Location & Community

Tahquamenon Falls State Park is located in Whitefish Township, Chippewa County and McMillan Township, Luce County, in the eastern Upper Peninsula of Michigan, approximately one and one-half hours north of the Mackinac Bridge. M-123 is a federally designated scenic byway, which provides access to the three main areas of the park: Rivermouth Campground and day use area 5 miles south of Paradise, the Lower Falls 10 miles west of Paradise and the Upper Falls 14 miles west of Paradise. The Village of Newberry is located approximately 30 miles southwest of the park.

Tahquamenon Falls State Park 48,000 encompasses over acres stretching over 13 miles and is the second largest state park in the system. Most of the park is undeveloped woodland without roads, buildings or power lines. The centerpiece of the park is the Tahquamenon River with its waterfalls. The Upper Falls is one the largest waterfalls east of the Mississippi River. It has a drop of nearly 50 feet and is more than 200 feet across. A maximum flow of more than 50,000 gallons of water per second has been recorded flowing over these falls. Four miles downstream is the

Lower Falls, a series of five smaller falls cascading around an island. The falls can be viewed from the

river bank or from the island, which can be reached by rowboat rented from a park concession. The island walk affords a view of the falls in the south channel. There are plans under consideration to enhance the access to the island, see Section A.12. The park also includes approximately four miles of Lake Superior shoreline at the mouth of the Tahquamenon River.

The Newberry Unit of the Lake Superior State Forest is located north and west of the park and shares a common boundary in the northeast of the park. The Hiawatha National Forest is located southeast of the park.

Park Features

Tahquamenon Falls State Park is a popular year-round tourist destination, hosting over 500,000 visitors per year. Although most of the visitors come to see two of Michigan's most beautiful waterfalls, the park also offers more than 40 miles of hiking trails, 13 inland lakes, 24 miles of the Tahquamenon River and a proposed 20,000 acre Natural Area. Hiking trails within the park include 27 miles of the North Country National Scenic Trail (NCNST), a congressionally designated trail that stretches 4,600 miles from New York to North Dakota. The hiking route of Michigan's Iron Belle Trail from Belle Isle in Detroit to Ironwood on the Wisconsin border, shares the NCNST through the park. Camping, hiking, fishing, canoeing and photography are popular activities in the spring and summer. In fall, many people enjoy hunting and viewing the beautiful autumn colors. Winter provides opportunities for snowmobiling, cross-country skiing and snowshoeing on the miles of marked trails.

A.2 DEMOGRAPHICS

Population centers in and around the park are small. The small town of Paradise (Chippewa County) and the Village of Newberry (Luce County) are the only significant population centers.

In 2013, the estimated population of Chippewa County was 38,696. This is a decrease of 0.5% compared to the 2010 census estimate of 38,520. The population density from the 2010 census was just 24.7 people per square mile. In 2012, the per capita personal income in Chippewa County was \$20,410, significantly lower than the state of Michigan's per capita income of \$25,547. Chippewa County also has a prominent American Indian and Alaskan Native population of 15%. A reported 26% of the housing units in the county are for seasonal, recreational or occasional use.

Luce County is very sparsely populated, with a 2010 population of just 6,631. The 2013 estimate is for a reduction in population to 6,502. This results in a population density of 7.4 persons per square mile. Per capita income is also lower than that of Chippewa County, and significantly lower than the state of Michigan. The data also shows a larger than average percentage of persons over the age of 65 and a smaller number of residents under the age of 18 years. 36% of the 4,343 housing units in the county are reported to be for seasonal, occasional or recreational use.

A.3 HISTORY OF THE REGION

The region has a rich history, beginning with Native Americans who fished and trapped along the banks of the Tahquamenon River. When French explorers arrived, they met the Anishinabeg (Original People), who are also known as the Potawatomi, Chippewa, and Ottawa tribes. Fur traders and missionaries soon followed, arriving in the mid-17th century, and founded Sault Ste. Marie and St. Ignace, which are two of the earliest named European settlements in the New World.

The word Tahquamenon rings with the language of the Native American. The name, as it currently appears, seems to have gone through a series of transitions from its original Algonquin roots. On a Jesuit map of the Upper Great Lakes printed in 1672, the island off the mouth of the river seems to be labeled "Outa-koua-minan". It is generally accepted that this is the earliest form of the word we use today to label the Tahquamenon River. Since that time missionaries, treaty makers, and writers have all spelled the word phonetically, spelling the word Otahquamenaw, Otikwaminag, and Taquamenaw until it finally came to rest at Tahquamenon.

Located north of Paradise, the Whitefish Point Light Station was established in 1849 and is recognized as an early stopping point for Indians, Voyagers and missionaries. It became a bustling community with the lifesaving crews, fishermen, cranberry growers, trappers, and woodsmen. There were no roads at this time and residents depended upon the boat for getting all their supplies and for transportation.

Lumbermen settled in the Upper Peninsula in the 1880s. "River Rats", as the men were called, ran the logs downstream while the Iron Horse Railroad picked up the load and shipped them to ports. With

the first lock in place at Sault Ste. Marie in 1855, boats could transport the much-needed lumber to the lower lakes.

Alonzo Chesebrough, of the Chesebrough Lumber Co., erected a sawmill in 1884 and established the settlement of Emerson, just south of the Tahquamenon Rivermouth.

In 1895 the Chesebrough Bros. of Emerson were awarded a contract to construct a new county road from Emerson to Eckerman, an 18 mile stretch. The road was predicted to be a great factor in the development of the Western portion of Chippewa County and eventually became M-123. The mill and townsite were on what is now State park property. The townsite of Emerson is a State of Michigan Register Historical Place.

The Village of Newberry, the county seat of Luce County, had its origin in a construction camp established while the Duluth, South Shore & Atlantic Railroad was being built between St. Ignace and Marquette in 1884. Shortly after the railroad was built, the Vulcan Furnace Company, a manufacturer of charcoal pig iron was established.



The dense growth of hardwoods was used to manufacture the charcoal and limestone from nearby quarries was used as a flux. The pigged iron was shipped by rail and boat to the Pennsylvania steel furnaces.

Towards the 1900's, the end of the big timber had arrived for this area and the mills were gradually dismantled and rails torn up and shipped away. The lumbering operations were very wasteful and left tops of trees and stumps on the ground, making the area prone to wildfires. It was in 1922 that a big fire laid waste to the area.

The community of Paradise started after the lumber industry had dwindled and the lumber companies sold much of the land. By 1910, the former logging communities of Shelldrake and Emerson had become ghost towns. The name Paradise is said to have come about when a local landowner's land was surveyed and he remarked that the land was like a paradise for fishing and hunting. The land was surveyed and platted out with a post office established in 1947.

It wasn't until 1975 that Highway M-123 was paved from Paradise south to connect with Highway M-28. The following year, Highway M-123 was paved to the west. This is the only major road that services the area. The road traveling north to Whitefish Point was not paved until 1987.

A.4 HISTORY OF TAHQUAMENON FALLS STATE PARK

For many years, the beauty of Tahquamenon Falls region was recognized and there was a concerted effort to preserve it for the benefit of the people. Following a petition from interested citizens from the Upper Peninsula in support of purchasing land in the Tahquamenon Falls area, Department of

Conservation Commissioners visited the area in August of 1935. They stated that the area of Tahquamenon was "the most outstanding scenic and recreational area in Michigan today, serving as a lure that is drawing and will continue to draw an ever increasing number of tourist visitors to Northern Michigan." They recommended to the Director that immediate action be taken to establish the park.

water power, the price on the land was high. The U.S. Government entered into an agreement with the Michigan Department of Conservation to convey land along the river frontage in exchange for State lands located elsewhere. A 1938 report by the Department of Conservation stated that 2,640 acres of heavily timbered land in the Tahquamenon region had been purchased and was ready for exchange. Around this same time, 2,341 acres fronting White Fish Bay and containing approximately 6 miles of Tahquamenon River frontage, was gifted to the State for recreational purposes.

In May 1942, the Federal Government formally executed an exchange conveying approximately 2,280 to the state. The state acquired an additional 1,300 feet of river frontage around this time.

In 1947 Tahquamenon Falls State Park was officially established. In the following years initial improvements were made for better public access and use. Development of roads, parking and access to the falls began in 1947. Foot trails to the Upper Falls were built along with picnic facilities and pump wells.

Development of the Lower Falls campground began in 1949 including parking area, campground, and entrance road. In the 1950s the DNR worked with Luce and Chippewa Counties to develop the M-123 through the park.

In 1952, the DNR purchased 79 acres of land from John Barrett for \$2,000 including land surrounding the Upper Falls. A restriction in the deed directed that the road and parking lot would terminate $\frac{3}{4}$ mile from the falls and that visitors would travel on foot to preserve the natural beauty of the area. The Barrett family kept a 2-acre parcel of land for private use. In 1950, the family built a replica of a logging camp, Camp 33, which was to be used as a public eating and resting place. In 1990, the camp was

rebuilt and in 1996 the Tahquamenon Falls Brewery and Pub was established, keeping with the original vision.

The 1970s was a period of expansion and growth for Tahquamenon Falls State Park. By 1974, the park encompassed almost 20,000 acres. This decade saw the modernization of the park's campgrounds including electric service to the Lower Falls campground.

The 1979 Tahquamenon Falls State Park Master Plan recommended an expanded dedicated park boundary to 43,785 acres, including the Betsy Lake Natural Area, then under the administrative jurisdiction of the Forest Division. At that time 37,600 acres of the proposed boundary were in state ownership. Another key recommendation of the Master Plan was to upgrade visitor services in the park, including a major visitor center complex between the upper and lower falls. This recommendation was not implemented.

A.5 LAND OWNERSHIP

The lands that comprise Tahquamenon Falls State Park have been acquired by the state of Michigan through a variety of funding sources. Often, conditions attached to the original funding source or other details of the property transaction encumber the future use or disposition of the land.

Funding Sources

Funding sources are illustrated by the Funding Source Map at the end of this report. All acreages are approximate.

Exchange

The State acquired 2,280 acres from the United States Forest Service (USFS) in 1942 as part of an exchange for lands that would become part of the National Forest.

In 1916, over 20,000 acres in total were exchanged with Cleveland-Cliffs Iron Company, approximately 6,270 acres of which are now part of the state park (the remainder is state forest land). Private exchanges of approximately 1,000 acres occurred through the 1960s.

Federal Land and Water Conservation Fund – 1,590 acres

The Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) is a federal program administered in Michigan by the Department of Natural Resources on behalf of the National Park Service (NPS). Land purchased using LWCF funding must be used for public outdoor recreation purposes. The required 50% match was provided by Special Legislation. The majority of land purchased with this fund is along the Tahquamenon River corridor, downstream of the falls, and was purchased in the 1960s and 1970s.

Special Legislation - 1,855 acres

Acquisitions for park purposes through this source are tied to specific funding established by the legislature established under Act 27, P.A. 1944, and Act 50, P.A. 1944.

Gift - 4,268 acres

A significant amount of land has been gifted to the state over the years by companies and private individuals, including land on Whitefish Bay in 1937, 2,000 acres stretching south and west from the river mouth from the Escanaba Paper Co. in 1979, and a gift of 1,565 acres in 1980

Michigan Land Trust Fund - 3,042 acres

The "Kammer Recreational Land Trust Fund Act of 1976" (Public Act 204, 1976) created the Michigan Land Trust Fund (MLTF) program to provide a source of funding for the public acquisition of lands for resource protection and public outdoor recreation. Funding was derived from royalties on the sale and lease of State-owned mineral rights. This fund has now been replaced by the Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund. Land shown as being purchased with MLTF is located in Chippewa County, both south and north of the river.

Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund - 7,267 acres

The MNRTF was created by a state constitutional amendment in 1984, which required that oil, gas, and other mineral lease and royalty payments be placed into the Trust Fund, with proceeds used to both acquire and develop public recreation lands. To implement the constitutional amendment, the Legislature passed the Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund Act of 1985 (P.A. 101 of 1985, Act 101). A number of parcels have been acquired over the years, including parcels along the river corridor and a large tract in the north of the park purchased in 2008 and 2010.

Recreation Bond Fund – 410 acres

At Tahquamenon Fall State Park, this fund was used primarily to match Land and Water Conservation Fund acquisitions.

State Game Fund – 4,451 acres

Act 17, P.A. 1921 established a funding source for land purchased with revenue from a \$1.50 tax on hunting licenses. The primary purpose of this land is for hunting and fishing purposes and the development of other recreation facilities is restricted.

Tax Reversion

The state acquired the balance of the land through tax reversion due to non-payment of taxes (approximately 720 acres). These lands are identified as unshaded areas on the Funding Source map. Furthermore, the state acquired large area in the south of the park was acquired by the State through tax reversion in 1939.

