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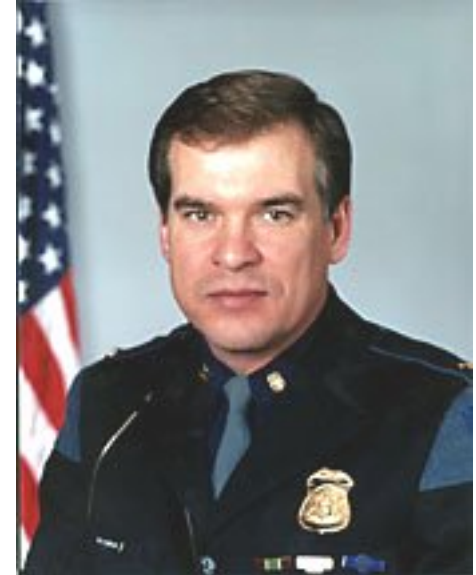
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FOREWORD



This constitutes the 39th *Crime in Michigan* annual report prepared by the Uniform Crime Reporting Program pursuant to PA 319 of 1968, as amended.

The Department of State Police truly appreciates the cooperation and support of over 600 police departments, sheriffs' offices, and specialized law enforcement agencies that provide offense and arrest data for the report. The contributions of all involved in the collection and preparation of this report provide a clear picture of the nature, volume, and extent of crime in Michigan. Without the concerted and dedicated effort of the people who serve in the many local and state agencies which comprise our criminal justice system, publication of this report would not be possible.



Michigan is the tenth state to be certified nationally to report criminal incident data in compliance with specifications established through the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The implementation of this statewide program is still taking place. Some agencies are reporting through the old system while others are reporting on the new system called Michigan Incident Crime Reporting (MICR). Other agencies are in a testing phase of transition.

Statistics indicate that total crime in 1997 decreased by 6.7% from last year. The violent crimes of murder, rape, aggravated assault, and robbery showed a decrease of 8.6% from 1996 figures. Total property crimes, consisting of burglary, larceny, and motor vehicle theft also showed a decrease of 4.9%. Although, murder and arson, both index crimes, increased by 3.1% and 11.8%, respectively. Total arrests decreased by 3.7% in 1997. Juveniles (age 16 and under) accounted for 9.7% of all those arrested.

This report, when analyzed, can significantly contribute to management and planning activities at local, state, and federal levels, especially by state officials, the law enforcement community, the legislature, and nonprofit organizations.

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1997 Uniform Crime Report Overview of Michigan



MICHIGAN



Michigan is the eighth most populated state in the United States, with a population of 9,295,297. Michigan's two peninsulas are divided into 83 counties, with about half of the population clustered in the southeast Lower Peninsula, and less than 5% in the Upper Peninsula. According to the 1990 Census, 70.5% of Michigan residents live in urban and 29.5% in rural areas. Twenty-six percent of the population is under 18 years of age and 11.9% is over 65. The U.S. Census Bureau estimates that the population of Michigan has grown 5.1% since 1990 and ranks 34th in rate of population growth. The population is projected to continue growing at a steady pace through the year 2025, with the greatest increases in the northwest Lower Peninsula.

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PUBLIC ACT 319 of 1968 (as amended)



28.251 *Uniform crime reports; duties of police departments to file; contents.*

Sec. 1. The police department of each city or village, any duly constituted police department of a township, and the sheriff's department of each county, once each month upon a date and form prescribed and furnished by the director of the department of state police, shall forward to the department of state police a crime report. Each reporting department shall report only on cases within its jurisdiction and upon which it is making, or has made, the primary police investigation. The report shall be called the uniform crime report and shall cover crimes reported and otherwise processed during the month preceding the month of the report. It shall contain the number and nature of offenses committed, the disposition of such offenses and such other information as the director of state police shall specify relating to the method, frequency, cause and prevention of crime. Under no circumstances shall the name of any person be reported.

28.252 *Compilation of monthly uniform crime reports; use.*

Sec. 2. Upon receipt of the monthly uniform crime reports from the reporting agencies, the department of state police shall prepare a statewide compilation of the statistics contained therein and the resulting statistical compilation shall be available to any governmental law enforcement agency in the state, the judiciary committees of the Michigan state senate and the Michigan state house of representatives, and the federal bureau of investigation, upon request. The statistics made available through the uniform crime report shall be used for the purpose of studying the causes, trends and effects of crime in this state and for intelligence upon which to base a more sound program of crime detection and prevention and the apprehension of criminals.

