# Wayne State University's Kappa Delta Sorority Has Successful Shamrock Pancake Breakfast for CTF

Gamma Omicron Chapter of Kappa Delta hosted their second annual Shamrock Pancake Breakfast on Saturday, March 5th, 2016 to support Prevent Child Abuse America and the Children's Trust Fund, which serves as Michigan's chapter. Over \$5,500 was raised at the event. "This was our biggest event to date with over 300 people in attendance," said Miranda Bottesi of the Kappa Delta Sorority. "We also almost tripled the amount we raised last year for the prevention of child abuse!!" The Children's Trust Fund is grateful for the partnership of Kappa Delta at Wayne State University. Since 2005, the Sorority has held dozens of different fundraisers and raised approximately \$25,000 to help the Children's Trust Fund protect children in Michigan. That is the equivalent of entirely funding one of our important Direct Service grants for six months.

## Oakland Family Services Parents as Teachers

Each month we feature the amazing work of a Direct Services Grantee or a Local Council. Our Direct Services Grant in Oakland County uses the evidenced based Parents As Teachers model.





Oakland Family Services offers the free, in-home program to children who are at risk for abuse and neglect. In Oakland County, the number of children in investigated families for child abuse/neglect increased from 11,833 to 13,640 between 2006 and 2014, according to the Kids Count in Michigan Data Book 2016.

Parents as Teachers is designed to help reduce the risk of abuse and neglect by involving families with infants, toddlers and young children in activities that encourage growth in language, social and emotional development. Parent educators, who make weekly or bi-weekly visits, also may link families with other agencies that provide basic necessities, such as food and housing.

Parent Rachel Koller is thankful for the program, which has helped her 2-year-old daughter, Amelia.

"I do have some relief now," she said. "Before I felt like I didn't know what to do. The pediatrician tells you she is missing her milestones but doesn't tell you what to do. I feel now I have someone to guide me through. It is good for me. It was my first time as a mom, and I didn't know what things to try. It was nice for (our parent educator) to tell me things to work on and that Amelia will be fine."

Parents as Teachers also offers monthly playgroups to encourage families to work and play together. Activities include different areas of development – gross motor (large muscles), fine motor (small muscles) and story time (literacy).



"It teaches me a lot," said Jenny Hansen, who brings her 1-year-old son, Brian, and 5-year-old son, Matthew, to the playgroups regularly. "I watch how other parents do things with their kids."

To qualify, at least three of 15 different risk factors must be met. The risk factors are conditions that cause enough stress on a household and a parent-child relationship that abuse and neglect could result.

"All of those stresses can lead to abuse and neglect and having someone support you at your home during those difficult times lessens the likelihood they will engage in abuse and neglect," said Kris Kasperski, Director of Early Childhood Services at Oakland Family Services.

Oakland Family Services is thankful the Children's Trust Fund has provided a three-year grant, which has allowed the agency to expand its services by hiring an additional parent educator.
