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New Beginning. Enduring Commitment.

One year ago, the Board of Directors revealed our rebranded organization, Children Trust Michigan! In one way, this small change to Children Trust Michigan (from Children's Trust Fund) represented our enduring commitment to being Michigan's only agency solely focused on the prevention of child abuse and neglect. In another way, this new beginning will enable us to increase support for our prevention partners through the strengthening of our network by providing additional funding, education, training, products, etc. With the expansion of the Children Trust Michigan team and the support of the Board of Directors, we are building capacity to prepare for the years ahead.

With our prevention partners identifying and sharing their community's needs and a newly created beginning with a fresh rebrand, the board set the strategic vision for 2023-2025. The plan is quite extensive, and we are confident there will be an increased impact on children and families across Michigan. Our priorities are to increase resources so that we can fund:

- 1. Capability Strengthen capability of prevention partners.
- 2. Capacity Build capacity within prevention partners to have the staffing, curriculum, training, and resources necessary to be centers of excellence.
- **3.** Equity Provide training and support so that prevention partners improve their diversity, equity, inclusion, and accessibility throughout their programming, staffing, board recruitment, etc.
- 4. Quality Provide training and support for quality prevention programs and education.

Finally, we look forward to sharing all the impact that the new Family Resource Centers will have in their communities as they are created and/or expanded over the next two years. They were started through an important partnership between Children Trust Michigan and the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services. We'll share more as updates are available.

Introduction

Formerly known as Michigan Children's Trust Fund, Children Trust Michigan was established by the Michigan Legislature in 1982 through Public Acts 249/250 as a nonprofit organization to provide permanent funding for the prevention of child abuse and neglect. While independent and autonomous per statute, Children Trust Michigan is deeply appreciative of the many partnerships with other organizations committed to the welfare of children in Michigan, including the Department of Health and Human Services, Department of Education, Michigan State Police, and local child abuse and neglect prevention councils.

Funding from the Children Trust Michigan comes from a checkoff donation from Michigan taxpayers on the state income tax form, specialty license plates, heirloom birth certificates, direct tax-deductible donations, fundraising, major gifts, state and federal grants, and interest from the trust account.

MISSION: Children Trust Michigan provides financial support, education and resources to our network of partners throughout Michigan that work to prevent child abuse and neglect by strengthening families. **VISION:** We believe in a Michigan where children are happy, supported, and have access to a bright, safe future. **OUR BELIEF:** We believe every child in Michigan deserves a safe, healthy and happy childhood. We have the privilege of working with our partners to enrich the futures of children and families for generations to come. We won't give up on the safety of our children. Together, we can end a cycle of abuse and neglect. It matters to us, and we believe it matters to all. **OUR APPROACH:** Children Trust Michigan is the only statewide organization solely focused on child abuse and neglect prevention. We provide education, guidance, and resources, as well as raise critical funds for our network of partners in all 83 counties. Our network of prevention partners offers a continuum of family-centered and community-based programs that are evidence-based, evidence-informed, and include innovative strategies. Children Trust Michigan's network of prevention partners is represented by public

agencies and private nonprofit organizations, including intermediate school districts and faith-based agencies that provide a continuum of prevention services for children and families.



Strategic Priorities

Children Trust Michigan is accountable for a sustainable system of primary and secondary child abuse and neglect prevention centers across Michigan. This is achieved by funding community-based child abuse prevention services in 83 counties through contracted local prevention partners that deliver child abuse prevention.

This work is done through the lens of the following FOUR Strategic Priorities:

CAPABILITIES:	Strengthen the knowledge and expertise of our statewide prevention partner network.
QUALITY:	Expand and strengthen our statewide prevention priorities through training and education; evidence-based, evidence-informed and/or innovative programming; and data and evaluation to increase program fidelity and impact.
CAPACITIES:	Expand the reach and impact of our child abuse and neglect prevention programming.
ACCESS:	Remove barriers to assure access for families through new programs, expanding outreach to underserved populations and providing concrete support.



Strategic Initiatives

The Children Trust Michigan team has identified FIVE Strategic Initiatives that will be elevated and built upon over the next three to five years. They include:

PREVENTION MINDSET INSTITUTE

A collaboration led by Children Trust Michigan and Children's Services Administration of MDHHS to create a continuum of child abuse and neglect prevention programming and services in the state of Michigan. This continuum would be inclusive beginning with the need to create awareness of the issue, parent education and support to in-home services and supervised visitation. This effort is ongoing as we shift from a child welfare to a child well-being system.