Land Transfers

In 2005, just under 4,000 acres was transferred from the Newberry SF management unit to Tahquamenon Falls State Park. A map showing the land consolidation is included in the Appendices.

Granted Easements

- <u>US Coast Guard</u>: granted a 10-foot right-of-way (ROW) in 1944 for erection and maintenance of telephone line to Whitefish Point.
- <u>Cloverland Electric Cooperative</u>: multiple easements and ROWs, varying in width from 10 to 66 feet wide, granted to place, construct, operate, repair and maintain a underground electric lines and electric distribution lines in McMillan and Whitefish Townships, Luce and Chippewa counties.
- <u>Michigan Bell Telephone Company</u>: permit to construct and maintain telephone line paralleling the road along Whitefish Bay.
- <u>Chippewa County</u>: release of ROW for highway purposes for County Road

- <u>Chippewa County</u>: quit claim deed (relinquishes easement) for highway purposes granting 150 feet
- <u>Luce County Road Commission:</u> release of right of way for highway purposes 66-foot easement
- <u>Department of State Highways</u>: Highway Easement Release for the purposes of improvement of M-123 in Whitefish Township, Chippewa County
- <u>Kimberly Clark Corp.</u>: 10-foot right of way to install and maintain a telephone line.
- <u>Munising Telephone Company</u>: 12-foot wide easement to construct and maintain buried telephone serving the Upper and Lower Falls, Park Headquarters and Rivermouth Campsite.
- <u>Special Land Use Permit:</u> allows private occupation of parcel of land on north side of Tahquamenon River, granted to Hugh and Katherine Clarke in 1942 (Doc # 685).

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<u>Leases</u>

 <u>Toonerville Trolley</u>: the State of Michigan has entered into a lease with Tahquamenon Boat Service Inc., for dockage for the Toonerville Trolley boat excursion to the Upper Falls, an approach trail and observation area, and construction, maintenance and operation of facilities to accomplish these functions. The current lease, amended in 2013, expires in 2023. A copy of the lease, as amended, is included in the Appendices.

A.6 LEGAL MANDATES

For all park General Management Plans, all legal mandates are identified that serve to further guide the development of the General Management Plan and subsequent Action Plans. For our planning purposes, the term "Legal Mandates" refers to not only to federal and state law, but also the administrative tools of "Policy" and "Directive" of the Natural Resource Commission, the Department, and the Parks & Recreation Division. Examples include Orders of the Director, Park and Recreation Areas State Land Rules and all other laws, commission orders, and rules or directives that apply to the park.

Specific to Tahquamenon Falls State Park, the following legal mandates have been identified.

FEDERAL STATUTE

ENDANGERED SPECIES ACT, 1973

The purposes of this Act are to provide a means whereby the ecosystems upon which endangered species and threatened species depend may be conserved, to provide a program for the conservation of such endangered species and threatened species, and to take such steps as may be appropriate to achieve the purposes of the act.

BALD AND GOLDEN EAGLE PROTECTION ACT, 1940 AND AMENDMENTS

This Act prohibits anyone, without a permit issued by the Secretary of the Interior, from "taking" bald eagles, including their parts, nests, or eggs. The Act defines "take" as "pursue, shoot, shoot at, poison, wound, kill, capture, trap, collect, molest or disturb." "Disturb" includes actions that may result in injury to the eagle, a decrease in its productivity or nest abandonment.

NATIONAL WILD AND SCENIC RIVERS SYSTEM, 1968

The purpose of the Act is to preserve certain rivers with outstanding cultural, and recreational values in a free-flowing condition for the enjoyment of future generations. The Act safeguards the special character of rivers, while also recognizing the potential for their appropriate use and development. It encourages river management that crosses political boundaries and promotes public participation in developing goals for river protection.

NATIONAL TRAILS SYSTEM ACT, 1968 (P.L. 90-543, as amended through P.L. 111-11, March 30, 2009)

This Act established the Appalachian and Pacific Crest National Scenic Trails and authorized a national system of trails to provide additional outdoor recreation opportunities and to promote the preservation of access to the outdoor areas and historic resources of the nation. The National Trails System includes four classes of trails: National Scenic Trails (NST), National Historic Trails (NHT), National Recreation Trails (NRT) and Connecting or Side Trails. The North Country National Scenic Trail (NCNST) was designated by P.L. 96-199 in 1980.

STATE STATUTE

NATURAL RESOURCES AND ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION ACT (NREPA) AND AMENDMENTS		
PA 451 of 1994, Part 5	Gives the DNR authority to make rules to support its mission. This includes State Land Rules, Land Use Orders, Wildlife Conservation Orders, Fisheries Orders and Watercraft Control.

ORDERS

The following Orders apply to Tahquamenon Falls State Park.

Land Use Orders of the Director

Other than the required motor vehicle permit or recreation passport to enter, there are no land use orders specific to Tahquamenon Falls State Park.

Wildlife Conservation Orders

Wildlife is owned by all the people of the State of Michigan, and protection is administered and managed by the Michigan DNR. The Natural Resources Commission (NRC) establishes hunting and trapping regulations including methods of take, bag limits, license quotas, and season dates as described in the Wildlife Conservation Orders.

3.412 Early September Canada goose season; dates and closures, exceptions.

Sec. 3.412 The early September Canada goose season shall be September 1 to September 15 in the Lower Peninsula and September 1 to September 10 in the Upper Peninsula, except as follows:

(4) **State parks open from the day following Labor Day to September 10.** All or portions of the following state parks, as described in chapter VII, shall be open from the day following Labor day to September 10: (f) Tahquamenon falls state park.

7.10 Tahquamenon Falls State Park, hunting and trapping allowed; exceptions.

Sec. 7.10 Hunting and trapping shall be allowed during the established seasons on all state-owned lands within the boundaries of Tahquamenon falls state park except for the following lands:

- (1) The Lower Falls Scenic site being the S 1/2 of the SE 1/4 south of highway M-123 and the E 1/2 of the SE 1/4 of the SW 1/4 south of state highwayM-123, Section 29; the NE 1/4 of Section 33 lying north of the Tahquamenon River including the island; and the E 1/2 of the E 1/2 of the NW 1/4 of Section 32 lying north of the Tahquamenon River, and the W 1/2 of the W 1/2 of the NW 1/4 of Section 33, T49N R7W.
- (2) The headquarters area being the S 1/2 of the SE 1/4 of the NE 1/4 and the N 1/2 of the NE 1/4 of the SE 1/4 of Section 31, T49N R7W.
- (3) The Upper Falls Scenic site being the SE 1/4 of the SW 1/4 lying south of state highway M-123 and the E 1/2 of the SW 1/4 lying south of state highwayM-123 in Section 1, and the NW 1/4 except for the NW 1/4 of the NW 1/4 of the NW 1/4 of Section 12, T48N R8W.

STATE LAND RULES

Parks and Recreation Areas – State Land Rules are issued by authority conferred on the Michigan DNR by Section 504 of 1994 PA 451 MCL 324.504. The rules cover entry, use and occupation of state lands and unlawful acts.

NATURAL AREAS

No legally-dedicated natural areas are present at Tahquamenon Falls State Park. However, approximately 17,800 acres of the park was proposed for legal dedication in 1987. The Natural Resources Commission (NRC) tentatively approved the dedication at its meeting on December 3, 1987. The administrative rule was never promulgated to formalize the dedication, although PRD continues to manage the area in line with the Natural Area legislation. The Conservation Commission minutes and memo approving the proposal and a map showing the proposed natural area is available in Appendix F.

The Conservation Commission (now the Natural Resources Commission) dedicated six natural areas at Tahquamenon Falls State Park on August 13, 1954. Three areas are dedicated as Natural Area Preserves, one area is dedicated as a Nature Study Preserve, and the remaining two areas are dedicated as Scenic Sites. The definitions of each of the types of areas, as well as the descriptions of the six areas are provided in the Conservation Commission minutes and a map of the commission-dedicated natural areas is available in Appendix F.

HIGH RISK EROSION

A small portion of the Lake Superior shoreline north of the river mouth is designated by the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) as High Risk Erosion Area. A permit is required to construct any permanent structure on a parcel that contains a High Risk Erosion Area, and permits will only be granted if required setbacks are met to make sure the structure will not erode away into the lake. Links to the law and the associated administrative rules for High Risk Erosion Areas can be found on DEQ's website (<u>http://www.michigan.gov/deq/0,4561,7-135-3313_3677_3700---,00.html</u> - see the "Laws & Rules" box on this page).

FISHERIES ORDERS

Tahquamenon Falls also contains Type 1 Designated Trout Streams, meaning that the taking of trout and salmon from these particular waters must follow regulations, such as seasonal fishing and possession restrictions, minimum sizes, and limited catch number.

NATIONAL WILD AND SCENIC RIVER DESIGNATION

Established in 1968, the National Wild and Scenic River Act protect and preserves rivers from development, which would significantly change the scenic and wild nature of the area. Currently, the east branch of the Tahquamenon River has received this protection. The west branch of the River, which runs through the park, is currently in the process of receiving this designation.

A.7 REGIONAL RECREATION RESOURCES

Federal Recreation Resources


<u>Pictured Rocks National Lakeshore</u> covers more than 40 miles of Lake Superior shoreline. It is made up of sandstone cliffs, beaches, dunes, waterfalls, lakes and forests. It offers opportunities for camping, hiking, canoeing, kayaking, and other activities.

<u>The Hiawatha National Forest</u> is located in the central and eastern parts of Michigan's Upper Peninsula. There are two separate portions of the Hiawatha. The eastern portion stretches north from the town of St. Ignace, which lies along Lakes Michigan and Huron, to the shore of Lake Superior west of the city of Sault Ste. Marie. It is a maturing forest of nearly a million acres that was created in 1931 from abandoned farms, razed logging tracts and lands devastated by forest fires. The "land that nobody wanted", is now a working forest that provides timber products to support local communities and is a refuge for rare plants and animals. The Hiawatha provides a variety of recreation opportunities. It encompasses six wilderness areas, trout streams, shoreline on 3 Great Lakes and numerous inland lakes. Visitors enjoy hiking, hunting, bird watching, camping, equestrian riding, snowmobiling, and cross-country skiing opportunities.

Whitefish Point Unit of Seney National Wildlife Refuge

The national wildlife sanctuary was established at Whitefish Point in 1998 with a transfer of 33 acres

from the US Coast Guard. The point is a concentration spot for migratory birds where the land and water features create a natural funnel. The Michigan Audubon Society has established the Whitefish Point Bird Observatory, across from the light station, where a small information room tells birders the species to be watching for as they hike along the network of trails along the point. The Observatory collects data and has led to the recognition of the area as a Globally Important Bird Area. Whitefish Point is a target for migrating birds, including hawks, eagles, goshawks, geese, falcons and owls.

North Country Scenic Trail

The North Country National Scenic Trail (NCNST), with 4,600 miles, is the longest National Scenic Trail. It was authorized by the U.S. Congress in 1980. The route, from New York to North Dakota, passes through seven (7) states. More than 1,500 miles are in Michigan, with approximately 25 miles of the trail passing through Tahquamenon Falls State Park. The trail within the park is maintained by the Hiawatha Shore to Shore Chapter of the North Country Trail Association.



State Recreation Resources

<u>Brimley State Park</u> is located on the coast of Lake Superior, about 50 miles southeast of Tahquamenon Falls and 15 miles west of Sault Ste. Marie. This 160 acre park is one of the oldest state parks in the Upper Peninsula, and features hunting, fishing, boating, camping and hiking.

<u>Straits State Park</u> has fantastic views of the Mackinac Bridge and the boat traffic going under the bridge on the Straits of Mackinac. The 180 acre park has a large modern campground, picnic area, playground, and waterfront area along Lake Huron. <u>Muskallonge Lake State Park</u> is located 28 miles northwest of Newberry in Luce County. The 217-acre park is situated between the shores of Lake Superior and inland Muskallonge Lake. The park offers 159 modern campsites, 1.5 miles of hiking trails, picnic area, overlook of Lake Superior and opportunities to fish and swim. The park is also a hub for the North Country Trail (NTC).

Sault Ste. Marie State Forest Management Unit

The Sault Ste. Marie Management Unit manages 322,500 acres, out of two offices, Sault Ste. Marie and Naubinway. These two portions of the Unit, or "Areas" are separated geographically by the Hiawatha National Forest.

The Sault Area is responsible for approximately 125,000 acres in Chippewa County and eastern Mackinac County, including ownership on numerous islands in the St. Mary's River and Lake Huron, most notably over 47,000 acres on Drummond Island. Recreational opportunities include two state forest campgrounds, ski trails, over sixty miles of designated ORV and motorcycle trails, and countless miles of snowmobile trails managed by the PRD.

