







Estimated Percent Uninsured by Race, Sex, Age, and Income as a Percent of the Poverty Level: Michigan, 2009

Summary of Patterns:

The estimated percentage of persons without health insurance:

- . . . is lowest for those under age 18 and highest for those age 18-39
- . . . falls as income increases
- . . . is highest for Hispanics
- . . . is lowest for whites overall because whites have the highest incomes among the racial groups for which these estimates are available;
- . . . is lower for whites than for blacks in the highest income category, but lower for blacks than for whites in the four lower income categories
- . . . is lower for females than for males in all income categories.

These estimates are not available for Asians, Pacific Islanders, Native Americans, or people with more than one race. Figures for that group of races cannot be computed reliably as a residual because of the extent to which figures for the major races have been rounded.
