

BENTON HARBOR, MICHIGAN – STATE EFFORTS

In 2018, high lead levels were discovered in tap water in the City of Benton Harbor. The City performed routine monitoring for lead and copper by sampling at homes connected to the Benton Harbor Water Supply and found that more than 10% of these samples exceeded the Action Level for lead. The samples collected in previous rounds did not have the same elevated results. The State of Michigan has taken the following actions to support the Benton Harbor community, including securing \$17 million for the City, and remains committed to assuring all residents have safe drinking water.

- Made filters available to all residents through the [Berrien County Health Department](#) or by calling 1-800-815-5485.
- Partnered with the City and U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to install corrosion control treatment needed to provide safe drinking water to residents.
- Developed and updated communication materials, including the statewide [Mi Lead Safe](#) web site.
- Supported the City with the collection of 2.5 times the number of water system samples as compared to 2018 resulting in a more comprehensive set of results to inform decision making.
- Worked with the City to secure a contractor to serve as the operator in charge of plant operations.
- Created a Benton Harbor Water Outreach [Task Force](#) in March 2021 in coordination with local advocates to develop additional educational materials for residents.
- Launched the [Water Leak Pilot](#) to install new plumbing fixtures in 100 homes free of charge.
- Worked with the City on 14 public conferences, advisories, and meetings on the lead action level exceedances providing updates and answering questions from community members.
- Verified improved treatment chemical injection at the water treatment plant.
- Conducted on-site visits and system reviews.
- Negotiated a revised Consent Order specifying technical requirements necessary to reduce risk.
- Worked with a local pediatrician to monitor blood level trends to keep kids safe.
- Partnered with the City on efforts to revitalize Ox Creek focused on visioning and planning to address nonpoint source and contamination issues.
- Led and continues to lead weekly operations meetings directly with City personnel and contractors to verify basic water system functions and set priorities.

- Partnered with the City to secure funding for the following active projects ranging from lead service line replacements to sewer improvements:
