

## Michigan Frog Calls

<b>1. Wood Frog</b>	Hoarse quacking with little carrying power
<b>2. Western Chorus Frog</b> (Boreal Frog is only found on Isle Royale)	"Crreek" lasts ½ to 2 seconds; similar to sound of fingernail running along fine-toothed comb.
<b>3. Northern Spring peeper</b>	High ascending "peep;" chorus resembles jingling of sleigh bells.
<b>4. Northern Leopard Frog</b>	Deep rattling snore interspersed with chuckling sound of thumb rubbing against balloon.
<b>5. Pickerel Frog</b>	Steady low-pitched snore with little carrying power, similar to Leopard Frog.
<b>6. American Toad</b>	Musical trill lasting up to 30 seconds, ends abruptly.
<b>7. Eastern Gray Treefrog</b>	Short, loud trill lasting up to one second.
<b>8. Cope's Gray Treefrog</b>	Short, loud trill lasting a half second or less; faster and harsher than Eastern Treefrog; nasally "wa-a-a-a"
<b>9. Mink Frog</b>	Likened to sound of horses' hooves on a cobblestone street.
<b>10. Green Frog</b>	Similar to the twang of a loose banjo string or large rubberband; usually given as a single note.
<b>11. Bullfrog</b>	Deep bass notes, similar to a foghorn.
<b>12. Blanchard's Cricket Frog (Lower Peninsula only)</b>	The voice of the Eastern or Blanchard's Cricket Frog is a series of clicks, sounding like rocks tapped together. The calls start out slowly, then gradually increase in speed.
<b>13. Fowler's Toad (Lower Peninsula only)</b>	Short call of 1-4 seconds duration is harsh and unmusical, and sounds similar to a sheep bleating in the distance.
