

Special Education

Special education helps children at school. [Project Find](#) helps connect any child who is suspected of having a disability and who may need special education to services. For more information, visit [BuildUpMi.org](#) or dial the Michigan Special Education Line at 1-888-320-8384.

Financial Support

State and federal programs help many families. Eligibility is based on a child's diagnosis and family income.

[Supplemental Security Income \(SSI\)](#) is a federal program for some children with disabilities. Monthly payments go to families with children who qualify. To learn more, call the Social Security Administration at 1-800-772-1213 or visit [ssa.gov](#) and search for SSI.

The [Family Support Subsidy Program](#) provides monthly payments. Families with a child who has severe cognitive impairment or autism spectrum disorder may qualify. Apply through your local Community Mental Health Services Program. Visit [Michigan.gov/michiganmentalhealth](#) and look under 'Children & Families.'

The [Children with Special Needs Fund](#) helps pay for special equipment. Families with a child eligible for Children's Special Health Care Services (CSHCS) may qualify. Apply at your local health department or by calling 1-800-359-3722.

Genetic Counseling

Genetics clinics help families learn more about a child's diagnosis. They answer questions about what to expect in the future and if the same condition may affect other family members. The Michigan Genetics Resource Center and the Michigan Association of Genetic Counselors have information about genetics clinics in the state. Facts about Michigan's Birth Defects Registry

- * More than 7,000 infants and toddlers with birth defects, chronic illnesses and developmental disabilities are identified each year.
- * Michigan law requires hospitals and medical labs to report certain health conditions to the MBDR.
- * Information in the MBDR is confidential.
- * The MBDR helps Michigan families get information, services and support.
- * Registry data is used to track the rate of birth defects, develop prevention plans, and help communities improve services.

After the birth or adoption of a child with special needs, parents sometimes have questions. Families may wonder where to get help. There are many programs in Michigan. Most are free. Many are run by parents who want to share information. This pamphlet explains some of the resources available to families who have children with special needs. Your family might benefit from these services now or in the future.



Family Support

MDHHS [Birth Defects Education and Outreach Program](#) helps with referrals for support and services. The program provides information for families and health care providers. The [Family Center for Children and Youth with Special Health Care Needs](#) has information and support for families of children with all types of special needs. Families may apply for scholarships to help cover the costs of summer camp and educational conferences. Hospice/Palliative Care

Hospice and palliative care programs serve children with life-limiting conditions. Some programs offer care and support *during pregnancy* when a life-limiting condition has been diagnosed in a family's unborn child. [Early On® Michigan](#) is one of the most important supports for children with special needs. It provides services for eligible children from birth to age three, which may include:

- Family training (skill building)
- Counseling (family, group or individual)
- Home visits
- Special instruction (teaching)
- Speech pathology
- Hearing and vision services
- Occupational therapy
- Physical therapy
- Psychological services
- Service coordination
- Diagnostic medical services
- Screening
- Assessment services
- Health services
- Nursing services