28.253 *Voluntary crime reports; inclusion in compilation.*

Sec. 3. Any governmental police agency, not falling within the description of those required to submit the monthly uniform crime report set forth in section 1, which desires to submit such a report, shall be furnished with the proper forms by the department of state police. When a report is received by the department of state police from a governmental police agency not required to make such report, the information contained therein shall be included within the monthly compilation provided for in section 2.

28.254 *Reports of wanted persons and stolen vehicles.*

Sec. 4. The chief of police of each city or village and of each township having a police department, and the sheriff of each county within this state, shall report to the department of state police, in a manner prescribed by the department, all persons wanted by, and all vehicles stolen from, their primary police jurisdictions. The report shall be made as soon as is practical after the investigating department either

ascertains that a vehicle is stolen or obtains a warrant for an individual's arrest or determines that they have reasonable grounds to believe that the individual committed a crime. In no case shall this time exceed 12 hours after the reporting agency determines that it has grounds to believe that a vehicle was stolen or that the wanted person should be arrested.

28.255 *Reports of apprehension or recovery.*

Sec. 5. When at any time after making a report required by section 4 it is determined by the reporting agency that a person is no longer wanted because of his apprehension, or any other factor, and when a vehicle reported stolen under section 4 is recovered, the chief of police or sheriff of the reporting agency shall immediately notify the department of state police in a manner prescribed by the department.

28.256 *Inapplicability of act as to traffic misdemeanor.*

Sec. 6. The provisions of this act do not apply to misdemeanor traffic cases or to persons wanted for misdemeanor traffic offenses, or for the violation of any city, village or township ordinance. The provisions of this act shall not be construed to in any way affect existing or future laws and procedures governing the reporting of persons wanted for traffic law violations or for the violation of city, village or township ordinances. History: 1968, Act 319, Imd. Eff. 7/3/68.

28.257 *Crimes of domestic assault; report to state police ; contents.*

Sec. 7. The chief of police of each city or village, the chief of police of each township having a police department, and the sheriff of each county within this state shall report to the department of state police, in a manner prescribed by the department, the following information related to crimes of domestic assault:

- a. The number of assaults reported which involve an adult and a minor and the disposition of those offenses.
- b. The number of assaults reported which involve 2 male adults or 2 female adults and the disposition of those offenses.
- c. The number of assaults reported which involve 1 male adult and 1 female adult and the disposition of those offenses.
- d. The number of assaults reported which involve a person and his or her spouse and the disposition of those offenses.
- e. Other statistics the director of the department of state police considers necessary to obtain accurate and reliable data on the incidence of domestic assault in this state.

28.257a *Crimes motivated by prejudice or bias; report.*

Sec. 7a. The chief of police of each city or village, the chief of police of each township having a police department, and the sheriff of each county within this state shall report to the department of state police, in a manner prescribed by the department, information specified under section 1 related to crimes motivated by prejudice or bias based upon race, ethnic origin, religion, gender, or sexual orientation. History: Add. 1991, Act 172, Eff. 3/30/92.

Sec. 8. DOES NOT APPLY TO UCR.

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Uniform Crime Reporting System



Michigan participates in a voluntary national program to collect crime statistics. The program is administered by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The state's Uniform Crime Reporting system was instituted in 1959 when the State Police requested all law enforcement agencies voluntarily submit crime data to them for the purpose of compiling a uniform crime report. The Michigan Uniform Crime Reporting program (UCR) is designed to meet federal reporting requirements as well as to provide detailed information for state law enforcement agencies.

The number of participating agencies was small in the beginning. The larger agencies made up the majority of the contributors. The enactment of Michigan Public Act 319 in 1968, making submission of crime data mandatory, greatly spurred the growth of the program. Smaller agencies began to participate as well as campus police departments and airport security police.

Initially, only summary data was collected. Since the introduction of incident based reporting in 1976, the Michigan UCR program has operated dual systems. The main difference between the summary and incident based system is the degree of detail in reporting. Agencies submitting **SUMMARY DATA** report aggregate counts of offense and arrest information for both index and non-index crimes. The types of data collected include the number of offenses, clearances, types, and values of stolen and recovered property, and the age, race, and sex of persons who are arrested. Under the **INCIDENT SYSTEM**, agencies collect more detailed information regarding individual crime incidents and arrests. This information is submitted by incident using prescribed data elements and data values to describe each incident and arrest.

Due to the great variation in definitions of criminal offenses, standardized definitions were adopted for all offenses to provide nationwide uniformity. Reporting agencies are required to submit data in accordance with these national definitions. Offenses were divided into Index and Non-Index categories. Because of their seriousness and frequency of occurrence, eight offenses (murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft, and arson) comprise the crime index and serve as indicators of our nation's crime experience. Unfounded complaints are not included in the crime tables. Sub-categories are added for the index offenses of robbery, assault, burglary, and larceny to provide a more detailed look at these offenses. Agencies also provide statistics on domestic assaults and bias crime. When reporting incidents where law enforcement officers are killed or assaulted, a separate paper report is required by all law enforcement agencies.

