Michigan's Coastal Management program was established in 1978 to protect and manage the nation's longest freshwater coastline. It provides leadership and support for Michigan's coastal communities and their unique ecological resources.

Coastline: 3,288 miles

Staff: 6 full-time staff, 3 part-time support staff

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Activities

Provides technical and grant assistance to municipalities and other local and regional groups to support environmental stewardship, innovate to address unique coastal challenges, and serve as cooperative partners in economic development.

Achievements

- Partnership with the Michigan Association of Planning to incorporate coastal resiliency principles and practices into community plans, policies, and ordinances.
- Implementation of Clean Beaches and Clean Marinas programs.
- Support of numerous regional public access and water trails projects that contribute to sustainable economic development.

Michigan's coastal communities face unique challenges from erosion, lake level changes, coastal hazards, and seasonal economies. The Coastal Program helps local decision makers implement hazard preparedness systems and supports sustainable, diverse economies.
