facilities," Director Washington said. "The department recognizes the importance of work/life balance and how stressful continued rounds of mandated overtime can be, which is why our team made it a priority to develop a plan to reduce mandates and give our officers more time doing the things they enjoy."

The department knows and understands the toll this can take on individual employees and

their families and most importantly wants to convey that more help is on the way.

The Department has been working diligently on a multi-pronged approach to tackle these staffing issues. First, the MDOC has continued to hire new correctional facility staff across the state. Over the past five years, the MDOC has hired more than 3,100 new corrections officers. The new state budget the MDOC advocated for, and that was signed into law by Governor Whitmer, will allow the Department to hire 800 new corrections officers this fiscal year.

#### What We've Done So Far

The department's recruitment team has been overhauled and added new positions, an outside marketing firm has been hired to assist in promoting job opportunities around the state, and more and more facilities are hosting recruitment events to bring in new staff.

Another important recent step that's been taken at 14 prisons so far is to take housing units offline, which due to the decreasing prisoner population this past year and a half, we have been able to safely do.

This has led to the closure of a total of 38 housing units across the state. And these closed units have reduced the number of officer positions by 402, thus allowing for fewer positions needing to be filled and reducing mandates.

#### Next Phase of the Officer Recertification Program

Now we are on to the next phase of the plan, which will allow previously PA 415 certified MDOC staff to volunteer for overtime shifts as corrections officers, relieving officers of mandatory overtime shifts.

Understanding the urgency to provide immediate relief to correction officers, Director Washington assigned an Effective Process Improvement and Communication (EPIC) team to develop a process to allow MDOC employees to assist at facilities that are experiencing a high number of mandates.

The EPIC team collected and reviewed current policies, procedures, Michigan Compiled Laws (MCLs), travel regulations, approved PA-415 training requirements, MDOC Townhall minutes, Collective Bargaining Unit Agreements, and other various resources to develop a program to relieve officers from being assigned mandatory overtime. The team also met and consulted with Assistant Deputy Directors, Wardens, Union Representatives, members of MDOC's Training Division, Legal Affairs,

Human Resources and conducted focus groups with frontline staff across the state, and meeting with a wide variety of staff before making their recommendation and implementing the changes to the Director's Office Memorandum 2021-23R.

Safety and security remain the MDOC's number one goal, which is why the EPIC team has developed a list of requirements for all volunteers, to ensure they have the resources and capabilities to perform the corrections officer job. Volunteers must be active MDOC staff members who have completed Officer Recruit Training and have achieved status as a correction officer, this includes custody staff from other facilities, Captains, Inspectors, Lieutenants, and Sergeants. Under this plan, most current and previously PA 415 certified MDOC staff will be eligible to sign up for voluntary overtime after they have completed and passed required training and have been recertified by Michigan Correctional Officer's Training Council (MCOTC).

MDOC staff that wish to volunteer must be in a role classified at a level 13 or below. MDOC staff that qualify and apply for voluntary overtime must complete the PA-415 recertification process



and must also be approved by the director and Training Council before being placed on the voluntary overtime equalization lists (OEL). In addition, volunteers will not be placed in a single-person assignment or a weapons-qualified assignment.

Those volunteering as corrections officers will be compensated time and a half at their current rate of pay. Volunteers can work no more than 120 hours per pay period, or 40 hours of overtime each pay period. MDOC staff members volunteering for overtime as a corrections officer are allowed to adjust their schedule if operationally feasible. Volunteers should speak with their supervisor if interested in modifying his or her schedule to help reduce mandates.

The MDOC knows how important work-life balance is and this is why the department found it crucial to implement these changes. Allowing active MDOC staff who previously worked in

facilities to volunteer will alleviate the burden and stress of mandatory overtime for those who work as officers in our facilities. However, if you are an officer who still wishes to work overtime, preferences remain in place for overtime assignments. Once all other options have been exhausted; volunteers will then be called to work voluntary overtime in lieu of a mandate. Any MDOC employee working voluntary overtime as a corrections officer cannot be mandated.

#### Recruitment Efforts

The MDOC continues its focus on corrections officer recruitment and retention. Below is a list of the MDOC's efforts to reduce vacancies across the department.

- Authorized to hire 800 new COs this fiscal year.
- More than 3,100 new COs hired over the past 5 years.
- MDOC recruitment team has added 4 new positions including a U.P. and social media recruiter.
- Facility and recruitment staff are hosting recruitment events, job fairs and facility open houses.
- Advertising includes radio and newspaper advertising, social media micro-targeting and TV commercials to air during NFL and college football games.
- We are a new member of the Army Pays
   Program which helps transitioning military
   members find employment upon their
   retirement from military service.
- We are focused on hiring veterans and in the last three years we have hired 560 veterans.

- The MDOC recently had more than 130
   Corrections Officers graduate from the Ken
   McKee Academy class in ceremonies held Dec.
   1 and Dec. 15.
- The next academy begins on Jan. 10 in the Upper Peninsula and Jan. 24 in the Lower Peninsula.
- The MDOC hosted eight hiring events in the month of December.
- Earlier this month, Fox 47 covered a hiring event hosted by Charles E. Egeler Reception & Guidance Center and ABC 10 covered a hiring event hosted by Marquette Branch Prison.
- Warden Nagy and Correctional Officers
   Fitzpatrick and O'Connor from G. Robert
   Cotton Correctional Facility appeared on JTV
   in Jackson to promote hiring events at his
   facility..
- The MDOC is hosting an additional recruit academy just for Women's HuronValley Correctional Facility recruits which begins on March 3. Those interested in working at WHV can also attend the academy beginning on Jan. 24.

