



Robust Ranks



Almost 900 new corrections officers completed the academy in 2015

Donning helmets, vests and gas masks, a group of new corrections officers completed a strenuous training drill before guiding their classmates through a winding path of obstacles. They needed to know what it was like to feel physically stressed in a high-pressure situation like a facility disturbance, where their response would be crucial to maintaining safety and security. The training at the corrections officer academy could feel

gruelling, but for some new corrections officers, like Maria Zavala, it was also exhilarating. Zavala, who said she always wanted to work in criminal justice, enjoyed the pace of training and considered it exciting. “It forced you to push yourself and see progress,” Zavala said.

“It was definitely a great learning opportunity. I would do it all over again.” Earlier this year the department announced it would be returning to state-run academies to help offset a wave of retirements stemming from a hiring boom in the 1980s. Since then, almost 900 new corrections officers have joined the MDOC after completing academies in Lansing and the

Upper Peninsula.

On Nov. 6, 238 recruits in the Barbara Bouchard Class, the department’s final academy for the year, graduated and joined their facilities for eight weeks of on-the-job training. Zavala was among them.

“Corrections is intriguing,” said Zavala, a new corrections officer at Michigan Reformatory. “I wanted a career in the field in a position that would be different daily.”

To become a corrections officer, interested applicants must be at least 18 years old and must have a high school diploma or G.E.D. and at least 15 college credits in

group of individuals and maintain an attention to detail to recognize when something seems out of place, said Sgt. Kirk Bussell, of Carson City Correctional Facility, who served as a platoon leader at the academy. In addition they must understand that authority is given, but respect is earned, Bussell said. Most importantly, they must learn to work as a team with their colleagues. During this year's final graduation ceremony, Director Washington told new recruits the officers beside them and at their

facilities would become an extended support system. That message rang true for Corrections Officer James Courtney, of Macomb Correctional Facility. Courtney was a corrections officer in Virginia for five years before moving to Michigan with his family and he wanted to stick with the career. "Corrections is a family," Courtney said, following the November graduation ceremony where he received the Jack L. Budd Award for excellence in the academy. "I've really liked the camaraderie between the officers."

applicable disciplines. Military veterans could use training or education documented on their joint services transcript to satisfy the educational requirement and may also be eligible to be paid through the GI Bill for training in addition to receiving state pay. The curriculum for the academy's eight weeks of classroom instruction includes 54 modules that are updated frequently to remain in line with changes to policy, procedure and the law. Recruits learn about facility security, disturbance control, over familiarization, and managing and de-escalating the behavior of

offenders, among other topics. Director Heidi Washington underscored the importance of what recruits would learn during the academy, and in their future roles within the department, when she spoke to new officers during the start of an academy class in September. "With experience and knowledge, you get better at your job and you learn every day," Washington said. "We are making an investment in you in this academy and in your training. The training we offer is second to none." New corrections officers also must learn to work among a diverse

While at the officer training academy on Oct. 9, Hegle noticed a fellow recruit who appeared to be choking and in distress. After confirming he was choking, Hegle administered several abdominal thrusts, which dislodged the obstruction and allowed his classmate to breathe freely again. The actions earned Hegle, a new officer at St. Louis Correctional Facility, the department's Lifesaving Award.

“A bigger calling”

Kent County parole agent reflects on 23 years of coaching

He is known simply as “coach.” Students, parents and Grand Rapids area residents all refer to Kent County Parole Agent Charles Ruffin by that moniker and after 23 years of leading high school football teams, it’s not hard to see why.

“Everyone in the community calls me coach,” said Ruffin, who retired from coaching football this year after a 21-season run at Ottawa Hills High School in

Grand Rapids.

Ruffin, who was named Kent County Coach of the Year in 2013, played for Ottawa Hills as a high school student and went on to Western Michigan University where he was a wide receiver. After graduation, his high school football coach asked him if he would be interested in returning to help guide the team.

“I fell in love with it at that point,” said Ruffin, who helped coach other Grand Rapids Public Schools teams for two years before joining Ottawa Hills. “It was a chance to stay involved with football.”

But with each season he coached, his reasons for sticking with the sport evolved. What started as a way to stay connected to football became a mission to help young men succeed. “Somewhere along the way, I felt like it became a bigger calling to help these young men and be a positive mentor in their life,” Ruffin said. Ruffin learned to recognize when his players were struggling. Some were homeless, couldn’t afford their equipment or came from homes without enough food on the table. He made it a priority to help them

both on and off the field and surrounded himself with coaching staff who were committed to supporting players in the same way. He and his coaching staff also cultivated relationships with area organizations that would donate jerseys and equipment to athletes in need.

Ruffin found that some of his players just needed someone to help boost their confidence.

“One of the big things was being able to help someone else achieve their potential,” Ruffin said. “Just giving a kid a pat on the back and saying ‘you could do it,’ really encouraged them.” The same principles apply to the parolees he supervises and Ruffin said he notices a change in their attitude when he expresses that he believes in them.

He said the biggest reward has been seeing players grow and go on to lead successful careers as lawyers, school administrators and professional athletes.

He still keeps in touch with some of his players, including New York Jets

linebacker David Harris. “I always tell the kids the one thing I really want from them is I want to see that they are doing well,” he said. “That’s my biggest accomplishment and what fills my heart the most is to see my boys doing well.”

Ruffin said he did not expect his retirement to draw much attention, but he has been overwhelmed by the outpouring of support from the community. Parents and former players have reached out to him to thank him for his guidance. Though he is retiring, Ruffin suspects he will never shake the “coach” title. It has become a part of his identity, especially around Ottawa Hills.

“People will probably always call me coach,” Ruffin said. “I do like it. It’s something I’m proud of.”

New virtual welding simulator to help inmates build vocational skills

Welding training at Muskegon and Kinross correctional facilities is going high-tech. The training programs at each facility are now using a virtual welding simulator to enhance learning for participating inmates. The machines are safer to use and help the department conserve resources as students do not need to work with metal. Students have also progressed 40 percent faster by using the machine.

Muskegon and Kinross currently have 30 students each participating in the program and using the virtual welding

simulators for training. Richard A. Handlon Correctional Facility is expected to add a virtual welding simulator soon for its welding training program.

Flint Parole and Probation Supervisor David Toner was among 200 people to participate in the first Flint Recovery Walk and Rally in September. The non-competitive 5K walk began at New Path’s transitional home and featured guest speakers including Congressman Dan Kildee, along with other local leaders who discussed community issues with addiction. Participants at the event, which was organized by The Serenity House of Flint, included individuals in recovery from addiction to drugs and alcohol, as well as treatment professionals, elected officials and other community members.

Families, community leaders offered a look inside Kinross Correctional Facility during open house event

It had been six years since MDOC employee Michael Cope had seen the inside of the former Hiawatha Correctional Facility.

When he had the chance to take another look in October, it was just as he remembered. He even found his name marking the office he used as an ARUS at the facility, though it was obscured by a fresh coat of paint.

“It looks fantastic,” said Cope, who worked at Hiawatha from 1990, until 2009 when the facility was deactivated. “It has always been in good shape.”

Members of the Kincheloe-area community and relatives of MDOC staff had an opportunity to take a unique look inside Hiawatha, which has become the new Kinross Correctional Facility, before prisoners transferred there.

About 400 people, including family members, and local government officials toured the facility as part of an open house event on Oct. 16. State Rep. Lee Chatfield, R-Levering, also visited the prison for the open house.

Tour destinations included housing units,

classrooms, the control center and food service. Instructors and other facility staff also described their work for open house attendees.

The facility opened and began accepting prisoners on Oct. 19.

Reactivating the facility is expected to help the department save \$4.1 million a year.

First Community Resource Fair at Detroit Reentry Center connects prisoners with aid prior to release

About 140 prisoners learned about services and resources that could help them following their release from prison during the Detroit Reentry

Center’s first Community Resource Fair.

The day-long event in October included 16 state and local agencies including Friend of the Court, Goodwill Industries, Detroit Training Center and the Network for Returning Citizens, and was organized in collaboration with the MDOC’s Reentry Services.

“We hope it gives them a better connection to community resources,” said Prisoner Reentry Specialist Janella Robinson. “They’ll know where to go to resolve issues and they’ll know where to go for training.”

Keith Bennett, of Goodwill Industries of Greater Detroit, said he wanted to help show prisoners there were resources that could help them after release so they could avoid a lifestyle that could lead to incarceration.

“It’s a great event and an excellent concept,” Bennett said.

Fit4Life Program offers inmates resources to improve health

Agging inmates at Macomb Correctional Facility will receive some help staying healthy through a new program starting Nov. 16.

The Fit 4 Life program is designed for inmates 55 years old and older and promotes physical health and wellness rehabilitation. It is expected to enhance well-being for older prisoners and support preventative health measures, which can help halt or reverse many debilitating and costly illnesses.

To participate, level II inmates must be enrolled as a chronic care clinic patient and medically cleared to participate.

Nursing staff will provide education on medications and disease processes and will monitor prisoners' progress toward fitness goals. Mental health staff will also provide guided relaxation and healthy coping skills instruction, and a dietitian will provide dietary education. Screened inmate trainers will help guide participants during low-impact fitness classes.

The hour-long classes will be held three days a week for six months.

Ed Vallad will serve as the next Physical Plant Division administrator for the MDOC, following the retirement of Dave Flack. Vallad joined the department in 1986 as an electrician at Michigan Reformatory.

MDOC staff go beyond the call of duty to help others

On the evening of January 15, Corrections Officer Matthew Bruesch passed by a unit at Earnest C. Brooks Correctional Facility and noticed a prisoner lying on the floor. As he checked on the prisoner,

Bruesch found he was unresponsive, not breathing and had a syringe in his hand. He immediately called for medical assistance and Corrections Officers David Kennedy and William Parsons responded to assist with

CPR on the prisoner as Corrections Officer Kyle Jacobson arrived with a defibrillator.

After about two cycles of CPR from Kennedy and Parsons, the prisoner began breathing and showing signs of circulation.

Health care continued to monitor the prisoner as he was stabilized and transported to the hospital.

The prisoner recovered quickly and was returned to the facility several hours later, expressing his gratitude to the officers, who earned the department's Lifesaving Award for their efforts to help him.

On May 23 the Tekonsha Fire Department was dispatched to an accident on U.S. 27 in Tekonsha Township that involved a collision between a car and a motorcycle. When first responders from the department arrived, they found Michael Farmer, an MDOC training specialist, diligently assisting a critically injured accident victim. Farmer already evaluated the accident victim and helped clear their airway. He also repositioned

the victim's arm to re-establish blood flow and circulation that had been cut off.

The victim had a fractured arm and skull, a collapsed lung and a broken leg, but still gave a thumbs up on the helicopter ride to the hospital and was able to talk to the crew. Tekonsha Fire Department officials said Farmer, who received the MDOC's Lifesaving Award for his actions, was instrumental in helping to save the woman's life.

As he was driving home from work on May 4, Larry Wenglikowski, an ARUS at Richard A. Handlon Correctional Facility, was struck by another vehicle

and his car rolled several times before it stopped, tipped on its side. Chad Battle, an ARUS at Bellamy Creek Correctional Facility and Bob Fay, a now-

retired Bellamy Creek Correctional Facility ARUS, were the first to arrive at the accident and rushed to help Wenglikowski out of the vehicle, while holding it in place to prevent it from rolling over.

Wenglikowski sustained severe injuries in the accident, but was grateful for the assistance of Battle and Fay, who received the MDOC's Citizenship Award for their actions.

Working within prison walls didn't prevent Parnall Correctional Facility Inspector Violet Stone from taking action to help guard two young boys from abuse at their home.

In January, a Children's Protective Services employee contacted Stone for assistance with a case of alleged child abuse that involved an inmate. Stone spent more than 40 hours monitoring phone calls and reading through JPay emails between the inmate and the mother of two young

boys who were suspected to be subjected to abuse at home. Her review uncovered information that confirmed the boys were being harmed and Children's Protective Services removed them from the home and provided them with a safe place to live. Felony charges were also filed against the prisoner. Her efforts to help the boys were recognized with a thank you letter from Children's Protective Services and the MDOC's Citizenship Award.



Years of training and experience helped Corrections Officer Richard Henrizi provide needed first aid to a victim of a car accident. Henrizi was on his way to work at G. Robert Cotton Correctional Facility in April when he encountered a car accident. As he stopped to assist, bystanders directed his attention to a woman who was trapped inside her vehicle, which was flipped on its side and pinned against a tree. Henrizi did not hesitate to help

and climbed on top of the vehicle to access the driver's side door and provide reassurance and first aid to the trapped victim. He promised her he would not leave until she was safely out of the vehicle and he helped shield her from debris as firefighters removed the windshield to free her. Henrizi, who earned the department's Citizenship Award for assisting the accident victim, credited his training for his quick response.