The Naubinway Area, in Western Mackinac County, consists of approximately 197,500 acres, including 19 miles of contiguous, undeveloped Lake Michigan shoreline. Managed recreational opportunities include seven state forest campgrounds, hiking trails, designated motorcycle trails and snowmobile trails.

State Harbors

Tahquamenon Falls State Park also manages/oversees two harbors, Whitefish Point Harbor and Little Lake Harbor.

Newberry State Forest Management Unit

Tahquamenon Falls State Park is within the Newberry Management Unit, which includes over 352,000 acres of state-owned land throughout all of Luce County and western Chippewa County. The Newberry Management Unit has over 30 miles of Lake Superior shoreline, much of which is contiguous and undeveloped. The Unit has six proposed Natural Areas, the Two Hearted River which is under Natural River designation, and the renowned Tahquamenon River system.

The Parks and Recreation Division (PRD) manages 18 state forest campgrounds located on various inland lakes, wildlife floodings, trout streams, and along the shore of Lake Superior. Those in close proximity to TFSP are shown in the campground table below.

There are 156 miles of designated ATV and cycle trails within the Unit, as well as pathways/hiking trails and a substantial portion of the North Country Trail. The extensive lake effect snowfall provides for some excellent winter recreation opportunities. The Newberry Unit administers a 275 mile network of snowmobiles trails groomed by four different area clubs as well as the 11.5 mile Canada Lakes Cross Country Ski Trail south of Newberry. The Paradise Ski Trail, located near Paradise, provides five miles of trail groomed by volunteers.

State Wildlife Management Areas

The following areas in Chippewa and Luce Counties are co-managed for wildlife by the DNR Wildlife & Forestry Divisions.

- Cranberry Lake Flooding State Wildlife Area (277 acres). This area is a combination of grasslands and wetlands. Mallard, ruffed grouse, and snowshoe hare are all being managed in this area.
- Munuscong State Wildlife Management Area (14,270 acres). The area features wetlands, grasslands and hardwoods and is managed for mallard, sharp-tailed grouse and white-tailed deer.
- Potagannissing Flooding State Wildlife Management Area (2200 acres). Beaver, mallard, and white-tailed deer are managed in this area
- Blind Sucker River Flooding State Wildlife 'Management Area (4,785 acres). This area features wetlands, grasslands, and hardwoods. Mallard, snowshoe hare, and white-tailed deer are all managed here.
- Dollarville Flooding State Wildlife Management Area (3,000 acres). The wetlands, grasslands, and hardwoods are managed primarily for mallard, snowshoe hare, and white-tailed deer.
 - Halifax Grouse Enhanced Management (GEM) Site (2,693 acres). The Halifax GEM, one
 of many such GEMs recently developed in the Upper Peninsula (UP), was established in
 2015 to promote ruffed grouse hunting and hunter walk-in access to intensively managed
 grouse habitat in Michigan. The GEMs are designed to primarily benefit ruffed grouse
 and woodcock but aspen, the primary cover type, provides valuable habitat for numerous
 other wildlife species. In addition, GEMs support the local forest economy and further tie
 communities to natural resources by capitalizing and expanding on the forest tourism
 industry.

Tahquamenon Scenic Byway

The entire 62-mile loop of M-123 north of M-28 is designated a State Scenic Byway, recognizing the outstanding natural beauty of the area. Passing through both Luce and Chippewa counties in the eastern Upper Peninsula, this route features views of Lake Superior, rivers, forests, trails, and Tahquamenon Falls State Park.



Regional Trails

ORV Trails

The Silver Creek Trail, a 31 mile loop and Two Hearted Trail, a 33 mile loop are designated for ORV use in the Newberry Forest Management Unit, south and west of the park.

Water Trails

Planning is currently underway to inventory access sites along the Lake Superior shoreline from Grand Marais to Sault Ste. Marie as part of the Lake Superior Water Trail.





Superior Birding Trail


The Superior Bird Trail is a 150-mile trail extending from Germfask to Whitefish Point. This trail gives birders and ornithologists and opportunity to view rare sightings and migration events. Tahquamenon Falls State Park is included as a stopping point in the trail, as the variety of ecosystems provide habitat for many different birds.


Iron Belle Trail


The hiking portion of the Iron Belle Trail from Belle Isle in Detroit to Ironwood on the Wisconsin border, follows the route of the NCNST through Tahquamenon Falls State Park. This 1,273 mile long hiking route showcases Michigan's spectacular cultural and natural resources.

Snowmobile Trails

An expansive snowmobile trail network is located in the area (see maps that follow). Falls trail number 45 between Newberry and Paradise specifically runs through Tahquamenon Falls State Park.

Whitefish Point Underwater Preserve

Whitefish Point Underwater Preserve is part of Michigan's Underwater Preserve System developed for scuba divers. Lake Superior water is cold enough to preserve the shipwrecks and visibility at Whitefish Point is outstanding. Diving and kayaking are common attractions to this area. Whitefish Point is known as the Graveyard of Ships as more vessels have been lost here than in any other part of the lake.



Historic Resources

Great Lakes Shipwreck Museum

The Great Lakes Shipwreck Museum, including the Whitefish Point Lighthouse, the oldest operating

lighthouse on Lake Superior, is located 11 miles north of Paradise. The museum and the light station are operated by the nonprofit Great Lakes Shipwreck Historical Society. Exhibits include artifacts, art, and models of the 13 historic wrecks along the coast. Featured at the museum is the bell from the Edmund Fitzgerald which is used as a memorial to sailors lost. First lit in 1849, the Whitefish Point Light shares honors with the lighthouse at Copper Harbor for being the first lights on Lake Superior.

Crisp Point Lighthouse

The Crisp Point Lighthouse is located approximately 24 miles away from the State Park. It was built between 1903 and 1904, and was named after one of the light station keepers, Christopher Crisp. The Crisp Point Lighthouse was decommissioned by the U.S. Coast Guard in 1993. The lighthouse has been threatened by erosion from Lake Superior, but various efforts have helped preserve this historic attraction.

Tahquamenon Logging Museum

The Tahquamenon Logging Museum is located just north of Newberry. It features a collection of old memorabilia from the lumberjack days. There are original building and models as well as many old photos and models.

Municipal Owned Recreational Land

Luce County features Luce County Park, which offers camping, and swimming. Luce County also operates Big Valley Ski Hill, the Hamilton Lake Picnic Area, and an ice rink.

Private Recreational Areas

- Oswald's Bear Ranch is located in Newberry. This is the largest bear only ranch in the United States featuring 29 bears, and opened in 1997.
- There are a few private campgrounds and many lodging options in the area.
- The Toonerville Trolley is located in Soo Junction. It offers a railway and riverboat trip down the Tahquamenon River to get a glimpse of virgin forest in the park.
- Canoe/kayak liveries and riding stables provide additional recreational resources in the vicinity of Tahquamenon Falls State Park.

A.8 RECREATIONAL RESOURCES

Tahquamenon Falls State Park offers a wide range of recreation activities on its 48,169 acres.

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The park offers modern, semi-modern and rustic camping and lodging opportunities.

- Tahquamenon Lower Falls Modern Campground The Lower Falls Campground is made up of 2 areas, Hemlock and Portage, with a total of 168 sites with modern restrooms and electrical service, some with 50 amp service
- Tahquamenon Rivermouth Pines/Semi-Modern/Rustic 36 rustic sites with vault toilets on the south side of the Tahquamenon River near the river mouth.
- Tahquamenon Rivermouth Modern Campsite
 72 sites with modern restrooms and electrical service, some with 50 amp service.
- Tahquamenon Falls Group Use Area Campground Rustic camping available for organized groups of up to 50 people.
- Backcountry Campsites
 3 backcountry campsites are available to hikers off the North Country Trail and the Clark Lake Trail.

Cabins and Lodges

- Tahquamenon Falls Lodge
 The Tahquamenon Falls Lodge is located between the Upper and Lower Falls, with easy access to snowmobile and hiking trails, and the Betsy Lake Natural Area. The three-bedroom lodge is fully equipped and sleeps up to 8 people. Accommodations at the

lodge are available year-round.



at the Rivermouth Pines Campground on the Tahquamenon River. The cabin can sleep up to 7 people and features tables/chairs, microwave, coffee pot, electric heat, lighting, refrigerator, charcoal grill, picnic table, covered porch & fire-ring. The Camper Cabin is available May to November.



The park is open to hunting, with the exception of no hunting areas posted around the campgrounds and high visitor areas.





Brown trout, walleye, northern Muskie, northern pike, yellow perch, smallmouth bass and more are frequently caught in the Tahquamenon River. ADA accessible shore fishing is available at the Rivermouth Boat Access Site.



The park has approximately 40 miles of hiking trails, enabling people to see beautiful portions of the park that are rarely seen by the public. The North Country National Scenic Trail traverses 27 miles within the park, including the trail between the Upper and Lower Falls.

- Clark Lake Loop (5.6 miles) cross-country skiing, hiking
- Emerson Trail (1.0 mile) cross-country skiing, hiking. This trail passes through black spruce and shrub swamp following the road that leads to the abandoned sawmill town of Emerson on the banks of Tahquamenon Bay. This trail is not maintained and becomes difficult to navigate once hikers get closer to Lake Superior.
- Giant Pines Trail (3.8 miles) cross-country skiing (groomed), hiking.
- Nature Trail (1.0 mile) cross-country skiing (groomed), hiking
- River Trail (4.0 miles) hiking. This trail, which is the route of the NCNST, is the path from the Lower Falls to the Upper Falls and passes through an old-growth forest of American beech, sugar maple, eastern hemlock and yellow birch.
- Wilderness Loop (7.0 miles) cross-country skiing, hiking





Snowmobiling is permitted in the park, except in the Natural Areas. Designated snowmobile trails travel through the park, with the Upper Falls being a prime stopping point.

Boat Rental

Rowboat rentals are available at the Lower Falls concession from Memorial Day to the end of the season. Kayaks may be rented from the Rivermouth Campground office.

Paddlesports

The Tahquamenon River offers 17 miles of canoeing from the Lower Falls to the Rivermouth area. Launching points are available both at the Lower Falls and at Rivermouth. More adventurous paddlers can experience the shallow waters of Whitefish Bay to explore the Lake Superior shoreline.

Cross Country Ski

The park has four miles of regularly groomed ski trails and is also open to backcountry skiing. See Hiking and Cross Country Ski Trail map below.

Boat Launch

An improved boat launch is located at the Rivermouth area; concrete launch ramp and paved parking is available.

Picnic Area

The picnic areas are equipped with tables and grills. A shelter at the Lower Falls can be reserved up to one year in advance

Playground

Each campground has a play area for children with a variety of equipment.



Concession/ Store

Park concession is available at the Lower Falls with souvenirs and limited menu items. The Upper Falls has a privately-owned brew pub and gift shop, which are adjacent to the park property.



Geocaching

Caches are within the park and maintained by members of the geocaching community. Interpretive programs also incorporate geocaching elements into activities.

Nature Programs and Interpretation

Interpretation is an integral part of the visitor experience at Tahquamenon Falls State Park. Guided tours, snowshoe hikes, lantern-lit winter trails, summer nature programs and a staffed informational center all enhance visitor experiences and create a connection between the visitor and the park.

A.9 NATURAL RESOURCES

Landscape Context


The vast Tahquamenon Falls State Park protects a complex of natural communities, many of exemplary quality, that function and interact at a landscape scale. Functioning exemplary landscapes ecosystem are very rare in Michigan.

A regional landscape ecosystem classification has been developed for Michigan, which distinguishes major landscapes based on macroclimate, physiography, soil and vegetation. The majority of Tahquamenon Falls State Park is located within Sub-section VIII.2.2, known as the Grand Marais Sandy End Morain and Outwash. This region includes glacial end moraine, pitted outwash, and an extensive complex of sand ridges alternating with lowland swales. Much of Tahquamenon is made of peatlands which are the result of paludification or swamping of the landscape. Portions of Tahquamenon also fall in the Sub-section

VIII2.1, Seney Sand Lake Plain. Other portions of Tahquamenon falls include dune ridge-swale and mesic forest.


Water Resources

The prominent water features of the park are the Tahquamenon River, Lake Superior, Betsy Lake (1,376 acres), Sheephead Lake (490 acres), Clark Lake (144 acres), Camp 10 Lakes and the Water Tank Lakes. The inland lakes within the park are free from any development and most are isolated from vehicular access.

Rising from springs north of McMillan, the Tahquamenon River drains the watershed of an area of more than 790 square miles. From its source, it meanders 94 miles before emptying into Whitefish Bay. The amber color of the water is caused by tannins leached from the Cedar, Spruce and Hemlock in the swamps drained by the river. The extremely soft water churned by the action of the falls causes the large amounts of foam, which has been the trademark of the Tahquamenon since the days of the voyager.



