The locally-approved amendment to the Osceola County Solid Waste Management Plan (Plan Amendment) sent to the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) on December 10, 2007, is hereby approved.

Osceola County has completed the process to amend the Osceola County Solid Waste Management Plan. The County has received the required 67% approval from its 22 governmental entities with the results as follows:

Approval: City of Evart, City of Reed City, Hartwick Township, Highland Township, Lincoln Township, Marion Township, Middle Branch Township, Orient Township, Osceola Township, Richmond Township, Rose Lake Township, Sherman Township, Sylvan Township, Village of Hersey, Village of LeRoy and the Village of Marion.

Denial: Burdell Township, Cedar Township, Evart Township, Hersey Township and the Village of Tustin.

Currently, LeRoy Township is pending as no decision has been made by their board if they either approve or disapprove of the amendment.

Proposed Amendment #1 to the Osceola County Solid Waste Management Plan

The Osceola County Board of Commissioners, upon recommendations from the Osceola County Solid Waste Management Planning Committee and the Osceola County Planning Commission, approved a proposed amendment to the County's Solid Waste Management Plan at their July 19, 2007 meeting. This amendment would ensure that all counties in the State that list Osceola County as an importing county can then export waste to Osceola County.

The amendment process requires, once the amendment is approved by the Board of Commissioners, that it be sent to all governmental entities in the County for their consideration to either approve or reject the proposed amendment. The amendment will require 67% of the local entities approval before it can be submitted to the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality for their consideration. A copy of the proposed changes to the Plan is attached for your reference.

The following is a summary of the changes to the plan:

- 1. The current text on pages III-3 to III-4, Table 1-A in the Approved Solid Waste Management Plan (Plan) will be deleted and replaced with the wording: "All other 82 counties that list Osceola County as an importing County in their Solid Waste Management Plans."
- 2. The current text on page III-5, Table 1-B in the Plan will be deleted and replaced with the wording: "The text of Table 1-B was deleted as a result of Amendment #1 dated mm/dd/yyyy" as the text is no longer applicable.
- 3. The current text on pages III-6, Table 2-A in the Plan will be deleted and replaced with the wording: "All other 82 counties that list Osceola County as an exporting County in their Solid Waste Management Plans. (Amendment #1 dated mm/dd/yyyy)."

The Board of Commissioners wishes to thank you for your consideration of this proposed amendment and respectfully requests a response from the local entities by October 12, 2007.

The Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) received the locally approved update to the Osceola County Solid Waste Management Plan (Plan) on June 14, 1999.

By this letter, this Plan is hereby approved and the County now assumes responsibility for the enforcement and implementation of this Plan. The DEQ would like to thank the County for its efforts in addressing the County's solid waste management issues.

By approving the Plan, the DEQ has determined that it complies with the provisions of Part 115, Solid Waste Management, of the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Act, 1994 PA 451, as amended, and the Part 115 Rules concerning the required content of solid waste management plans. Specifically, the DEQ has determined that the Plan identifies the enforceable mechanisms that authorize the state, a county, a municipality, or a person to take legal action to guarantee compliance with the Plan, as required by Part 115. The Plan is enforceable, however, only to the extent the County properly implements these enforceable mechanisms under applicable enabling legislation. The Plan itself does not serve as such underlying enabling authority, and the DEQ's approval of the Plan neither restricts nor expands the County's authority to implement these enforceable mechanisms.

The Plan may also contain other provisions that are neither required nor expressly authorized for inclusion in a solid waste management plan. The DEQ's approval of the Plan does not extend to any such provisions. Under Part 115, the DEQ has no statutory authority to determine whether such provisions have any force of effect.

WHEREAS, Part 115 of Act 451, P.A. 1994, and Act 641, P.A. 1978, as amended, require that both the receiving and the sending county's solid waste management plan include the mechanism for a signed agreement between the two counties prior to any shipment of solid waste,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, THAT Osceola County will agree to accept solid waste from Leelanau County so long as Osceola County has an approved solid waste disposal site that is open for public use.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, THAT Leelanau County will agree to accept solid waste from Osceola County so long as an approved solid waste disposal site exists in Leelanau County that is open for public use.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, THAT Osceola County agrees to establish and maintain a program for diverting a portion of its waste from landfill facilities and send its ANNUAL PROJECT UPDATE AND PROGRESS REPORT to Leelanau County. The waste diversion program must be acceptable to Leelanau County and shall contain, at a minimum, the following four (4) items:

1. Public Education Program

Osceola County shall participate in a program to inform the public of proper disposal methods for various wastes so that no improper wastes are disposed of in the landfill. The educational program shall also inform the public as to the importance of recycling and how the public can participate.

2. Recycling Program

The Osceola County recycling program shall include a sufficient number of drop-off sites or sufficient curbside recycling to provide the public with an opportunity to participate in the program.

3. Composting Program

Osceola County shall establish or participate in a composting program to prevent yard waste and other organic wastes from being disposed of in the landfill.

4. Household and Agricultural Hazardous Waste Collection

Osceola County shall conduct or participate in at least one (1) household and agricultural hazardous waste collection day per year. The collected wastes shall be disposed of at a facility licensed to receive that type of waste.

BE IT FURTHER RESPOLVED, THAT OSCEOLA County agrees to implement a waste diversion program, as outlined above, within one (1) year of the adoption of the Leelanau County Solid Waste Management Plan 1998 Update.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, THAT this agreement is valid until the next revision of the Leelanau County Solid Waste Plan is approved. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

CONCLUSIONS

Major conclusions resulting from the planning work during the development of this plan are as follows:

- It is important that the existing high quality environmental conditions in Osceola County be maintained
- Solid Waste volumes are directly related to population and seasonal fluctuations.
- All solid waste collection and hauling is being done by private haulers.
- A portion of the solid waste generated in Osceola County is being recycled.
- All solid waste presently being collected in Osceola County that is not recycled or otherwise removed from the waste stream is disposed of by landfilling.
- At the present time, landfilling is the most economical method of solid waste disposal.
- Recycling is the primary five and twenty year alternative for reducing Osceola County's solid waste disposal based on an evaluation and ranking of various alternatives and estimated future conditions.

SELECTED ALTERNATIVES

All potentially feasible solid waste management systems were evaluated and ranked to determine the best systems for Osceola County. The major components of the five and twenty year recommended alternatives are as follows:

Recommended Five Year Alternatives:

- Solid waste collection by private haulers.
- Materials collected at the drop-off sites will be transported to a processing plant.
- Dispose of all wastes not removed from the waste stream by source reduction, recycling, composting, or other methods at a licensed landfill.
- Encourage development of transfer stations as needed.
- Enter into reciprocal agreements with counties in the region regarding solid waste disposal.
- Coordinate collection for household and agricultural hazardous wastes and dispose of them at a licensed out-of-county disposal site.
- Seek additional and alternative funding to promote the selected system and recycling efforts through education.
- The Osceola County Planning Commission or another organization designated by the County Board of Commissioners will be responsible for implementing the Solid Waste Management Plan. Membership on any designated organization should reflect the makeup of the Solid Waste Management Planning Committee as designated by the DEQ.

Recommended Ten Year Alternatives:

- Solid waste collection by private haulers.
- Continue developing alternatives to landfilling.
- Follow-up recommendations of five-year plan as feasible.
- Update plan at five year intervals.