# NEW AGENT READY FOR CHALLENGE

New Agent Allen Black started working in probation in 2004 in drug treatment court at the district court level before making the switch to the MDOC in January of 2020. Agent Black was looking for a change of pace and is particularly excited to be working in the community. "I like being out in the community and

being out in the field," said Field Agent Black.
"How can you supervise the community when you don't know what's going on in the community?"
While Agent Black, who

works at Macomb Probation Office, is not new to supervising offenders. The MDOC, however, has its differences which Agent Black had to learn in the midst of a pandemic. He is grateful for his former supervisor Tunga Hurst who served as a mentor to him, guiding him through his new position before she passed away in July.

One takeaway Agent Black took from the new agent school is the importance of encouragement when supervising offenders.

"Most people want to do the right thing," said Field Agent Black. "Sometimes people just need to be encouraged, while also understanding there are consequences for their actions."

For those considering becoming a field agent, Agent Black explains the importance of adaptability.

"You won't have any boring days, it's always a new challenge," said Field Agent Black. "Be conscious of the role you play in people's lives, don't take yourself too seriously, but realize people look at you as a piece of their freedom. Be firm and treat people how you would want you or your own family members to be treated."

### MDOC Fiscal Year 2022 Budget

On Wednesday, Sept. 29 Governor Gretchen Whitmer signed Senate Bill 82, the multidepartment omnibus budget bill for Fiscal Year 2022 which began on October 1. Funding for MDOC is contained within Article 2, for FY22 and Article 14, for supplemental needs for FY21. The total enacted FY22 budget for MDOC is \$2.1 Billion, which includes \$2.0 Billion in state General Fund/ General Purpose dollars.

Highlights of the Budget Include:

•A total on-going appropriation of \$21,166,100 for New Custody Staff Training. The department requested and the legislature approved an increase of \$7.3 Million to this line item. Total funding will allow for the training of 800 new officers during the fiscal year.

•A total investment in the Employee Wellness Programming line item of \$2.0 Million. The department requested an increase of over 60% from Fiscal Year 2021 funding reflecting strong growth within the program. In addition to core funding within this line item, the department will leverage funding within other line items in the budget to continue to address employee wellness needs.

•Supplemental Fiscal Year 2021 funding of \$20.9 Million was requested by the department and supported by the legislature for a capital outlay appropriation to complete construction of the Department of Corrections training academy located in Whitmore Lake. Two phases of construction are already under way at the site and the final phase that includes the construction of a bunk house for new officer recruits is expected to be completed by July 2023.

•Overall the funding contained within the Fiscal Year 2022 budget provides for 13,484.4 FTEs and includes funding for operation of correctional facilities currently housing over 32,400 prisoners and field staff supervising over 42,200 felony probationers and parolees. The Michigan Department of Corrections is the state's second largest department in terms of the total number of state employees and total General Fund / General Purpose appropriations.

App users will have the ability to connect directly to the MDOC Wellness Unit, Peer Support, the Employee Chaplain Program, as well as other specialized support resources. In addition, a Therapist finder offers contact information for local mental health providers who specialize in and have experience working with correctional professionals.

On November 9, during a tour at Marquette Branch Prison with Attorney General Dana Nessel, Director Washington presented Corrections Officer Zoey Peterson with the Department's Valor Award in recognition of her actions on two separate occasions.

In April 2020, a level V prisoner intentionally plugged his toilet and asked to clean up the water with a mop and bucket. Staff secured his cell door in the open position and provided him with the mop and bucket. When Officer Peterson went to secure the prisoner back in his cell after he finished cleaning, he grabbed her and pulled her into the cell. She keyed her radio and continued to scream which alerted staff that quickly



responded to the scene. An investigation into the incident revealed that the prisoner's actions were part of a much larger plot to escape involving several additional prisoners. Her quick actions fighting her way out of the cell and alerting her partner prevented both a hostage situation and another serious situation from developing.

In April 2021, Officer Peterson and her partner were releasing level V general population prisoners from their cells to go to the yard and a prisoner began assaulting her partner. Officer Peterson radioed for assistance and administered her Personal Chemical Agent to the prisoner and stopped the assault.

During both incidents, Officer Peterson showed courage, dedication and determination. Her ability to perform at a high level under a stressful situation is an outstanding demonstration of her commitment to her job and helping others in need.

An Upper Peninsula animal shelter welcomed 100 newborn puppies in the two months following an alleged puppy mill bust. Pictured is mom Macy who was the first to deliver a litter shortly after the MSP were able to remove her from the property. The pictures shows the incredible six-week transformation of momma and babies once they were moved into a healthy environment.

Many of the dogs who were seized were taken into the Dawgz Adapt prison rehab program, as most of the dogs had never experienced any sort of love or affection. Dawgz Adapt is a program for rescue dogs that are trained by inmates housed at Alger Correctional Facility. These dogs are considered less adoptable and may have extra behavioral challenges, or have a high risk of being returned to the shelter. The graduates leave house-trained and understand basic commands. They are also spayed or neutered, up-to-date on vaccinations and micro-chipped.