The amount of water flowing over the Upper Falls is completely dependent on the amount of precipitation received within the 800-square-mile watershed. This often coincides with the seasons, and provides a unique viewing opportunity with every visit. As the graph illustrates, April is often the best time to catch the maximum flow rate. The river is approximately 24 miles long within the park.

Topography

Topography within the park rises from a low elevation of 605 feet above sea level along the Lake Superior shoreline to a high elevation of 940 feet above sea level between the upper and lower falls, a difference of +/-335 feet. Typical river downcutting and meandering has created a steep river shoreline below the Upper Falls to within 5 miles of the river mouth. Above the Upper Falls, the river shoreline is flat with intermittent swamp areas.

<u>Soils</u>

Soils within the park area are very varied and include areas of peat, muck, sandy loam, with few suitable for development. Distinguishing features of the limiting soil types are high water table, low bearing capacities, trees in the soils subject to windthrow, slow to dry out in the spring and subject to frost heave.

Geology and Mineral Resources

The surface of Tahquamenon Falls State Park (TFSP) and surrounding area is covered with glacial drift of varying thickness. There is insufficient data to accurately determine the thickness of Quaternary sediment cover, but it can be greater than 200 feet in places. Surface sediments on the lowland lake and outwash plains consist of lacustrine clay, silt, sand, and gravel and peat and muck, whereas the upland ridges consist of end moraines of coarse-textured till. The coarser glacial deposits are frequently quarried across the state for sand and gravel, primarily for use in road construction and maintenance. A former sand and gravel pit is located about three miles south of Whitehouse Landing.

Bedrock underlying the glacial drift is primarily sandstone consisting of the Cambrian Munising Formation and Precambrian Jacobsville Sandstone, but subcrops of the Ordovician Au Train Formation also underlie glacial sediments in the park. Most of these units do not have a current economic use. The Jacobsville has been used as a building stone in the past in some parts of the state. The sandstones were deposited in fluvial to shallow marine environments when what is now northern Michigan was located near the equator. The sandstones form an expansive cuesta that stretches across the north-central Upper Peninsula and are well-exposed at Pictured Rocks National Lakeshore. Glacial sediments obscure these ancient sandstones in most other areas. However, in Tahquamenon Falls State Park, the Tahquamenon River has eroded down through the glacial sediments and has exposed the rocks of the Munising Formation at the upper and lower falls.

There has been little to no oil and gas exploration in this region and no commercial production of hydrocarbons in the Upper Peninsula as a whole. A single well (a dry hole), dating to 1961, was drilled in McMillan Township, southwest of the park. There are no active State mineral leases within 20 miles of the park. A large portion of the park has severed mineral rights in private ownership. As a consequence, because the mineral estate is the dominant estate, the State has limited control over the development of these privately-owned minerals. However, mineral potential is low in this area and development of mineral resources is unlikely.

Pre Settlement Vegetation

Native vegetation prior to European settlement included a variety of plant communities. Beech-sugar maple-hemlock forest (northern mesic forest) occurred on glacial end moraine. This contained northern hardwoods dominated by American beech and sugar maple, conifer dominated areas with eastern hemlock and white pine, as well as mixed forests with eastern hemlock and American beech. Upland areas supported primarily red and white pine, but also pine barrens and spruce-fir-cedar (boreal) forest. Some of the kettle depressions likely supported small, shrubby bogs. Lowland swales between the dune ridges were characterized by mixed conifer swamp, dominated in this region by black spruce and tamarack, and some northern white cedar. The muskeg or bog in the northern area of the park was much as it is today.

Current Vegetation

Tahquamenon State Park can be divided broadly into three units: peatlands in the north of the park, duneridge swales in the center, and mesic forest south of the river.

The wetland in the northern part of the park is one of the largest northern peatlands in the Upper Peninsula. Rich conifer swamp dominates in the higher areas, transitioning to black-spruce dominated swamp in the margins of the peatlands, to open muskeg bog.

The dune ridge/swale of the central area of the park was harvested during the logging era. Much of the upland supports dry mesic northern forests of red pine-jack-pine and aspen. However, white pine in the

understory suggests these areas are succeeding back to the red pine-white pine that once dominated the area. Red oak is also common.

Mesic northern forests dominate the southern unit of the park, containing a complex mix of beech, sugar maple, yellow birch, hemlock and white pine. Of particular importance is an area of Old Growth Forest, covering approximately 1,500 acres, between the upper and lower falls.

Natural Communities

Multiple occurrence of thirteen unique natural communities of exemplary quality have been identified in Tahquamenon Falls State Park. These are:

- Northern Wet Meadow
- Poor Fen

The complex of natural communities at Tahquamenon Falls State Park functions at a landscape scale, providing for the needs of wildlife species that require vast areas for viability.

<u>Wildlife</u>

Moose are occasionally seen feeding in the wet areas of Tahquamenon Falls State Park. Black bear, coyotes, otter, deer, fox, porcupines, beaver and mink are a few of the other wildlife which can be seen in the park. The abundant bird life includes spruce grouse, pileated woodpeckers, bald eagles and a variety of waterfowl and songbirds.

The park is home to several northern bird species including the gray jay, boreal chickadee, and blackbacked woodpecker. It also is one of the state's best known breeding sites for the palm warbler and one of the only known breeding sites for the rusty blackbird.

The area near the mouth of the Tahquamenon River has a linear marsh running inland along the wide serpentine river corridor. This sheltered habitat and the bay near the river mouth are used by waterfowl during migration, especially April and May. Gulls and terns that work the Lake Superior shallows and nest in the area are found here throughout the ice-free months.

Migrating birds following the Lake Superior shoreline, pass through the park every spring and fall. More than 300 species, including rare species, have been documented using this migration corridor. The Upper Tahquamenon Falls area offers a glimpse of Michigan's pre-settlement forests. In summer, songs of the winter wren, black-throated blue warbler, black-throated green warbler, blackburnian warbler, least flycatcher, rose-breasted grosbeak, red-eyed vireo, wood thrush, and veery fill the dense



forest. This forest is also home to barred and sawwhet owls, northern goshawk, yellow-bellied sapsucker, pileated woodpecker, brown creeper, red-breasted and white-breasted nuthatches, chimney swift, scarlet tanager, and Swainson's trush: to name a few.

The Lower Falls area offers a variety of birding opportunities. Along the "Mainland Trail", a 3/4 mile boardwalk through a narrow conifer lowland, river edge songbirds mingle with hardwood dwellers. Summer residents include American redstart, northern water thrush, mourning warbler, red-eyed vireo, and scarlet tanager. Bald eagles fish the rapids below the falls early in the morning. In the evenings, common nighthawks swoop up emerging insects in midair. Other species common in and around the pool below the falls include the red-breasted and common mergansers, great blue heron, spotted sandpiper, belted kingfisher, osprey, and northern rough-winged swallow.

Fisheries

The Tahquamenon River provides anglers various types of fisheries within the park boundaries. Between the Upper and Lower Falls, brown trout are stocked annually which offer anglers a unique experience that is typically found in Western mountain states with cascading riffles and pockets of deepwater eddy's all situated in an aesthetically isolated location. Walleye are stocked downstream from the Lower Falls and provide a year-round fishery in the lower river. Walleye, Muskellunge, Smallmouth Bass, Northern Pike, and Yellow Perch can be found year-round in the river and are targeted specifically in the spring time when fish congregate below the Lower Falls. Many anglers seeking these fish will launch from the Rivermouth Campground boat ramp and motor upstream just below the Lower Falls.

Betsy, Clark, and Sheephead lakes start the headwaters of the Betsy River and all provide remote access fisheries for use by carry-in anglers during the open water months. Ice fishing is popular on these waterbodies as well for Northern Pike and Yellow Perch.

A.10 HISTORIC AND CULTURAL RESOURCES


Throughout Tahquamenon Falls State Park, remnants of the logging era are visible. Both the Upper and Lower Falls show scars left by the river jacks of the 1890's. The scar on the Upper Falls is in the form of a vee, cut into the lip of the falls just south of the center. It is said that lumbermen dynamited the vee when logs jammed on the brink of the falls.

The Lower Falls shows evidence of the logging era in the form of steel pipes driven into the sandstone spanning the river and connecting to the island. These were apparently intended to block the western channel during log drives.

Historically, the Rivermouth was the collection point for logs harvested during the late 1800s that were sent down the Tahquamenon River. These logs were held within large booms, then separated using identifying logging marks before being sent further downriver to the sawmill at Emerson. The southern channel around Marsh Island was originally excavated to allow passage around the booms during spring drives. Remnants of the logging era can still be seen today. Logs with perfectly straight cut ends stick out of the Tahquamenon River during low water, and occasionally wash up on the shore of Whitefish Bay. Visitors walking the shoreline may come across these logs, and a few even have visible logging marks.

There are no known sites within the park that are eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places. However, the townsite of Emerson, once a thriving hub of pine lumbering, is listed as a Michigan Historic Site. According to R. Dodge in <u>Michigan Ghost Towns</u>, the town was in existence from 1882 until 1939.

There are 35 known archeological sites at Tahquamenon Falls State Park.

A.11 EDUCATION AND INTERPRETATION

Tahquamenon Falls State Park offers year-round events and programming led by a full time park interpreter. The Upper Falls Fact Shack serves as the main interpretive center with staff available seven days a week June-Labor Day to answer questions and provide daily tours of the Upper Falls. The Fact Shack features a wolf exhibit and interactive hands-on displays that change daily, along with trail maps, park guides, and information about key places to visit. Groups visiting the park, such as scouts, religious organizations, outdoor clubs and schools, can schedule a personal program to suit their needs. Tahquamenon Falls State Park also offers free guided tours for motor coach groups of the Upper Falls when scheduled in advance.

Some examples of the events and programs offered at the park are described below.

Special Events

Interpretive staff plays a role in creating, marketing and implementing special events at Tahquamenon Falls. Main special events include the Lantern-lit Winter Trail, Hike Between Da Falls and Harvest Festival. Some events are run by outside organizations, such as the trail runs and canoe race, and the interpretive staff creates flyers and provides marketing for those events.

Interpretive Programs

Interpretation is an integral part of the visitor experience at Tahquamenon Falls State Park. Guided tours, snowshoe hikes, lantern-lit winter trails, summer nature programs, and a staffed informational center all enhance visitor experiences and create a connection between the visitor and the park. These connections can eventually turn a visitor into a steward and park advocate. Each year interpretive staff presents over 200 programs. Scheduled nature programs primarily take place during the summer when visitation is high. Examples of program topics include archery, Michigan wolves, survival, wildflowers and astronomy. An increased demand for winter programming has led to weekend guided hikes and snowshoe rental. Winter camping numbers have also increased, as more groups seem to be interested in trying out winter camping. These groups also request interpretive snowshoe hikes.



Fact Shack

Junior Naturalist programs take place in the campgrounds.

The Upper Falls Fact Shack serves as the visitor center for the park, featuring wildlife displays, park maps and information for visitors to plan their trip. The Fact Shack is staffed daily mid-June through Labor Day, and weekends during September. Over 50,000 people stop by the Fact Shack during the summer season and at least 120 Upper Falls Guided Tours meet at the Fact Shack each year. During the winter months, the Fact Shack serves as a welcome area for snowshoers, cross country skiers and snowmobilers. Every Saturday in February the park interpreter offers free snowshoe rental, guided snowshoe hikes, bonfire and refreshments at the Upper Falls Fact Shack. There is also a lantern-lit trail that begins and ends at the Fact Shack.


Graphic displays and wayside exhibits are strategically placed throughout Tahquamenon Falls State Park. The park interpreter is responsible for writing, designing and maintaining these exhibits. Wayside interpretation is an effective means to engage and inform visitors about park history, local wildlife and DNR messages. It is also a useful tool to gain understanding and compliance regarding park rules and regulations.

A.12 CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS

A number of capital improvement projects have been identified that are necessary to replace aging infrastructure and facilitate management at Tahquamenon Falls State Park. These include replacement of the Lower Falls concession, store and visitor area bathrooms with contemporary barrier free structures; replacing or upgrading the wells at the Upper Falls; and the development of a Rivermouth maintenance building and employee bathrooms. Projects such as these are prioritized by PRD District each year and funds allocated as available. In 2015, the priority identified projects at Tahquamenon Falls State Park have an estimated cost of close to \$8 million.

One major project that is currently in the design phase is the redevelopment of the boat concession and waterfall viewing area at the Lower Falls day use area. The expansive waterfall viewing area and popular row boat rental concession that provides self- guided access to the island, are two of the primary visitor experiences at this location. The retaining wall at the main visitor viewing area has been slumping and pulling away from the asphalt upper viewing platform and creating voids in the walking surface. In addition, the boat concession area and pedestrian access has aged to a point where much of the associated infrastructure is beyond simple operational repair or replacement and is putting the visiting public at risk. The row boat rental, island take out point, and island walkways are not currently barrier free.