INTRODUCTION

GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

To comply with Part 115 and its requirements, each Plan must be directed toward goals and objectives based or the purposes stated in Part 115, Sections 11538.(1)(a), 11541.(4) and the State Solid Waste Policy adopted pursuant to this Section, and Administrative Rules 711(b)(i) and (ii). At a minimum, the goals must reflect two major purposes of Solid Waste Management Plans:

- (1) To utilize to the maximum extent possible the resources available in Michigan's solid waste stream through source reduction, source separation, and other means of resource recovery and;
- (2) to prevent adverse effects on the public health and the environment resulting from improper solic waste collection, transportation, processing, or disposal, so as to protect the quality of the air, the land, and ground and surface wasters.

This Solid Waste Management Plan works toward the following goals through actions designed to meet the objectives described under the respective goals which they support:

Goal 1: The primary purpose of the Solid Waste Management Plan for Osceola County is to develop a totally workable system for the entire county that will utilize to the extent possible the resources available in Michigan's solid waste stream and be acceptable to the public.

Objective 1a: Identify and cooperate with existing interest groups and promote a plan that will conserve public resources.

Objective 1b: Promote a plan which is diverse and flexible enough to respond to socioeconomic changes throughout the planning period.

Goal 2: To encourage regional coordination among the neighboring counties.

INTRODUCTION

Objective 2a. Foster a plan which is compatible with those of other counties in the region and maintain agreements with other counties.

Objective 2b: Maintain close liaison with the Osceola County Planning Commission and its efforts in solid waste management.

Goal 3: Implement a solid waste management plan which will coordinate the goals and objectives of Osceola County as well as the State of Michigan.

Objective 3a: Develop plan details consistent with implementing, assisting and promoting the existing methods of collection, conservation and disposal of solid waste which are in the best interest of the general public.

Objective 3b: Establish and maintain a high quality environment by developing and implementing integrated waste management which provides for the protection of public health and environment. Insure that the goals and objectives of the State of Michgan are in accordance with the goals and objectives of the general public.

The county does not anticipate major problems associated with managing the solid waste generated within its borders since the landfills that have agreed to accept Osceola County's solid waste have over 10 years capacity. It is expected that Osceola County will remain a relatively rural county during this 10 year period, and will, therefore, have little industrial waste disposal impact on any of these landfills. Recycling in the county, while still on a small scale, has resulted in excess of 500 tons being diverted from landfills each year. If populations increase at a more rapid rate than anticipated, it is not expected to have an adverse effect on any of the landfills listed in this Plan.

SOLID WASTE COLLECTION SERVICES AND TRANSPORTATION INFRASTRUCTURE

The following describes the solid waste collection services and transportation infrastructure that will be utilized within the County to collect and transport solid waste.

44 July 10

The county has four companies/individuals which provide adequate collection services throughout the county. Residents outside the limits of both cities and villages contract individually with waste haulers for pickup of solid waste at their residence. Also there are two townships, each of which have a transfer station serviced by one of the licensed solid waste haulers.

The City of Evart contracts with a licensed solid waste hauler for curbside pickup, including recycling materials, within the city limits for residential solid waste. Businesses and industry have the option of contracting privately for these services.

The City of Reed City also contracts with a licensed solid waste hauler for curbside pickup of solid waste within their city limits. The city does not participate in a curbside recycling program but residents may use a bag system for curbside pickup or participate in the local program run by a volunteer recycling organization. Businesses and industry also have the option of contracting with private enterprise for additional services.

The State and County highways are displayed on the map on page D-4. The State highway network in Osceola County has a total of 92 miles of roads which are designated M-61, US 10, US 131, M-115, and M-66. The roads which collect traffic in the county and feed it into the regional system are termed Major and Minor Collectors or County Primary Roads. There are 248 miles of county primary roads. The county local roads, of which there are 684 miles, serve as a secondary collection system which feeds the primary and arterial networks. Over 246.5 miles of the county's primary and secondary system is hard surfaced. Most of the secondary system is two lane gravel-surfaced roadway. The state highways within the county are all-season routes. County roads are subject to seasonal load restrictions.

EVALUATION OF DEFICIENCIES AND PROBLEMS

The following is a description of problems or deficiencies in the existing solid waste system.

- 1. Lack of overall organization and implementing legislation.
- 2. Lack of administrative supervision and enforcement of solid waste disposal practices.
- 3. Lack of funds for adequate maintenance.
- 4. Lack of an adequate urban segment of the population large enough to actively sustain a county operated landfill. The predominate rural nature of the county will greatly affect the amounts of solid waste available for burial in landfills and thus the economics of the operation.

DEMOGRAPHICS

The following presents the current and projected population densities and centers for five and ten year periods, identification of current and projected centers of solid waste generation including industrial solid waste for five and ten year periods as related to the Selected Solid Waste Management System for the next five and ten year periods. Solid waste generation data is expressed in tons or cubic yards, and if it was extrapolated from yearly data, then it was calculated by using 365 days per year, or another number of days as indicated.

The population centers in the county are the cities of Reed City and Evart and the townships immediately surrounding the cities. (See map in Appendix D, D-4). The centers of solid waste generation are the same as the population centers. The majority of the industrial solid waste generation has been confined to the industrial parks in both Reed City, Evart and the village of Marion. It is anticipated this trend will continue during both a five and a ten year projection.

LAND DEVELOPMENT

The following describes current and projected land development patterns, as related to the Selected Solid Waste Management System, for the next five and ten year periods.

- AD IN THE WAY

The rural nature of Osceola County has not changed significantly in the last 20 years. Residential growth and development has been scattered throughout the county, with significant increases in population in the townships immediately surrounding the cities of Reed City, Evart, the villages of Hersey, LeRoy, Tustin, and Marion. Industrial growth has primarily been seen in the industrial parks located in the city of Reed City, Evart and the Village of Marion. A Land Use Plan adopted by the Planning Commission in 1991 recommends continued expansion of industrial uses in industrial parks, and commercial/light industrial uses along major all-season county and state highways. Following this recommendation can decrease infrastructure costs for highways, both improvement and maintenance, and provide suitable transportation routes for waste haulers to utilize for pick-ups. (See Land Use Map in Appendix D, D-4).

SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT ALTERNATIVES

The following briefly describes all solid waste management systems considered by the County and how each alternative will meet the needs of the County. The manner of evaluation and ranking of each alternative is also described. Details regarding the Selected Alternatives are located in the following section. Details regarding each non-selected alternative are located in Appendix B.

ALTERNATIVE #1:

STORAGE:

The storage of solid waste generated at some homes, commercial and industrial establishments at times pose public health and safety hazards. These poor practices allow access to the solid waste by children, animals and insects, the blowing of debris by wind, and increase handling problems for collectors. Proper storage of solid waste prior to collection and/or transportation to a disposal area is the first step towards efficient solid waste management. The improvement of storage practices can be accomplished two ways: 1)create a good public information program to provide for positive storage practices by the public; 2) promote enforcement of existing regulations such as the littering laws and secure load laws which are both State Laws enforceable by all law enforcement agencies. These two steps will help form an effective solid waste management program in Osceola County.

COLLECTION:

The recommended system of collection would incorporate both resident responsibility for the hauling and disposal of waste products and a voluntary house-to-house collection method by solid waste haulers operating within the county. The haulers should be required by regulation to pick up solid waste at each location at least once a week. The cities and townships should retain full control over collection activities and be responsible for the financing and establishment of any collection center, boxes, or transfer stations that are deemed necessary beyond what private enterprise is providing or willing to provide. Local governments pass regulations, laws or ordinances and enter into contract agreements that might be needed for the collection of solid waste in their jurisdictions. Transfer stations would be established by private enterprise.

TRANSPORTATION:

The prevention of littering during collection and hauling can be achieved by the enforcement of local ordinances and State Laws regarding solid waste hauler littering. Michigan Department of Transportation requires proper maintenance and operation of the vehicle used by solid waste haulers for transportation of solid waste. Direct haul would take place to a landfill accepting Osceola County wastes.