Michigan's old UCR program supports various levels of submission ranging from manually processed

forms, automated tapes, to on-line data collection. The majority of contributors participate in the incident based system, reporting three-fourths of the state's crime statistics. The remaining agencies report on the summary system. Information submitted through both these systems provides a comprehensive database to define the type and extent of crime in Michigan. Data is extracted monthly and submitted to the FBI Uniform Crime Reporting program summary system. Each contributing agency reports offenses or arrests for offenses committed within its jurisdiction. These offenses represent violations of Michigan statutes and local ordinances. Crime figures presented in this report are law enforcement statistics submitted to the federal program and are not to be confused with judicial or penal statistics.

Following several years of extensive study requested by the International Association of Chiefs of Police and the National Sheriffs Association, **BLUEPRINT FOR THE FUTURE OF THE UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING PROGRAM**, published in 1985, provided the guidelines and specifications used to develop the National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS). In 1988, this incident based system was unanimously endorsed by the nation's law enforcement community. Implementation began in 1989. In 1989, the Michigan UCR Program, with the endorsement of the MACP and MSA, applied for a federal grant to redesign the state program. The grant was approved in 1990 and ended June 30, 1995. Eventually, all agencies will be on one incident system, called Michigan Incident Crime Reporting (MICR) and when fully implemented, summary collection of data will cease. MICR began implementation in 1994. 457 agencies were submitting MICR data for all or a portion of 1997. The new system retains two calendar years of data on the on-line database, providing less chance of error, access to current year and previous year data, along with the ability to provide comparison reports. The redesigned system provides the descriptive characteristics and tools necessary for managing resources, policy analysis, program development and research.

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COMMENTARY ON 1997 CRIME DATA



The information presented in this report provides a study of crime location, frequency and type of offenses and arrests. It can be used to assist law enforcement agencies in identifying crime patterns. It should not be used as a measure of an individual agency's workload.

OFFENSE ESTIMATION

These statistics may not be compared to the FBI. The FBI estimates for states are computed by assigning the same proportional crime volumes to partial and non-reporting local agencies. The size of the agency, type of jurisdiction, and geographic location are considered in the estimation process. Crime in Michigan does not estimate. It is a tabulation by county of local agencies' actual reported crime. Michigan's annual report trending is figured by total population (non-reporting or partial reporting jurisdictions' populations are included).

CRIME FACTORS

When reviewing and comparing crime statistics, it is important to keep in mind that many factors affect the type and volume of crime that occurs in a given area. These factors have a great impact on the incidence of crime:

- Economic conditions, including median income and job availability
- Composition of the population (age, sex, race)
- Density and size of the population (urban vs. rural)
- Climate, including seasonal weather conditions
- Relative stability of population (seasonal, transient)
- Effective strength of the police force
- Educational, recreational, and religious characteristics
- Attitude of public toward law and enforcement problems
- Degree of adherence to crime reporting standards
- Policies of the prosecuting officials and the courts
- Administrative and investigative emphases of local law enforcement

CRIME RATES

In this publication, a crime rate is represented by the number of crimes reported for each 100,000

population. It provides a measure of the severity of a crime problem within a given jurisdiction. The rate is calculated by multiplying the number of offenses by 100,000. That number is then divided by the population of the service jurisdiction based on 1990 census figures.

When using this rate for comparisons, keep in mind that certain large cities and tourist areas report crime that may be the result of transient populations. The crime rates for these areas do not reflect these special populations. Also, student populations for colleges and universities are used only to compute the crime rate for the facility, not for county and total state rates.

MICR STATUS REPORT

Local law enforcement agencies are making progress implementing the Michigan Incident Crime Reporting program (MICR). Criminal data is accepted from local law enforcement agencies by forms, on-line, bulletin board, and tape/cassette. Goals being pursued in Michigan are to have all agencies reporting MICR by the year 2000, to eliminate paper submission, and to make data accessible over the Internet at <http://www.msp.state.mi.us..>

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Crime In Michigan 1997 Statistics



The number of index crime offenses reported to Michigan law enforcement agencies in 1997 decreased 5.2% compared to 1996 figures. These offenses consist of murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft, and arson.

Total property crimes, consisting of burglary, larceny, and motor vehicle theft, showed a decrease from the 1996 figures. The net overall decrease for property crime is 4.9%.

Total violent crimes, consisting of murder, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault, also showed a decrease from the 1996 figures. The net overall decrease for violent crimes is 8.6%.