FAMILY RESOURCE CENTERS

Children Trust Michigan has established a statewide network of Family Resource Centers (FRC). There are currently 11 FRCs within the Michigan FRC Network. The Michigan FRC Network meets monthly to connect, collaborate and coordinate services. In 2023, the Michigan FRC Network will work on designing metrics that explain client experience, develop new and creative approaches to learning about community needs, and troubleshoot challenges surrounding classism and accessibility. This includes hiring staff and volunteers that reflect the communities they serve. The goal is to share data that illustrates the positive impact the Family Resource Centers have on mitigating child abuse and neglect.

The network developed a definition for what an FRC looks like in Michigan: Michigan's Family Resource Centers are community-led, family-centered resource



hubs that partner with caregivers to deliver support and services that respond to each family's individual needs and values. FRCs are places where families can connect with one another and with resources they value — including culturally responsive supports offered within and outside each center. FRCs are committed to creating safe, nonjudgmental, welcoming environments where all families feel that they belong, feel a sense of ownership and can see themselves reflected.



PARENT LEADERSHIP

The parent leadership needs of the communities across Michigan, as well as the needs at the state level, will continue to be assessed over the next five years. Children Trust Michigan is at the beginning stages of strategic planning with the aid of Family Resource, Information, Education and Network Development Service (FRIENDS) to increase the capabilities, quality, capacity and access of parent leadership in all communities along with the state level. Child Welfare Information Gateway published an Issue Brief in 2019, highlighting the supporting research, which identifies parental education, involvement and leadership as having a large impact on the reduction of child abuse and neglect.

With an increase in funding, training of our prevention network in the Strengthening Families Framework ™ and the addition of a parent partner coordinator on staff, we are now able to offer additional technical assistance, training and resource support to our prevention partners that will allow them to build their capabilities, quality, capacity and access of their organization. We will be investigating how to support our prevention network so that they can elevate their programs to offer evidencesupported and evidence-based programming. We are part of a pilot study with FRIENDS and the University of Kansas to devise a toolkit that would allow us to

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help our network address and reduce barriers for parents, ultimately increasing access to the network at large. This increase in access allows parents to receive concrete support in times of need, gain social connections, and increase their knowledge of parenting, child development, as well as the social and emotional growth of their children all leading to an increase in parental resilience. As parental resilience increases in our prevention network, more parents will then have the support to be able to become more involved in their community organizations. Once parental involvement becomes the norm and expectation in our prevention network, this will ultimately lead to an increased capacity of parent leadership within our network. As this capacity develops and remains stable, we can then begin leveraging these parent leaders at the state level more consistently.

We meet all our programs where they are and then work with them individually with support and technical assistance to elevate them to where they want to be and to help them achieve their level of standards. Within



five years all prevention programs in the prevention network will have an authentic parent voice in their organization ranging from board members to a parent advisory council. We will help facilitate training in parent leadership for all the prevention partners so that the parent leaders will be supported and have the skills to effectively communicate at the local and state level. All prevention partners will have the parent voice elevated in programming, community outreach, evaluation of the prevention partner, as well as grant writing and review. Here at the state level, we will have authentic parent leadership on our committees, in our program development, in our outreach activities, as well as in grant reviews. It is our goal that by the end of the fifth year, Children Trust Michigan will be in the works to construct its own parent advisory council.



DIVERSITY, EQUITY AND INCLUSION

In alignment with the MDHHS, Children Trust Michigan has created a working group to establish a diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI) plan. The working group's strategy is directed to include consideration for inequities that permeate all aspects of child abuse and neglect prevention at a structural level and throughout service delivery. The DEI plan will address multiple facets of inequity, including but not limited to race and ethnicity, gender, sexuality, income inequality and disability, both at the state level and throughout Children Trust Michigan's network of prevention partners. Children Trust Michigan strives to hold intentional activities as a funder of child abuse and neglect prevention programs through its choices in funding requirements, prevention partners, statewide events, delivery of technical assistance, training and educational offerings, and in the data that it collects and reports.

TRAINING AND EDUCATION

Under the direction of the Training and Education Manager, Children Trust Michigan is excited to bring training and support for both the network of prevention partners and the Children Trust Michigan state team in the following three areas:

Bringing the Protective Factors to Life In Your Work

Bringing the Protective Factors to Life in Your Work Training is grounded in the Strengthening Families[™] Protective Factors approach. Upon completion of the training, Prevention Partners will be CTF Alliance Certified Trainers, providing them with the expertise to train, present and facilitate gatherings that build protective factors to strengthen families, promote optimal development and reduce the likelihood of child abuse and neglect.