DISPOSAL:

The present recommended method of disposal of solid waste from Osceola County is to transport it out of the county to an approved landfill. The primary landfills for Osceola County are Central Landfill in Montcalm County, Northern Oaks in Clare County, and Glen's Landfill in Leelanau County.

RECYCLING:

Osceola County will continue to support the operation of a recycling center for use by the residents of the County. This center is located in Reed City and owned and maintained by Recycle of Osceola County Inc. (a non profit organization). In addition, the townships and cities that engage in recycling and composting programs will be encouraged to continue these services.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTES:

The County will endorse the concept of this program, and promote this service as offered and provided by private enterprise at an approved site. Acceptance of Osceola County waste by a county with a landfill offering this service would make it available to our residents. In addition Cities and Townships if they desire to provide this service, are encouraged to do so.

INSTITUTIONAL ARRANGEMENTS:

Osceola County endorses the concept of an independent jurisdictional approach to the management of solid waste. Solid waste haulers operate independently within the County to provide services to residents.

EDUCATIONAL AND INFORMATIONAL PROGRAMS:

Osceola County will continue to endorse and promote educational and informational programs which promote waste reduction and resource recovery. Programs are available through the Michigan State University Extension Service.

ALTERNATIVE #2:

STORAGE:

The storage of solid waste generated at some homes, commercial and industrial establishments at times pose public health and safety hazards. These poor practices allow access to the solid waste by children, animals and insects, the blowing of debris by wind, and increase handling problems for collectors. Proper storage of solid waste prior to collection and/or transportation to a disposal area is the first step towards efficient solid waste management. The improvement of storage practices can be accomplished two ways: 1)create a good public information program to provide for positive storage practices by the public; 2) promote enforcement of existing regulations such as the littering laws and secure load laws which are both State Laws enforceable by all law enforcement agencies. These two steps will help form an effective solid waste management program in Osceola County.

COLLECTION:

The recommended system of collection would incorporate both resident responsibility for the hauling and disposal of waste products and a voluntary house-to-house collection method by solid waste haulers operating within the county. The haulers should be required by regulation to pick up solid waste at each location at least once a week. The cities and townships should retain full control over collection activities and be responsible for the financing and establishment of any collection center, boxes, or transfer stations that are deemed necessary' beyond what private enterprise is providing or willing to provide. Local governments pass regulations, laws or ordinances and enter into contract

agreements that might be needed for the collection of solid waste in their jurisdictions. Transfer stations would be established and operated by the County on county-owned property.

TRANSPORTATION:

The prevention of littering during collection and hauling would be achieved by the enforcement of local ordinances and regulations regarding solid waste haulers. Michigan Department of Transportation requires proper maintenance and operation of the vehicle used by solid waste haulers for transportation of solid waste. Direct haul would take place to a landfill accepting Osceola County wastes.

DISPOSAL:

The present recommended method of disposal of solid waste from Osceola County is to transport it out of the county to an approved landfill. The primary landfills for Osceola County are Central Landfill in Montcalm County, Northern Oaks in Clare County, and Glen's Landfill in Leelanau County, and the Pitsch Landfill in Ionia County. Agreements with these landfills provide for contingency plans for use in the event one or more of the primary use landfills are unavailable. Agreements with these landfills are included in Appendix D.

RECYCLING:

Osceola County will continue to support the operation of a recycling center for use by the residents of the County. This center is located in Reed City and owned and maintained by Recycle of Osceola County Inc. (a non profit organization). In addition, the townships and cities that engage in recycling and composting programs will be encouraged to continue these services.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTES:

This service would be offered to Osceola County residents at a facility built for that purpose and funded by Osceola County.

INSTITUTIONAL ARRANGEMENTS:

Osceola County endorses the concept of an independent jurisdictional approach to the management of solid waste. Solid waste haulers operate independently within the County' to provide services to residents.

EDUCATIONAL AND INFORMATION PROGRAMS:

Osceola County would provide educational and informational programs to the public which promote waste reduction and resource recovery.

ALTERNATIVE #3:

STORAGE:

The storage of solid waste generated at some homes, commercial and industrial establishments at times pose public health and safety hazards. These poor practices allow access to the solid waste by children, animals and insects, the blowing of debris by wind, and increase handling problems for

collectors. Proper storage of solid waste prior to collection and/or transportation to a disposal area is the first step towards efficient solid waste management. The improvement of storage practices can be accomplished two ways: 1)create a good public information program to provide for positive storage practices by the public; 2) adopt an ordinance which includes enforcement capabilities for the collection and storage of solid waste. These two steps will help form an effective solid waste management program in Osceola County.

COLLECTION:

The recommended system of collection would incorporate both resident responsibility for the hauling and disposal of waste products and a voluntary house-to-house collection method by solid waste haulers operating within the county. The haulers should be required by regulation to pick up solid waste at each location at least once a week. The cities and townships should retain full control over collection activities and be responsible for the financing and establishment of any collection center, boxes, or transfer stations that are deemed necessary beyond what private enterprise is providing or willing to provide. Local governments pass regulations, laws or ordinances and enter into contract agreements that might be needed for the collection of solid waste in their jurisdictions. Transfer stations would be established and operated by the County on county-owned property.

TRANSPORTATION:

The prevention of littering during collection and hauling would be achieved by the adoption of a solid waste regulation. This regulation should require proper maintenance and operation of the vehicle used by solid waste haulers for transportation of solid waste. Direct haul would take place to a landfill in Osceola County.

DISPOSAL:

This alternative would provide for a new landfill located in Osceola County, and either owned and operated by the County, or owned and operated by private enterprise. The site for a landfill must comply with current state regulations, provide adequate disposal capacity for Osceola County's solid waste for a period of 20 years, must comply with restrictions and requirements of local ordinances and land use plans, accessible by an existing all weather road, located only where an aquifer is protected by a natural clay barrier and within approximately ten miles of the center of population of Osceola County. The site shall be no less than two miles from the corporate limits of any village or city. Development of any landfill would be encouraged only on Clay loam soils or soils which can be shown to have equivalent properties. No construction of a landfill shall take place within 2000 feet from any year-round stream, nor within one mile of any lake. No construction will be permitted in any wetland. Construction shall not obstruct any natural runoff or drainage area.

RECYCLING:

Osceola County will continue to support the operation of a recycling center for use by the residents of the County. This center is located in Reed City and owned and maintained by Recycle of Osceola County Inc. (a non profit organization). In addition, the townships and cities that engage in recycling and composting programs will be encouraged to continue these services. In the event that Recycle of Osceola County Inc. should disband or discontinue, the following will apply. Recycling programs will

be run in conjunction with the operation of the landfill, with the recycling center being located at the site of the landfill. Operation of the recycling center/program would be the responsibility of the owner of the landfill.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTES:

The landfill would be the site for the county's annual household hazardous waste collection.

INSTITUTIONAL ARRANGEMENTS:

Osceola County endorses the concept of an independent jurisdictional approach to the management of solid waste. Solid waste haulers operate independently within the County to provide services to residents.

EDUCATIONAL AND INFORMATIONAL PROGRAMS:

Osceola County, in cooperation with private disposal facilities, will provide educational and informational programs which promote waste reduction and resource recovery to the public.

ALTERNATIVE #4:

STORAGE:

The storage of solid waste generated at some homes, commercial and industrial establishments at times pose public health and safety' hazards. These poor practices allow access to the solid waste by children, animals and insects, the blowing of debris by wind, and increase handling problems for collectors. Proper storage of solid waste prior to collection and/or transportation to a disposal area is the first step towards efficient solid waste management. The improvement of storage practices can be accomplished two ways: l)create a good public information program to provide for positive storage practices by the public: 2) adopt an ordinance which includes enforcement capabilities for the collection and storage of solid waste. These two steps will help form an effective solid waste management program in Osceola County.

COLLECTION:

The recommended system of collection would incorporate both resident responsibility for the hauling and disposal of waste products and a voluntary house-to-house collection method by solid waste haulers operating within the county. The haulers should be required by regulation to pick up solid waste at each location at least once a week The cities and townships should retain full control over collection activities and be responsible for the financing and establishment of any collection center, boxes, or transfer stations that are deemed necessary beyond what private enterprise is providing or willing to provide. Local governments pass regulations, laws or ordinances and enter into contract agreements that might be needed for the collection of solid waste in their jurisdictions. Transfer stations would be established and operated by the County on county-owned property.

TRANSPORTATION:

The prevention of littering during collection and hauling would be achieved by the adoption of a solid waste regulation. This regulation should require proper maintenance and operation of the vehicle used by solid waste haulers for transportation of solid waste. Direct haul would take place to a landfill in Osceola County.

DISPOSAL:

This alternative would provide for a landfill located in Osceola County, and either owned and operated by the County, or owned and operated by private enterprise. The site for a landfill must comply with current state regulations, provide adequate disposal capacity for Osceola County's solid waste for a period of 20 years, must comply with restrictions and requirements of local ordinances and land use plans, accessible by an existing all weather road, located only where an aquifer is protected by a natural clay barrier and within approximately ten miles of the center of population of Osceola County. The site shall be no less than two miles from the corporate limits of any village or city. Development of any landfill would be encouraged only on clay loam soils or soils which can be shown to have equivalent properties. No construction of a landfill shall take place within 2000 feet from any year-round stream, nor within one mile of any lake. No construction will be permitted in any wetland. Construction shall not obstruct any natural runoff or drainage area. In addition, incineration services would be available at the landfill facility.

TO THE WORLD

RECYCLING:

Osceola County will continue to support the operation of a recycling center for use by the residents of the County. This center is located in Reed City and owned and maintained by Recycle of Osceola County Inc. (a non profit organization). In addition, the townships and cities that engage in recycling and composting programs will be encouraged to continue these services. In the event that Recycle of Osceola County Inc. should disband or discontinue, the following will apply. Recycling programs will be run in conjunction with the operation of the landfill, with the recycling center being located at the site of the landfill. Operation of the recycling center/program would be the responsibility of the owner of the landfill.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTES:

The landfill would be the site for the county's annual household hazardous waste collection.

INSTITUTIONAL ARRANGEMENTS:

Osceola County endorses the concept of an independent jurisdictional approach to the management of solid waste. Solid waste haulers operate independently within the County to provide services to residents.

Osceola County, in cooperation with private disposal facilities, will provide educational and informational programs which promote waste reduction and resource recovery to the public.

THE SELECTED SOLID WASTE

MANAGEMENT SYSTEM

The Selected Solid Waste Management System (Selected System) is a comprehensive approach to managing the County's solid waste and recoverable materials. The Selected System addresses the generation, transfer and disposal of the County's solid waste. It aims to reduce the amount of solid waste sent for final disposal by volume reduction techniques and by various resource conservation and resource recovery programs. It also addresses collection processes and transportation needs that provide the most cost effective, efficient service. Proposed disposal areas locations and capacity to accept solid waste are identified as well as program management, funding, and enforcement roles for local agencies. Detailed information on recycling programs, evaluation, and coordination of the Selected System is included in Appendix B. Following is an overall description of the Selected System:

The Selected System for solid waste management in Osceola County addresses proper storage of solid waste generated at residences, commercial and industrial establishments, and agricultural uses. Education of proper management practices is an important element to help reduce risks to public health and safety from improper storage. Collection of the solid wastes will be managed by licensed waste haulers contracted on an individual basis by property owners and/or businesses and industry. In addition to curbside collections, the option will be available to consumers for additional storage in dumpsters provided by the waste haulers. Public health, MDEQ, State and local laws and Michigan Department of Transportation regulations, will dictate enforcement mechanisms that will be followed in Osceola County.

Transportation to an approved licensed landfill willing to accept waste from Osceola County will be done on a direct haul basis by the licensed solid waste hauler. Michigan Department of Transportation regulations will dictate proper collection methods as far as maintenance of hauling equipment and proper handling of solid waste while on highways. Primary roads servicing existing landfills in Osceola County, shall be paved all-weather, class A roads. These roads will be based on criteria determined by the Osceola County Road Commission.

The recycling program will be continued in Osceola County, one of which is owned and operated by Recycle of Osceola County Inc., located in Reed City. Other Recycle programs are in effect in the City of Evart, the villages of LeRoy and Marion. These programs being accomplished with the haulers in the area.

The disposal of household hazardous wastes has been cost prohibitive for the Osceola County Board of Commissioners in the past. With an agreement to use the Northern Oaks Facility in Clare County, having an established disposal program at this facility. And the use of the Isabella County Household Hazardous Waste Collection Program., our residents will be able to participate at little or no additional cost to the County.

Osceola County will continue to endorse the concept of an independent jurisdictional approach to the management of solid waste. The Board of Commissioners has committed to the continuation of an educational and informational program on all aspects of waste management, including proper disposal resource conservation, recycling, composting and waste reduction. These programs will be coordinated with MSU Extension Service.

The County wants to remain independent and not become part of a region for solid waste management.



SOLID WASTE COLLECTION SERVICES AND TRANSPORTATION:

The following describes the solid waste collection services and transportation infrastructure which will be utilized within the County to collect and transport solid waste.

The county has four companies/individuals which provide adequate collection services throughout the county. Residents outside the limits of both cities and villages contract individually with waste haulers for pickup of solid waste at their residence. Two townships, each of which have a transfer station serviced by one of the licensed solid waste haulers.

The City of Evart contracts with a licensed solid waste hauler for curbside pickup, including recycling materials, within the city limits for residential solid waste. Businesses and industry have the option of contracting privately for these services.

The City of Reed City also contracts with a licensed solid waste hauler for curbside pickup of solid waste within their city limits. The city does not participate in a curbside recycling program but residents may use a bag system for curbside pickup or participate in the local program run by a volunteer recycling organization. Businesses and industry also have the option of contracting with private enterprise for additional services.

The State and County highways are displayed on the map on page D-4. The State highway network in Osceola County has a total of 92 miles of roads which are designated M-61, US 10, US 131, M-115, and M-66. The roads which collect traffic in the county and feed it into the regional system are termed Major and Minor Collectors or County Primary Roads. There are 248 miles of county primary roads. The county local roads, of which there are 684 miles, serve as a secondary collection system which feeds the primary and arterial networks. Over 246.5 miles of the county's primary and secondary system is hard surfaced. Most of the secondary system is two lane gravel-surfaced roadway. The state highways within the county are all-season routes. County roads are subject to seasonal load restrictions.

RESOURCE CONSERVATION EFFORTS

The following describes the selected system's proposed conservation efforts to reduce the amount of solid waste generated throughout the County. The annual amount of solid waste currently or proposed to be diverted from landfills and incinerators is estimated for each effort to be used, if possible. Since conservation efforts are provided voluntarily and change with technologies and public awareness, it is not this Plan update's intention to limit the efforts to only what is listed. Instead citizens, businesses, and industries are encouraged to explore the options available to their lifestyles, practices, and processes which will reduce the amount of materials requiring disposal.