Total crime, which includes index and non-index offenses, is down 6.7% from last year. A crime rate of 11,151 per 100,000 population equates to one reported crime for every nine Michigan residents.

Most index crimes have decreased from 1996. Rape is down 11.3%, robbery is down 14.2%, aggravated assault is down 5.8%, burglary is down 10.3%, larceny is down 3.1%, and motor vehicle theft is down 4.9%. Murder has increased 3.1%. Arson has increased by 11.8%, however, it is not included in the violent or property crime statistics. Total arrests were down 3.7% in 1997. Juveniles (age 16 and under) accounted for 9.7% of all those arrested.

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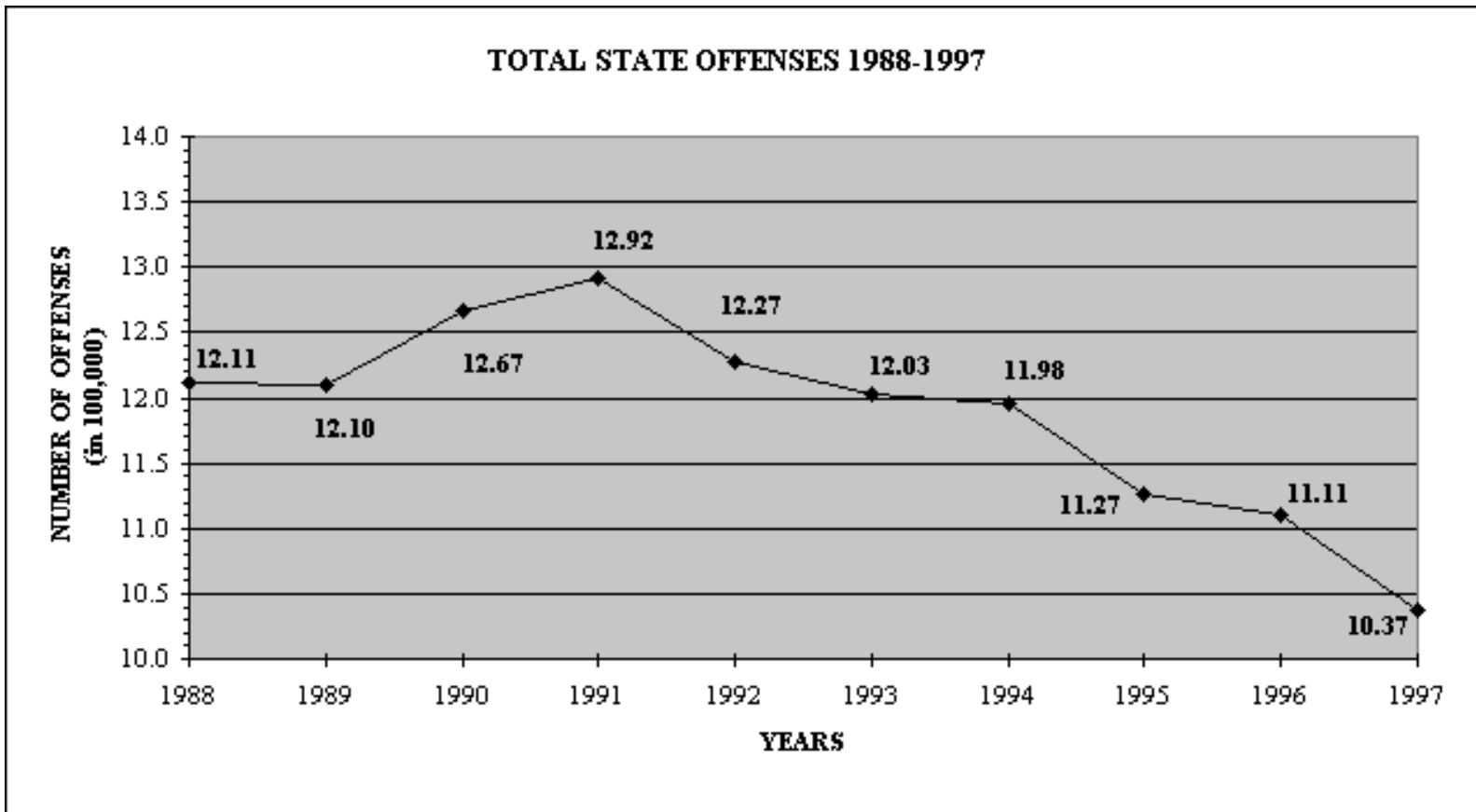