- Training of Trainers: Up to 20 prevention partners will be given the opportunity to become a certified strengthening families trainer.
- Strengthening Families Community Cafes: Prevention partners will learn how to facilitate community cafes.
- Strengthening Families Community of Practice

Healthy Outcomes from Positive Experiences (HOPE)

Positive experiences can ease toxic stress and help children and youth grow into more resilient, healthier adults. HOPE identifies ways that communities and systems of care can better ensure that all children have more positive experiences and that all families have support to nurture and celebrate their strengths.

Offered by the HOPE National Research Center (led by Dr. Robert Sege based out of Tufts Medical Center), this series of trainings will provide our network of prevention partners the opportunity to develop HOPE-informed approaches to supporting children and families.

- Introduction to HOPE Workshop
- HOPE Facilitation Training: Up to 25 prevention partners will be given the opportunity to become HOPE facilitators (trained to deliver an Introduction to HOPE workshop).


- HOPE Champion Training: Up to 10 prevention partners will be given the opportunity to become HOPE champions (on-the-ground HOPE experts leading implementation projects and ensuring the HOPE framework results in actionable change in an organization).
- HOPE Community of Practice

Preventing Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACE)

In partnership with the Michigan ACE Initiative and ACE Interface, this series of trainings will provide our prevention partners with the expertise to expand awareness of Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) and support the implementation of evidence-based interventions and programs that address ACEs. Building awareness helps children build resilience to ACEs.

- MiACE Community Champion Training: Up to 25 prevention partners will be trained to become MiACE community champions (prepared to give presentations in their community).
- MiACE Initiative Master Trainer Cohort: Up to 25 prevention partners will be given the opportunity to receive training from Dr. Rob Anda and Laura Porter (and be certified to train others throughout our network).

Child Abuse Prevention Awareness Month

April is nationally recognized as Child Abuse Prevention (CAP) Month with Prevent Child Abuse America (PCAA). Here at Children Trust Michigan, we are always planning for this month. We have formed a committee to devise and refine a Michigan-specific toolkit for our prevention partners to utilize that focuses heavily on parentcentered language around the Strengthening Families Protective Factors®. Children Trust Michigan also cofacilitates training with Michigan's Children on Effective Parent Storytelling in a meet your legislator event. Along with our prevention partners, we host events such as Wear Blue Day and in the past the annual Child Abuse Prevention Awareness Day (CAPAD) Rally that takes place at the state Capitol. In an effort to elevate a strength-based approach and a united Michigan, we will be moving to Family Strengthening Event starting in April 2024.

Each year we are creating more shareable content to spread the word and educate the community of Michigan as a whole, all while looking for ways to co-brand with others who have published evidencebased materials.

We are continually assessing the needs of the community at large and the prevention network so that we can investigate ways to fill those needs or reduce barriers. By offering yearly training to meet your legislator, our goal is to increase the number of parents who are comfortable and willing to meet their legislators to express their needs, whether it be on the day of the rally or at a different time convenient for them. By offering effective storytelling training and workshops, we help parents hone their stories to be able to deliver them to a wide variety of audiences with the greatest effectiveness. Moving forward, the CAPAD Rally will now include parent speakers so that their stories are heard. The best way to gain support is to have parental-lived experiences shared to highlight the importance of the programs that we fund.

The pinwheel is a national symbol of child abuse and neglect prevention used by Prevent Child Abuse America (PCAA), their state chapters (Children Trust Michigan is the Michigan chapter of PCAA), as well as community and government supporters. Pinwheels are planted at the kickoff event during Wear Blue Day and are highlighted throughout the month. Our prevention partners plant pinwheel gardens, alongside many schools, government agencies, community organizations and individuals, as a sign for support in the reduction of child maltreatment. We will continue this tradition as well as investigate other more environmentally friendly ways to show support such as window clings, car magnets, vinyl decals, stickers and digital pinwheel gardens.

2022 Mission Moment






Infant Safe Sleep Awareness and education plays an important role in preventing sleep-related infant deaths. Most people think this would never happen to them, but the sad reality is that a baby dies nearly every other day in Michigan, and these deaths are overwhelmingly preventable.

Thanks to 2022 Mission Moment donors, Children Trust Michigan's prevention partners distributed more than 7,000 safe sleep sacks to parents and families across the state. Many programs work closely with local hospitals to assist parents and families when their babies are born.




