34th Annual Michigan Statewide Conference Child Abuse & Neglect: Prevention, Assessment & Treatment

**November 2-3, 2015
The Inn at St. John's
Plymouth, MI 48170**



This year's two-day conference features noted national and Michigan experts who will address a range of topics in the field of child abuse prevention, assessment, and treatment. In addition to the keynote presentations and plenary session that feature Dr. Jordan Greenbaum, Dr. Sandeep Narang, and Dr. Randell Turner, attendees will have a choice of over 30 workshops focusing on recent advances and best practices in the areas of prevention, medical issues, child advocacy, and law enforcement.

The goal is for conference participants to gain knowledge about practice in the field of child abuse throughout the conference and be able to apply this knowledge in the field. Participants will also have opportunities to interact and network with other professionals in the field.

The conference is designed for prevention specialists; social workers; child welfare professionals (children's protective services, foster care, adoption); juvenile justice services; physicians; nurses; mental health and other medical professionals; attorneys; law enforcement; child advocacy professionals; and educators.

Direct Service Grant of the Month

Great Start Baby Links Program

Welcome to Baby Links, a home visiting program for at-risk pregnant families and families with children up to 2 years of age. We aim to strengthen protective factors and utilize Parents as Teachers curriculum. Services focus on parent-child interaction, child development-centered parenting and family well-being. We currently serve 31 families in Van Buren County.

Here are services we have provided so far this 2014-2015 year:

- 200 home visits.
- 177 screenings; these include health questionnaire, developmental screenings using ASQ-3 and ASQ-SE, vision and hearing screenings.
- Edinburg Postnatal Depression Scale screenings with all mothers within the first year of delivery.
- Safe Sleep Survey with follow up education for all new families.
- Baby Steps group connections twice/month on the east and west sides of Van Buren County; 19 parent education meetings and 23 parent support meetings.
- Links to community resources with 23 community connections.
- Free newsletters mailed to all families; contents include early childhood development information and activity ideas, a list of community activities, a featured community service.

In conjunction with Early On, our Great Start Collaborative and its Parent Coalition, we co-sponsored “Kids-a-Great Start Family Carnival.” Highlights of the day were family fun with games and community resource information stations; safe sleep demo and free sleep sack; prizes; a giant inflatable play station; and making a healthy snack. Children also planted mini pinwheels in fairy gardens that were later distributed to local libraries to promote carefree childhood and to encourage that “reading together creates connections.”

Parents have shared our impact with responses to our June 2015 Parent Satisfaction Survey. Here is a sampling of what is most helpful about this program:

- Trying new strategies & games.
- Before the program, I had two step-kids and no kids of my own (my step kids are teenagers). Once I had my own son this program taught me things I would never thought about, like how kids develop, the stages they go through and how quick they catch onto things. The one big change in my life would be how I pay attention to all three of the kids better than I did before.
- All the help & guidance on steps to get me & my children settled in my own home.
- The activity’s help teach my daughter a lot of useful things she needs for school. Teaches transitions.
- Small activities to help strengthen my family as a whole.
- I love this program. Family educator helps remind me that early education is very important and helps me see my child’s perspective on things which helps me with patience. She also referred me to physical therapist from Early On because of my child’s bowing legs and her toes pointing in. My daughter’s doctor wouldn’t do anything for her. I found out she actually does have foot problems thanks to (my family educator).
- Milestones & his progress in reaching them.
- We got my daughters hearing screened. We also got to keep track of our son’s development.
- As a new parent, (my educator) has been so helpful and helped ease my stress levels exponentially. My husband travels for work a lot and is not home to help me figure this parenting thing out but (my educator) has been with me since my daughter was born and has really helped me find myself as a mother and she has taught me how to be a teacher.

Local Council Regional Meetings

Seven planned CTF summer Local Council regional meetings have taken place thus far. Since the 1st session in June in Ann Arbor, we've also had meetings in; Centreville, Holland, Saginaw, Gaylord, Newberry and Marquette. Each meeting has been enjoyably spent with a spirit of collaboration and comradery. At the beginning of each session I ask each group member to express his/her expectations. One common theme is that councils wish to reenergize, renew and share. The participants have reported that this expectation has been met and then some. This year a number of participating Local Councils (LCs) once more had board and other council members attend the meetings in addition to the LC Coordinators, which significantly enhanced the perspectives and shared conversations. Approximately 96 individuals have participated in these regional meetings CTF is appreciative of those LCs that have already hosted including; Jyoti Gupta (Washtenaw), Myra Brimmer (St. Joseph), Leigh Moerdyke (Ottawa), Suzanne Greenberg, Vera Harrison and Catherine Martinez (Saginaw), Teresa Cherry and Brandy McVannel (Otsego) and, Mandy Miskovich and Jayne Letts (Marquette). These gracious hosts went above and beyond to provide a great atmosphere and delicious food for the days' meetings. At Gaylord's meeting Teresa prepared the lunch herself. We were served an array of delicious homemade salads and breads.

The Regional Meeting agenda included an all-morning discussion about Parent Leadership. After lunch a 'peer sharing' discussion about council sustainability and capacity building took place. This consists of individuals pairing with another from a different council, providing each other support and feedback using a list of questions (as the basis of their conversation) related to council programming and administration. The final learning unit was a discussion about fundraising. One outcome from the fundraising topic was two councils at the western regional meeting are now in a friendly competition to see which council will raise more money from the social media fundraiser they created during the planning exercise for the fundraising unit. At the East UP meeting two councils will collaborate for a corn hole fundraiser this winter. Each topic throughout the day has included opportunities for councils to brainstorm and plan strategies to take back to their own respective councils.

Each year I look forward to and enjoy the CTF regional meetings. These opportunities afford me a chance to meet and personally interact with individuals throughout the state. The experiences reenergize me! The commitment demonstrated by the Local Councils to improving the lives of Michigan's children and families is laudable.
