FY 2021 Community Corrections Comprehensive Plan Applications and Proposals

For FY 21 the Office of Community Corrections received 33 grant applications to review covering the 43 counties from the previous fiscal year. In addition, Probation Residential Services received 20 bid responses for our request for proposals. Of the 20 received, two are from new contractors that will expand available options to impact our target population on the east side of the state.

FY 2021 Appropriations

Comprehensive Plans & Services (CPS) funds are utilized by local jurisdictions to support a wide range of programming (e.g., community service, pre-trial services, day reporting, cognitive programs, etc.) and local community corrections administrative costs. Drunk Driver Jail Reduction and Community Treatment Program (DDJR & CPT) funds are used to increase the availability of treatment options with the goal to drive down our drunk driving metrics. Probation Residential Services (PRS) are provided primarily by residential centers and providers of residential substance abuse treatment services.

The Community Corrections appropriation for FY 2021 has not been passed by the Legislature. Once a budget passes, the Office of Community Corrections will submit our proposals with recommendations to the State Board.

Statewide OMNI Disposition Data- FY 2019

The following analysis provides a summary of OMNI statewide disposition data for FY 2019 in comparison to FY 2018. In addition to the below comparison, the FY 2019 prison commitment rate (PCR) for counties with approved comprehensive plans and services is 18.9%. Counties without a plan have a PCR of 25%.

- There were 44,626 total dispositions statewide in FY 2019 compared to 45,733 in FY

2018.

- The overall PCR for the State is 19.6% (8,774 prison dispositions) compared to 19.8% in FY 2018.
- In FY 2019, there were 1,107 fewer felony dispositions than in FY 2018.
- In FY 2019, there were 285 fewer prison dispositions than in FY 2018.
- FY 2019 data reflects the following regarding prison dispositions in specific sentencing guideline categories:
 - Intermediate cell: 1.8%, this is a 1.5% overall decrease
 - Straddle cell: 24%, this is a 3.3% overall decrease
 - Group 2 Straddle Cell PCR is 23% with 1,491 prison dispositions. This is a decrease even with considering fewer felony dispositions (9% decrease) when compared to FY 18's PCR of 26.4%
 - Presumptive Cell: PCR is 80.7%

OUIL 3rd Felony Disposition Data- FY 2019

The following analysis provides data on felony dispositions for OUIL 3rd offenders.

- The total number of OUIL 3rd dispositions were 2,925 in FY 2019 compared to 2,824 in FY 2018. OUIL 3rd dispositions continue to consistently increase.
- During this period the number of prison commitments for OUIL 3rd offenders increased to 493 in FY 2019 from 485 in FY 2018.

Jail Utilization

For FY 2019 unsentenced felons had an average daily population of 3,877 and make up the highest percentage (34.6%) of the reporting jail population housed. The average length of stay for this population at presentence is 264 days.

It should be noted that this information is obtained through the Jail Population Information System (JPIS). The data provided above covers 60 reporting counties including Kent and Wayne.

Progress Toward Addressing Objectives and Priorities

The overall FY 19 PCR for probation violators is 23.5% compared to 25% in FY 18. Several

county partners have prison commitment rates well below the State average. Many have consistently sought and received local stakeholder support while promoting offender success. Year-round strategic planning continues to be conducted to establish structured sentencing practices and alternatives to incarceration.

Initiatives to further impact public safety and reduction of prison growth are as follows:

- Probation Sentencing Specialist that review Straddle Cell Pre-Sentence Reports and Probation Violation reports.
- Providing criminogenic risk/need data for all sentenced felons that assist with estimating programming projections
- The implementation of evidenced based trauma programming for men and women.
- Federal grant funding pilot in Muskegon to expand upon existing programming to make an impact on violent crime and recidivism.
- Expanding Probation Residential Services to be used as a community resources for homelessness and COMPAS assessment risk/needs program matching.

Community Corrections September Training

Out of concern for the health and safety of all attendees, the Office of Community Corrections cancelled our training scheduled to take place in September. Our team will reconvene and work closely with our Michigan Association of Community Corrections Advisory Board members to develop a plan to host this event in the future.