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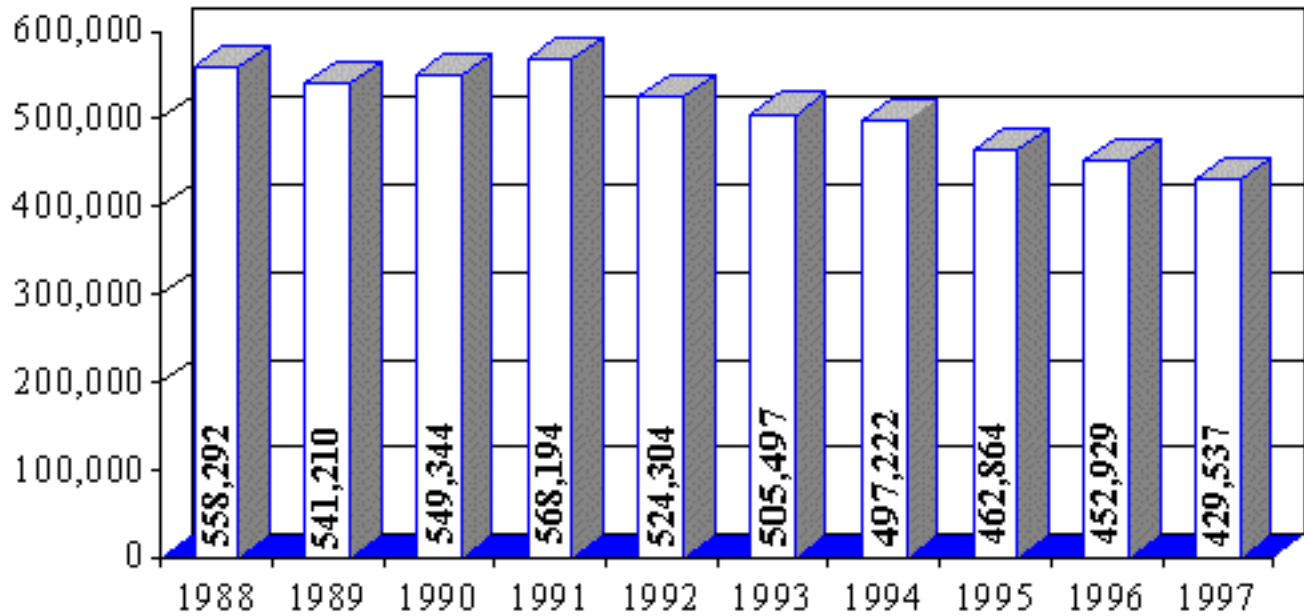

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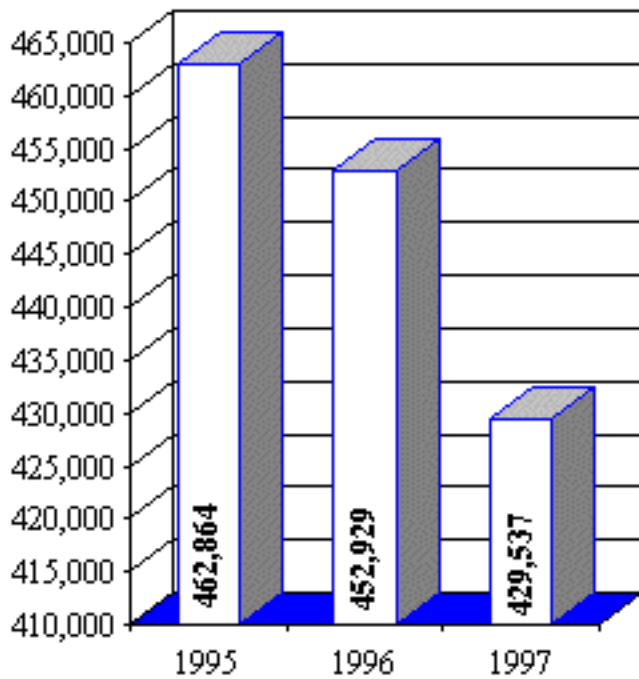

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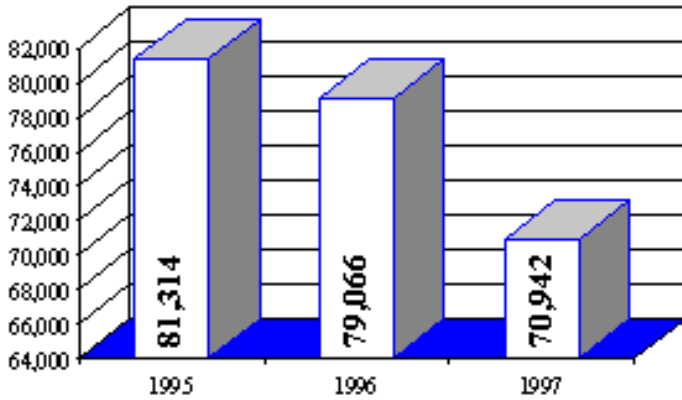