RECYCLING AND COMPOSTING

The following is a brief analysis of the recycling and composting programs selected for the County in this Plan. Additional information on operation of recycling and composting programs is included in Appendix A. The analysis covers various factors within the County and the impacts of these factors on recycling and composting. Following the written analysis the tables on pages III-24, 25, & 26 list the existing recycling, composting, and source separation of hazardous materials programs that are currently active in the County and which will be continued as part of this Plan. The second group of three tables on pages III-27, 28, & 29 list the recycling, composting, and source separation of hazardous materials programs that are proposed in the future for the County. It is not this Plan update's intent to prohibit additional programs or expansions of current programs to be implemented beyond those listed.

The recycling program in the county is a privately run program. The Reed City area program is incorporated as a nonprofit and has 501-C3 status. The Reed City Recycling Center is open to the public every second Saturday of the month from 9:00 a.m. to Noon. The Reed City Area Recycling Center offers weekly pickup of cardboard from the area businesses. The Boy Scouts provide a 24 hour per day drop off for news print.

The Evart area offers a recycling program on the same day and most of the material collected comes to the Reed City Center.

The LeRoy area recycling program is provided by one of the waste haulers.

The Recycling Program in Osceola County will continue and will be expanded to include other parts of the County.

The County will continue to encourage residents to practice composting on private property and will promote this program through an educational program in cooperation with MSU Extension and the Osceola/Lake Conservation District.

Household hazardous waste collection and disposal is done by residents in the County on a volunteer basis. There are a number of sites available to accept this material. The County Solid Waste Management Planning Committee will identify these sites and inform the residents as to the date and location this hazardous waste material can be dropped off.

SITING CRITERIA AND PROCESS

The following process describes the criteria and procedures to be used to site solid waste disposal facilities and determine consistency with this Plan. (attach additional pages if necessary)

We have a documented 10 year capacity for type II and type III Solid Waste with present agreements for our County waste disposal.

SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT COMPONENTS¹

The following identifies the management responsibilities and institutional arrangements necessary for the implementation of the Selected Waste Management System. Also included is a description of the technical, administrative, financial and legal capabilities of each identified existing structure of persons, municipalities, counties and state and federal agencies responsible for solid waste management including planning, implementation, and enforcement.

Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ)

Various sections of the DEQ are charged by law with the regulation, enforcement and review of the conduct of the solid waste management systems in Osceola County and all other Michigan counties. The county will be dependent upon the appropriate offices of the DEQ to be informed of changes in the requirements for solid waste management from both federal and state levels. This information from the DEQ will include new solid waste legislation, regulatory rulings, changes in the handling of disposal of all types of solid waste, national or state public information programs, financial aid programs from the national or state level available to the county, and technical assistance from DEQ staff.

Enforcement

Any person believing violations of the Solid Waste Disposal Act or any other Enforceable Mechanism, as defined in said Act, pursuant to M.C.L.A. 324.101 et seq., as amended, particularly Parts 5, 17, 31, 55, 89, 91, 111, 115 and 121; 257.1 et seq.; 16.338 et seq.; that have been, are, or will be occurring shall report same to the MDEQ, the MDNR, a health officer, or any other law enforcement officer for appropriate action and relief according to the law.

Osceola County Board of Commissioners

The County Board is responsible for the overall supervision of the solid waste management system for the county. This responsibility includes the implementation of the 5 year and 10 year plans. It also includes financing, administration and operations of the county solid waste management system, as well as accountability to the public. The County Board shall designate a board responsible for implementing the Solid Waste Management Plan.

Osceola County Planning Commission

The Osceola County Planning Commission is responsible for the continued planning effort in the solid waste management field for the county. This planning should be done in coordination with other units of government actively involved in solid waste planning and implementation of plans. The Planning Commission is the "Central Informational Repository" of all solid waste planning information as it relates to Osceola County.

Solid Waste Management Planning Committee (SWMPC)

The Osceola County SWMPC is responsible for sending a recommended 5 year and 10 year Solid Waste Management Plan to the County Board for their approval, as is the purpose of this report. The SWMPC is also responsible to the County Board to assist in the approval process of the plan. Every five years, the SWMPC will update the 5 and 10 year management plans for the County Board. The SWMPC will begin work on the 5 year updates two years prior to the deadline for submission of the revised plan.

Township and Village Governments

The local units of government in the county will continue to inform the SWMPC as to the effectiveness of the Solid Waste Management Plan and will, on a continuing basis, inform the County Board as to solid waste problems. The County Board will in turn keep the local units of government informed as to solid waste management activities so the townships and villages may keep the citizenry totally informed as to the solid waste management. The villages and townships will be called upon to provide labor and assistance in managing the recycling drop-off sites..

Private Enterprises

The private sector should manage those activities which it can and is willing to manage. This includes both collection and disposal. The private sector is encouraged to develop alternative solid waste management facilities and services.

Private Individuals

The public of Osceola County will need to support the solid waste management plans in order for them to be successful. This support will include source separation, willingness to accept new information on solid waste, and general support of any specific solid waste projects.

MSU Extension Service

The MSU Extension Service and the Osceola Lake Conservation District will develop the public education and promotional programs necessary for implementing various components of the plan, including recycling and composting programs. MSU Extension Service and Conservation District will assist in efforts to encourage local units of government, businesses, schools, etc. to participate in or expand resource recovery methods and programs. MSU Extension Service and Conservation District will also assist in developing and disseminating information and literature designed to inform the public on matters related to recycling, resource recovery, and conservation. Finally, MSU Extension Service and Conservation District will develop educational and promotional programs for the proper disposal of household hazardous wastes.

EVALUATION OF RECYCLING

The following provides additional information regarding implementation and evaluations of various components of the Selected System.

Osceola County's volume of material being reused and recycled has increased drastically over the past ten years. The recycling program began in 1988. The first month collection of recycled material amounted to about nine gaylord boxes. This was about 2,000 pounds of material. Presently the County recycling program collects about 50 tons of material each month. The recycling volume continues to grow each year.

The following briefly describes the processes used or to be used to select the equipment and locations of the recycling and composting programs included in the Selected System. Existing Programs:

Recycling. There are three active drop off centers in the County: Village of LeRoy, Evart area and Reed City area. The cities of Evart and Reed City have the option of curbside pickup as well as some areas in the rural Osceola County. The licensed waste haulers operate the curbside program. The drop off centers in the Village of LeRoy, City of Evart and Reed City are operated by volunteers. Most of the recycled items collected at Evart are transported to Reed City where they are processed and sold. There are no major difficulties in the county program except in the low cost of the recycled material sold and the availability of an outlet for styrofoam and film plastic.

Composting. There are many backyard composting operations in the county. Most are composting the yard waste and unused garden products. There is a major composting operation on the Morgan Farms, east of Evart. They are composting animal manure, leaves, and grass clippings from the City of Evart and sawdust from local sawmills.

Proposed Programs:

Both the recycling program and the composting program will continue

Site Availability & Selection

Existing Programs:

Composting. Private, backyard composting will continue. The cities of Reed City and Evart offer spring and fall pickup of leaves and other yard waste. The city of Evart takes the leaves and yard waste to Morgan Farms for composting. The City of Reed City takes their leaves and yard waste to city property where it is composted. The end product on the Morgan Farm is marketed. The end product in the Reed City property is used by the city and its residents.

Proposed Programs:

The County will continue to encourage the cities to keep this program going. Educational material will be available from MSU Extension Service and Osceola/Lake Conservation District. Composting bins are available from the Osceola/Lake Conservation District. There will be other farm composting operations started up in the future.

In addition, the city of Reed City offers twice a year clean up campaigns. Also some of the villages and townships offers cleanup programs. Items that can be recycled are separated and the rest of the refuse is landfilled.

