


Public Act 288


- Signed by Gov. Snyder in 2016
- Requires determination of motorized and non-motorized use restrictions
- Requires DNR to post maps and mileage open to motorized use each year
- Requires an inventory of forest roads by region, including:
 - Location
 - Condition
 - Development Level





Inventories Completed


- Dec. 14, 2017: LUOD designated roads open to ORVs in the NLP
- Dec. 13, 2018: LUOD identified UP and SLP roads open to ORVs
- Maps are fine-tuned each year
- Roads may be opened or closed to ORVs or other vehicles





Process for Change

- Status changes can be initiated by public comment,
 Department staff, stakeholders, tribal governments or local units of government
- Multi-disciplinary DNR team reviews and recommends changes
- 30-day public review each year before proposed changes are made
- DNR received 95 comments from Sept. 1, 2022-Aug. 31, 2023; 11 comments were received during the Nov. 1-Dec. 1, 2023, public review phase



2023 Proposals

- Remove 38.7 miles of road segments from state forest maps for conventional & ORV use
- Delete 36.0 miles of roads due to data cleanup of non-existing or duplicate roads
- Add 254.9 miles of roads to maps that were not previously included in the inventory; 252.0 miles will be open to ORV use, 2.9 miles closed to ORV use, and 3.6 miles open to seasonal ORV.
- Updated the language of the LUOD, so that Boating Access Sites open/closed to ORV use is regulated by what is identified on the map.




Miles of Road by Region

- Upper Peninsula: 5,686.6 miles open to ORV use out of 5,767.4 total miles
- Northern Lower Peninsula: 6,068.6 miles open to ORV use out of 7,251.2 total miles
- Southern Lower Peninsula: 10.1 miles open to ORV use out of 358.0 total miles

What's Next?

- Director's action in February
- Maps reflecting approved changes will be published online by April 1, 2024
- Signs will be posted on statemanaged forest roads closed to ORV use, including seasonal closures

- Implement recently passed legislation related to fishery specific reporting
 - Public Act 239 of 2023 Senate Bill 441
 - Commercial fishing, wholesale, and Charter Boat reporting requirements
 - Also complies with 2023 Great Lakes
 Fishing Decree
 - Public Act 220 of 2023 Senate Bill 103
 - Inland Sport Fishing Guide reporting requirements





Fisheries Orders 255.24

for information

- Commercial fishing, wholesale, and Charter Boat reporting requirements
 - Reports must be submitted via Fishery Activity & Catch Tracking System (FACTS).
 - Must file an electronic report of their catch activity by 11:00 pm Eastern Time on the second (2nd) and fourth (4th) Wednesday of each month.
 - Report must include all trips that occurred on Great Lakes and Great Lakes connecting waters.
 - Lists specific data that must be included in each report.





Fisheries Orders 255.24

for information

- Inland Sport Fishing Guides
 - Beginning April 1, 2024, catch activity reports must be submitted monthly via FACTS.
 - Must file an electronic report of their catch activity by 11:00 pm Eastern
 Time of the first day after the end of the reporting month.
 - Report must include all trips that occurred on all waters except the Great Lakes, Great Lakes connecting waters, and lakes or ponds that have a surface area of less than 5 acres.
 - Lists specific data that must be included in each report.



Current Elk Management Plan

- Finalized in 2023
- Three main Goals
 - Manage for a sustainable elk population in balance with habitat
 - Use hunting as the primary method to control elk
 - Enhance public understanding of elk management





Population Goal and Current Estimate

- Goal of 500-900 animals in current range
- 2022 Elk survey estimates:
 - 1,277 estimated animals (95% CI: 870-1,684)







Evaluating the Past 10 years

• 1,761 elk taken (2013-2022)









2023 Preliminary Elk Season Summary

Hunt Period 1:

Aug. 29-Sep. 1, Sep. 15-18, Sep. 29-Oct. 2

- Consistently warm weather
- License Quota: 100
 - 30 any elk
 - 70 antlerless only elk






Elk Harvest – Early Season



- Hunt Period 1 Harvest
- State hunter harvest: 71 legally harvested elk
 - 30 antlered elk (bulls)
 - 41 antlerless elk (4 calves)
 - 73% success (97 hunters)
 - 1 bull by Pure Michigan Hunters
 - Tribal harvest: 3 elk reported
 - 1 double kill on a cow tag



Hunt Period 1





2023 Late Elk Season Summary

- Hunt Period 2:
 - December 9-17
 - Hunt Areas H, I, and X
- License Quota: 160
 - 50 any elk
 - 110 antlerless only elk



- Weather conditions were difficult
 - Very windy and rainy
 - Consistently warmer than average
 - Snow largely absent throughout the hunt



Elk Harvest – Late Season






- State hunter harvest: 97 legally harvested elk
 - 41 antlered bulls
 - 51 cows
 - 5 calves
 - 63% success (154 hunters)
- 4 hunters took bulls on antlerless only tags
- Tribal harvest: 1 elk (bull)



Hunt Period 2





Historical Success Rates-Statewide Drawn Hunters

	2019	2020	2021	2022	2023	5 Year Avg.
Early Season	74%	83%	75%	80%	73%	77%
Late Season	92%	86%	89%	72%	63%	79%





2023 Total Elk Season Summary

- Hunt Period 1 Harvest:
 - State hunter harvest: 71 legally harvested elk
 - 30 bulls, 41 cows/calves; 73% success
- Hunt Period 2 Harvest:
 - State hunter harvest: 97 legally harvested elk
 - 41 bulls, 56 cows/calves; 63% success
- Tribal Harvest: 4 elk (still being tabulated)
- All 3 Pure Michigan hunters successful



2024 Elk Schedule

- Elk Survey
 - Conducted every two years in January
 - Scheduled for January 2024
 - Currently postponed due to lack of snow
- Elk Regulations
 - Presented in March
