




Fisheries Orders For Action

FO-200: Statewide Trout, Salmon, Whitefish, Cisco, Grayling, and Smelt Regulations



Fisheries Order 200 For Information Only

- 2000 Consent Decree describes agreement regarding lake trout harvest limits in 1836 Treaty Ceded waters.
- Recreational harvest exceeded harvest limits per agreement
 MH-1 (2016); MM-4 (2018)
- Daily possession limits were reduced in 2019 to address exceedance.
- 2019 recreational harvest was below harvest limits




Fisheries Order 200 For Information Only

Recommendation:

•MH-1: Increase daily possession limit for lake trout and splake to 3

MM-4: Increase daily possession limit for lake trout and splake to 2
 Immediate effect


Change is not expected to result in an overage of lake trout harvest in 2020

Add Marbled Crayfish to the Prohibited Species List



Process - Invasive Species Order Amendment No. 1 of 2020

Authority to add or remove species from the prohibited species transferred from NRC to DNR via Executive Orders in 2009 and 2011

Criteria for listing:

- 1. Organism is not native to the state
- 2. Organism is not naturalized (i.e., sustained reproduction in wild), or if naturalized, not widely distributed
- 3. One of the following:
 - a) Potential to harm human health or to severely harm agricultural, natural, or silvicultural resources
 - b) Effective management controls for the organism are not available



Marbled Crayfish ("Marmorkrebs")

- Listed on Great Lakes Governors and Premiers "Least Wanted AIS List"
 - Present imminent threat to the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence River region
- Reproduces asexually (parthenogenetic)
- No native range, presumed product of captive breeding

2018 The New York Times This Mutant Crayfish Clones Itself, and It's Taking Over Europe



Primary risk of introduction is pet release

- Initially discovered in the German pet trade (mid-1990s)
- Documented in wild in Germany, Italy, the Netherlands, Japan, and Madagascar
- Impacts and spread where populations have become established
- Threat to natural resources
 - Aggressive behavior traits
 - Introduce disease
 - Alter fish communities
 - Degrade water quality

- Consulted with Commission of Agriculture and Rural Development in March 2020
- Next Steps
 - Recommend listing Marbled Crayfish as prohibited to DNR-Director
 - Officially list in May, if recommendation is approved