Composting Operating Parameters:

The following identifies some of the operating parameters which are to be used or are planned to be used to monitor the composting programs.

COORDINATION EFFORTS:

Solid Waste Management Plans need to be developed and implemented with due regard for both local conditions and the state and federal regulatory framework for protecting public health and the quality of the air, waster, and land. The following states the ways in which coordination will be achieved to minimize potential conflicts with other programs and, if possible, to enhance those programs.

It may be necessary to enter into various types of agreements between public and private sectors to be able to implement the various components of this solid waste management system. The known existing arrangements are described below which are considered necessary to successfully implement this system within the County. In addition, proposed arrangements are recommended which address any discrepancies that the existing arrangements may have created or overlooked. Since arrangements may exist between two or more private parties that are not public knowledge, this section may not be comprehensive of all the arrangements within the County. Additionally, it may be necessary to cancel or enter into new or revised arrangements as conditions change during the planning period. The entities responsible for developing, approving, and enforcing these arrangements are also noted.

- The Osceola County Board of Commissioners will adopt regulations pertaining to solid waste management prior to a landfill being sited for location in the County. Regulations will be enforced by the Osceola County Sheriff's Department, the Central Michigan District Health Department, and all other law enforcement.
- The Board of Commissioners will be responsible for negotiating the use of landfills which are located outside Osceola County.
- The cities and townships retain full control over collection activities and are responsible for the financing and establishment of any collection centers, boxes, or transfer stations that are deemed necessary beyond what private enterprise is providing or willing to provide. Local government may pass laws or ordinances and enter into contract agreements that might be needed for the collection of solid waste in their jurisdictions.
- 4. Osceola County Solid Waste Management Planning Committee is responsible for the planning of standards and methods to be considered for the processing and disposal of solid waste. These standards will be reviewed and approved by the Osceola County Planning Commission and presented to the Osceola County Board of Commissioners for approval. Both of these appointed committees will assist local units of government in the planning of collection and transportation systems of solid waste and provide liaison with state and federal solid waste management agencies.
- The Osceola County Planning Commission will be the coordinating agency for the solid waste education and public information process. Information obtained at seminars, workshops and training programs will be distributed by the Planning Commission to all local officials involved in the solid waste program. A continuous informational program will provide data, as it develops, to the public through news released to the mass communications media.

COORDINATION EFFORTS CONTINUED:

The Planning Commission will be responsible for the dissemination of informational and educational material that pertains to their unit of government.

Osceola County will coordinate its solid waste management plans with other ongoing projects in the region and within the county. This coordination will be done by the Osceola County Board of Commissioners, the Planning Commission, and any other entity as designated by the Board of Commissioners. This coordination and cooperation is particularly important in efforts by the county to deal with the DEQ and in efforts to obtain state and federal grants for solid waste projects. Ultimate authority for implementing the Solid Waste Management Plan, allocating funds, and authorizing solid waste agreements is the responsibility of the Osceola County Board of Commissioners.

Copies of letters from the various departments/agencies are included in the Appendix.

COSTS & FUNDING:

The following estimates the necessary management, capital, and operational and maintenance requirements for each applicable component of the solid waste management system. In addition, potential funding sources have been identified to support those components.

EVALUATION SUMMARY OF THE SELECTED SYSTEM:

The solid waste management system has been evaluated for anticipated positive and negative impacts on the public health, economics, environmental conditions, siting considerations, existing disposal areas, and energy consumption and production which would occur as a result of implementing this Selected System. In addition, the Selected System was evaluated to determine if it would be technically and economically feasible, whether the public would accept this Selected System, and the effectiveness of the educational and informational programs. Impacts to the resource recovery programs created by the solid waste collection system, local support groups, institutional arrangements, and the population in the County in addition to market availability for the collected materials and the transportation network were also considered. Impediments to implementing the solid waste management system are identified and proposed activities which will help overcome those problems are also addressed to assure successful programs. The Selected System was also evaluated as to how it relates to the Michigan Solid Waste Policy's goals. The following summarizes the findings of this evaluation and the basis for selecting this system:

The selected system, for the most part, is the same system that has been in effect in Osceola County for several years. The public is comfortable with this system and the way it is operated. We feel the acceptance from the public will remain positive. The selected system is not anticipated to have a negative impact in the future on either public health, economics, environmental conditions, siting considerations, existing disposal areas or energy consumption and production. This has been proven during the past with the use of this system. It is technically and economically feasible for our residents to continue using this system, providing pick-up costs remain relatively constant.

The educational and informational responsibilities will remain the same as with past practices, a cooperative effort between the County and MSU Extension. Recycling will continue to be managed through contract with private enterprise. The collection of newsprint will continue to be operated by non-profit service groups having collection sites in Evart and Reed City. In the event the non-profit groups discontinue their collection, the County can and will assume this responsibility.

There is not, at the present time, a County ordinance to regulate waste hauling. Because of this, local law enforcement and health department officials have only their own regulations with which to cite individuals or agencies in cases where violations occur. Budgetary concerns at the present time prevent hiring a staff. It is these same budgetary concerns that prevent sponsoring a County household hazardous waste collection. This type of service will be available to County residents at a landfill included in our plan, but cannot be offered locally at the present time.

Composting is practiced throughout the County by individuals, and is a service offered by both cities on a limited scale. With proper education and information, composting can be a practical way to reduce the amount of yard waste going to landfills. The County endorses and encourages this practice and will continue, in cooperation with MSU Extension and the Osceola Lake Conservation District to offer educational information to the public on the most effective way to compost.

This summary details how we plan to relate to the Michigan Solid Waste Policy goals as we have done in the past and will continue to do in the future.

ADVANTAGES AND DISADVANTAGES OF THE SELECTED SYSTEM:

Each solid waste management system has pros and cons relating to its implementation within the County. Following is an outline of the major advantages and disadvantages for this Selected System.

- 1. Addresses the needs of its residents and the rural nature of Osceola County.

NON-SELECTED

SYSTEMS

Before selecting the solid waste management system contained within this Plan update, the County developed and considered other alternative systems. The details of the non-selected systems are available for review in the County's repository. The following section provides a brief description of these non-selected systems and an explanation why they were not selected.

The following briefly describes the various components of the non-selected system.

ALTERNATIVE #2

RESOURCE CONSERVATION EFFORTS:

Osceola County will continue to support the operation of a recycling center for use by the residents of the County. This center is located in Reed City and owned and maintained by Recycle of Osceola County Inc. (a non-profit organization.). In addition, the townships and cities that engage in recycling and composting programs will be encouraged to continue these services.

VOLUME REDUCTION TECHNIQUES:

Osceola County will continue to support the operation of a recycling center for use by the residents of the County. This center is located in Reed City and owned and maintained by Recycle of Osceola County Inc. (a non-profit organization.). In addition, the townships and cities that engage in recycling and composting programs will be encouraged to continue these services.

RESOURCE RECOVERY PROGRAMS:

Private enterprise will be encouraged to continue to explore the most cost effective methods of recycling, offering the most return on the recycled materials.

COLLECTION PROCESSES:

The recommended system of collection should incorporate resident responsibility for the hauling and disposal of waste products and a voluntary house-to-house collection method by solid waste haulers operating within the county. The haulers should be required by regulation to pick up solid waste at each location at least once a week. The cities and townships would retain full control over collection activities and be responsible for the financing and establishment of any collection center, boxes, or transfer stations that are deemed necessary beyond what private enterprise is providing or willing to provide. Local governments pass regulations, laws or ordinances and enter into contract agreements that might be needed for the collection of solid waste in their jurisdictions. Transfer stations would be established and operated by private enterprise.

