Steps for Responding to a Large* **Elemental Mercury Spill**

*Mercury spills that equal or exceed one pound (>2 Tablespoons)

Get professional (spill response) help!

(see Mercury Spill Cleanup Contractors List)

In the meantime, quickly do the following:

- 1. Close off the area immediately to people and animals.
- 2. Call 911 or your local fire department as human health may be adversely impacted.
- 3. Turn down the temperature or lower the thermostat. Temperature should be maintained below 65 degrees Fahrenheit.
- 4. Open windows and ventilate the area.
- 5. Surround and contain the spill. Prevent liquid mercury from running into nearby cracks, crevices, drains, and surface waters. Never pour mercury down the drain. Mercury is heavier than water and may get trapped in the plumbing system.
- 6. Notify state and local authorities. For a release to the environment of one pound or more, it is *mandatory* under federal regulations to call the numbers listed below:
 - a) National Response Center (NRC) 800-424-8802
 - b) DEQ's Pollution Emergency Alerting System (PEAS) 800-292-4706
 - c) Your Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) (Call SARA Title III Program at 517-373-8481 for LEPC Contacts)