DNR PRD has completed a study and is in the process of developing preliminary designs for the above referenced work to identify desired solutions. This effort includes assessing the existing retaining wall and viewing platform for options of repair or replacement, as well as identifying improvements to the row boat concession and island access. There is a desire to consider this unique visitor service facility for alternatives for accessing the island that will provide improved visitor experiences, barrier free access and universal design, lower cost infrastructure investment, reduced operational maintenance and increased infrastructure longevity. The Tahquamenon River is a proposed federally designated Wild and Scenic River and as such is subject to the federal criteria, review and approval on any alterations or changes along the river.

A.13 PARK USE STATISTICS

Tahquamenon Falls State Park is one of the top tourist attractions in the Upper Peninsula, attracting over 478,665 day use visitors per year and over 100,000 campers. Camping numbers are recorded in the reservation system. Day use visitor numbers are estimated based on car counts throughout the year and using multipliers for the number of occupants.

Day-Use


- Summer- The busiest season at the park. Summer usage makes up about 63% of the year's day uses.
- Fall- The second busiest season at Tahquamenon likely to do with the scenic fall color views at the park. Usage in the fall makes up about 25% of the year's day users. Some of the park's busiest days of the year occur in October.
- Winter- Winter use in the park makes up about 6% of all day usage.
- Spring- The months of April and May see about 5% of all day usage in the park.

Camping-use


- Summer-This busy season makes up about 72% of all camping uses for the year.





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






























Appendix B – Public & Tribal Input Summary

Over the duration of the General Management Planning process, the Tahquamenon Falls State Park Planning Team ensured a variety of opportunities for public input and feedback. The process could be followed and comments posted at the Tahquamenon Falls State Park Website:

Overview of Public Input Opportunities

- **Stakeholder Input Meeting (October 22, 2015)** located at the LMAS District Health Department. Stakeholders had the opportunity to learn about the General Management Planning process and provide input regarding their concerns, vision of the park, how they could contribution to make their vision possible. Over 50 stakeholders were invited to the open house; 17 stakeholders attended.

The Parks and Recreation Division (PRD) of the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is in the process of developing General Management Plans for Tahquamenon Falls State Park and Muskallonge Lake State Park in Luce and Chippewa Counties, Michigan.

Tahquamenon Falls State Park encompasses close to 50,000 acres stretching over 13 miles. Most of this is undeveloped woodland and wetland with limited access. The centerpiece of the park is the Tahquamenon River with the Upper and Lower Falls and river mouth in Whitefish Bay. Muskallonge Lake State Park is situated between the shores of Lake Superior and Muskallonge Lake, 28 miles north of Newberry. The 217-acre park provides opportunities for camping, fishing, swimming and hiking.

The DNR uses General Management Plans (GMPs) to define a long-range planning and management strategy that will protect the natural and cultural resources of the site, while considering education and recreation opportunities. A planning team, representing various specialties within the DNR, has been established and is meeting regularly to develop the GMP for this site. The planning process includes several opportunities for public and stakeholder input. The first of these, a stakeholder focus group, has been scheduled for Thursday October 22, 2015 at the LMAS District Health Department, 14150 Hamilton Lake Road, Newberry. The focus group for Muskallonge Lake will take place from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. and Tahquamenon Falls from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. An on-line survey will be made available in the upcoming months with the results used to inform the planning team. A public review of the draft plan will be advertised in spring 2016, with opportunities to provide comments at a public open house or to review the draft plan on the DNR's website prior to adoption.

We would like to give the Tribes the opportunity to meet with us independently of the larger group to discuss the Management Plan process and any concerns you may have in relation to Tahquamenon Falls and/or Muskallonge Lake State Park. In addition, you are welcome to send representatives to the stakeholder focus group in October, or the public meeting, which will be advertised early next year.

The meeting was initiated by a letter from Dennis Knapp, Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) Tribal Coordinator, extending an invitation to meet with the Tribal representatives to discuss the General Management Plans for Tahquamenon Falls and Muskallonge Lake State Parks.

Debbie Jensen gave an overview of the progress made to date on the General Management Plans. Internal planning meetings are underway and the team has received input from stakeholders and the public via an online survey. The draft plans are expected to be made available for review in May/June.

Tahquamenon River access was discussed. It is limited between the falls due to topography, and between the Lower Falls and the river mouth by lack of suitable land in public ownership. It was noted that those wanting to fish the river currently motor up 16 miles from the river mouth causing some concerns for riparian owners. The DNR is interested in establishing a new access point, approximately centrally located along the river corridor, if suitable land could be acquired

It was noted that the river has a history of Tribal sturgeon fishing. Cory mentioned that there was the possibility of installing a streamside rearing facility in the park, which was seen as a great outreach opportunity.

Keith outlined some proposed development concepts at Tahquamenon Falls. A project currently in the planning stages at the Lower Falls would improve the boat concession and reduce infrastructure on the island, connecting to the island with an accessible bridge. Improvements to a canoe/kayak access below the Lower Falls with a boat slide is also proposed. All development in the river corridor would be in keeping with the Federal Wild and Scenic River proposal. A potential visitor center is also something

that will be considered. At the rivermouth, river bank erosion will continue to be addressed and there are proposals for additional cabins within the campground.

It was noted that any new footprint would require a Phase 1 Archeological Survey. The park has 34 documented archeological sites and likely others that are not documented, including Native American sites and those relating to the logging era etc. Tom expressed his desire to see a buffer on any logging along the river corridor for aesthetic and archeological reasons. Although logging is not relevant in state parks, the concept of limited disturbance along the viewshed from the river was agreed upon.

Tom mentioned that there had been some issues with access being denied to those showing Tribal ID at the park. Continued education was suggested for both park staff and Tribal members (Craig noted that the passport exemption is for the driver of the vehicle not passengers).

Craig noted that there have been periodic requests to salvage wood from the river, which is under the jurisdiction of the Department of Environmental Quality and typically requires a permit application. Tom said that they would be opposed to this for fisheries reasons.

The intent to move ahead with dedication of the proposed Natural Area at Tahquamenon Falls was discussed and Tom indicated his general support.

At Muskallonge Lake SP a Phase 1 Archeological Survey was undertaken prior to the headquarters relocation. A survey of the remaining park is proposed. Other proposals at this park primarily relate to upgrades of existing facilities.

It was noted that there had been no comments received to date from the Bay Mills or Sault Ste Marie Tribes.

Key Points

- Tribal interests relate primarily to: access to fisheries, protection of archeological resources and support for a streamside rearing facility for Sturgeon.

Developed Recreation

The Developed Recreation Zone is characterized by active recreation with a high density of use, conducted in areas not designated for natural resource significance. hazard trees and to manage pests and disease.



In addition, the Parks are the ONE place left where the forest and land can just "be." No timbering should ever be allowed. Animals and people need the restorative forests!


Q1 How many times per year do you typically visit Tahquamenon Falls State Park (TFSP)?



Q2 Why do you not visit Tahquamenon Falls State Park?






Q4 What time of year do you typically visit Tahquamenon Falls State Park (TFSP)?





We agree, one should not be allowed to possess a single site, but anyone should be able to purchase a different site or travel to another park, then return to another enroute to their home after their vacation. Restrict the amount of days at a site, but why restrict the number of days in the parks?? Especially during off-peak times when the parks are far from full capacity??? Consider allowing the individual parks such as the Rivermouth Modern the option to extend their water service/dump tank disposal during the seasons that are above temperature. The second week of October can often exclude beautiful camping conditions. On those rare seasons, the local park should be allowed to make the decision to extend their water/waste station even if they still closed the restrooms and showers. Remove and RELOCATE the irresponsibly placed vault toilet placed directly beside the edge of the Tahquamenon River in the south loop of the modern side. Any citizen would NEVER receive environmental approval for same placement only feet from this river. This is neither a convenience to the campers who cannot stomach the smell, nor enjoy the only river view. 



Appendix C—Planning Team Summary

Over the duration of the General Management Planning process, the Planning Team held three on-site team meetings and three virtual meetings. These meetings were critical to the development of the General Management Plan and particularly the creation of the 20-Year Management Zones and the 10-Year Action Goals. Additionally, the meetings were an opportunity to review input received from stakeholders and the public.

Overview of Planning Team Meetings

Team Meeting #1 Tahquamenon Falls State Park (August 18-19, 2015) – The Planning Team's kick-off meeting was an opportunity for Planning Team members to introduce themselves to one another, review the General Management Plan schedule, receive an overview and tour of Tahquamenon Falls, discuss the park and its significance features, review the resource maps, and review the Supporting Analysis.

Team Meeting #2 Tahquamenon Falls State Park (September 23, 2015) – The Planning Team met and began discussion with the supporting analysis and potential stakeholders to include for the future open house. They also suggested questions for the public input survey. The Planning Team worked together in drafting the park's Management Zones and began brainstorming 10-year action goals for the park.

Team Meeting #3 Tahquamenon Falls State Park (October 20, 2015) – The Planning Team met and reviewed the Draft Statements of Significance, Draft Management Zone Map, and Draft Action Goals. The Planning Team also finalized revisions to the online survey and the stakeholder list.

Team Meeting #4, Go-To-Meeting (January 22, 2016) – The Planning Team reviewed the input received from the stakeholder meeting and the online survey. The Team refined and made additions to the Draft Action Goals, taking into account the stakeholder and public input received. Discussion of the upcoming Public Open House occurred, including date and location options.

Team Meeting #5, Go-To-Meeting (March 3, 2016) – The Planning Team met and reviewed updates the maps, action goals, and GMP. The Management Zone and Amenities maps were discussed with revisions. The Action Goals were reviewed and confirmed project input and responsible parties. The Team discussed the internal review process and the format for the upcoming Open House.

Team Meeting #6, Go-To-Meeting (June 14, 2016) – The Planning Team met and discussed the input received from the Public Input Open House, and how those topics could be reflected in the plan. Minor revisions to the Action Goals and maps were made. The Team received an overview of the final steps in the process, as well as projected timeline.

- 4. Tahquamenon Falls State Park Overview was presented by C. Krepps. Following is the information presented during the slide show along with comments from the Team. **General:**
 - Tahquamenon Falls State Park was established in 1947
 - The park is located in Luce and Chippewa Counties, with Paradise to the east and Newberry approximately 21 miles to the west.
 - The park has 34 full and part-time/seasonal employees.
 - The 48,169 acre State Park is open year round.
 - 38 Miles of Hiking Trails. The trails are mostly linear and there are no designated bike trails within the park. The North Country Trail runs through the park including a connection from the Lower to Upper Falls.
 - 13 Inland Lakes and 24 Miles of Tahquamenon River
 - 90% undeveloped wilderness area and wetlands. It was suggested that there may be closer to 98%-99% of the land area undeveloped. *K. Cheli suggested reviewing and refining the quantity of undeveloped land reported.*

• T. Neal provided some additional information on the visitor attendance, employment levels, and history of infrastructure improvements. It was suggested that some of this information could be included in the Park Statistic section of the Supporting Analysis.

Park Facilities:

- Campgrounds Campsites include 241 modern, 36 rustic, 3 back country and an organizational campground. The modern campsites are available from the second week of May to mid-October.
- Lodging/Cabins The Pine Camper Cabin is located between the modern and rustic campgrounds at the Rivermouth and Tahquamenon Lodge with two units (one unit completed and another under renovation) is located between the Upper and Lower Falls across from the park headquarters. Tahquamenon Lodge and Pines Camper Cabins are available year-round and accessible.
- Day Use Areas There are two day use areas: Upper Falls and Lower Falls. The Upper Falls Day Use Area is open year round.
- Picnic Areas The Whitefish Bay picnic area is located at the easterly boundary of the park; this is in addition to the picnic areas located within the day use areas. Picnic areas within the day use areas are accessible.
- Boat Launch The River Boat Launch is located at the east boundary of the park at the mouth of the Tahquamenon River and White Fish Bay of Lake Superior.
- Accessible Facilities The Park has several accessible facilities including the walkways between the Upper and Lower Falls, Tahquamenon Lodge and the Pine Camper Cabin, Day Use Area picnic tables/area, bathrooms (4 modern buildings), and campsites. The Park also offers wheelchairs for use at the Upper and Lower Falls.

Trails:

- Tahquamenon State Park includes 38 miles of hiking trails, cross-country skiing trails, snowmobile trails. There are no designated bike trails within the Park, although that is a frequent question by visitors. The 38 miles of hiking trails include the following:

 - o River Trail the most popular trail within the park

 - c. Recreation Opportunities statement updated to better portray activities in the park.
 - d. Tourism statement updated to encompass other features that draws users to the park.
- 3. Draft Management Zone Activity. The Planning team reviewed the first draft of the management zones. Modifications to the map were recommended for accuracy, as well as the addition of other zones to better reflect present and future activities in these areas.

