





State of Michigan (DARD) must perform increased cattle testing in the affected county as described in the MOU



Current TB events



Surveillance is ongoing in both deer and cattle

 To date in 2019, over 900 deer have been tested for bovine TB across the state

In cattle:

- Per the MOU, all cattle producers in Enhanced Wildlife Biosecurity area must allow USDA-WS access to conduct targeted deer removal on their farm
 - ~125 active commercial herds in this area
 - Requirement waived if selling directly to slaughter
- Two additional TB-positive herds have been found for a total of 75 infected herds

ANTLER POINT RESTRICTIONS SURVEY IN THE DEER MANAGEMENT UNITS OF THE THUMB AREA

APR Proposal

- The Thumb Hunters for Antler Point Restrictions (APRs) submitted a proposal to modify deer harvest regulations in Huron, Lapeer, St. Clair, Sanilac, and Tuscola counties (Thumb Area).
- Proposed APRs aimed to protect most 1½-year-old bucks from harvest. This would be achieved by requiring all bucks taken in this area to have at least <u>four</u> points on one antler.
- People that were currently exempt from APRs would continue to be exempt.

APR Evaluation Process

- The NRC requested that the DNR develop a process to review proposed APR regulations, and these guidelines were reviewed and endorsed by the NRC.
- Evaluation process developed jointly by the DNR and an APR workgroup made up of representatives from several organizations and members of the deer hunting community.
- At least 66% of hunters in the affected area must support mandatory APRs.
- Recommended a scientifically designed survey to evaluate support for APR.

APR Survey Process

- Randomly select sample.
- Sent a cover letter with an enclosed questionnaire and postage-paid return envelope via first-class mail.
- Initial mailing was followed by two additional questionnaires to nonrespondents.

APR Survey Process

- Question asked "Do you support this proposed antler-point restriction?"
- The percentage of support was measured by dividing the number of "yes" responses by the sum of those responses indicating "yes" or "no."
- At least 50% of people receiving the survey had to reply in order to accept the results of the survey.

Support from hunters did not meet the 66% target to trigger a recommendation to implement the proposed antler point restrictions in the 5-county Thumb Area.



Proposed Antlerless Quota Changes in the UP



Moving the Liberty Hunt

- Completion of changes originally brought forward during Bear Regulations
 - Would move Liberty hunt from Saturday following September 15 to the second Saturday in September
 - 2019: September 14-15
 - Department does not anticipate a biological impact from this move


Redefining bait

- Previous definition:
 - Any substance composed of grain, mineral, salt, fruit, vegetable, hay, or other food material used to lure, entice, or attract deer
- Proposed definition
 - Intent for consumption
 - Excludes scents

Proposed Baiting/Feeding Ban



Proposed Baiting/Feeding Ban


- CWD Response/Surveillance Plan
- Recommended by UP CWD Working Group at March 21 meeting
- Consistent timeline with previous CWD detections
 - 3 county ban in 2015
- Exceptions available for hunters with disabilities during Liberty/Independence hunts

Antlerless Archery Options

- Reinstate antlerless option during archery season in areas open to antlerless hunting
 - Archery hunters hunting in select DMUs would be able to resume pursuing antlerless deer using their deer/combo licenses
 - DMU 022 (if approved in antlerless order), 055,
 121, 122, 155, 255

Lower Peninsula Recommendations

Expansion of CWD Management Zone



- Add Barry, Lenawee, and Midland Counties
 - Counties within 10
 miles of known CWD
 positive animals
 - Expectation to reevaluate CWDManagement Zone in 2020

Antler Point Restrictions in CWD Core Zone

- Propose 4 point antler point restriction on deer/combo license in Mecosta, Montcalm, and Ionia counties
 - Result of research project requested in August 2018
- Project would evaluate impact of APRs on deer herd dynamics
- Project would sunset in March 2022*

^{*}Unless clear and negative impacts are seen prior to completion

Administrative Changes

- Identification on constructed ground blinds on public land
- Licenses valid for early/late antlerless seasons in disease management areas
- Deer rehabilitation
- Intrastate transportation of cleaned skulls
