25,970 injuries and illnesses that required recuperation away from work beyond the day of the incident were reported in private industry workplaces during 2009.

This publication contains Case and Demographic data reported on the Survey of Occupational Injuries and Illnesses. This survey is conducted by the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS), U.S. Department of Labor, in cooperation with the Department of Energy, Labor & Economic Growth, Michigan Occupational Safety and Health Administration (MIOSHA), Management and Technical Services Division, Management Information Systems Section.


During 2009, a total of 25,970 injuries and illnesses that required recuperation away from work beyond the day of the incident were reported in private industry workplaces in Michigan. Nationally, there were a total of 964,990 reported.

The following charts give specific details regarding data collected by gender, age, length of service, nature, part, source and event of injuries, as well as the occupations at the time of injuries and illnesses.


GENDER

AGE


Percent distribution of nonfatal occupational injuries and illnesses involving days away from work by age of worker, Private industry 2009



- Men accounted for 57 percent of the 25,970 injury and illness cases.
- Workers between the ages of 35-54 accounted for half of the total injury and illness cases.
- Forty-one percent of the injury and illness cases involved workers who had been on the job for more than five years.

LENGTH OF SERVICE


Percent of nonfatal occupational injuries and illnesses involving days away from work by length of service with employer, Private industry 2009

Percent distribution of nonfatal occupational injuries and illnesses involving days away from work by nature of injury or illness, Private industry 2009




•Sprains, strains made up 41% of all nonfatal occupational injuries and illnesses in 2009.

•The trunk (shoulder and back) was injured in 32% of the injury and illness cases reported in 2009.

Percent distribution of nonfatal injuries and illnesses involving days away from work by event or exposure, Private industry 2009





•Floors, ground surfaces contributed to 23 percent of the occupational injuries and illnesses in 2009.

•The event of Contact with objects, equipment was the leading category involved in over one-fourth of the nonfatal occupational injuries and illness during 2009.