The State of Michigan has entered into a lease with Tahquamenon Boat Service Inc., for dockage for the Toonerville Trolley boat excursion to the Upper Falls, an approach trail and observation area, and construction, maintenance and operation of facilities to accomplish these functions. The current lease, amended in 2013, expires in 2023. A copy of both the previous and amended lease follows.

LEASE By authority of Part 5 of Public Act 451 of 1994

Between

The STATE OF MICHIGAN, as Lessor

and

TAHQUAMENON BOAT SERVICE, Inc., a Michigan Corporation, as Lessee

This Lease is entered into by the State of Michigan through its Department of Natural Resources (DNR) Office of Property Management (Lessor) and Tahquamenon Boat Service, Inc., a Michigan corporation, also known as the Toonerville Trolley (Lessee), whose address is 5883 County Road 441, Newberry, Michigan 49868.

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 503(1) of Public Act 451 of 1994 (1994 PA 451), as amended MCL 324.503(1), the DNR is required to: protect and conserve the natural resources of the State; provide and develop facilities for outdoor recreation; prevent the destruction of timber and other forest growth by fire or otherwise; promote the reforesting of forest lands belonging to the State; prevent and guard against the pollution of lakes and streams within the State and enforce all laws provided for that purpose with all authority granted by law; and foster and encourage the protecting and propagation of game and fish.

WHEREAS, the Purpose of this Lease is to provide and develop a facility for outdoor recreation.

WHEREAS, the Director of DNR, or his or her lawful representative, has determined that the purpose of this Lease is necessary to implement Part 5 of 1994 PA 451 because the facilities and outdoor recreation services offered by Lessee will foster a respect and appreciation for the Upper Tahquamenon Falls.

THEREFORE, Lessor and Lessee, for the valuable consideration specified in this Lease, agree to the following terms and conditions:

1. **DESCRIPTION OF PREMISES:** Lessor hereby leases to Lessee the Premises, described in **Enclosure A** (legal description), in the Township of McMillan, County of Luce, State of Michigan.

2. **USE OF PREMISES:**

A. Lessee hereby acknowledges that the use and occupancy of the Premises shall be subject to the provisions of 1994 PA 451, as amended, and confined to the following specific Uses:

- 1. Dockage for the "Toonerville Trolley" Boat Excursion, a for-profit tour operation to the Upper Tahquamenon Falls;
- 2. An approach trail and observation area for Toonerville Trolley passengers visiting the Upper Tahquamenon Falls; and
- 3. The construction, maintainance, and operation of facilities to accomplish the above.

Lessee shall obtain Lessor's prior consent, in writing signed by the Department Representative, to use the Premises for any purpose not listed in this Paragraph. Lessor may terminate this Lease if, at any time, Lessee uses the Premises, without express written permission by Lessor, for purposes other than those enumerated in this Paragraph. This Paragraph is cross-referenced in Paragraph 24.

- B. PROHIBITED ACTIVITIES: The following activities on the Premises are prohibited:
 - 1. Cutting or removal of trees and shrubs.
 - 2. Use of non-native species in any re-vegetation effort on the Premises.
 - 3. Storage of equipment, placing of signs, or use of camping trailers or tents without prior written approval of the Department Representative. All storage of supplies and equipment must be inside.
 - 4. Blockage of the access road unless limited blockage is approved in writing by the Department Representative.
 - 5. Any clearing activity outside the Premises.
 - 6. Dumping or disposal of garbage/trash, spare parts, hazardous waste, scrap metal and other waste onto the Premises.
 - 7. Disposal of trees, tree tops, branches, roots, stumps, and other vegetational debris onto the Premises.

Lessor may terminate this Lease if, at any time during the term of this Lease, prohibited activities occur on the Premises. This Paragraph is cross-referenced in Paragraph 24.

3. **WASTE:** Lessee agrees not to commit, or allow to be committed, any waste or nuisance on the Premises and will not use, or permit to be used, the Premises for any unlawful purpose.

4. **LESSOR'S OPERATIONS:** Lessee covenants that its use of the Premises shall be nonexclusive and will, at no time, interfere with the uses or operations of Lessor or the Public on the Premises. Lessee covenants that its use of the Premises shall, at no time, interfere with the Public's use of State land adjacent to the Premises. Lessee shall not prevent Lessor, its agents, or the public from crossing the Premises to access the adjoining State lands.

5. ADMINISTRATION: District Supervisor, Parks and Recreation Bureau, Gaylord District Office, 1732 M-32 West, Gaylord, MI 49735, (989) 732-3541 is the Department Administrator of this Lease or his or her designated representative (collectively, Department Representative). The Lessee shall designate in writing to the Department Representative one person and one alternate responsible to be the contact person for the Lessor

regarding the administration of the Lease. This person shall be authorized to make decisions regarding the maintenance and operation of the Premises.

6. **CONDITION OF PREMISES:** Lessee represents and warrants that Lessee has examined the Premises, and that they are at the time of this Lease in good order, repair, and in a safe, clean, and tenantable condition. Lessee represents that it is taking possession of the Premises in their "as is" condition. Lessee acknowledges that it has not made an independent environmental assessment of the Premises, and agrees to maintain the Premises in their present condition.

7. **TERM:** Lessor shall lease the Premises to Lessee for a ten-year initial term of possession beginning upon actual possession at 12:01 a.m. on January 1, 2004, and ending at midnight on December 31, 2013, or such later date as provided in Paragraph 9.

The beginning and ending Lease term dates may be altered by mutual written consent to reflect the actual date of occupancy. If the occupancy date is changed, this Paragraph shall also be changed accordingly.

8. **RENT:** Lessee shall pay to Lessor at Attention: Department Representative, or at such other address as Lessor may from time to time designate, rent at the rate of Two Thousand Three Hundred Sixty-Five and 00/100 Dollars (\$2,365.00) per annum. Rent shall be paid in full annually by March 1st of each year.

If at any time Lessee vacates the Premises prior to the expiration of the Lease, Lessee will be responsible for all rental payments and repairs, above and beyond normal wear and tear, until and including the date Lessor cancels the Lease.

Rent during any extended term agreed to pursuant to Paragraph 9 of the Lease shall be at the prevailing market rental value. Lessor shall notify the Lessee in writing, at least ninety (90) days prior to the expiration of the prior term or extension, of the proposed rent increase for the extended term. Lessee shall notify Lessor in writing within thirty (30) days of receipt of Lessor's notice, of Lessee's acceptance or rejection of Lessor's proposed rental rate for the extended term. In the event an extension option is exercised, all the terms and conditions of this Lease shall continue over the extended term, except that the rental rate shall be adjusted.

In the event that Lessee fails to make a required payment under this Lease within thirty (30) days of the due date, Lessee shall pay to Lessor, in addition to such payment or other charges due hereunder, a "late fee" in the amount of **Ten and 00/100** Dollars (**\$10.00**), per day for each additional day of delay.

9. **OPTION TO RENEW:** The initial term of this Lease may be extended if Lessee gives Lessor thirty (30) days written notice before this Lease or any extension expires and agrees to any additional terms and rent modifications proposed by Lessor. Any extension of this Lease is contingent upon Lessor's written consent. Lessor's rental rate for the Premises during an extended term will be established as set forth in Paragraph 8, and will be sent to the address indicated under "Notice and Approvals."

10. **SERVICES BY LESSOR:** Lessor shall furnish to the Lessee the following:

a. None.

- 11. **SERVICES BY LESSEE:** Lessee shall furnish the following services at its own expense:
 - a. Lessee will secure, maintain and keep in good repair the Leased Premises, at its sole expense.
 - b. Lessee will furnish outhouses for public use on the Premises.
 - c. Lessee shall, at its cost, provide trash containers for and the disposal of all garbage, waste and debris from the buildings and grounds within and surrounding the Leased Premises. The Lessee shall keep the Premises in a clean and sanitary condition and in conformity with standards and rules for sanitation and public health. The Lessee shall also be responsible for the pickup and removal of litter on the Premises.

Lessee shall maintain standards of cleanliness that will reflect favorable public opinion on the Lessee and the DNR. If the Department Representative determines that the Lessee has failed to maintain an acceptable standard of cleanliness and if after forty-eight (48) hours following written notification by the Lessor, the problem is not rectified to the satisfaction of Lessor, Lessor may perform or have the duties of the Lessee performed by others. Lessee shall pay 105% of the cost of such work, whether performed by the Department or by others at the discretion of the Department. Situations caused by emergencies (broken pipes, etc.) that deter the Lessee from immediate (48 hours) correction shall be reported to the Department Representative and shall be excluded from notice and cure provisions of this clause.

12. **ASSIGNMENT AND SUBLEASE:** Lessee shall neither assign, sublet, nor grant any license for use of the Premises, or any part thereof, without Lessor's prior written consent, which Lessee shall request at least thirty (30) days in advance of such assignment, sublease, or license. Consent by Lessor to one such assignment, sublease, or license shall not be deemed to be a consent to any subsequent assignment, sublease, or license. An assignment, sublease, or license without the prior written consent of Lessor shall be absolutely null and void and shall, at Lessor's option, terminate this Lease.

13. **ALTERATIONS:** No alterations, modifications, or improvements shall be made to the Premises without Lessor's specific written consent, which Lessee shall request at least thirty (30) days in advance of such alteration, modification, or improvement. At the expiration or cancellation of the Lease, all alterations, modifications, and improvements to the Premises shall become the property of Lessor unless otherwise agreed in writing by Lessor. In the event that the parties agree that Lessee may remove Lessee improvements, Lessee shall restore the Premises to its original condition.

14. LAWS, CODES AND PERMITS: Lessee shall comply with all applicable (including but not limited to all environmental) federal, state, and local laws, regulations, and codes and will obtain any necessary permits in connection with its use of the Premises.

15. **DAMAGE and REPAIRS:** Lessee shall reimburse Lessor for any repairs to the Premises resulting from damage that exceeds the normal wear and tear expected from the lawful and proper use of the Premises.

16. **INSPECTION OF PREMISES:** Lessor and Lessor's agents and employees shall have the right at all reasonable times during the term of this Lease, and any renewal thereof, to enter the Premises for the purposes of making any inspections, repairs, additions, or alterations as may be deemed appropriate by Lessor for the preservation of the Premises.

In addition, the Lessee must arrange for an inspection of stairs located on the Premises by a State Licensed engineering entity approved by DNR prior to the commencement of operation in 2004, and provide a written copy of the engineering report to the Department Representative. Inspections are to be repeated every second year, prior to the operating season, for the life of this Lease, including any extension periods. Each subsequent inspection report shall also be provided to the Department Representative. If any part of a stairway fails the safety inspection report, it shall immediately be closed to use. The structure must either then be corrected, as confirmed by the State Building Inspector, or it shall be removed from the Premises by the Lessee's sole expense, and shall be performed pursuant to plans proposed by Lessee and subject to the written approval of the Lessee.

17. **INDEMNIFICATION:** Lessee hereby expressly agrees to hold harmless, defend, and indemnify Lessor, its agents and employees, from and against any and all claims, costs, losses, suits, demands, actions, liabilities, damages, causes of action or judgments, including, but not limited to, alleged violations of environmental laws, that may in any manner be imposed on or incurred by the Lessor, its agents and employees, for any bodily injury, loss of life, and/or damage to property, resulting from, arising out of, or in any way connected with Lessee's use of the Premises. This indemnification and hold harmless provision shall survive the termination of the leasehold interest and the sale of the Premises by Lessor.

18. **INSURANCE:** Lessee shall provide to Lessor certificates of insurance listing the State of Michigan, its several departments, boards, agencies, commissions, officers, and employees as additional insureds, within thirty (30) calendar days following the execution and delivery of this Lease to Lessee, and every year thereafter, for the following insurance coverage. The insurance policies shall provide that they may not be modified, canceled, or allowed to expire without thirty (30) days prior written notice given to Lessor.

a. Lessee shall obtain general liability insurance, naming Lessor, its officers and employees as additional insureds and protecting against all claims, demands, suits, actions or causes of action and judgments, settlements or recoveries, for bodily injury or property damage arising out of a condition of the Premises, or arising in connection with or as a direct or indirect result of the Lessee's use and occupancy of the Premises or its exercise of the right and privileges granted in the Lease. Lessee agrees to maintain a minimum policy limit, in the amount of \$500,000.00 per occurrence for property damage, \$1,000,000.00 per occurrence for bodily injury, and \$2,000,000.00 aggregate.

b. Lessee covenants that it will, during the continuance of the term of this Lease, keep the buildings and improvements now or hereafter located on the Premises, insured by a responsible and reputable insurance company or companies licensed or authorized in the State of Michigan against loss or damage for all risks as are currently embraced in the standard extended coverage endorsement in the State of Michigan, and in an amount equal to the full replacement value of said buildings and improvements.

c. Lessee shall obtain workers compensation insurance for Lessee Employers' claims under Michigan Workers Compensation Act or similar employee benefit act or any other state act applicable to an employee, along with Employer's Liability Insurance for claims for damages because of bodily injury, occupational sickness or disease or death of an employee when workers compensation may not be an exclusive remedy, subject to a limit of liability of not less than \$100,000 each accident.

