Chair Hodges opened the meeting by saying she looks forward to getting these meetings back to in person as it is much more prolific in terms of what can be accomplished. She asked other members to introduce themselves.

Chair Hodges stated that the Conservancy just completed Kulture City training, which means the aquarium is now ready to provide all levels for sensory needs and to provide an all-inclusive experience, from having bags of equipment to help ease someone's experience to having quiet exhibits within the aquarium. They are proud of this as it is important to their mission.

Chair Hodges mentioned the fun fact that the Statue of Liberty gets on average 3.1 million visitors a year, while Belle Isle gets 5 million visitors. Also, the fallow deer that once roamed the island were a gift from the King of France, much like the Statue of Liberty to our country.

General Updates

Park Update

Tom Bissett, Urban District Supervisor, said they are happy to announce that the long vacant park supervisor position has been filled and the new person will start October 1. The Scott Fountain has been partially running since yesterday, with more repairs to be done on pump two. If everything goes well, it will run through October. They are working on the allocation of ARPA funding and will present details at the next meeting.

Karis Floyd, Park Manager, said they will start bathroom winterization the first week of November and will give prior notice to the public. Bus stop 7 restroom will be open all year. They have hired a full-time janitor and a new ranger at Milliken. Also hired was another general office assistant, Dashika Hill, who was on the call today. The Fountain will be run as long as possible, once repairs are complete. All summer help has returned to college, and they look forward to having them back next season. They are proud of their booth workers and events team who were able to hit \$1M in revenue. The events team booked a lot of events that got them over the hump to this amount, an amount not seen since before the pandemic.

Chair Hodges called the meeting to order at 9:14 a.m. with the addition of Rev. Lonnie Peek.

Member Curis asked if there will be port-a-johns around the island and asked if the \$1M in revenue stays on the island. He also asked that Rev. Peek give a

closure of prayer. Karis Floyd stated that there will be port-a-johns, and the money does stay on the island.

Infrastructure Update – Amanda Treadwell, Urban Area Field Planner

Amanda Treadwell provided project updates on the Athletic Complex handball courts, Sawmill, casino, flatwoods, and an update on the Mobility Study. (Report attached).

Member Denker asked what the sawmill structure will be used for once complete. Amanda Treadwell said the goal for the structure is to use the structure for educational purposes. Member Denker gave praise to Amanda for getting the funds to repair the casino, and that it should be a beautiful and cherished place to use for many years to come.

Law Update – Lt. Todd Szyska, DNR Law Enforcement

Lt. Szyska said they are at their winter staffing levels, working along with MSP. They are looking forward to MDOT's completion of the roadwork and parking situation. Bollards should be going up soon on Sunset to help with where traffic should be parking versus pedestrian walking. Speed is still an issue; they have certified more of their conservation officers for radar speed enforcement. Speeders have been going double to triple over the speed limit. They are asking people to stay at the 25-mph speed limit.

Belle Isle Conservancy Updates - Ayo Thomas, Belle Isle Conservancy

Ayo presented updates including the Belle Isle fall/winter facility hours, Island Stakeholder Updates, the aquarium Kulture City certification, and collaborative Rebel Nell collection. (Update attached)

Friends of Detroit Rowing Facility Updates and Plans – Todd Platt and Henry Goitz, Friends of Detroit Rowing

Todd Platt gave a presentation update that covered the club's goals, programs, accomplishments, partnerships, patterns of activities, site overview, operational challenges, and their future vision of the leased site.

Mr. Platt displayed a presentation to the group with graphics of what has been done on the site since they last came before the committee. The presentation included graphics of the structures that have been erected to house equipment and operate from after they were evacuated from the boathouse building due to unsafe conditions, and graphics of the safety zones they are currently operating from. Also included were graphics of their

near-term proposal to erect a structure in the parking lot for housing equipment and ultimately operate programming from. The proposal has gone through preliminary engineering work and is with the DNR now for comment and approval. Fundraising efforts by the group are geared up and ready.

Mr. Platt also discussed the assessment that was done by the Smith Group, which pointed out a number of issues and a high price tag. Thus, a site planning exercise was performed to look at other options: A) building on top of a barge in the harbor, B) a permanent boathouse in the parking lot, and C) a potential location for a new boathouse. He presented a graphic of what they think would be a future vision, Option C, as part of a concept that would create a watersports park stretching from the Bridge to the Beach. (Presentation attached.)

Rev. Peek asked how they recruited students for the program and if they have approached Detroit Public Schools, to which Todd Platt replied that they are constantly going to various organizations and schools, meeting with administration and students to encourage participation. Their head coach has had contact with Detroit Public Schools.

Chair Hodges said that given the DNR's responsibility for management of the facility, she asked if the DNR had any input. Tom Bissett said that it is important to understand what program is taking place despite the challenges. There is a significant cost to rehab the boathouse to make it habitable again. This is meant to be a presentation of what the club envisions, but right now the DNR is at the information and public comment stage, thus why it was brought forth to this committee for comment.

Rev. Peek said he understands the gravity of the situation, and they have a jewel that needs to be rehabilitated, and it is a struggle to do so. He asked them to keep the vision and that they will eventually get there.

Member Curis thanked him for the presentation and for reaching out to be a more diverse organization. He asked who pays for the building, how big it is and who owns it. Todd Platt said the Detroit Boatclub Social Club built the building and then leased it back. As for a model for the future, he thinks they will have to bring back a coalition of funders to fund the building and that it would probably have to be owned by the City of Detroit and then leased back. Member Curis said it would be to their advantage to identify those groups and what portions of the building they would occupy, then to put forth a plan.

Chair Hodges said it is important to have access to our waterways and Belle Isle is a unique location. It would be great to see their efforts continue. She said the Conservancy could be helpful with input from the community and it would be helpful to have priorities and next steps from the DNR.

Member Curis asked if their membership is a paid membership. Todd said it depends on what level of participation members have, there may be fees, but they consider them program participants; about 250 competitive rowers and outreach programs can reach 500 in addition to activities that are off-site.

Public Comment


Rich Rybicki – Asked about the traffic survey public input and the status of the one-way option. Amanda Treadwell said the option presented seemed to address concerns by the stakeholders and public, but the results were across the board. There are other tools to utilize and they are reviewing them with MDOT and DNR leadership. Mr. Rybicki is also hoping for the rehabilitation of the police station.

Debbie – Asked if there are any thoughts of returning the sawmill to milling trees that are brought down by the city. Amanda said at this time, she does not anticipate this and there is a portable sawmill brough to the site that has modern safety features. She asked if there were thoughts on building a pole barn or putting a new boathouse next to the existing one. Chair Hodges left her contact information to get answers to her questions.

Rev. Peek closed the meeting with prayer.

With no further business the meeting adjourned at 10:31 a.m.
