


Upper Peninsula Population Trajectory Goal

 To continue to increase the bear population, but at a slower rate, by increasing harvest slightly

9,902 bear in 2019. Up 16% since 2012




Northern Lower Peninsula Population Trajectory Goal

 To slow the population growth to eventually achieve a stable population

2,402 bears in 2019. Up 69% since 2012






2020 Statewide Harvest (State Licensed Hunters)

- 1,797 bears harvested statewide
- Up 6% from 2019 (1,700)
- Approximately 6% above the 10-year average
- Very good success rates in many BMU's







Statistics from 2019 Bear Hunter Survey (Frawley)


- Most hunters (85%) relied primarily on bait only
- 12% relied primarily on dogs alone or a combination of baiting (strike) and dogs
- 80% of harvested bear were taken over bait
- Bait-only hunters had a 33% success rate, dog hunters had a 55% success rate







Statistics from 2019 Bear Hunter Survey (Frawley)

- The success rate of hunters that used a guide was 47%
- Approximately 711 hunters (14%) hired a guide
- 5,365 people bought a bear license, which is a decrease of 26% since 2011 (8,401)













UP: number of bears registered by BMU (State-licensed hunters)




NLP - State and Tribal Harvest Long-term average: 299



2021-22 Proposed UP Desired Harvest and License Quota

- State allocation: 1,185 (+5 from 2019-20)
 - Tribal allocation: 55 (same as 2019-20)
- State license Quota: 5,986 (-24 from 2019-20)

2021-22 Proposed NLP Desired Harvest and License Quota

- State allocation: 480 (+80 from 2019-20)
 - Tribal allocation: 68 (+12 from 2019-20)
- State license quota: 1,230 (+160 from 2019-20)

Baldwin	340	+31%
Gladwin	120	+9%
Red Oak	770	+10%



Proposed Regulatory Changes



Expand Archery-Only Season to Entire NLP

- Currently an archery-only season in the Red Oak BMU
- Proposal: establish an archery-only season in the Baldwin and Gladwin BMUs
 - Consistency across NLP BMUs
 - Increased opportunity
 - Increased harvest
 - Address nuisance issues
- Department supports this proposal



For NRC Consideration



Allow Bear Baiting Earlier in Michigan

- Currently legal to bait 31 days before the open season in a BMU
- Proposal: begin bear baiting on July 8
- Potential concerns:
 - Increased wolf/bear hound conflicts
 - Increased nuisance issues
 - Bear health
- Department does not support this proposal

Implement a Youth Bear Hunt

- Currently several options for youth hunters interested in bear hunting
- Proposal: award 18 bear licenses to current-year Hunter Safety graduates
- Potential concerns:
 - Limited impact on opportunity or recruitment
 - Complicated structure
 - Drawings not conducted by Department
- Department does not support this propose

Use of Bait Barrels on Department-Managed Lands

- Bait barrels were allowed for two-year trial period
- Proposal: re-instate bait barrels on Department-managed lands
- Potential concerns:
 - Majority have improper identification
 - Majority are left after season
 - Poor compliance on other requirements
- Department does not support this propose
