Pursuant to P.A. 245 of 2008 Section 925

Administrative Segregation Report

Section 925: By March 1, 2009, the department shall report to the senate and house appropriations subcommittees on corrections, the senate and house fiscal agencies, and the state budget director on the number of prisoners in administrative segregation between October 1, 2003 and September 30, 2008, and the number of prisoners in administrative segregation between October 1, 2003 and September 30, 2008 who at any time during the current or prior prison term were diagnosed with serious mental illness or have a developmental disorder and the number of days each of the prisoners with serious mental illness or a developmental disorder have been confined to administrative segregation. As used in this section:

- (a) "Administrative segregation" means confinement for maintenance of order or discipline to a cell or room apart from accommodations provided for inmates who are participating in programs of the facility.
- (b) "Serious mental illness" means that term as defined in section 100d(3) of the mental health code, 1974 PA 328, MCL 330.1100d.

This report summarizes data compiled by Corrections Mental Health Program Support Services (CMHPSS) which includes cumulative and individual case data for serious mental illness (SMI) or developmental disorder (DD) as identified on the mental health caseload.

Additionally, the Department operates a 115-bed Social Skills Development Unit (SSDU) for prisoners with impairments in adaptive behavior, often the result of developmental disorders or impaired intellectual functioning. The SSDU serves prisoners at custody Level II or lower. A similar 180-bed unit is in development for higher security prisoners and those posing management problems. Regular psychological services rounds within segregation units are employed to identify prisoners who would qualify for the high security unit.