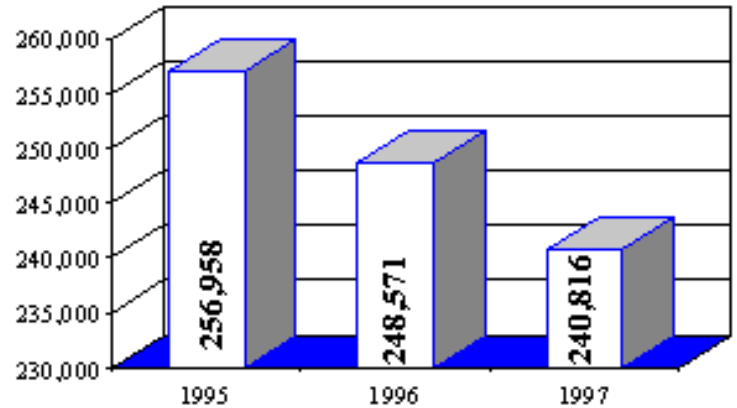
STATE TOTAL INDEX CRIME OFFENSES BY TYPE MICHIGAN 1995-1997 PROPERTY CRIME



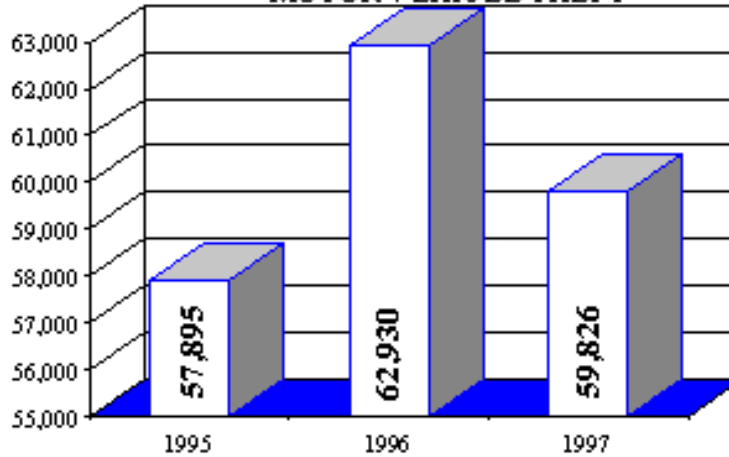

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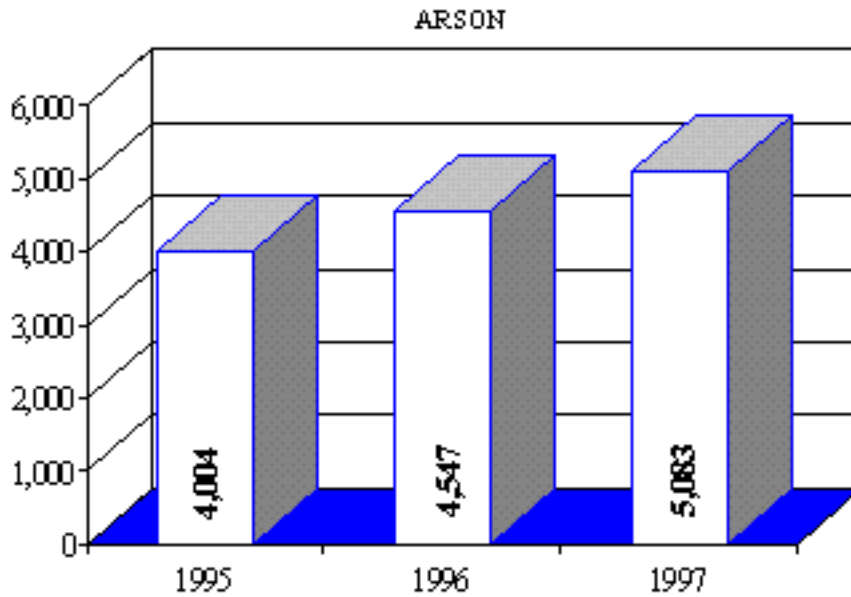

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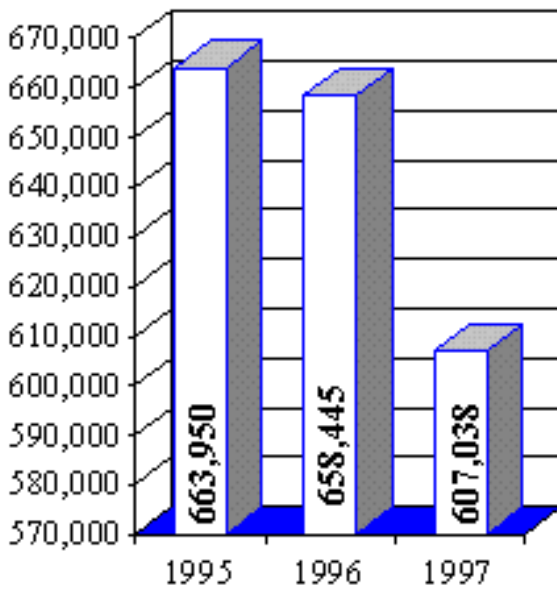

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-A-

AGGRAVATED ASSAULT - An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault is usually accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm.

ARREST - To seize and hold by legal authority.

ARSON - The willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft.

AUTOMATIC WEAPON - Any firearm which shoots, or is designed to shoot, more than one shot at a time by a single pull of the trigger without manual reloading.

-B-

BIAS CRIME - A criminal offense committed against a person or property which is motivated, in whole or in part, by the offender's bias against a race, religion, ethnic/national origin, sexual orientation or disability group.

BURGLARY - The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. Breaking and entering into motor vehicles is classified as larceny.

-C-

CLEARANCE - The solution of a particular crime, either by the arrest of the offender or through an exceptional clearance.

CLEARANCE BY ARREST - When an offender has been identified, sufficient evidence to formally charge the suspect has been obtained, and the offender has been ordered to appear in court.

CRIME RATE - Relates the incidence of crime to population, so that it can be compared uniformly without regard to population size. In this release the rate is calculated by multiplying the number of offenses by 100,000. That number is then divided by the population of the service jurisdiction based on 1990 census figures.

-D-

DISORDERLY CONDUCT - An offense which disturbs the peace and tranquility of the community in general.

DRIVING UNDER THE INFLUENCE - The driving or operating of any vehicle while under the influence of liquor or drugs.

-E-

EMBEZZLEMENT - The illegal taking, misapplying, or misappropriating of money, or other things of value which have been entrusted to his/her care, custody, or control.

EXCEPTIONAL CLEARANCE - Made when an investigation has established an offender, there is enough information to support an arrest charge, and the location of the offender is known, but there is a reason outside police control that prevents arresting, charging and prosecuting the offender.

-F-

FAMILY OFFENSE - Any non-violent offense by a member of the family which threatens the unity, physical welfare, economic welfare, or morals of members of the family.

FATAL INJURY - Any injury which results in death.

FORGERY & COUNTERFEITING - The making, altering, uttering, or possessing with intent to defraud, anything false in the semblance of that which is true.

FRAUD - The conversion and obtaining of money or property by false pretense.

-G-

GAMBLING - Unlawful engaging in playing, operating, or assisting in operating a game of chance for money or some other stake.

GAY - Of or relating to males who experience a sexual attraction toward, and responsiveness to, other

males.

-H-

HETEROSEXUAL - Of or relating to persons who experience a sexual attraction toward, and responsiveness to, members of the opposite sex.

HOMOSEXUAL - Of or relating to persons who experience a sexual attraction toward, and responsiveness to, members of their own sex.

-I-

INCAPACITATING INJURY - Any injury other than fatal which prevents normal activities and generally requires hospitalization.

INCIDENT - One or more offenses committed by a person or group of persons acting together, at the same time and place.

INDEX CRIME - Because of their seriousness and frequency of occurrence, eight offenses (murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft, and arson) are designated as Index Crimes. They serve as indicators of the nation's crime experience.

INTIMIDATION - To discourage, inhibit, or frighten by threats.

-J-

JURISDICTION - The geographical range of authority.

JUVENILE - The definition of a juvenile differs for Federal and Michigan law. Under Federal law a juvenile is a person who is under 18, and under Michigan law a juvenile is a person who is under 17.

-L-

LARCENY - Larceny is the unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another.

LESBIAN - Of or relating to females who experience a sexual attraction toward, and responsiveness to, other females.

LIQUOR LAWS - Unlawfully acquiring, manufacturing, transporting, selling, or possessing intoxicating alcoholic liquor.

-M-

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT - The theft or attempted theft of a self-propelled vehicle that runs on land and not on rails. "Joy riding" is included in this classification. Carjacking is classified as a robbery.

MURDER - A willful killing of one human being by another.

MICR - Michigan Incident Crime Reporting is the Uniform Crime Reporting program in Michigan. It provides data to NIBRS. MICR and NIBRS differ primarily because of State law.