TRANSPORTATION:

The prevention of littering during collection and hauling would be achieved by the enforcement of local ordinances and regulations regarding solid waste haulers. The Michigan Department of Transportation, and DEQ, requires proper maintenance and operation of vehicles used by solid waste haulers for transportation of solid waste. Direct haul would take place to a landfill accepting Osceola County wastes.

DISPOSAL AREAS:

The present recommended method of disposal of solid waste from Osceola County is to transport it out of the county to an approved landfill. The primary landfills for Osceola County are Central

EVALUATION SUMMARY CONTINUED:

Landfill in Montcalm County, Northern Oaks in Clare County and Glen's Landfill in Leelanau County.

INSTITUTIONAL ARRANGEMENTS:

Osceola County endorses the concept of an independent-jurisdictional approach to the management of solid waste. Solid waste haulers operate independently within the County to provide services to residents.

EDUCATIONAL AND INFORMATIONAL PROGRAMS:

Osceola County would provide educational and informational programs to the public which promote waste reduction and resource recovery.

CAPITAL, OPERATIONAL, AND MAINTENANCE COSTS:

A recycling center owned by the County and operated by private enterprise: \$ 10-12,000/year. Collection costs for route collection: We were unable to obtain this information from private enterprise. Education provided by Osceola County, MSU Extension Service and Osceola Lake Conservation Service: \$3-4000/year. Transfer stations owned and operated by Osceola County: Building size, amount and type of equipment are based on the volume of waste processed. Specific areas would be identified for locations of stations, with sites developed based on the size needed for building construction. Contracts would be let to private enterprise for operation. Household hazardous waste collection facility: Building size, amount of equipment and staff would be determined by the volume of waste handled.

EVALUATION SUMMARY OF NON-SELECTED SYSTEM:

The non-selected system was evaluated to determine its potential of impacting human health, economics, environmental, transportation, siting and energy resources of the County. In addition, it was reviewed for technical feasibility, and whether it would have public support. Following is a brief summary of that evaluation along with an explanation why this system was not chosen to be implemented.

This alternative offers the same services as the selected alternative, plus it would provide for county owned and operated transfer stations. Household hazardous waste collection would be offered to residents at a facility built for that purpose and funded by the county. These are not economically viable options at this time.

EVALUATION SUMMARY CONTINUED:

ALTERNATIVE #3

RESOURCE CONSERVATION EFFORTS:

Recycling programs will be run in conjunction with the operation of the landfill, with the recycling center being located in Reed City. Should Recycle of Osceola Inc. disband, the operation of the recycling center/program would be the responsibility of the owner of the landfill.

Transfer stations would be established and operated by the County on county-owned property.

TRANSPORTATION:

The prevention of littering during collection and hauling would be achieved by the adoption of a solid waste regulation. This regulation should require proper maintenance and operation of the vehicle used by solid waste haulers for transportation of solid waste. Direct haul would take place to a landfill in Osceola County.

EVALUATION SUMMARY CONTINUED:

DISPOSAL AREAS:

This alternative would provide for a landfill located in Osceola County, and either owned and operated by the County, or owned and operated by private enterprise. The site for a landfill must comply with current state regulations, provide adequate disposal capacity for Osceola County's solid waste for a period of 20 years, must comply with restrictions and requirements of local ordinances and land use plans, accessible by an existing all weather road, located only where an aquifer is protected by a natural clay barrier and within approximately ten miles of the center of population of Osceola County. The site shall be no less than 10 miles from the corporate limits of any village or city. Development of any landfill would be encouraged only on clay loam soils or soils which can be shown to have equivalent properties. No construction of a landfill shall take place within 2000 feet of any year-round stream nor within one mile of any lake. No construction will be permitted in any wetland. Construction shall not obstruct any natural runoff or drainage area.

INSTITUTIONAL ARRANGEMENTS:

Osceola County endorses the concept of an independent-jurisdictional approach to the management of solid waste. Solid waste haulers operate independently within the County to provide services to residents.

EDUCATIONAL AND INFORMATIONAL PROGRAMS:

Osceola County, in cooperation with private disposal facilities, will provide educational and informational programs which promote waste reduction and resource recovery to the public

CAPITAL, OPERATIONAL, AND MAINTENANCE COSTS:

Recycling center at a landfill: \$50,000 construction costs. Operating costs would be part of the landfill operating costs. Collection costs for route collection: We were unable to obtain this information from private enterprise. Education provided by Osceola County, MSU Extension Service and Osceola-Lake Conservation Service. \$3 - 4000/year. Transfer stations established on county-owned property and operated by the County: Building size, amount and type of equipment are based on the volume of waste processed. Specific areas would be identified for locations of stations, with sites developed based on the size needed for building construction. Contracts would be let to private enterprise for operation. Construction of a landfill in Osceola County: \$300,000/acre double lined. Equipment for operation: \$1.1 million. Operating and personnel (four): \$900,000-\$1 million/year. (These estimates were obtained from private enterprise.)

EVALUATION SUMMARY OF NON-SELECTED SYSTEM:

The non-selected system was evaluated to determine its potential of impacting human health, economics, environmental, transportation, siting and energy resources of the County. In addition, it was reviewed for technical feasibility, and whether it would have public support. Following is a brief summary of that evaluation along with an explanation why this system was not chosen to be implemented.

EVALUATION SUMMARY CONTINUED:

Alternative #3 would provide for a landfill located in Osceola County, either owned and operated by the county or by private enterprise. Recycling programs would take place at the landfill and be part of the landfill operation. The landfill would also be the site of the annual household hazardous waste collection. Additionally, transfer stations would be provided by the county. A local ordinance would be adopted and enforced pertaining to the regulation of solid waste collection and disposal. There are no licensed landfills presently located in Osceola County nor are any anticipated in the immediate future. It is the opinion of the Solid Waste Management Planning Committee that public acceptance of a landfill located in Osceola County would be low. Alternative #3 was not selected for these reasons.

ALTERNATIVE #4

RESOURCE CONSERVATION EFFORTS:

Recycling programs will be run in conjunction with the operation of the landfill, with the recycling center being located in Reed City Should Recycle of Osceola Inc. disband, the operation of the recycling center/program would be the responsibility of the owner of the landfill.

VOLUME REDUCTION TECHNIQUES:

Recycling programs will be run in conjunction with the operation of the landfill, with the recycling center being located in Reed City. Should Recycle of Osceola Inc. disband, the operation of the recycling center/program would be the responsibility of the owner of the landfill.

RESOURCE RECOVERY PROGRAMS:

Private enterprise will be encouraged to continue to explore the most cost effective methods of recycling, offering the most return on the recycled materials.

COLLECTION PROCESSES:

The recommended system of collection would incorporate resident responsibility for the hauling and disposal of waste products and a voluntary house-to-house collection method by solid waste haulers operating within the county. The haulers should be required by regulation to pick up solid waste at each location at least once a week. The cities and townships should retain full control over collection activities and be responsible for the financing and establishment of any collection center, boxes, or transfer stations that are deemed necessary beyond what private enterprise is providing or willing to provide. Local governments pass regulations, laws or ordinances and enter into contract agreements that might he needed for the collection of solid waste in their jurisdictions. Transfer stations would be established and operated by the County on county-owned property.

EVALUATION SUMMARY CONTINUED:

TRANSPORTATION:

The prevention of littering during collection and hauling would be achieved by the adoption of a solid waste regulation. This regulation should require proper maintenance and operation of the vehicle used by solid waste haulers for transportation of solid waste. Direct haul would take place to a landfill in Osceola County.