19. Deleted, not applicable.

20. ACCIDENTS OR PROPERTY DAMAGE: Lessee shall report in writing to the Department Representative, all accidents that result in personal injury or property damage to the Premises or adjacent land. Lessee shall make complete reports in writing to the Department Representative within twenty-four (24) hours of any such incident. Incidents resulting in serious personal injury, death, or property damage to the Premises or adjacent land are to be reported to the Department Representative immediately by telephone or in person. A written report is to follow as described above.

21. **NONDISCRIMINATION:** Lessee shall comply with the Elliott-Larsen Civil Rights Act, 1976 PA 453 as amended, MCL 37.2101 *et seq.*; the Persons with Disabilities Civil Rights Act, 1976 PA 220, as amended, MCL 37.1101 *et seq.*, and all other federal, state and local fair employment practices and equal opportunity laws and covenants that it shall not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment, to be employed in the performance of this real estate contract, with respect to his or her hire, tenure, terms, conditions, or privileges of employment, or any matter directly or indirectly related to employment, because of his or her race, religion, color, national origin, age, sex, height, weight, marital status, or physical or mental disability that is unrelated to the individual's ability to perform the duties of a particular job or position. Lessee agrees to include in every subcontract entered into for the performance of this real estate contract this covenant not to discriminate in employment. A breach of this covenant is a material breach of this Lease. This covenant is cross-referenced in Paragraph 24.

22. UNFAIR LABOR PRACTICES: Lessor shall comply with the Employers Engaging in Unfair Labor Practices Act, 1980 PA 278, as amended, MCL 423.321 *et esq.* This covenant is cross-referenced in Paragraph 24.

23. Deleted

24. **CANCELLATION:** Lessor may cancel this Lease provided Lessee is notified in writing at least thirty (30) calendar days prior to the effective date of cancellation and any one of the following occur:

a. The DNR determines that the Premises are no longer being used for the Purposes identified in this Lease.

b. The DNR determines that Lessee provided the DNR with information, in its application for this Lease or at any time during the Lease term, that was false or fraudulent.

c. Lessee fails to perform any of its obligations under this Lease, and such failure is not cured within ten (10) calendar days after written notice of default to Lessee.

d. Lessee or any subcontractor, manufacturer or supplier of Lessee appears in the register compiled by the Michigan Department of Consumer and Industry Services pursuant to 1980 PA 278, as amended, MCL 423.321 *et seq* (Employers Engaging in Unfair Labor Practices Act). This covenant is cross-referenced in Paragraph 22.

e. Lessee or any subcontractor, manufacturer or supplier of Lessee is found guilty of discrimination, pursuant to 1976 PA 453, as amended, MCL 37.2101 *et seq.*; (Elliott-Larsen Civil Rights Act); or 1976 PA 220, as amended, MCL 37.1101 *et seq.*; (Persons with Disabilities Civil Rights Act). This covenant is cross-referenced in Paragraph 21.

25. **CANCELLATION**: Lessee may cancel this lease due to the death of a key employee or the onset of serious illness of a key employee. Lessee must notify the Lessor of the circumstances leading to such anticipated cancellation within twenty four (24) hours of the onset of the circumstances that may lead to such cancellation.

26. **RESERVATION:** Lessor reserves the right to grant rights-of-way and easements of any kind and nature over and across the Premises and to grant or exercise all other rights and privileges of every kind and nature not herein specifically granted.

27. **HOLDOVER TENANCY:** If Lessee remains in possession of the Premises after the natural expiration of this Lease, with the consent of Lessor but without a renewal of this Lease pursuant to Paragraph 9, a new tenancy from month-to-month shall be created between Lessor and Lessee. The new tenancy shall be subject to all of the terms and conditions of this Lease, except that rent shall then be due and owing at the rate of Four Thousand Seven Hundred Thirty and 00/100 Dollars (\$4,730.00) per annum, and except that such tenancy shall be terminable upon fifteen (15) days written notice served by either party.

28. **TAXES:** If Lessee is a nongovernmental entity, it may be subject to taxation for the Premises as provided in 1953 P.A. 189, as amended, MCL 211.181 *et seq.* Lessee shall be responsible for the payment of any taxes on the Premises.

Lessee's failure to notify the taxing authority of this Lease and/or its failure to pay its pro rata share of real property taxes by the first due date shall be a breach of the Lease. Lessee shall provide

Lessor with paid receipts for any real property taxes within thirty (30) days after the tax due date, if any.

29. **NOTICES:** Any notices to Lessor or to Lessee required by this Lease shall be complete if submitted in writing and transmitted by personal delivery (with signed delivery receipt), or certified or registered mail return receipt requested. Unless either party notifies the other in writing of a different mailing address, notices to Lessor and Lessee shall be transmitted to the addresses listed below:

30. **NOTICES – EFFECTIVE TIME/DATE:** Notices shall be deemed effective as of 12:00 noon Eastern Standard Time on the third business day following the date of mailing, if sent by mail. Business day is defined as any day other than a Saturday, Sunday, legal holiday, or day preceding a legal holiday. A receipt from a U.S. Postal Service, or comparable agency performing such function, shall be conclusive evidence of the date of mailing.

31. **INTERPRETATION:** This Lease shall be interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of Michigan.

32. **NO UNNAMED ENTITIES/PARTNERS:** Lessee covenants that there are no unnamed entities or partners having authority over the operation or management of the Premises and further represents that Lessee is the only entity responsible for carrying out Lessee's responsibilities.

34. **SEVERABLITY:** Should any provision of this Lease or any addenda thereto be found to be illegal or otherwise unenforceable by a court of law, such provision shall be severed from the remainder of the Lease, and such action shall not affect the enforceability of the remaining provisions of the Lease.

35. **REQUIRED APPROVALS**: This Lease shall not be binding or effective on either party until executed (and witnessed and notarized as necessary) by Lessor and Lessee.

36. **ENTIRE AGREEMENT AND ENCLOSURES**: This Lease with the enclosure listed below, constitute the entire agreement between the parties with regard to this transaction and may be amended only in writing and executed in the same manner as this Lease was originally executed.



The State of Michigan, **Department of Natural Resources (DNR)** (the Lessor), and **Tahquamenon Boat Service, Inc.**, 5883 County Road 441, Newberry, MI 49868 (the Lessee), do hereby agree to the terms and conditions of this Addendum to the **Tahquamenon Falls State Park Commercial Use Lease** between the above stated parties executed on March 12, 2004. Where the Lease may conflict with this Addendum, the Addendum shall control the Agreement between the parties.

The Lease shall be amended as follows:

1. Section 5, "Administration", shall be amended as follows:

Parks and Recreation Division (PRD) Western Upper Peninsula District Supervisor (906) 226-1347 is the Department Administrator of this Lease or his or her designated representative (collectively, Department Representative). The Lessee shall designate in writing to Lessor one(1) person and one(1) alternate responsible to be the contact person for Lessee regarding administration of the Lease. This person shall be authorized to make decision regarding the maintenance and operation of the Premises.

2. Section 7, "Term", shall be amended as follows:

Lessor shall lease the Premises to Lessee for a ten(10) year term beginning **January 1, 2014** and ending at midnight on **December 31, 2023**, or later as agreed to by both parties.

3. Section 8, "Rent", shall be amended as follows:

Lessee shall pay to Lessor, rent at the rate of 2,365.00 dollars per annum. Rent shall be paid in full annually by March 1st of each year.

Lessor shall notify Lessee in writing, at least ninety(90) days prior to the expiration of the prior term or extension, of the proposed rent increase for the extended term. Lessee shall notify Lessor in writing within thirty(30) days of receipt of Lessor' notice, of Lessee's acceptance or rejection of Lessor's proposed rental rate for the extended term. In the event an extension option is exercised, all the terms and conditions of this Lease shall continue over the extended term, except that the rental rate shall be adjusted.



Appendix E—Land Transfer

In 2005, Tahquamenon Falls State Park and the Department of Natural Resource's Newberry Forest Management Unit exchanged land, transferring 3,944 acres from the Newberry Unit to Tahquamenon Falls State Park, and 119 acres from the State Park to the Newberry Unit.



Appendix F—Natural Area Documentation

The Conservation Commission originally dedicated six natural areas at Tahquamenon Falls State park in 1954. These include Natural Area Preserves, Nature Study Preserve, and Scenic Sites.

There are no legally-dedicated natural areas currently at Tahquamenon Falls. However, approximately 17,800 acres was tentatively approved for proposed legal dedication in 1987. Though the formal dedication has not yet occurred, the PRD continues to manage these areas in a manner that meets Natural Area legislation.

AUGUST 13, 1954

Dedication of Natural Areas

The following memorandum was presented to the Commission:

April 26, 1954

Memorandum to the Director :

At the last departmental staff meeting we discussed at some length the recommendations of the Michigan Natural Areas Council for the dedication of natural areas in the Tahquamenon Falls and Porcupine Mountains state parks and in the Highland Recreation Area. I believe I am safe in saying that the recommendations of the Natural Areas Council were approved by the staff and that it was your intention that these recommendations be presented to the Commission. They are attached hereto with definitions of the terms used in describing the areas.

It is recommended that they be reviewed and adopted by the Commission.

NATURAL AREAS

Definitions

The following definitions and general rules are recommended for application to the areas referred to in the accompanying report:

NATURAL AREA PRESERVE—An area of land having distinctive natural characteristics, dedicated to the preservation of natural conditions for lasting public enjoyment and educational benefits.

General Rules—The natural area preserve should be kept entirely free from structures of any kind, from cutting or clearing of timber, from altering of water levels, and from stripping bark or removing any vegetation except as follows: Fire lines and primitive foot trails may be provided where necessary for access. Signs may be posted on the boundary and at important points within the area. Simple shelters may be built in remote places where necessary for the protection of trail users. All clearing and construction work required for such purposes should be kept to a minimum and so executed as to retain the natural appearance of the area. The removal of botanical or other specimens should be for scientific purposes only and subject to special permit from the administrative agency. Hunting, fishing, berry picking, and measures for maintaining a normal balance of nature may be permitted but should be so regulated as to retain the natural character of the area.

NATURE STUDY AREA—An area of land having special significance in natural history, dedicated for the preservation of natural conditions in combination with the development and use of facilities for conservation education, the study and enjoyment of nature, and/or research in the fields of conservation and natural science.

General Rules—Such improvements as access roads, parking areas, nature trails, museums, and other facilities for public convenience and use may be provided. Projects for research in natural science would be appropriate. In providing improvements the dominant natural features should be preserved, and the natural appearance of the area as a whole should be retained.

SCENIC SITE—An area of land having unusual scenic values, dedicated for the preservation and enjoyment of natural beauty.

General Rules—The scenic features should be made available to the public by providing necessary improvements, such as access trails, roads, parking places and facilities for comfort and convenience. All improvements should be so located and made as to preserve the natural scenery. Planting exotic trees and other exotic plants, collecting or removing plants, and stripping bark, should not be permitted. Cutting or trimming trees should not be permitted except for necessary improvements and for enhancing views. NATURE RESERVATION—An area of land having distinctive natural features set aside for maximum preservation of natural conditions consistent with the development and use of facilities for the enjoyment of nature and extensive types of recreation, and for the proper operation of the administrative unit.

General Rules—A nature reservation may contain one or more natural area preserves, nature study areas, scenic sites and/or conservation projects, each of which would be subject to the general rules applying thereto. Elsewhere in the reservation such improvements as access road, trails, parking areas and other facilities required for appropriate public uses would be permissible. Utilities and services required for the administration of adjacent lands would be permitted. All such improvements, however, should be so adjusted as to preserve the natural features that distinguish the reservation. The surroundings of any included units should be preserved in as natural a state as feasible, as buffer areas, and the whole reservation should retain a natural appearance. Areas for intensive recreation and other activities which might change or destroy the natural history values of the reservation should not be permitted.

RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE MICHIGAN CONSERVATION COMMISSION

by the MICHIGAN NATURAL AREAS COUNCIL for the dedication of natural areas in and near TAHQUAMENON FALLS STATE PARK

INTRODUCTION

This is an outstanding park with impressive scenic features and a wide variety of natural beauty. Much of the attraction which sets this park apart is due to its primeval forest and the wilderness character of the region. Reasonable access obviously is necessary and certain improvements are required for public service, but overdevelopment, or reduction of its wilderness character, or domination of the natural scenery by man-made structures, would seriously impair the attractions which now distinguish the area. It is our conviction that by properly zoning areas for public use it is possible to permanently preserve the natural beauty inherent in the region, and at the same time provide for its full enjoyment by all segments of the public. Toward this end we offer the following:

RECOMMENDATIONS

It is recommended that the Conservation Commission dedicate certain areas in the Tahquamenon Falls State Park, and in the Lake Superior State Forest adjacent thereto, as depicted on the attached map and described below:

1. SOUTHSIDE NATURAL AREA PRESERVE, comprising all state-owned land in the park project south of the Tahquamenon River between the Upper and Lower Falls, exclusive of sites at the falls and exclusive of those descriptions involved in exchanges approved by the Commission, April 16, 1952.

Land Description

This areas is more particularly described as:

All state wowned land south of the Tahquamenon River in the $S_{\overline{2}}^{1}$ of Sec. 31, 32 and 33, T 49 N, R 7 W; Sec. 4, 5 and 6, T 48 N, R 7 W, except the $E_{\overline{2}}^{1}$ of $SE_{\overline{4}}^{1}$ and the $SW_{\overline{4}}^{1}$ of $SE_{\overline{4}}^{1}$ of Sec. 6; and Sec. 12, T 48 N, R 8 W, except the $NW_{\overline{4}}^{1}$ and the $SE_{\overline{4}}^{1}$ of $SW_{\overline{4}}^{1}$ and the $S_{\overline{2}}^{1}$ of $SE_{\overline{4}}^{1}$.

Justification

Although the original pine was removed and some hemlock timber has been cut in the past, this area has the aspect of a primeval forest. The terrain varies from steep slopes, cut with deep ravines, to flat, swampy areas near the mouths of tributary streams. The soil is mostly heavy clay and sandstone debris. The timber is mixed hardwood and hemlock with scattered white pines on the upland and a cedar-white birch complex on the low ground. Because of its present unspoiled condition, its rugged terrain, and its isolated location, we believe the best use of this area would be as a natural area preserve and that development should be limited to simple foot trails.

2. OLD TRAIL NATURAL AREA PRESERVE, comprising all state-owned land between the Newberry-Paradise County Road and a line at least a quarter-mile north and west of the old Big Falls Trail, exclusive of an area at the park headquarters, and exclusive of a 10-rod strip along the county road right of way.

Land Description

This area is more particularly described as:

All state-owned land between a line 10 rods northwesterly of the right of way of the Newberry-Paradise County Road and a line running north from the center of Sec. 11, T 48 N, R 8 W, to the center of Sec. 35, T 49 N, R 8 W; thence east one-half mile, north one-half mile, east one-half mile, and north one-half mile to the center of Sec. 25; thence east on quarter lines to the center of Sec. 29, T 49 N, R 7 W; thence south to the county road; exclusive of the headquarters area of approximately 40 acres near the center of Sec. 31.

Justification

This area combines a variety of features of scenic and scientific interest. Blended in it are ancient moraines covered with hardwood-hemlock forest, heavily wooded sand dunes marking an early border of the Great Lakes, cedar swamps, and a succession of old shore ridges interspersed with swales and muskegs. Plant growth in great variety follows the pattern of the land formations = hardwood timber on the heavy soil, pines on the sandy ridges, cedar and white birch in some low places, stunted spruce, shrubby plants and mosses in swales and muskegs. Because of its natural beauty, its display of ecological processes, and its scientific values, we believe that this area should be set aside as a natural area preserve, with development limited to primitive-type trails. We believe that the old Big Falls Trail, because of its historic interest and potential usefulness, should be developed and maintained in a manner compatible with a natural area preserve and consistent with its early use.

3. BETSY LAKE NATURAL AREA PRESERVE, comprising an area in the Lake Superior State Forest north and northwest of the Tahquamenon Falls State Park, including Betsy, Clark and Sheephead lakes, and distinctive natural features surrounding them.

Land Description

This area is more particularly described as:

All state=owned land in that part of the Lake Superior State Forest bounded on the north by the south boundary of the Betsy River Road; on the west by the west lines of Sec. 9, 16, 21, 28 and 33, T 49 N, R 8 W, and on the south, east and northeast by a line running from the southwest corner of Sec. 33, T 49 N, R 8 W, east to the south quarter post of Sec. 35; thence north one-half mile, east one-half mile, north one-half mile, east one-half mile, north one-half mile and east one-half mile to the east quarter post of Sec. 25, T 49 N, R 8 W; thence east one and onehalf miles and north one-half mile to the north quarter post of Sec. 29; T 49 N, R 7 W; thence east on the north line of Sec. 29, 28, 27 and 26 to the west boundary of the Newberry-Paradise County Road; thence northerly and northwesterly along the westerly boundary of the Newberry-Paradise County Road and the Farm Truck Trail to the Betsy River Road.

Justification

Bordered with wooded sand dunes, evergreen swamps and open marshland, Betsy, Clark, and Sheephead lakes have distinctive natural beauty. They are set in a region suggestive of the far north - a wilderness, not of heavy forest, but of muskeg, sandy ridges and broad open spaces; of picturesque pines, stunted spruce and struggling vegetation. Its timber potential is slight and greatly outweighed by its scientific values, its natural beauty and its character of remoteness. We believe that this area should be preserved permanently in a natural state and that development should be limited to primitive foot trails.

4. BETWEEN-FALLS NATURE STUDY AREA, comprising the land between the Upper and Lower Falls northwest of the Tahquamenon River and southeast of the Newberry-Paradise County Road; exclusive of areas at both falls, an area at the park headquarters, and a 10-rod strip along the county road right of way.

Land Description

This area is more particularly described as:

Those parts of the following descriptions lying north and west of the Tahquamenon River and southeasterly of a line 10 rods from the right of way of the Newberry-Paradise County Road; the $SW_{\frac{1}{4}}$ of Sec. 29, Sec. 31 except the headquarters area of approximately 40 acres, near the center of the section, and the $W_{\frac{1}{2}}$ of Sec. 32, T 49 N, R 7 W; the $S_{\frac{1}{2}}$ of Sec. 36, T 49 N, R 8 W; Sec. 1, except the $S_{\frac{1}{2}}$ of $SW_{\frac{1}{4}}$; and the NE $\frac{1}{4}$ of Sec. 12, T 48 N, R 8 W; and entire Sec. 6, T 48 N, R 7 W.

Justification

A large part of this area is rugged with high banks, ridges and steep slopes broken with sharp ravines which widen in places near the river. Clay soils and sandstone debris mark much of the area. The tree growth is mostly hardwood and hemlock with scattered white pine and cedar. The forest is exceptional in its density, in the grouping of species, and in the huge size of individual trees.

This a rea also incorporates a section of wooded sand dunes, old shore ridges, bogs and muskegs, with vegetation in sharp contrast to the big timber. Because of its distinctive natural features, its accessibility, and its significance for nature education, we believe that the best use of this area would be as a nature study area, with the natural conditions preserved to the greatest extent feasible.

- 5. UPPER FALLS SCENIC SITE, described as: All state-owned land southeast of the Newberry-Paradise County Road in the $S_2^{\frac{1}{2}}$ of $SW_4^{\frac{1}{2}}$, Sec. 1, and the $NW_4^{\frac{1}{2}}$ of Sec. 12, T 48 N, R 8 W.
- 6. LOWER FALLS SCENIC SITE, described as those parts of the following descriptions west of the entrance road and campground: that part of the SE¹/₄ of Sec. 29, south of the Newberry-Paradise County Road, and the NE¹/₄ of Sec. 32, T 49 N, R 7 W.

Justification

To a large proportion of the public the falls unquestionably are the greatest attraction of the park. We believe, however, that this appeal is not due to the falls alone, but largely to their setting in natural surroundings. While recognizing that adequate provisions for public use are required, we believe that improvements should be limited to essentials and kept in harmony with the natural features. We believe that dedicating the falls areas as scenic sites would aid in permanent preservation and would promote public appreciation of the falls.

SUPPLEMENT TO

RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE MICHIGAN CONSERVATION COMMISSION

by the

MICHICAN NATURAL AREAS COUNCIL for the dedication of natural areas in and near TAHQUAMENON FALLS STATE PARK

INTRODUCTION

During study of potential natural areas the Council was impressed with the desirability of certain measures that would be in the public interest, although not vital to the dedication of the natural areas as recommended. Accordingly, these matters are presented independently of the recommendations for natural areas for such consideration as they may merit.

SUCCESTIONS

A. FOOT TRAILS

To increase public enjoyment while preserving the natural beauty of the park it is suggested that primitive foot trails be provided as follows:

- 1. North River Trail on the north side of the Tahquamenon River, between the Lower and Upper Falls.
- 2. South River Trail on the south side of the Tahquamenon River, between the Lower and Upper Falls.
- 3. <u>Old Big Falls Trail</u> following the old blazed trail from a point on the Clark Lake Trail to the Upper Falls.
- 4. <u>High Ridge Trail</u> southeast from the Lower Falls, along the high ranges of old sand dunes to the existing auto trail at the lower end of the river.

B. WILDERNESS ASPECT

It is suggested that dead and over mature trees that constitute a hazard along roads, parking lots, and the like, be removed with a minimum change in the natural appearance of the forest.

In case of need for harvesting timber in the future it is suggested that such harvesting be confined to parts well away from the river and other distinctive features, and well outside of any dedicated natural areas, and then limited to selective cutting that would not detract from the natural appearance of the park as a whole.

C. PARK BOUNDARIES

A number of adjustments in boundaries appear desirable for extending the park service and protecting park values, by including in one unit those features of special park significance that distinguish the region. Logical boundaries would promote public knowledge and enjoyment of the park and would simplify planning, management and public information. Changes are suggested in the park boundaries approximately as shown on the attached map and described as follows:

1. Northwest Boundary

In the northwest end of the park the present boundary eliminates from the park a corner of Sec. 36, southeast of the (ounty road, that obviously should be in the park. It also eliminates a stretch of the old Big Falls Trail which has decided park significance and we believe should be wholly in the park.

2. South Boundary

The lower river is an outstanding feature. To permanently protect the public values in it we believe that the boundary should be expanded to include a strip along the south bank, and that ownership should ultimately be acquired by the state.

3. North Boundary

The section incorporating Camp Ten Lakes and a rough area of high wooded dunes surrounding them is scenic in itself and presents spectacular views of the river valley, Whitefish Bay, and distant mountains in Canada. Access is by the Timberlost Trail. We believe that these features have great significance to the park and that they should be wholly within the park project.

It appears to us that more space north of the county road in the vicinity of the Lower Falls would be desirable, to provide ample buffer and greater flexibility in development.

More buffer area also appears desirable along the north side of the lower river. While a boundary to incorporate these features and advantages would be somewhat flexible, the one suggested appears logical because it is simple, direct and almost entirely on section lines.

Memorandum to the Natural Resources Commission

SUBJECT: Request for Tentative Approval for Dedication of Tahquamenon Falls Natural Area

Authority

Act 241 of the Public Acts of 1972 authorizes the Natural Resources Commission to establish and regulate wilderness, wild, and natural areas on State owned, Department managed lands.

Discussion and Background

The proposed natural area is a 17,800 acre tract located in Chippewa and Luce counties in the western half of Tahquamenon State Park. All of the proposed natural area is State owned. It includes diverse geological and biological features of high quality, and the scenic beauty of the second largest waterfall east of the Mississippi. Sufficient land has been reserved from the site to allow for future planned park facilities.

The Natural Resources Commission granted permission to hold a public hearing on the proposal at its March 1987 Commission meeting. A notice of the public hearing was published in the Detroit News, Marquette Mining Journal, and the St. Ignace News. The Office of Public Information issued a press release to newspapers, radio and television stations throughout the State.

On July 8, 1987, public hearings were held in Paradise and Newberry, Michigan. Ten individuals attended and filled out attendance cards. Six letters were received during the time the hearing record remained open. All letters received were in support of the proposal. Persons speaking at the public hearing were generally not supportive, in part because of restrictions on use of motor boats on the inland lakes after dedication.

Attached is a location map, the draft administrative rule describing the site, and the Administrative Rule Report on the 17,800 acre site proposed for dedication under the Wilderness and Natural Areas Act.

Recommendation

Staff is recommending that the Natural Resources Commission grant tentative approval to the proposed rules dedicating Tahquamenon Falls Natural Area under the Wilderness and Natural Areas Act.