-N-

NARCOTIC LAWS - The unlawful possession, use, sale, growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs.

NEGLIGENT MANSLAUGHTER - Deaths determined by police investigation to be primarily caused by gross negligence (except motor vehicle accidents).

NIBRS - Is a incident-based reporting system in which data is collected on each single crime occurrence. NIBRS data is designed to be generated as a byproduct of local, state, and Federal automated record systems.

NON-AGGRAVATED ASSAULT - An unlawful physical attack by one person upon another, where no weapon is present and no severe injury occurs.

NON-INCAPACITATING INJURY - Any injury that is evident to others at the scene, but not serious enough to prevent normal activities or require hospitalization.

NON-INDEX CRIME - Criminal offenses reported consisting of negligent manslaughter, non-aggravated assault, forgery & counterfeiting, fraud, embezzlement, stolen property, vandalism, weapons, prostitution & common law vice, sex offenses, narcotic laws, gambling, offenses against family & children, driving under the influence, liquor laws, disorderly conduct, and all other crimes not listed here or in the index crime.

-O-

OFFENSE - An unlawful act which has been reported to a law enforcement agency.

OFFENSES AGAINST FAMILY & CHILDREN - Any non-violent offense by a member of a family which threatens the unity of the family, the physical or economic welfare or morals of members of the family.

-P-

PERCENT CHANGE - Show the fluctuations of crime from year to year and provide an added perspective to study crime. Calculated by taking the number of offenses for the current year, minus the number of offenses for the previous year. Then divide the difference by the number of offenses for the previous year, and multiply the dividend by 100.

POSSIBLE INJURY - No visible injury but complaint of pain or momentary unconsciousness.

PROPERTY CRIMES - Consists of burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft. The object of the theft-type offenses is the taking of money or property, but there is no force or threat of force against the victims. Arson is not included.

PROSTITUTION & COMMON LAW VICE - Illegal activities related to engaging in normal or deviate, heterosexual or homosexual acts for profit or gain.

-R-

RAPE - The carnal knowledge of a female, forcibly and against her will, or where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity. Assault to rape and attempted rape are included in this classification. Other types of sexual penetration are not included.

ROBBERY - Robbery is the taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or putting the victim in fear.

-S-

SEX OFFENSES - The illegal acts done for sexual stimulation or gratification, or involving display or exposure of sexual organs. Rape and prostitution not included.

STATISTICAL - A collection and study of numerical data.

STOLEN PROPERTY - The buying, receiving, or possessing of personal property of another which has been criminally taken.

-T-

TOTAL CRIME - All criminal activity reported, both index and non-index.

TRENDS - Show the fluctuations of crime from year to year and provide an added perspective to study

crime.

-U-

UCR - Uniform Crime Reporting is a city, county, state, and Federal law enforcement program. This Program provides a nationwide view of crime based on the submission of crime information by law enforcement agencies throughout the country.

-V-

VANDALISM - The willful or malicious destruction, injury, disfigurement, or defacement of any public or private property, real or personal, without consent of the owner or person having control.

VIOLENT CRIMES - Consists of murder, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault. All violent crimes involve force or threat of force.

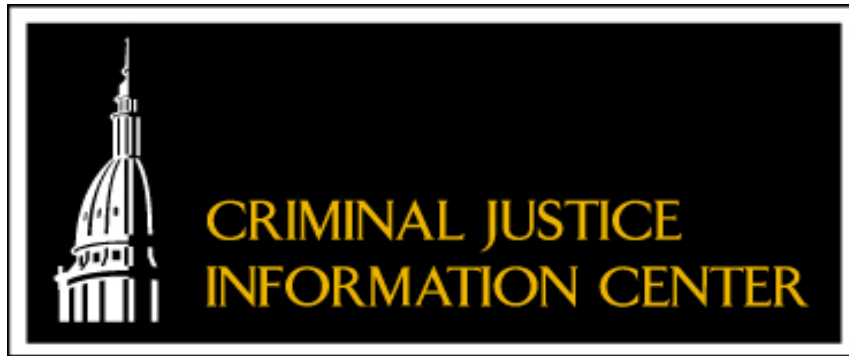
-W-

WEAPONS - The violation of laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture, sale, purchase, transportation, possession, concealment, or use of firearms or other deadly weapons.

-Z-

ZERO POPULATION - Population can only be shown once. Police departments with zero population indicate that those areas are being serviced by the county sheriff and/or MSP. Colleges, universities, metro parks, airports, and Provost Marshal-Camp Grayling have no permanent residents and will also show a zero population. Michigan State Police has jurisdiction over the entire state and will show a zero population because either the sheriff or local police departments already show the population.