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DISPOSAL AREAS:

This alternative would provide for a landfill with incinerator located in Osceola County, and either owned and operated by the County or owned and operated by private enterprise. The site for a landfill must comply with current state regulations, provide adequate disposal capacity for Osceola County's solid waste for a period of 20 years, must comply with restrictions and requirements of local ordinances and land use plans, accessible by an existing all weather road, located only where an aquifer is protected by a natural clay barrier and within approximately ten miles of the center of population of Osceola County. The site shall be no less than two miles from the corporate limits of any village or city. Development of any landfill would be encouraged only on clay loam soil or soils which can be shown to have equivalent properties. No construction of a landfill shall take place within 2000 feet from any year-round stream, nor within one mile of any lake. No construction will be permitted in any wetland. Construction shall not obstruct any natural runoff or drainage area. In addition, incineration services would be available at the landfill.

INSTITUTIONAL ARRANGEMENTS:

Osceola County endorses the concept of an independent-jurisdictional approach to the management of solid waste. Solid waste haulers operate independently within the County to provide services to residents.

EDUCATIONAL AND INFORMATIONAL PROGRAMS:

Osceola County, in cooperation with private disposal facilities, will provide educational and informational programs which promote waste reduction and resource recovery to the public.

CAPITAL, OPERATIONAL AND MAINTENANCE COSTS:

Recycling center at a landfill: \$50,000 construction costs. Operating costs would be part of the landfill operation. Collection costs for route collection: We were unable to obtain this information from private enterprise. Education provided by Osceola County in conjunction with private enterprise: \$3 - 4,000/year. Transfer stations established on county-owned property and operated by the County: Building size, amount and type of equipment are based on the volume of waste processed. Specific areas would be identified for locations of stations, with sites developed based on the size needed for building construction. Contracts would be let to private enterprise for operation. Construction of a landfill in Osceola County: \$300,000/acre double lined. Equipment for operation: \$1.1 million. Operating and personnel(four): \$900,000-1 million/year. (These estimates were obtained from private enterprise.) Construction of an incinerator at the landfill: We were unable to obtain this information from private enterprise.

EVALUATION SUMMARY OF NON-SELECTED SYSTEM:

The non-selected system was evaluated to determine its potential of impacting human health, economics, environmental, transportation, siting and energy resources of the County. In addition, it was reviewed for technical feasibility, and whether it would have public support. Following is a brief summary of that evaluation along with an explanation why this system was not chosen to be implemented.

This alternative is also contingent on a landfill with incinerator being located in Osceola County, with all educational, recycling, and household hazardous waste collection provided or managed by the landfill. This alternative also provides for the adoption of a local ordinance to regulate solid waste collection and disposal, and the provision of county-owned transfer stations. Educational programs would be entirely sponsored by the County, in cooperation with private disposal facilities. Incineration would also take place at the landfill.

There are no licensed landfills located in Osceola County at the present time, and none are anticipated in the immediate future. Additionally, budgetary concerns would prevent a county owned landfill at the present time.

It is also the consensus of the Solid Waste Planning Committee that a landfill with incineration capabilities located in Osceola County would not be readily accepted by the majority of the residents in the county.

ADVANTAGES AND DISADVANTAGES OF THE NON-SELECTED SYSTEM:

Each solid waste management system has pros and cons relating to its implementation within the County. Following is a summary of the major advantages and disadvantages for this non-selected system.

ADVANTAGES:

- 1. Alternatives #3 and #4 provide for a landfill located in the county.
- 2. Better potential for resource recovery.
- 3. Lower transportation costs.
- 4. Possible revenue source for the county.
- 5. Expanded recycling program.
- 6. Preserving rural nature of county with local controls regarding littering, solid waste management.
- 7. More direct input and control over waste collection and disposal.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

AND APPROVAL

The following summarizes the processes which were used in the development and local approval of the Plan including a summary of public participation in those processes, documentation of each of the required approval steps, and a description of the appointment of the solid waste management planning committee along with the members of that committee.

SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT PLANNING COMMITTEE APPOINTED:

The Solid Waste Management Planning Committee was appointed by the County Board of Commissioners on several dates in 1997 and 1998. All of the meetings were public meetings and the public was allowed to comment at all meetings.

PREPARATION OF THE PLAN BY THE SWMPC:

The Solid Waste Management Planning Committee held a total of twelve public meetings from October 14, 1997 to September 8, 1998, to prepare the draft Plan. At each meeting time was allotted for Public Comment. Two other meetings were held one on November 10, 1998 and on December 8, 1998 to make corrections to the Plan.

PUBLIC REVIEW PERIOD AUTHORIZED BY THE SWMPC:

At a Public meeting held on September 8, 1998, and by a unanimous vote (10-0), the SWMPC authorized the 90 day public review period to begin on September 10, 1998. Again time was allotted for Public Comment.

PUBLIC REVIEW PERIOD (SEPTEMBER 10, 1998 TO DECEMBER 9, 1998:

A public hearing was held on October 13, 1998 during the regular monthly meeting of the Osceola County Board of Commissioners.

APPROVAL OF THE PLAN BY THE SWMPC

At a Public meeting held on December 8, 1998, and by a unanimous roll call vote (10-0), the SWMPC approved the Plan with the noted corrections at this meeting.

APPROVAL OF THE PLAN BY THE COUNTY BOARD

At it's regular scheduled meeting held on December 8, 1998, the County Board of Commissioners gave a tacit approval of the Solid Waste Plan, with the formal approval forthcoming at it's next scheduled meeting date.

At it's scheduled meeting held on December 15, 1998, the Osceola County Board of Commissioners and by a unanimous roll call vote (8-0) approved the Plan and qualified it's release to all other units of government for their consideration.


Maps showing locations of solid waste disposal facilities used by the County.




















VENICE PARK LANDFILL SITE LOCATION MAP





Both Missaukee County and Osceola County are responsible for the collection and disposal of their own respective solid waste, and both are Michigan counties subject to the regulations and planning requirements of Section 11539a of Part 115, Solid Waste Management, of the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Act 1994 P.A. 451, as amended.

The Act requires that both the receiving and sending county's solid waste management plan include statements as to where solid waste will be sent to and/or will be received from, before wastes can be transported between counties.

The Missaukee County Solid Waste Management Plan provided for a mechanism to enter into reciprocal agreements such as this one:

- A. Missaukee County will agree to accept solid waste from Osceola County, for primary and/or standby backup disposal in solid waste facilities within its borders so long as they are open to the public and users will not be subject to discrimination in service or tipping fee price structure.
- B. Osceola County will agree to accept solid waste from Missaukee County for primary and/or standby backup disposal in solid waste facilities within its borders so long as they are open to the public and users will not be subject to discrimination in services or tipping fee price structure.

This agreement may be terminated by either county upon receipt of a mutually agreeable notice adequate to provide time for another method of primary disposal. if adequate notice is not mutually agreed to, then adequate notice shall be two years.

Both counties agree to assume their own and separate liability, and assume financial responsibility for payment of any damages, fines, etc., at their own cost, as would exist if this agreement had never been entered into.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED. That Osceola County will agree to accept the import of solid waste from Oceana County for both primary and contingency disposal in solid waste facilities within Osceola County so long as these facilities are open to the public and that Oceana County solid waste will not be subject to discrimination in services or tipping fee price structure.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That this agreement may be terminated by either Osceola County or Oceana County upon receipt of a mutually agreed upon notice that is adequate to provide for the necessary time to identify and procure another primary solid waste disposal site. If adequate notice is not mutually agreeable to either county, then adequate notice shall be determined as two years.

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED. That both Counties agree to assume their own and separate liability and that both Counties agree to assume their own financial responsibility for any payments for assessed damages, fines or penalties at their own cost as would exist if this agreement had never been entered into
